hospital wing of the Medical Center into a nursing home facility and the formation of a county wide committee to work towards recruiting doctors for the area.

Knight said the first meeting of this recruiting committee would be held shortly. Thus far, county organizations pledging members to the committee include Howardwick's Lions Club and Clarendon's Chamber of Commerce and Lions.

In other board action at the meeting, tentative members to serve on the district's tax equalization board were named. These individuals will now be notified and asked to serve on the board.

The equalization board will meet sometime in July.

# Safety precautions urged when canning

Home-canning season is at hand, and consumers should be sure their pressure canner produces a product safe to eat. A temperature of 240 degrees F. is necessary to destroy bacteria spores present in low-acid foods, which include vegetables other than tomatoes and rhubarb and most fish and poultry.

If the bacteria is not destroyed, it grows in jars or cans of food in the absence of air. It produces a toxin that causes the deadly botulism poisoning.

When selecting a pressure canner, look for features that assure adequate pressure can be safely reached and maintained. Look for these
