## Judy's Beauty Salon robbed

At approximately 7:05 a.m. on March 15, Rosie Wright was dressing hair in Judy's Hair Design located at 103 South Kearney. She was working on Mrs. Alton Mason when a white male, approximately in his 20's, entered the shop. The white male was approximately 5'5", 130 pounds, small skinny build, and was wearing jeans and a medium blue, shiny satin jacket with a solid blue collar and blue and white cuffs. The subject had blonde hair, with darker roots, parted in the middle, and it was past his ears but did not reach his shoulders. Subject may have had a light blonde mustache and may have been wearing glasses.

Rosie asked the subject if she could help him. He said he wanted a soda pop and went to the Coke machine, put change in it, got a 7-Up, and started drinking it. Rosie did not pay any more attention to the subject as she was working on a customer's hair. The subject

messed around in the front, drinking his soda pop, for approximately 10 minutes. He then walked up to Rosie and said something which she could not understand. She asked him to repeat his question. He, at this time, had a yellow pearl handled knife in his hand with a blade slightly longer than a pocket knife. He then repeated and told Rosie that he wanted her money and that he would not hurt Rosie or Mrs. Mason if they gave him the money. Rosie told the subject that she did not have any money, that all she had were checks. He asked several times what they made change with and told Rosie she had better do better than that (referring to the checks).

The subject made Rosie take \$12 from her purse, and made Mrs. Mason take \$18 from her purse and gave the money to him. He then took Rosie and Mrs. Mason to the office of the shop and went through it. He also went through the cash register

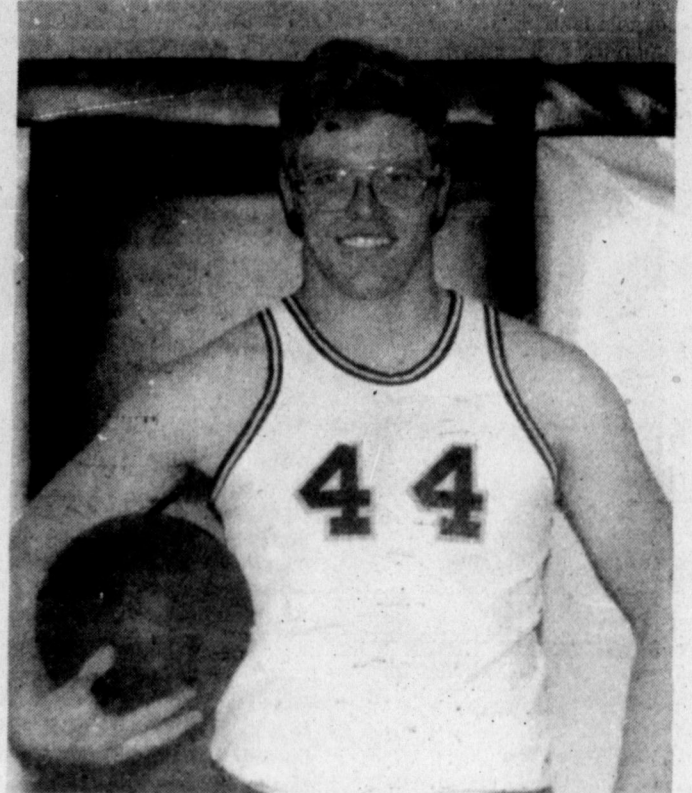
In the final team standings Dalhart won the meet with 149 points while the Clarendon Lady Bronchos finished in a strong second with 82 1/2 points.

**TAXPAYERS' RIGHTS, REMEDIES, RESPONSIBILITIES!**  
Charles SoRelle, chief appraiser for the Donley County Appraisal District, has announced the availability of an eight-page pamphlet which may help district residents save on their property taxes.

"Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities!" explains how the property tax system operates in Texas and highlights possible tax savings available to property owners. The pamphlet is published by the State Property Tax Board under provisions of the Texas Property Tax Code. The information in "Remedies" applies to property taxes collected by all types of local government, including counties, cities, school districts and special districts such as hospitals and municipal utility districts.

The pamphlet explains in detail the residence homestead exemptions offered by various taxing units including the amounts of each exemption and what it takes to qualify for and receive them.

For example, all homeowners in a school district are eligible for a \$5,000 general residence homestead exemption. Also, certain disabled taxpayers and those aged 65 or over may qualify for an additional \$10,000 exemption from the value of their homesteads.

"A taxpayer who was 65 or older on January 1 of this year is also entitled to a tax freeze, or ceiling, on the tax bill from the school district on his house and yard," SoRelle added. "This ceiling is based on the taxes assessed when a taxpayer receives the over-65 school homestead exemption for the

first time." The chief appraiser pointed out, though, that homeowners who received the elderly exemption and tax freeze from the school district last year need not apply again this year. Only those who became 65 during 1983 and those who have never been granted the exemption and freeze must apply for 1984.

Homeowners may also be eligible for a \$3,000 general homestead exemption for county tax purposes. This exemption is granted on the portion of county tax for farm-to-market roads and flood control.

Additional exemptions are available upon application to disabled veterans and to other disabled citizens or those aged 65 and older.

Owners of agricultural land which was taxed for 1983 on its productivity value under 1-d-1 open-space provisions do not have to re-apply unless requested in writing by the appraisal office to do so. However, applications must be filed before May 1 for land to be taxed for 1984 under 1-d-1 open-space provisions, and by landowners who have not previously received productivity valuation.

"More complete information on special land valuation, tax reductions and exemptions is available from appraisal district personnel as well as in the pamphlet," SoRelle said.

He said that the "Remedies" pamphlet also contains information about the appraisal review board (ARB) which serves to equalize all property values in the district. This section of the pamphlet serves to equalize all property values in the district. This section of the pamphlet outlines the steps for making a protest to the ARB and ways to prepare and present the appeal.

Another section deals with the process of initiative and referendum by which voters are able to petition for an election to limit the amount of tax increase adopted by any taxing unit.

"District residents are encouraged to review the pamphlet and to make any

applications required, in order to get all the tax relief to which they are entitled. Remember, applications must be filed with the appraisal office before May 1," the chief appraiser said.

The pamphlet and other information is available from the Donley Appraisal District office in the Courthouse Annex in Clarendon.

Lent has long been an important time in the Christian church. The word "Lent" is derived from the Old English word "lencten" meaning "springtime."

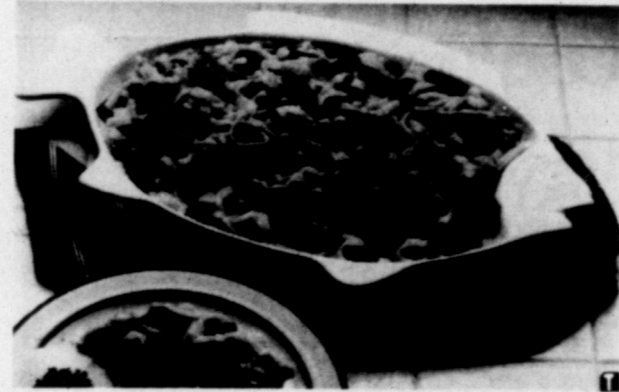

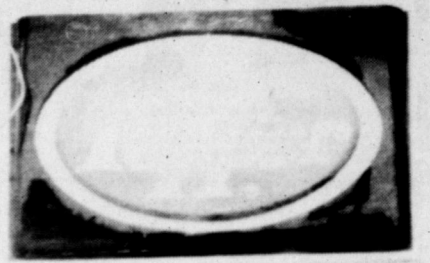

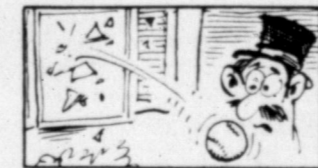

**TO THE CITIZENS OF DONLEY COUNTY**

Many have asked how I would perform my duties; changes, additions or deletions I would make if elected sheriff of this county. The following are only a few of my views:

1. I believe in enforcement of the law without partiality as to race, position or friendship.
2. Twenty-four hours coverage of the county with at least one man on duty. Others on call especially prime crime time of early morning hours not covered at this time.
3. No passengers with officer on duty, as relatives or friends riding in patrol cars. I consider this dangerous and could be costly to the county taxpayers.
4. Absolutely no personal use of patrol cars. This includes ranching, farming, pleasure trips not related to work.
5. All officers will obey traffic rules and speed limits, as all other citizens are expected to do. Excessive speeds are only used in line of pursuit, not because it is a patrol car.
6. Careful and sound judgement should be used by the force at all times. This would avoid possible suits which may cost the taxpayers in the event of law suits involved with civil liberties.
7. I believe a person is innocent until proven guilty, not guilty until proven innocent.
8. I would always be open to suggestions by citizens of Donley County.

## Your Baby

### DAILY INFANT CARE

To be their happiest and healthiest, babies need stimulation, talking to, eye contact and touching. All of these contribute to an infant's sound psychological development and can be easily incorporated into your daily baby care routine. "Since bathing, feeding and diapering occupy such a large portion of an infant's waking hours, parents should create opportunities to make these moments as meaningful as possible," says Frann Krajeski, R.N., medical services manager at Johnson & Johnson Baby Products Company. Chatting with your infant while performing routine tasks can be beneficial to his development. Research shows that mothers who talk to their infants,



regardless of what they say, tend to have more articulate children.

"Talk to an infant slowly," Ms. Krajeski advises, "as if you expect a reply. Of course, the baby can't answer, but studies show that infants will gesture toward talking parents and open and close their mouths to imitate them."

#### Step in Socialization

Frequent touching provides a baby with another tangible expression of love. Aside from building the baby's sense of security, it is a vital first step toward socialization. The more a baby is touched, the more the baby learns to enjoy it and reach out to the surrounding world.

"Bathing is a perfect time to touch and talk to your baby in a relaxed manner," Ms. Krajeski comments. "And after bathing, or while diapering, apply corn starch powder as a dry lubricant for a massage. (This extra absorbent layer keeps moisture away from baby's skin to help prevent diaper rash.) Gently rub or stroke the infant's arms, legs, back and tummy with soothing caresses. Informal infant massage can be repeated at nap or bedtime to help the baby drift off to sleep."

Sharing the joy and the time commitment of such care also will increase family interest in the baby's development and leave mother with some well-deserved personal time.

- TORNADO WARNING:** Tornado detected; take shelter.



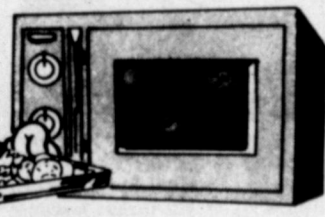

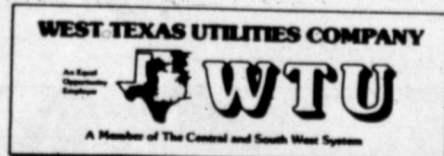
