Study report of CHS returned

Commendations and suggested improvements to Clarendon High School were part of a 42 page report recently returned to the school by the Southern Assn. of Colleges and Schools. The association sent a visiting team to CHS for two days last April for the study. Fourteen educators comprised the team including two members of the Clarendon College staff: Jerry Hawkins, Vo-Ag instructor; and Ronnie Null, college English teacher. Other team members were teachers from Groom, Pampa, Panhandle, Plainview and Shamrock. Five members of the Region XVI Education Service Center

based in Amarillo also participated. The team study was part of a five-year self-improvement plan Clarendon High School is currently participating in. The plan is being implemented by the school to determine what areas of education need improvement or are currently satisfactory. CHS is a member of the Southern Assn. of College and Schools, which conducts a team study like the one in April about every 10 years to member schools.

Team members summarized commendable features as well as suggested improvements for general school areas, beginning with general statements about the school course curriculum.

Each study area was then commented upon (ie. math, health, P.E. etc.). The school's building facilities, faculty and staff and student activities were also evaluated. General statements about the school's curriculum included favorable comments about the staff's ability, the "positive attitude" of students towards school, adequate class sizes, and the expansion of the curriculum to include programs for handicapped persons, business education and driver education.

The team also offered several recommendations for the curriculum. Offering a greater number of "high interest" courses should be considered, they said, along

with studying a possible imbalance between competitive athletics and academic programs at the school. An informality shown by students towards the school and teachers was also noted and the team suggested discipline could be strengthened in some areas.

A gradual discontinuation of class work in the school's older buildings, both constructed around 1909, was also suggested. Reference to the two "Old College" buildings was noted several times in the report.

Recommendations for the school's curriculum included a suggestion that procedure for establishing the student council and other student groups be re-examined; a

study began to establish crime, drug and narcotic educational programs; and a restructuring of the principal's jobs so more time could be provided for curriculum supervision and development.

Favorable features were also noted by the visiting team concerning the school's buildings and facilities. The main school building, built in 1961, was commended. The two older college buildings, however, were criticized, noting the homemaking department should be attached to the regular school building and labeling the school's fine arts facilities as "inadequate." Various needed repairs in the two older buildings were also recommended.

On the positive side, the team noted the general high maintenance level of classroom furniture, grounds, the football field, parking areas and administrative offices. Utilization of the new gymnasium also received favorable comment.

Criticism of school facilities included the need for more library space, the addition of a local law enforcement patrol officer to prevent speeding cars by the school; the addition of more custodial help; and the replacement of several specific equipment items. These include classroom filing cabinets, projector screens, projectors, additional adding machines or print calculator; and replacing current cook stoves in the cafeteria.

Other general areas commended by the team included using the school board as a policy-making body and the "good relationship" apparent between the school and the community. This relationship was judged "good" because of community raised funds for special school projects. In student activities, the team commended good student participation in University Interscholastic League activities, athletics, band and other activities.

Door prize to be given away Friday Saddle Shop grand opening set

Grand opening for Bob Marris Saddle Shop and Western Art Gallery is Friday, June 25, at the shop located on Clarendon's Main Street. Marris and his wife Betty recently opened the business. Along with handcrafted riding equipment and leather goods, the shop features displays of state wide as well as local western art. Among the works displayed are many by Marris and his wife plus professional artists like Jim Ward, Justin Wells, Jack Fordyce and, in the future, Bob Moline.

Friday's grand opening will include a door prize presentation of a pair of spurs. All persons attending will receive a number while registering. Winning number will be drawn Friday afternoon.

A specialist in making custom saddles, Marris has been in the profession for

over 25 years. Until recently, he and his wife were retired and living on a small ranch 18 miles northeast of Clarendon. "But I decided to get back into leather work fulltime," he said, "plus try and sell a few paintings."

Marris said a custom saddle takes about three months to complete. This includes a six to eight week wait for a custom saddle tree to be built to the customer's specifications. The tree is the basic wooden seat consisting of the saddle's four main parts. These are the metal saddle horn covered with rawhide and bolted into the saddle's fork; the saddle's bars, two long, flat slats of wood on which the rider actually sits; and the saddle candle which offers back support.

Marris said the tree's four parts are molded from a soft pine wood. "Soft wood is better because when it gets wet it won't warp," he said. All wooden pieces are fitted and covered with rawhide leather, the hardest and toughest leather.

When Marris receives the tree, he begins fitting and tooling the leather parts of the saddle. Different grades and textures of leather are used for the various saddle parts.

Skirting leather is used for most of the saddle's surface, laid over a lining of sheep skin. Saddle straps and strings are made from softer textured Latigo leather.

In addition to saddles, Marris makes other riding equipment and leather goods including bridles, spur straps, chaps, belts and lariet ropes. "I try to make it so it'll hold up under a working cowboy," he said.

In the future, Marris said he's planning an art show in the shop for late July or early August. Planned artists for the show include Don Ray, an ex-Clarendon resident, Justin Wells, Jim Ward, and Thad Leachman.

The shop will be open from 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Monday through Friday and from 8:30 a.m. till 12 o'clock noon Saturdays.

Marris and his wife have two daughters and three grandchildren. Their oldest child is Mrs. Jody (Kathy) Sheets of Borger. The Sheets have two daughters, Shelly and Amy Ann. The youngest daughter is Mrs. Royce (Debby) Vassallo of Dallas. She and her husband have one daughter, Angela.

Updated information concerning Clarendon High School and the school district were released with the visiting educators team report recently.

Clarendon's Public School District covers approximately 800 square miles. Nineteen professional staff members are employed as teachers at the school. Ten of these have master's degrees. The remaining nine all have bachelor's degrees.

Five full-time workers are employed in the school's

cafeteria, which serves all 12 grades. The school employs a custodial staff consisting of a supervisor with three full-time workers.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated four accidents on rural highways in Donley County during the month of May, 1976, according to Sergeant J.R. Smith, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in two persons killed and no persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first five months of 1976 shows a total of

accidents resulting in three persons killed and six persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for May, 1976, shows a total of 517 accidents resulting in 14 persons killed and 268 persons injured, as compared to May, 1975, with 524 accidents resulting in 17 persons killed and 310

persons injured. This was seven less accidents, three less killed, and 42 less injured in 1976 at the same period of time.

The 14 traffic deaths for the month of May, 1976, occurred in the following counties: Two each in Parker, Wichita, Donley, and Randall; and one each in Kent, Palo Pinto, Carson, Hartley, Potter, and Wheeler.

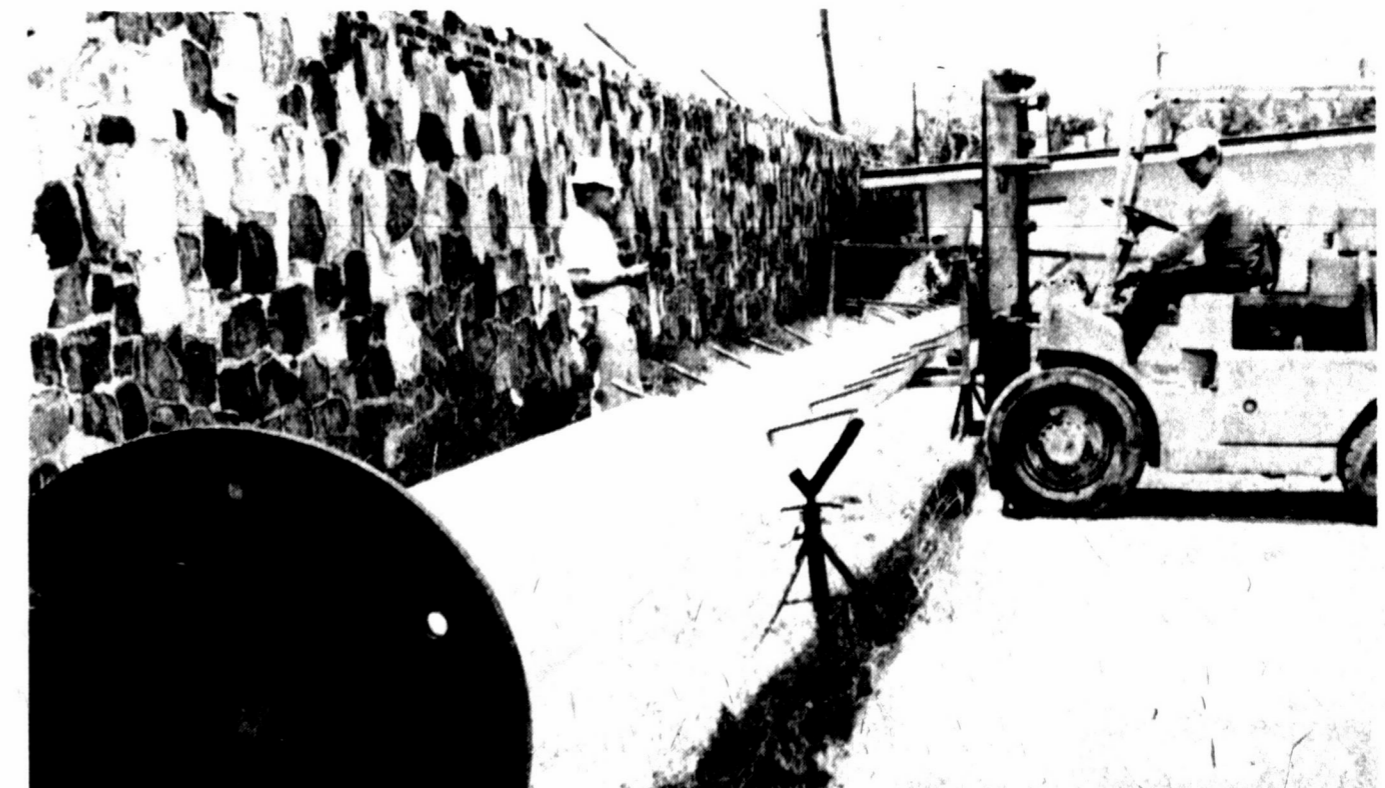

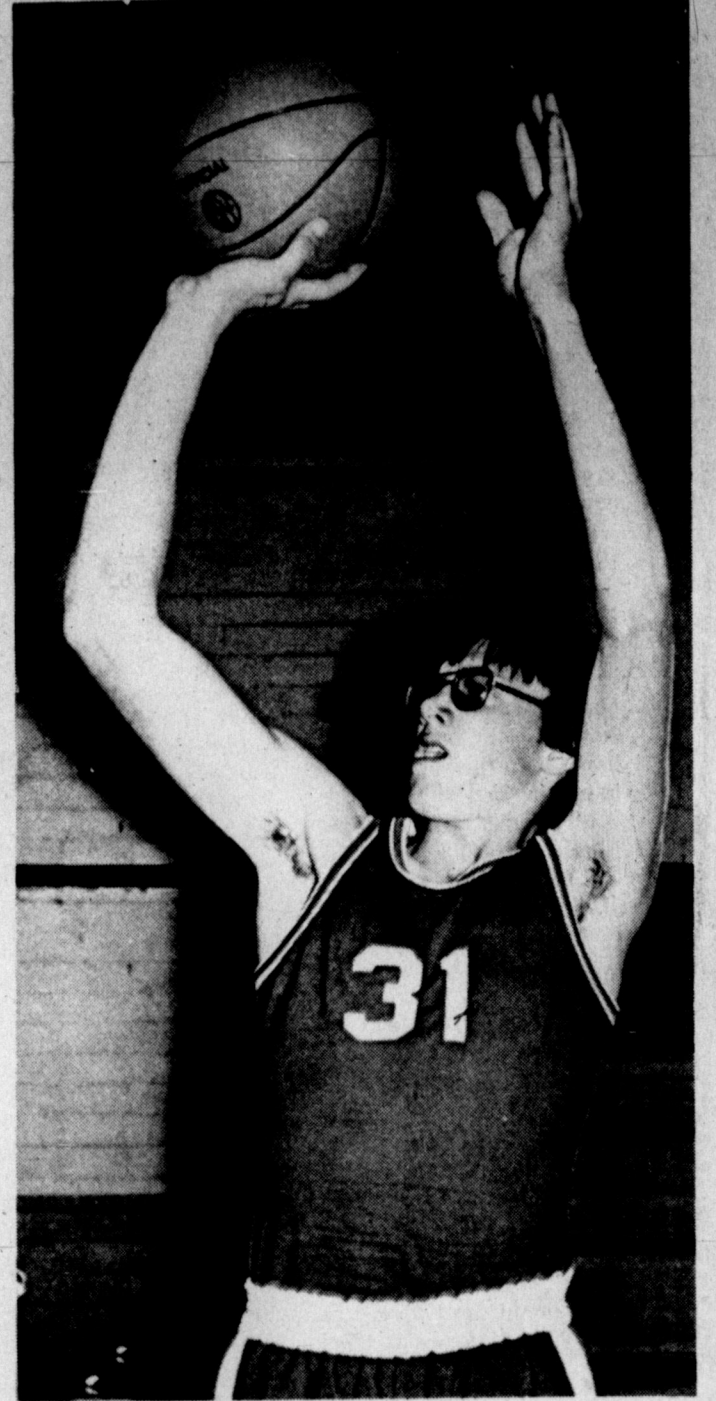
Area basketball players signed for scholarships

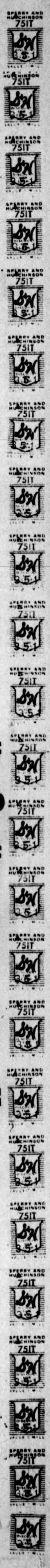

Telephone number changes explained

Twelve Clarendon residents had telephone numbers changed when new General Telephone directories were sent out early this summer.

According to Jim Davis,

division manager for General in Memphis, these numbers were changed because they were in the 3500 group, reserved for business phones on a rotary telephone system. The rotary system requires several telephone

numbers in numerical order (3501, 3502, 3503, etc.). If someone dials 3501 and that line is busy, 3502 will automatically ring.

"We changed the 3500 group numbers because of an

expected business growth in Clarendon," Davis said. As an example, he cited a recent request by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office in Clarendon for four telephone numbers on the rotary system. To do this, the telephone company gave them three telephone numbers previously used by home residences. The fourth telephone number was not in use, but fell between two numbers in use. Consequently, 874-3561, 3562 and 3564 in Clarendon had to be changed.

All numbers changed are now listed with the correct new number in the recently released telephone directories. In all cases except the numbers assigned to the ASCS office, a recording will play when the old 3500 group number is dialed.

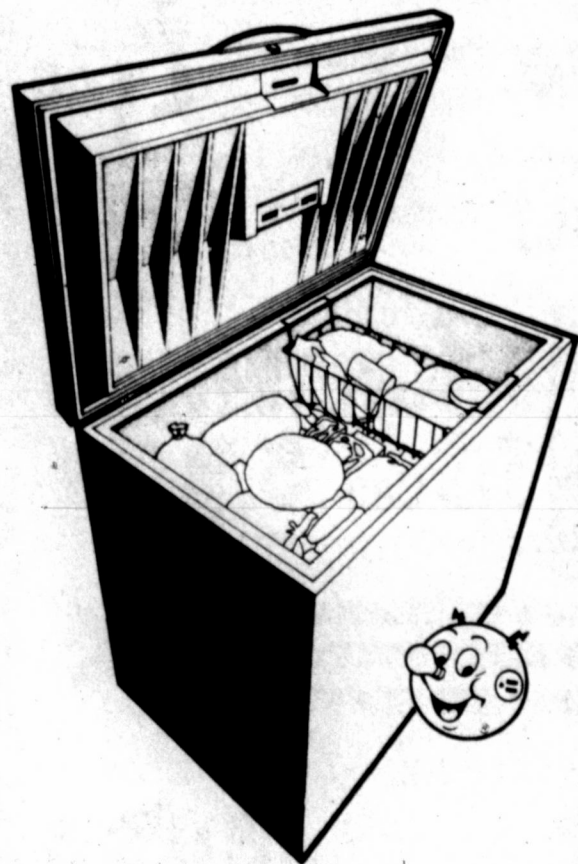

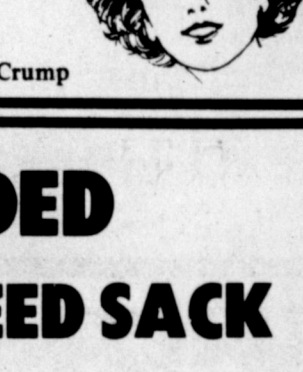

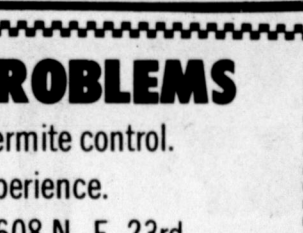

For the wedding trip to Hawaii, the bride wore an off-white linen suit with orange accessories.

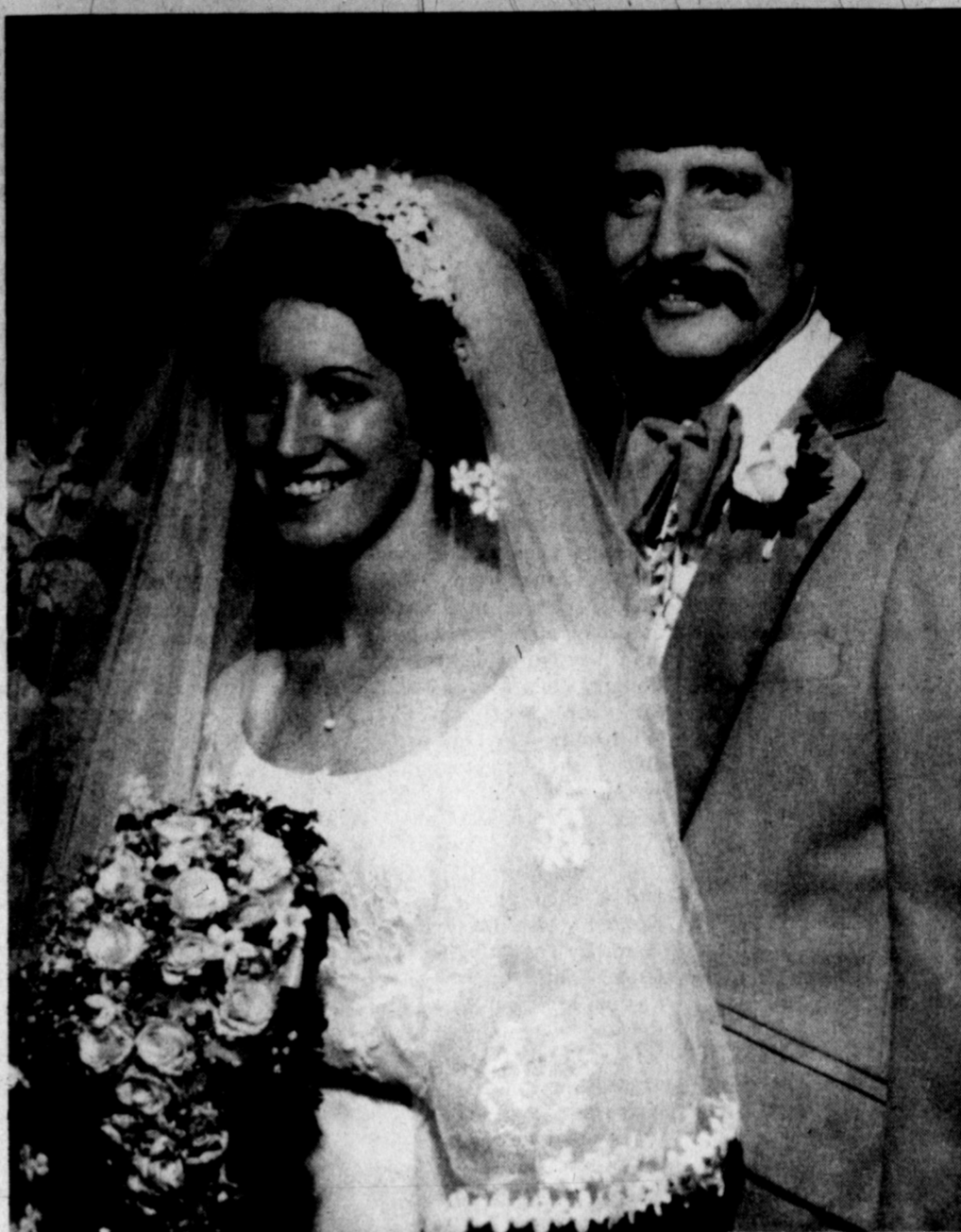
The bride is a graduate of Washington State University and is presently teaching at Post Falls Jr. High in Post Falls, Idaho.
