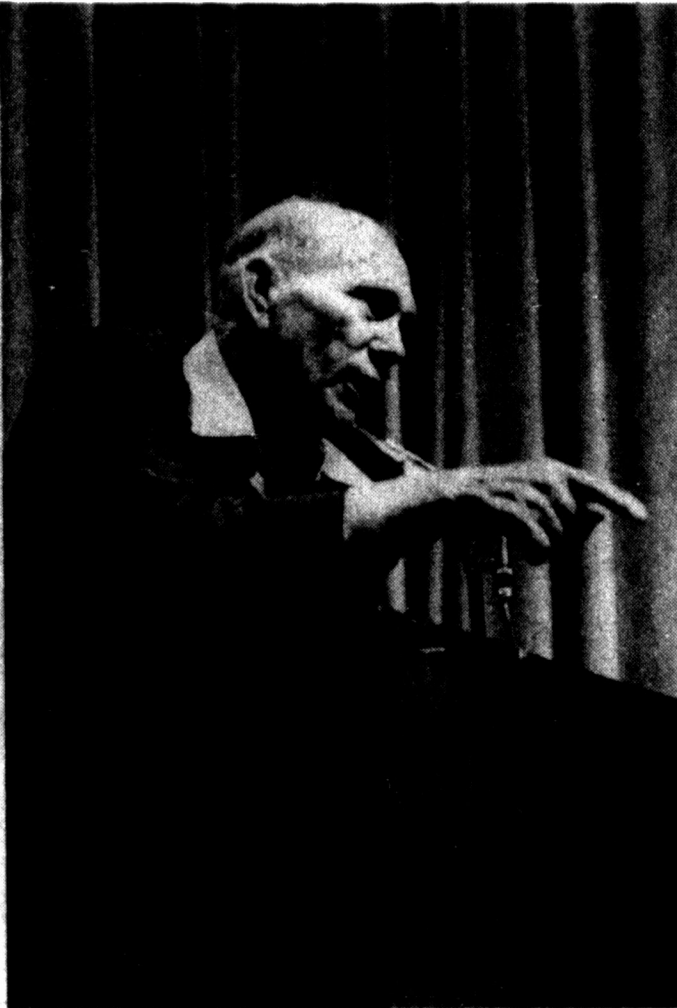

Primary run-off Saturday

Donley County's Democratic Primary run-off election is this Saturday, June 5, with two county races to be decided.

Incumbent Donley County Sheriff/Tax Assessor Frank Lindsey Jr. faces opponent Truett Behrens and Pct. 3 Commissioner Junior Hill faces opponent Buford Holland.

Saturday, a tote board will be set up in front of Tunnell's Pharmacy on Clarendon's Main St. and election results will be posted as the County's nine boxes' vote count are reported.

Central office for election results will be the Emmett O. Simmons Insurance Agency.

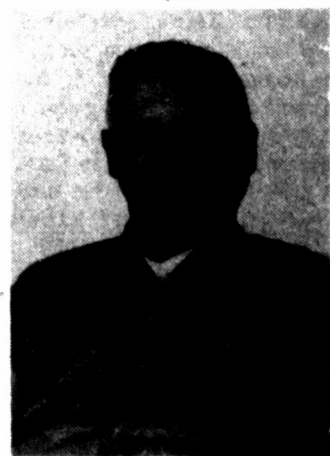
All persons who cast votes in the Republican primary May 1 are ineligible to vote in the Democratic Primary this Saturday.

According to the County Clerk's office, 50 absentee votes had been cast for Saturday's races as of Tuesday morning, June 1.

This number was approximately 20 shy of the absentee votes cast in the first primary. Absentee voting deadline was Tuesday, at 5 p.m.

In the May 1 Democratic Primary, Truett Behrens lead all six candidates for Sheriff/Tax Assessor with 573 votes. Lindsey followed with 411. Combined votes of the other four candidates totaled 645.

In the precinct commissioner race, Buford Holland

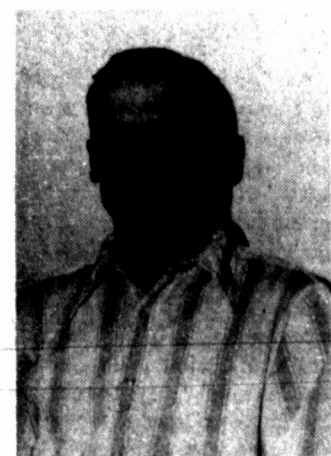

lead incumbent Hill 192 votes to 175. Sixty-eight votes were cast in that election for third candidate C.C. Ayers.

All Donley County voting boxes will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday.

Voters must vote in the precinct they are registered in. Democrats for Pct. 1 will have three ballot boxes where they may cast their votes. Box 1 will be placed in Howardwick's City Hall, election judge Mrs. Bill Littlefield; Box 4, the Old

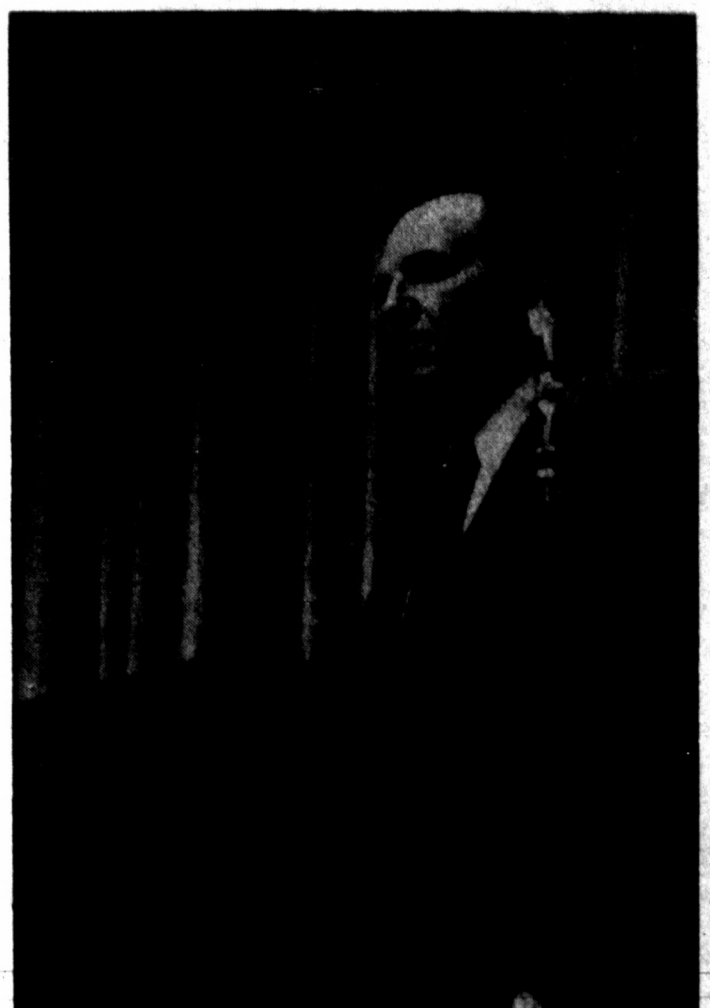
College Building in Clarendon, election judge Willard Skelton; and Box 6, at the

Community Center in the Martin community, Pete Land, election judge.

Precinct 2 voters will have one ballot box. In past years, Box 2 has been located at the Oddfellows Hall in Clarendon. It has been moved this year to the Donley County Courthouse. Election judge will be Joan Kidd.

Two ballot boxes will be available for voters in Pct. 3. Box 3 will be placed in the Community Hall at Lelia Lake, J.L. Butler, election judge; and Box 5 will be at the Lions Club Hall in Hedley, Mrs. Herlie Moreman election judge.

Pct. 4 will also have two ballot boxes. Box 4 will be at the Farmers State Bank and Trust Co. in Clarendon, Mrs. Fred E. Chamberlain, election judge; and Box 9 will be located in the home of W.O. Hommel in the Alanreed community. Hommel will also serve as election judge.

Art of bottle collecting, rewarding hobby for two Clarendon men

Bottle collecting is the compelling force behind the hobbies pursued independently by Steve Estes, a 22 year old welder, and Junior Putman, veteran plumber, of Clarendon.

With the insatiable curiosity of a small boy to dig and look in unlikely places, Steve Estes unearthed an old Mason half-gallon jar with the date '1858' on it. At the time he was about 12 years old and that first jar and the excitement of discovery started him on the bottle hunting hobby he has enjoyed for the past ten years, and the additional collecting of other items such as keys and old license plates.

One of the nice things

about this type of hobby, Steve said, is being able to store it for practically any length of time and then to get involved in the collecting again as inclination and time permits.

Estes has his own site for digging bottles and most of his collection came from a 16 by 16 foot space at a depth of approximately 12 inches. The excavation lasted five or six days and the fruit of Estes labors are some of the finest bottles he has today. The location of the 'dig' is something not to be disclosed, Estes said.

Many of the bottles are clear glass, colored with the iridescence of ageing in the damp earth. Some examples of Estes' finds are a Newbro's Herpicide for the scalp bottle and a cork type

vanilla extract bottle. Old snuff bottles, ink bottles and perfume bottles are also on display.

Others find bearing little resemblance to today's containers of the same products are a Hinds Honey & Almond Cream glass bottle and a Chamberlains bottle. Both clear glass hand lotion bottles are much like Dr. Price's extract bottle in design. A Mentholatum jar he found is of white opaque glass about an inch across the top and two inches high and an unearthed Dr. Pepper Bottle has written "Good for Life" on it. Among the beverage bottles are Royal Crown Cola, Grapette, Lemonette and Virginia Dare all in the regular pop bottle size of the early part of this century. One of the most

attractive bottles is an old whiskey bottle decanter. Along with the approximately 100 bottles Steve has is an old copper Aladdin lamp, the mantle type, a Gene Autry six shooter and a toy rubber car. Keys in his collection are in a variety of sizes and types. Hollow shaft keys outnumber the others. This type key was used extensively in the late 1880's on furniture locks, desks, chests and cupboards and ranged from the very plain to fancy embossed ones shown in Steve's collection.

Although he has never used it ("I don't know how it works," he explained,) Steve has a metal detector that belonged to his grandfather Estes. It is a wooden box measuring 24 inches by 2 1/2 inches. It has a top that slides open and shut along

grooves; an eight inch glass cylinder filled with granular material (some of it metal); and six inch metal rods on either end. Once he learns how to use the gadget Steve plans to hunt for buried metal objects.

Twenty years ago Junior Putman, the other 'collector' was digging a hole in the alley behind the Farmers State Bank and unearthed three Dr. Holstiders Stomache Bitters bottles. All of the bottles were different and the oldest was an 1871 bottle. His interest in collecting began then.

Putman is a plumber and in the time he has followed this line of work he has become knowledgeable about digging in the earth. "It's easy to tell you're getting near a hole somebody filled

up" Junior said. "If you are the first one to disturb old mother earth the ground is hard and nobody was there before you. When it is kind of soft you know a hole was there at some time or other." He said that the soft spot has ashes, bits of broken metal or china, chances are it is a long abandoned trash pile site. Putman starts scratching at this point instead of digging so if a bottle is uncovered it is not a bottle.

Since a number of finds were made on the job, bottles and other items of interest he has found actually belonged to someone else. "They always shared with me," Junior said, "my customers are the nicest people."

During the years Putman has kept finding things, mostly bottles, and just

stashed them away. He has no idea of their value and does not care.

"The ground is full of treasure. Its the uncovering that makes the difference," Putman said. Only once did he find a bottle still filled with liquid. This was a wine or champagne bottle dug up in the alley behind Mrs. M.R. Allensworth's house. The seal was still intact and lettering still readable identified it as being a Taylor product. Because it was lying on the side, the cork was kept moist and evaporation did not occur.

Once an interest is developed for collectables friends and other persons often contribute items. Such was the case when Putman was made a gift of a cutglass coal oil lamp by the late Mrs.

James Trent. He now has several old lamps.

According to Putman the most unique thing he has is a bottle uncorker. It weighs about five pounds, fastens onto a counter and has a rubber edged gripping surface to prevent breaking bottle necks.

Steve Estes is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bailey Estes and is associated with his father in the welling business. He is married and has two sisters, Toza, Mrs. Don Nelson, of Lubbock and Melissa Estes of San Antonio.

Putman is married and his wife Norma shares his interest in collecting and is a teacher in Clarendon High School.

The Putman's have three children Donnie, Julie and Terry all of Clarendon.

'Press' to sponsor June fishing contest

A Fishing Rodeo, sponsored by the "Clarendon Press" begins this weekend at Lake Greenbelt and will continue through June 27.

Over \$250 worth of prizes will be offered including Garcia and Ambassador fishing reels and Fenwick fishing rods.

There is no charge to enter the contest and all Lake Greenbelt Fishermen are eligible. To enter take fish along with a Greenbelt fishing and recreation permit to either Mooring's Marina on Greenbelt's south shore; Jim Milam's Canteen on Greenbelt's north shore; or Barney's Marine, just outside Clarendon on Hwy. 70.

The weight of the fish will be recorded there and turned in to the "Clarendon Press." Winners will be announced in the July 1 edition of the paper.

Contest categories include largest bass, largest pike, largest pan fish (perch, crappie, etc.) and largest catfish catch. Size of the fish will be determined by weight only.

Angler catching the largest bass will win a Fenwick 1155 fishing rod with a Garcia 2500 C reel. Total cost of this equipment

is approximately \$90.

For the largest pike category, prize is a Fenwick 1460 rod with an Ambassador 5000 reel, estimated cost at \$75.

The largest pan fish caught will win contest

entries a Plano Tackle Box, model 727, estimated cost \$35.

For biggest catfish, caught either on a rod and reel or trotline, the winner will receive a \$25 gift certificate exchangeable at the Boat

Dock, 4217 Canyon Drive (Canyon E-Way and Georgia) in Amarillo. All prizes will be on display at the 'Clarendon Press' during the contest and winners may pick up their prizes there.

Two county feedlots sold at auction

Greenbelt Feedlot, sold at public auction Tuesday, June 1, will be reopening soon under the new management of Walter Le Fevre, owner, and Tom Jessop, operator.

Le Fevre, a resident of Mt. Morris, Illinois, bought the feedlot at Tuesday's auction for \$75,000. The Donley County Feedlot, also auctioned off Tuesday, sold to Ute Corp. based in Plainview,

for \$105,000. Corporation owner Jake Wilson said they have no immediate plans for reopening the Donley Feedlot.

Le Fevre estimated the Greenbelt lot would be in operation by July 1. He is a rancher-farmer in Mt. Morris and owner of two feedlots there.

Tom Jessop is also a native of Illinois. Le Fevre said

Jessop would be in the Donley County area soon to begin procedures to open the stockyard.

He estimated the yard could handle five to six thousand cattle. Current plans are to custom feed their own beefs along with accepting cattle from area ranches.

Concerning opening the Donley County Feedyard, Ute Corp. President Richard Wilson said they would study the cattle market before setting any final dates for opening.

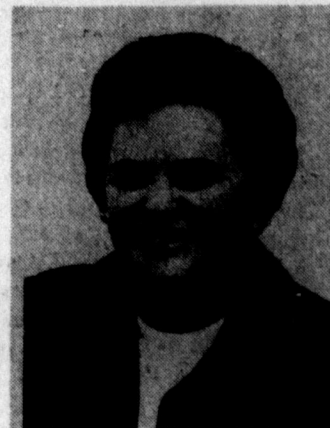
month. Members receive notices of the area activities of the Studio.

Ex-staff member of Texas A&I Brother of local man moves here

Dr. C. Edd Todd, brother of Clarendon local Bill Todd, recently moved to Clarendon after retiring from Texas A&I Arts and Industrial University at Kingsville.

Todd was a member of the Texas A&I staff for 13 years. A farm boy from Acme, Todd worked his way through West Texas State College playing in a string orchestra. "We played western music and told the histories of ranch names," Todd recalls. "I played all the string instruments except the violin."

Since those undergraduate days in Canyon, Todd has taught in Texas elementary schools seven years, served

as an elementary school principal eight years and as a high school principal for five years and taught one year at McMurry College before joining the A&I staff. He came to A&I in 1963.

Although Todd has been in business and served in the Navy as a lieutenant commander, he has always been enthusiastic about teaching.

"I wouldn't do anything else. I love teaching," he asserts.

Todd has been helping students plan their courses for certification in secondary education. He also has been teaching graduate students in administration and re-

search. Students reciprocate Todd's enthusiasm. For four years Cap and Gown Honor Society selected him one of the Top Ten Teachers at A&I.

"That's probably the greatest honor ever paid me," Todd feels.

Despite his emphasis on teaching, Todd has also performed administrative duties. Besides initially serving as department chairman, Todd has been chairman of the Faculty Senate.

Among a score or so University committee assignments was a particularly significant one: chairing the A&I presidential selection committee three years ago.

Conservation has been one of Todd's interests. He was a member of the Texas Advisory Committee on Conservation Education and for several years directed the Science-Conservation Workshop at A&I.

Similarly, among his publications have been "Science Comprehensive Readers" and "Camping in the Elementary Schools."

Todd's doctoral dissertation at North Texas State University, where he earlier earned a master's degree, was a study of school supervisory practices in Texas.

The Moorings also operate the MP camping area where campers may park beside covered picnic tables with complete water and electrical hook-ups for their vehicles.

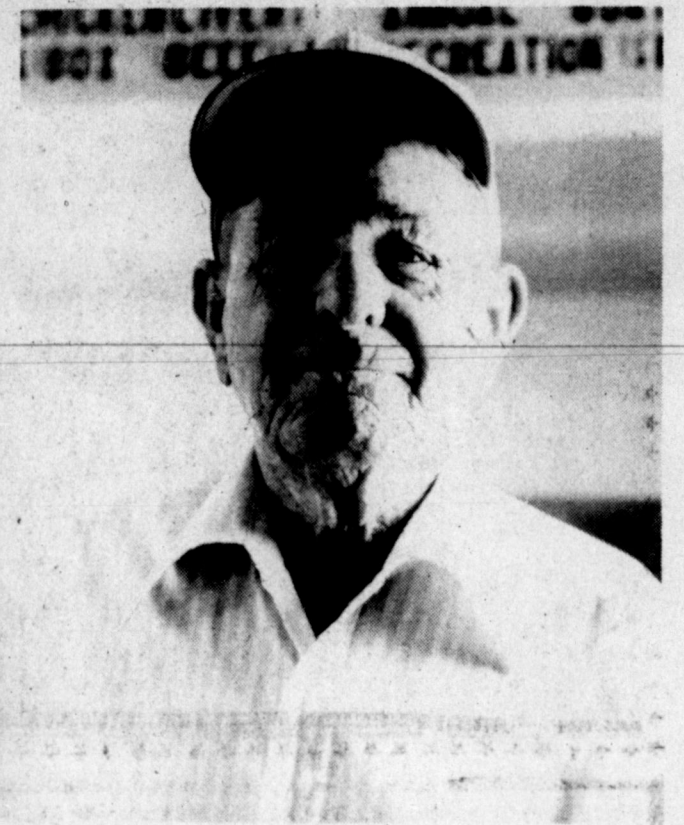

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Greenbelt Municipal, Industrial Authority construction underway

Estimated \$1,282,187 worth of improvements to the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Authority will be completed by May, 1977, according to Water Plant Manager Jimmy Kuhn.

Bids were accepted in January this year for the addition of two water pumps

to the Greenbelt Water Plant, plus a stand-by chlorinator housed in a fiberglass building; pump stations under construction in Childress and Quanah; and the addition of a four million gallon capacity water tank in Childress. Goolsby Building Corp. of Temple

was awarded the construction bid.

Kuhn said these improvements, when complete would boost the plant's present capacity of processing approximately six million gallons of water per day to an estimated ten million gallons. Improvements would

also increase delivery of water to Childress and Quanah by automatic pumps rather than the present gravity flow method.

Currently, water is supplied to Clarendon, Hedley, Childress, Quanah and Crowell by the Greenbelt Authority.

Gravity flow currently moves water to Clarendon and Hedley. Storage tanks are now located at Hedley, Childress and the Medicine Mound area which supplies Crowell.

Basically, the water filtering process at the Greenbelt plant involves pumping untreated lake water into chemical mixing basins located outside the plant. Treatment chemicals are added to the water in these tanks before it is pumped into flocculators. Here the chemicals are mixed with the water by large paddles stirring the water.

Next, the water is pumped into water clarifiers where any floc (foreign matter) is allowed to settle out. This done, the water is pumped through filters and on to its point of arrival.

Constant checks and tests are run on the processed water. Tests for chlorine

content, floc tests for sedimentation and a weekly bacteriological test are administered at the plant.

Gauges, charts and pressure reading devices also constantly relay information concerning the status of the water throughout the supply system -- from Clarendon to

Crowell.

Personnel for the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority includes Jimmy Kuhn, general manager; Frank Drummond, plant supervisor; Sandra Mooring, bookkeeper; James Swearingen, John Just, Troy Moore, Chester Bohlar and Bobby

Kidd, operators; and Dewey Ford, maintenance.

Personnel for the Authority working at Lake Greenbelt are Troy Welty and Louis Bogue, lake patrolmen; Leroy Johnson, Weldon Cecil Wood, maintenance; and H.G. Bobbitt, a part-time maintenance man.

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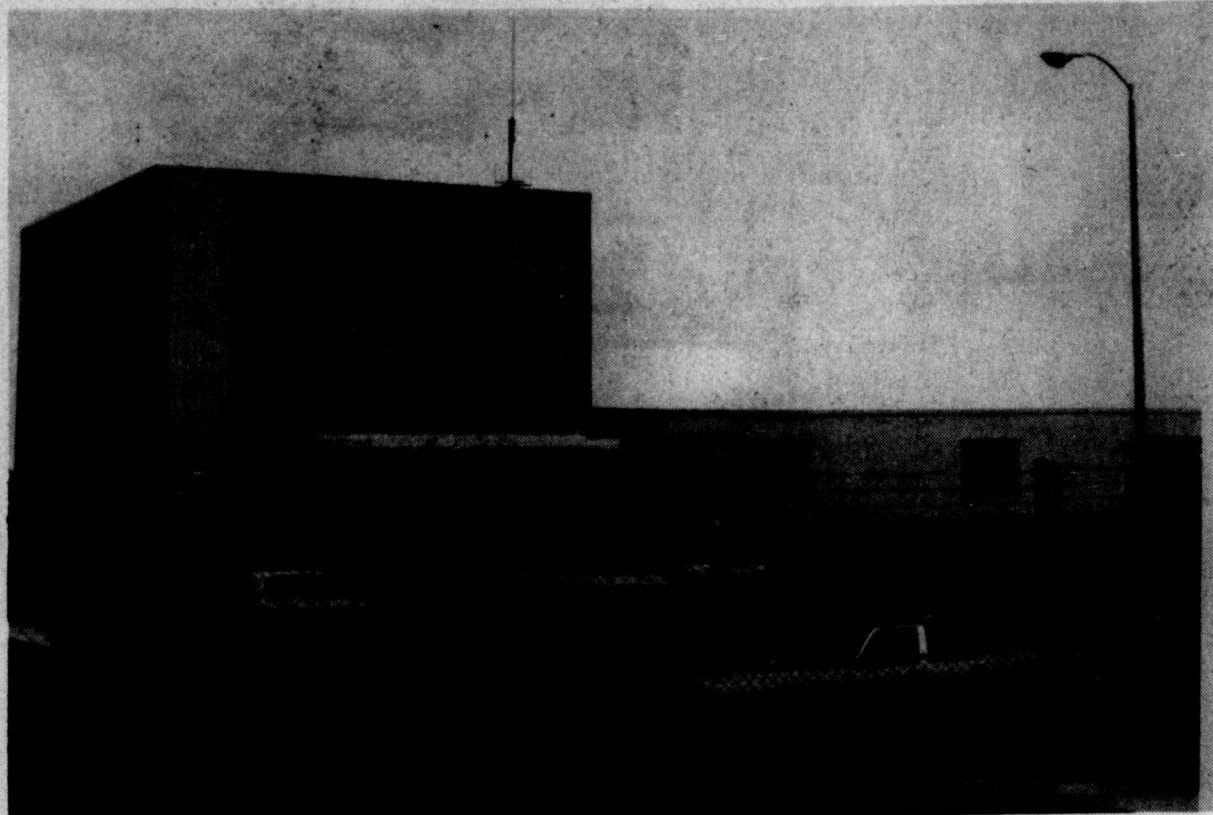

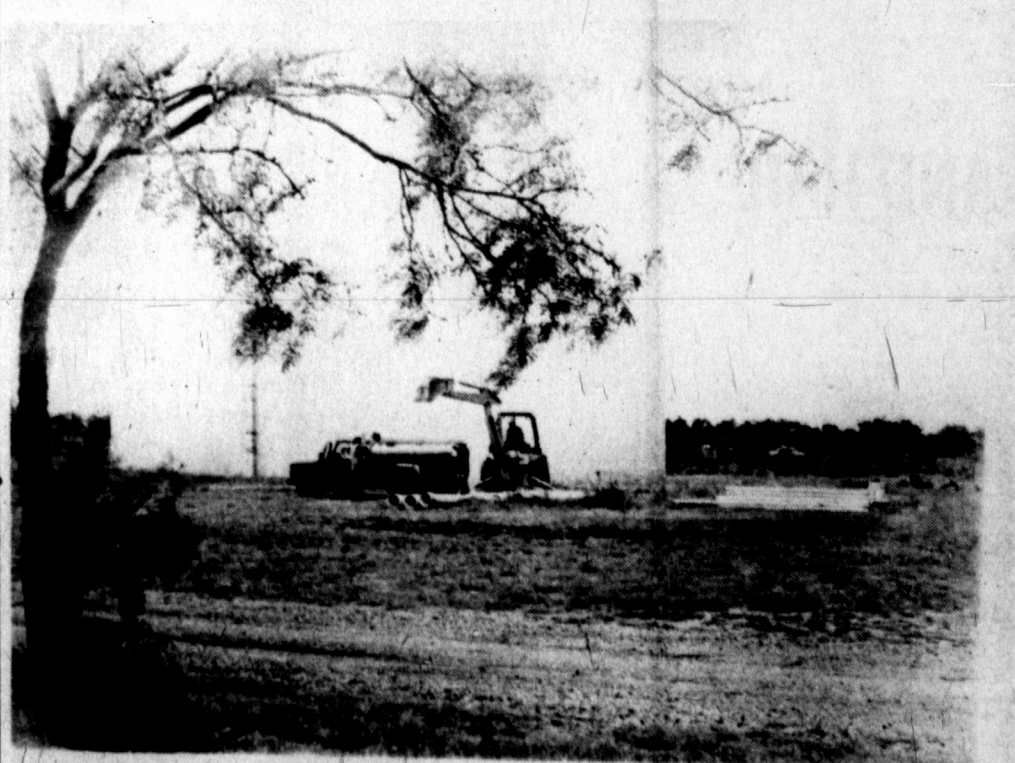

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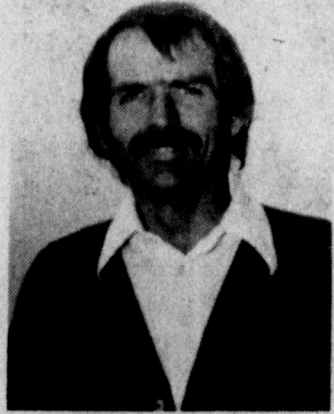

Country Club, golf course underway with new management

Jerry Thompson new golf pro, a professional since '68

Jerry Thompson took over as pro at the Clarendon Country Club last April, and has since been working to get the 18 hole recreation spot ready for the flood of summer golfers.

Thompson, a class A pro, turned professional in 1968. He served his PGA assistantship at Ridgewood Country Club in Waco and served as head pro for the Lufkin Country Club in Lufkin.

The course, located on the north shore of Lake Greenbelt, attracts many area

golfers each year, in part because its one of the coolest golf courses in the area during hot summer months. An almost constant southerly wind blows across Lake Greenbelt in the summer, creating cool breezes on hot days.

Established in 1969, the course is rated by the United States Golf Assn. at 69, meaning a scratch golfer anywhere in the U.S. should shoot that score for 18 holes. Country Club members play free with a \$3.50 green fee for non-members.

The par 71 course features three holes played directly beside Lake Greenbelt and unusually large greens. There are approximately 350,000 sq. ft. of greens on the course, Thompson said, about twice the size of most courses. Cottonwood trees are throughout the course.

Thompson said the course also has many "strong par 3 holes" with many of them measuring over 200 yards from the intermediate blue tee boxes.

The clubhouse is also

stocked with most major brands of golf equipment including Spalding, Wilson and Acushnet golf clubs; Burton, PGA, and Hotze golf bags; and Footjoy and Etonic golf shoes. Twenty golf carts are also available to rent.

Eleven golf tournaments are scheduled for the remainder of the summer.

Pro Thompson also offers free golf clinics for club members. A ladies golf clinic is set for June 7, 11, 14 and 18.

Tina duBois took over as club manager for Clarendon's Country Club in April this year.

She brought to the job over

18 years experience in the restaurant/club business.

This includes managing a ski resort, restaurants and private clubs in five states including Michigan, Geor-

Since becoming manager, she's made many additions to the existing club. Club members may now play twice a month, the 1st and 3rd Thursdays, with a jackpot prize of \$100. Bingo night is also Family Night with fried chicken served.

Specialty food each week has also been added. Monday night, Mexican dishes are served; Wednesday is spaghetti; and Friday is all the fish you can eat. Barbecue cookouts are featured Saturday nights and Sunday a noon buffet is served.

Howardwick, lakeside community, a busy little town

On Lake Greenbelt's north shore is the community of Howardwick, population 341 recorded in 1975.

But for a town its size, it has plenty of activity including an active Lions Club, volunteer fire department, a Friendship Club and a Ladies Fire Department Auxiliary.

Largest organization in Howardwick is the Lions Club, with a membership roll of 49. The club meets the second and fourth Saturday of each month in the Howardwick City Hall at 6 p.m. Each regular meeting is also ladies night, with members bringing their wives for dinner. A program is presented at each meeting.

In addition to their regular meetings, the Lions sponsor Bingo each Saturday night in the City Hall. Prizes sometimes up to \$100 with all proceeds donated to the Lion's sponsored charities.

New Lion officers to be installed this July include Lynn Cherry, Boss Lion; Jim Corgill, 1st vice-president; Albert Moore, 2nd vice-president; Robert Reed, 3rd vice-president; Vernon Berry, secretary-treasurer. Directors are Glen Doty, Will Corgill, Berry York and Neal Mann.

Howardwick's Volunteer Fire Department is also active with 17 volunteer firemen. Equipment used includes a 2½ ton truck with a 1,000 gallon water storing capacity and a 1930 model Seagraves fire truck, still in operating order.

Howardwick's fire alarm system also doubles as a severe weather warning alarm and can be heard from anywhere in the Howardwick vicinity.

Firemen meet for practice drills the first Thursday of each month at the Howardwick fire station beside City Hall. Fire Chief is Herman Green. He is assisted by Carrell Rippetoe, assnt. chief; and Vernon Berry, secretary/treasurer.

Howardwick's Friendship Club is open to both ladies and men. Its 45 members meet at 7 p.m. each third

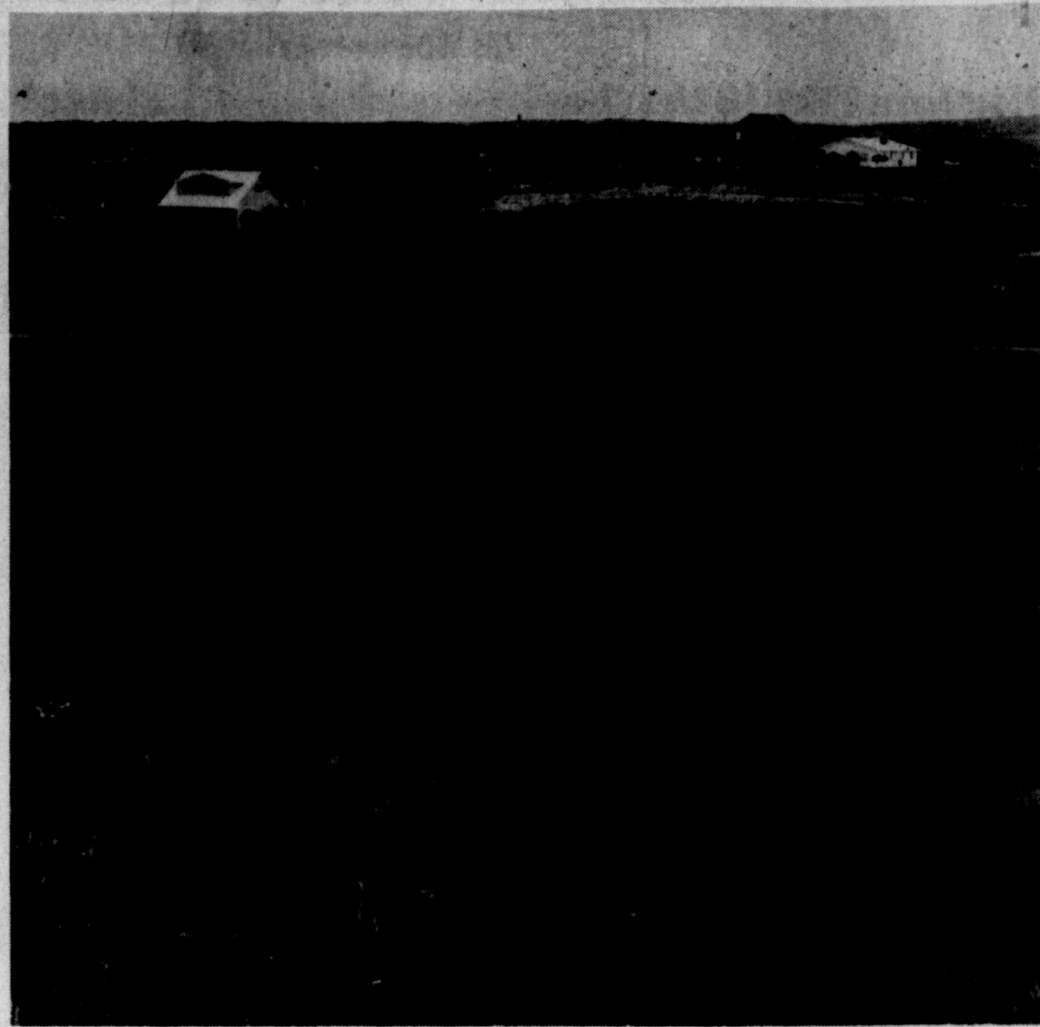
Friday night of the month in the City Hall. Those attending bring covered dishes and dinner is served. After the meal, members play a variety of cards and domino games.

Other recent residents of Howardwick, Morris and Eddie Castner, farmed near Lubbock for 20 years before retiring in 1975.

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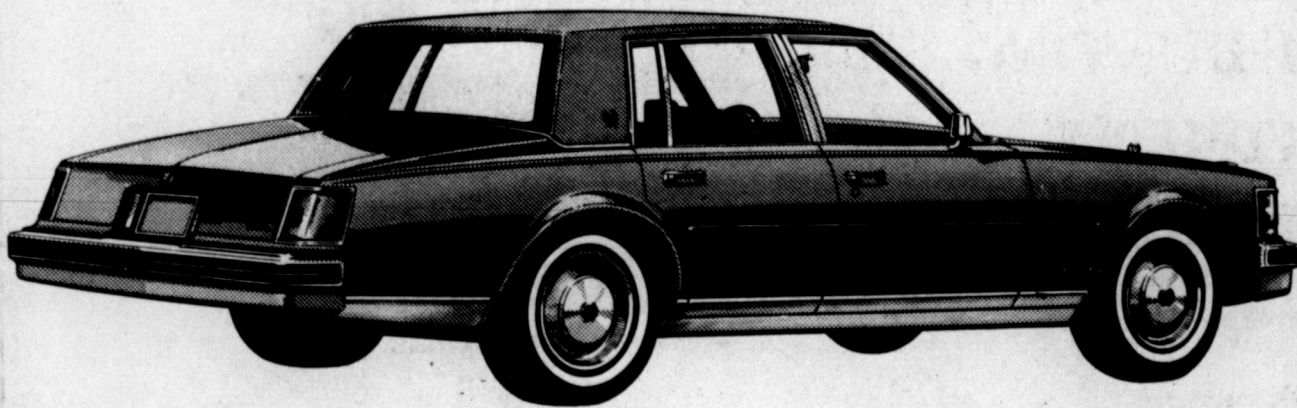
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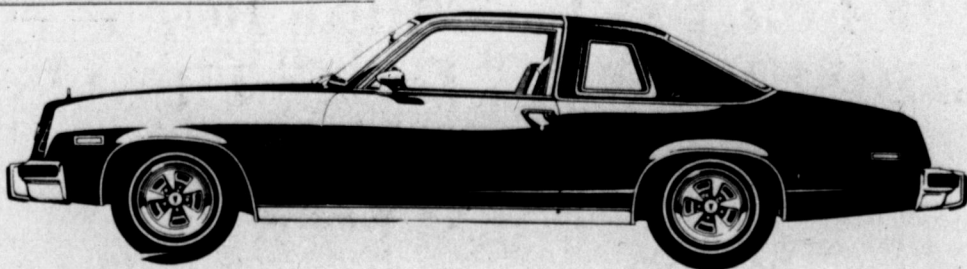
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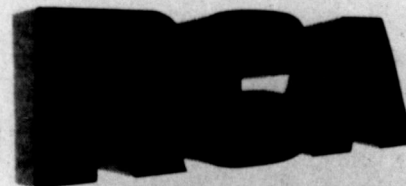


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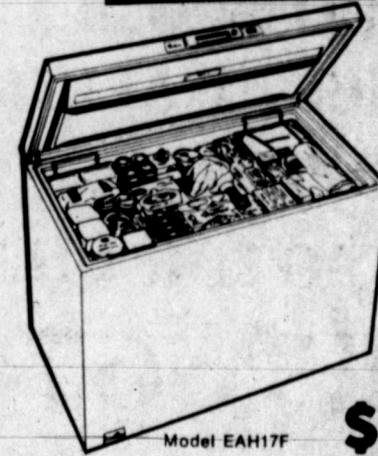
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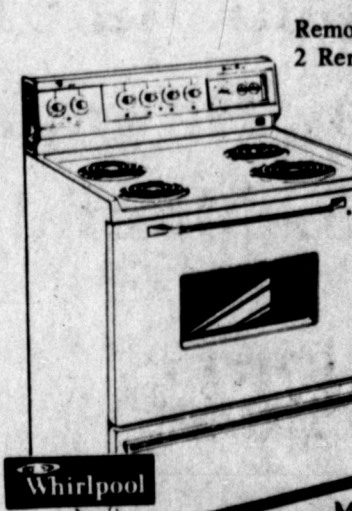


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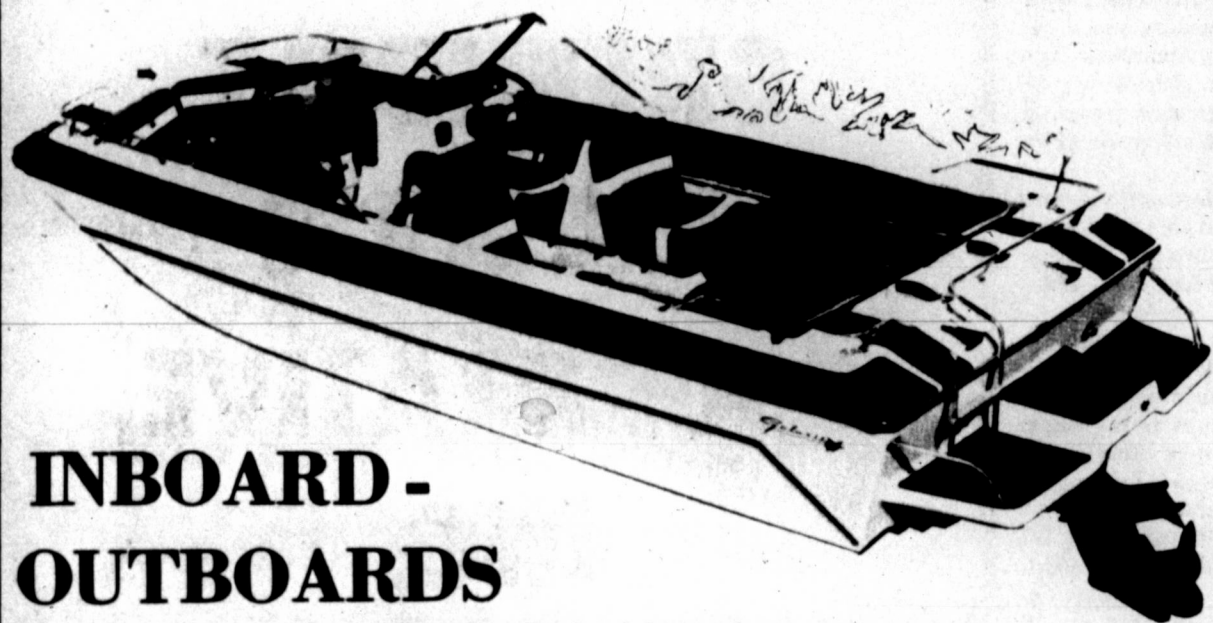
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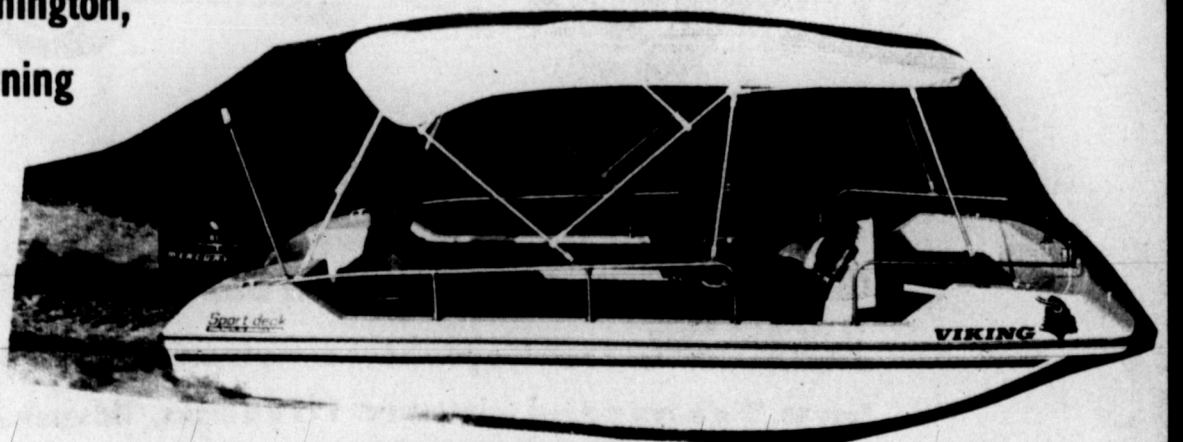
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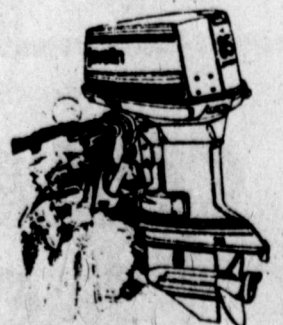
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
