Hospital may convert to nursing home, board decision due

An application to convert Donley County Hospital District's now vacant 20 bed hospital facility into a nursing home will be filed with the Texas Hospital Commission within the next few weeks, according to Hospital Board President Ernest Barbee.

The board approved the filing at their April meeting. The Medical Center facility currently houses a 22 bed nursing home which, according to Hospital Administrator Jerry Knight, operates at a "break even" financial status. Knight said this was primarily due to the home's size. He speculated, however, if the other wing of the facility was opened as a nursing home "we'd see a considerably net gain per month in profits."

Barbee said the board's purpose in filing for the conversion was not to "open a nursing home and leave it as a nursing home. The people voted for a hospital and we want to keep it a hospital. But we felt we had to do something other than let the building stand idle."

He said increased profits from the nursing home would speed up eliminating debts currently owed by the district. Knight added, once the medical facility was placed on a money making status, alternate money sources for hospital grants and loans would be contacted. "When applying for money," he said, "we could show them a facility making a profit rather than one just breaking even."

Excess money earned from the expanded nursing home could also be used as a "pad" if the hospital eventually re-opens. Knight said smaller hospitals generally lose money until new doctors' practices are established. He said this financial "pad" could absorb these expected losses.

Barbee said if the district becomes financially able to open the facility as a hospital, the nursing home could be gradually phased out or the entire facility could be enlarged.

If the home was phased out, the district would stop accepting any new applications for admittance. Knight said the nursing home currently has a long waiting list of applicants and filling the additional space would be no problem.

The only modification to the existing hospital facility, Knight said, would be the addition of hand rails in the hallways. He estimated the change over would cost approximately \$300.

The application is currently being completed by Knight. He said he hoped to have it submitted by May 15 at the latest. Once submitted, the Texas Health Commission has 90 days for approval. If approved, Knight said, the board can decide if they want to go ahead with the conversion.

Barbee said the board felt this conversion would give the district a "financially sound" operating facility plus provide a needed service to the area.

Two races won, two in run-offs

Donley County voters decided two local political races at the Democratic Primary Saturday, May 1, and left two to be decided at a run-off primary Saturday, June 5.

County residents who have not registered still have Thursday, May 6, to do so and be eligible to vote June 5. Voters must register 30 days prior to the election.

Candidate for County School Superintendent Jerry Hawkins won that race Saturday over two opponents, incumbent Maurice Risley and Richard Finch. Incumbent Commissioner of Pct. 1, Gene White, also defeated opponent Junior Spier.

In the Donley County Sheriff/Tax Assessor race, Sheriff Frank Lindsey, Jr. will face Truett Behrens at the June 5 run-off.

Also in the run-off will be incumbent Pct. 3 Commissioner Junior Hill and opponent Buford Holland.

The only county office unopposed on the May 1 ballot was County Attorney John Knorrp, polling 1,263 votes.

Of the 2,450 registered voters in Donley County, 1,621 turned out for the election.

In the County School Superintendent race, winner Hawkins gathered 839 votes, 63 more than the combined votes of his two opponents. Finch had 405 votes to Risley's 371.

To avoid a run-off election, the winning candidate must obtain at least one more vote than the combined number of votes of all his opponents. In a run-off, the top two vote gatherers oppose each other.

Gene White pulled in 223 votes from residents of Donley County's Pct. 1. Junior Spier obtained 192. In the Pct. 3 race, Buford Holland had 192, Junior Hill, 175; and C.C. Ayers, 68.

For County Sheriff/Tax Assessor, Truett Behrens gathered 573 votes; Frank Lindsey, Jr., 411; James E. "Slick" Johnston, 364; Carl Carter, 176; Homer Holman, 56; and Louis Bogue, 49.

In the national elections, Donley County Democrats favored delegates for Jimmy Carter with each delegate getting an average of 671 votes. Lloyd Bentsen delegates obtained an average 329 votes with George Wallace gathering 200.

Fifty persons voted in the Republican primary with Ronald Reagan the favorite. Reagan polled an average of 39 votes while President Gerald Ford obtained 11.

The totals varied for each delegate because every voter could vote three times. This was the first Texas Presidential primary and some confusion existed at the polls concerning voting procedure. County chairmen for both Republican and Democratic primaries reported a few persons voted in the county election for local offices and attempted to vote at another party polling place for national spots.

Local winning Democratic candidates will be unopposed in the Nov. 4 National Election.

These candidates will begin their terms Jan. 1, 1977. See inside page 11 for voter preference in the nine Donley County ballot boxes.

Beth Walker wins 'Secretary of Year'

Man builds model of 1915 butcher shop

By Fred Russell's own admission, he "Can't be still."

The 79 year old Clarendon butcher tried retiring 12 years ago, but today is still working part-time at a job he's done for the past 53 years, a butcher in a meat market.

"I'm not braggin," Russell said, "but I've reached a point where I don't have to work. I just like doing it."

Russell said he also likes his independence. He hasn't actually worked for anyone in these 53 years. Instead, Russell set up his butcher shop in different stores, a separate operation from the rest of the grocery's business.

He learned meat cutting in 1915. Then, the 17 year old Russell traded "a mare, a colt and a forty-five dollars" for a McLean meat market. "I worked at it for a while then quit to do some cowboying," he said. "I thought it was too confining."

He said his cowboying days ended at 21, when he married.

It was his earlier attempt at retirement in 1964 that prompted Russell to take up another method of keeping busy, constructing scale

models of equipment and tools used in butcher shops.

The model he used for his first model shop was the business he traded for in 1915. He constructed scaled down versions of each piece of equipment in the shop including a meat locker, the butcher block complete with all the cutting equipment and the wrapping table.

Russell's meat locker, constructed from scrap wood and metal pieces, has three sections with working doors complete with hinges and latches. He explained ice was stored in the case's small upper compartment to keep the meat cooled. The small lower section was used for storage of cheese and lunch meats. The third large section was used to store half and sides of beef.

The most intricate part of Russell's model butcher block is the tiny cutting tools arranged in a metal rack on the block's side.

Russell had always made his own knives for his business, by his own estimate, "over a thousand or more, 80 or 90 percent of which I've given away." He used basically the same method to construct his model cutting tools as for larger working models.

Each small knife is constructed of metal with

wooden handles attached to either side of the butt end. Russell made a thin bladed boning knife, a steak knife, and a meat cleaver, all to scale.

The butcher block also has a bone saw complete with serrated teeth on the blade and a butcher's "steel" used to sharpen blades of the cutting tools.

To fashion these blades, Russell said he honed small metal bits of chrome with a metal file and emory cloth. The handles are whittled from various types of fine grained wood like mahogany.

To complete the shop's equipment, Russell constructed a meat table with meat scales at one end and a roll to dispense meat wrapping paper at the other. The balance tray of the scale is mounted on a spring, adding a realistic up and

down movement. The roll mounted in the wrapping paper dispenser also turns freely.

Russell is currently constructing another butcher shop model, this one patterned after a shop he

owned in 1924. He and his wife Hattie also garden.

Russell has two children, a son, Cleo Russell of Columbus, Ohio; and a daughter, Mrs. Gene (Louise) Butler, of Resedo, California.

Escaped prisoner caught here

An escaped prisoner from the Canyon jail was recaptured in Clarendon Thursday, April 29, by Donley County Deputy Eddie Hammons.

The prisoner, David Wallen, 18, of Amarillo had escaped from the jail earlier that day. Wallen was being arraigned at the Randall County jail for charges of car theft when he managed to walk from the building unnoticed. Sheriff deputies discovered Wallen had

escaped, apparently taking a 1971 Toronado. Descriptions of the suspect and the automobile were dispatched over police radios.

Wallen was driving towards Clarendon on Hwy. 287 when the '71 Toronado ran out of gas. Wallen hitchhiked into Clarendon where he was spotted and arrested by Hammons.

Wallen is currently in Randall County jail awaiting trial for the earlier car theft charge.

Presbyterians begin task force

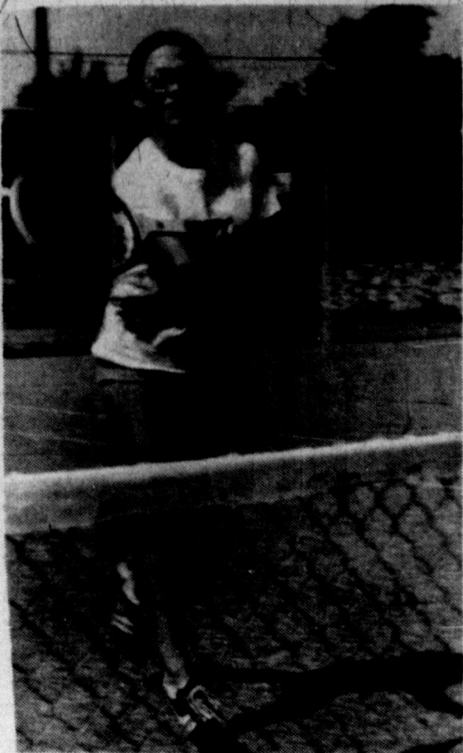
The several Presbyterian churches in the Panhandle district known as The Palo Duro Union Presbytery have designated certain ones of their congregations to represent them as members of a "task force".

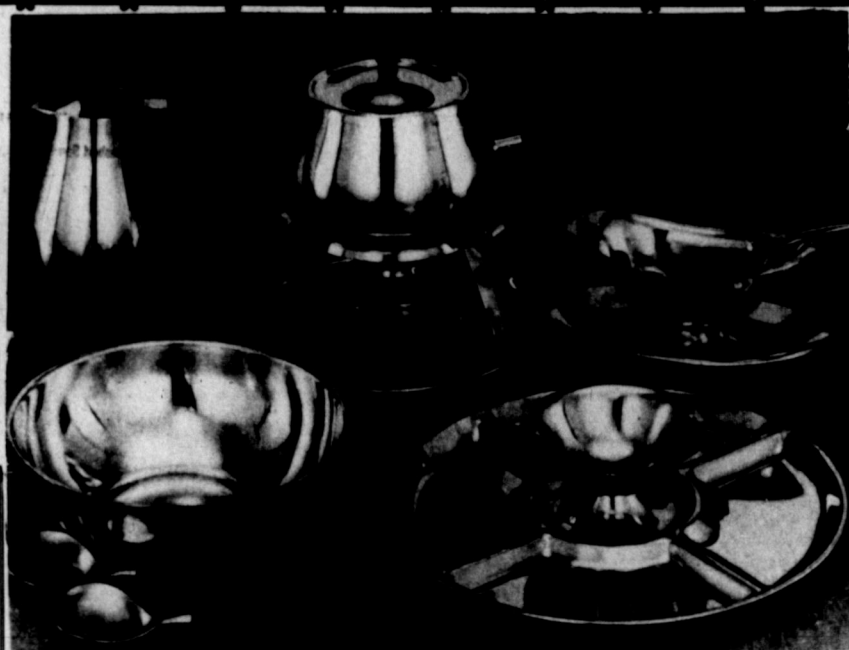
