

Donley County commissioners meet in regular session Monday

Donley County Commissioner's Court met in regular session Monday, May 10, with all four precinct commissioners attending.

Persons attending the court session included Mrs. Helen Coker, a resident of Pct. 2 in the county. Mrs. Coker asked the court, specifically Pct. 2 Commissioner Olace Hicks, to repair a bridge in her precinct which she said was in bad disrepair. Hicks said he would look at the problem

"tomorrow if not today" and see what could be done to fix it.

Other guests before the commission included County Social workers Robbie Hill and Eureka Mays for reports of the Community Action and Planned Parenthood organizations. They said Community Action had opened up a part time branch office in Hedley and a clientele of 150 were already enrolled. Mrs. Mays also reported a membership of over 200 in the county's Planned Parent-

hood Chapter.

Junior High Principal retiring

After 21 years service with the Clarendon Public School System, Junior High Principal Stina Cain is retiring this spring.

Cain, 65, will be honored Thursday night, May 13, with a dinner presented by Clarendon School's faculty and staff.

He came to Clarendon in 1955. His academic career

began in 1935, as a math teacher and assistant football coach for Wheeler High School. He later became athletic director of that school and eventually, Elementary Principal.

During the war years, Cain resigned at Wheeler for a defense job with Civilian Ordnance. "I tried to enlist twice in Navy programs," he said. "But both times their quotas had just been filled." Cain said he expected to be drafted, but when called before his draft board was told his civilian job was too important to the war effort to be taken away from.

During those years, Cain's field was studying and researching better ways to produce wartime ammunition. After the war, he returned to education working as a physical education instructor in Monahan.

Cain's interest in physical education dated back to his college days when he played end for 1933-35 state champion Amarillo Junior College football teams. He also received a football scholarship to West Texas State in Canyon after leaving AC.

This interest was continued through the years by officiating in high school and college basketball and football games for 32 years. "I've refereed games everywhere this side of the Mississippi." In those 32 years, Cain says he specifically remembers two crucial calls. One, in a play-off game between Texas Tech and Texas A&M, Cain had to call a pass incomplete in the final game seconds, losing the game for A&M. The other call involved spotting a punt kicked out of bounds. "I remember putting my hat down on the sideline to mark the spot," he said, "and from way up in the crowd I heard this voice say, 'You missed a foot ref.' In every crowd there was always a foghorn."

Last game officiated by Cain was in 1967, a play-off match between a Wichita Falls high school and Brownwood. "The traveling

around got to be too tiresome in the end," Cain said. He was granted an honorary lifetime membership in the Southwest Basketball Officials Assn. upon retirement from the profession.

Cain's career as an official had a part in finding the principal's job in Clarendon. He said he'd stopped to eat here many times while on game trips. While here he met several local school personnel and developed a liking for the city, he said. In the early fifties, Cain had begun work on his masters at West Texas while operating a laundry business in Amarillo. Through these classes he learned of the principal's job opening here. He began as principal in the fall of 1955.

Since that time, Cain said, there have been quite a few changes.

"Kids are different now," he said. "Children now want to know why, they want to be involved and they want immediate results. They seem like they want something, and sometimes I don't think they're getting it."

"We always had two type kids, the kind who accept and the one's who question. Today, it seems like there are more who question."

In retirement, Cain said he plans to remain "a young 65 year old," and do the things he's always done: play golf, fish and hunt.

"One thing I'd like to encourage," he said, "is for parents to become more involved with their children's education. If they've got questions, they should come up here, to the school, and ask them. If they want to know why their kid is not doing well, we can show them."

Cain and his wife Kathryn, have two children: Carol, Mrs. Mike (Carol) Mills, a teacher in the Roswell Public School System; and Bob, a National Park superintendent in Lincroft, New Jersey.

Donley County land owners help themselves, save money

A group of Jericho and Martin land owners helped themselves and saved Donley County money recently by donating their time and equipment to help Pct. 1 Commissioner Gene White work on area roads.

Two Martin landowners completed caliche work on roads in that area this week. Caliche donated by Ray

Pittman was dumped for spreading on local roads by landowners Pete Land and Bobby Cole.

The Jericho project began when people living in the Jericho area wanted to have many dirt roads there caliche. In 1973, they had 4 1/2 miles of this work done by pledging \$6,000 themselves for the work with another \$6,000 in county funds put up. The stock farmers did much of the work themselves.

The Jericho landowners have been assisting Gene White maintain the dirt roads in Jericho each spring since 1973. To date they added another nine miles to the roads they've topped with caliche.

"Since '73," White said, "we've just done what we

could." This spring, the stock farmers donated seven of their trucks for hauling the caliche. The county's front end loader and motorgrader were used to load and spread the caliche along with another motorgrader donated by area stock farmers Andy and David Brown.

White estimated that the Martin and Jericho land owners, by donating their time and equipment, had saved Donley County thousands of dollars.

Camping trips offer summer boredom relief

Summer's free time can turn into a dreary bore for children if parents don't provide a little direction. This doesn't mean parents have to spend every waking moment entertaining their children -- in fact, by giving direction at the start, parents may be surprised to find the children satisfied to entertain themselves.

Of course, planning for and attending summer camp take much time -- of both parent and child. But what about the family who decides summer camp isn't for them? Families might plan their

own camping trip to give children camping experiences and the advantage of family togetherness.

Sometimes local organizations sponsor day camps that give children different activities during the day but don't require overnight away from home. These are usually less expensive than lengthy camps. They're often staffed by volunteers, and the youngsters themselves participate more actively in running of day camps. Most day camps serve a broader age span.

If the family doesn't want any type of camping experience, short-range trips to explore local sights might be popular. Begin the day with an outdoor breakfast at a roadside park and explore local archeological discoveries, or caves, or natural springs. Such things like this can be found in Palo Duro Canyon in our immediate vicinity.

Another idea is to help the children decide on something to collect as a summer project. Garage sales provide a treasure trove of interesting items from books to bottles.

If one parent has a job requiring travel, maybe he could take one child at a time along for a week's trip. This should be scheduled beforehand so each child will know when his turn is. A younger child can take books along to read while the parent conducts business -- or an older child could sightsee alone while the parent is busy. This plan gives each

child lots of private time with his parent, along with a chance to get away from ordinary home surroundings -- making it a 'special' time. Summer can be an exciting time for school age children.

Other group activities that help entertain a child during the summer months is 4-H activities, little league baseball or softball, swimming, church group activities and many others.

Pointers offered for pruning trees

Improper pruning of trees can be just as bad or worse than not pruning them at all, emphasizes Ronald Gooch, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. On the other hand, proper pruning can turn a tree or shrub into a beautiful plant specimen.

Gooch offers 10 pointers to consider as far as the pruning operation is concerned:

1. Do not top trees. Topped trees often die because the topped branches cannot heal, thus letting in decay fungi and bacteria. Also, side branches below topped stubs

are usually weaker and are subject to wind damage.

2. Prune at the right season. Prune deciduous trees and shrubs, vines, ground covers and evergreens during the winter. However, an exception is that spring-flowering shrubs such as azaleas, forsythia, bridal wreath and gardenias should be pruned after flowering.

3. Use proper tools. Hand shears can handle twigs under one-half inch in diameter. Long-handled lopping shears are needed for timber one-half to one inch in diameter. Branches larger

than one inch in diameter should be cut with a pruning saw.

4. Make all cuts flush with the trunk. Stubs don't heal properly and the decay and deterioration spreads down the trunk of the tree until wind topples it.

5. Seal big cuts with pruning paint. Use pruning paint on cuts larger than one inch in diameter to ward off insects and diseases.

6. Repair damaged plants at once. Plants should be kept healthy year-round; this means pruning damaged twigs or branches.

7. Use common sense when pruning. Watch for limbs that may fall over power lines or damage other property.

8. Always prune after transplanting. Pruning is especially important for balled-and-burlapped plants; this compensates for roots lost during digging.

9. Beware of the door-to-door pruner. If you can't handle the pruning job yourself, hire someone with an established operation and years of reputation.

10. Have a reason for pruning. Don't prune just to pass the time of day.

Following these simple guidelines can save many headaches, heartaches and "butchered" plants, contends Gooch.

Dr. Lyle E. Eckley, District Superintendent presented the award to Rev. R.A. Noakes, church pastor.

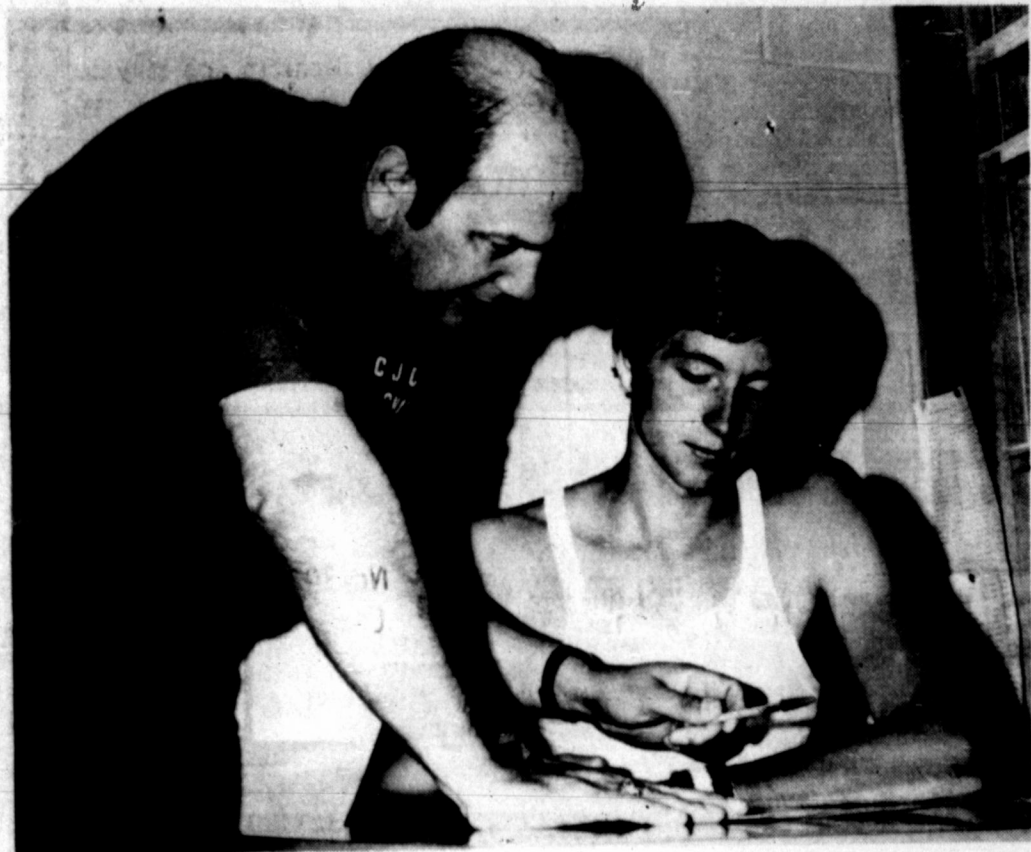
There are 98 churches on the district, and only one award made each year. It was given for increased membership - evangelistic outreach - and cooperation in district and general interest. The church has made local

Nearby Indian site excavated by WT team

Recent excavations of an archaic Indian site on the Bitter Creek Ranch near Clarendon produced what the archeologists expected -- little in the way of artifacts and a lot in the way of questions.

"I can give you a long list of what this site did not produce," says Dr. Jack Hughes, West Texas State University professor of geology who oversees WTSU digs.

"It didn't produce very many of the usual things that

later sites have in abundance, such as flint projectile points, grinding implements, knives and grinding stones," he continues. "It is intriguing."

What WTSU graduate student Chuck Hood and his assistants did find in the three weeks of weekend digging were the boiling stones, choppers and Clear Fork gouges, which are typical of archaic Indian sites.

Hughes says the choppers and boiling stones were probably used to process and cook plant matter for consumption, but that no one has yet figured out the uses for the gouges.

"We are looking at some people who probably lived during the aliothermal, the long drought that occurred between 5000 and 2000 B.C., who had to live a very simple hand-to-mouth existence," Hughes says. "These implements suggest very limited hunting activities."

Two other oddities of the site are its extensiveness, covering an area of about 1000 by 200 feet, and the fact the two-thirds of its artifacts were on the surface of the ground while the rest were within three inches.

"It has been a very stable surface, which is surprising," Hughes says.

Chuck Hood, who did the original survey of the site for the Conservation Service, excavated about 15 five-foot squares.

He and his WT student assistants, Kathy Barr of Snyder and Janice Bass of Canyon, found indications that the site had been used more than once during the early to middle archaic period.

"There are scores and scores of these kind of sites in the southeastern Panhandle," Hughes notes.

Home preservation hints

Frozen fruits and vegetables offer summer flavors in the coldest of winter--and are easy to preserve and use. Pickled products give tang to meals and enhance the flavor of milder tasting foods.

Jellied products furnish tasty spreads for breakfast breads and offer a useful way to use good fruits that are over-ripe and too small or too large for uniform use in canning or freezing.

Dried fruits and vegetables offer versatile storage and variety in flavor. Besides these four methods, home canning is one of the most widely used and popular methods of food preservation. In addition to endless

variety, home-preserved foods are quick and easy to use--being close as an arm's reach. Also, except for frozen items, they release freezer space and require no electricity for storage.

How can you learn these food preservation methods? Enroll in the mailout series offered by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.
