

Christian Television comes to Clarendon


The First Baptist Church installed a satellite receiver this week in order to make available to our city the American Christian Television System (ACTS).

Myron the Scholar goes to College

The American Cancer Society is a voluntary organization dedicated to the control and eradication of cancer. The immediate goal of the Society is to save more lives and to diminish suffering from cancer to the fullest extent possible. Many lives are being saved. About 440,000 people die of cancer each year in the United States, but more than 145,000 might have been saved by earlier detection, diagnosis, and prompt, proper treatment, using present knowledge and techniques.

The final goal of total cancer control can be reached only through research. As adults, most of us

contribute to the Society to reach its goal. In order to involve the school-age children, the American Cancer Society sponsored "Send A Mouse to College" project on April 2-6 in the Clarendon elementary and Junior High chool.

This project included several "fun" activities for the children. A real white mouse was on display in the trophy case located in Johnny Leather's science room. The science class took care of Myron the Scholar, during the project.

Contribution envelopes, posters, and buttons were distributed toward funding a research mouse. The current cost of a research mouse is 87

cents. The mice are used in the research and study of cancer. This was not a door to door campaign. The money was only collected through the school system. One of the scheduled

activities as a name contest for the mouse. Each class tried to find name suitable for a mouse going to college. Class 6-B chose Professor Killacancer and won third place, while 8th grade selected Theodore Kenton III receiving second place. 7-B felt the mouse should be called Myron the Scholar. 



Charles SoRelle, chief appraiser for the Donley Coun-ty Appraisal District, has ed the availability of an eight-page pamphlet which may help district resi-dents save on their property taxes.

"Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibili-ties!" explains how the property tax system operates in Texas and highlights pos-sible tax savings available to

property owners. The pamphlet is published by the State Property Tax Board under provisions of the Texas Property Tax Code. The information in "Remedies" applies to

property taxes collected by all types of local govern including counties, school districts and sp districts such as hospitals and municipal utility districts.

The pamphlet explains in detail the residence homestead exemptions offered by verious taxing units including the amounts of each exemption and what it takes to qualify for and receive

For example, all home owners in a school district are eligible for a \$5,000 general residence homestead exemption. Also, certain disabled taxpayers and those aged 65 or over may qualify for an additional \$10,000 exemption from the value of

their homesteads.

"A taxpayer who was 65 or older on January 1 of this year is also entitled to a tax freeze, or ceiling, on the tax bill from the school district on his house and yard," SoRelle added. "This celling is based on the taxes assessed when a taxpayer receives the over-65 school omestead exemption for the

first time." The chief appraiser cointed out, though, that meowners who received the elderly exemption and tax freeze from the school district last year need not apply again this year. Only se who became 65 during 1983 and those who have never been granted the exemption and freeze must

apply for 1984. Homeowners may also be eligible for a \$3,000 general homestead exemption for county tax purposes. This exemption is granted on the portion of county tax for farm-to-market roads and flood control.

Additional exemptions are available upon application to disabled veterans and to other disabled citizens or those aged 65 and older.

Owners of agricultural land which was taxed for 1983 on its productivity value under 1-d-1 open-space provisions do not have to reapply unless requested in writing by the appraisal office to do so. However, applications must be filed before May 1 for land to be

taxed for 1984 under 1-d-1 open-space provisions, and by landowners who have not previously received productivity valuation.

"More complete information on special land valuation, tax renditions and exemptions is available from appraisal district personne as well as in the pamphlet," SoRelle said.

He said that the "Remedies" pamphlet also contains information about the appraisal review board [ARB] which serves to equalize all property values in the district. Furrow Diking Irrigation gaining popularity

High Plains water conservationists constantly take time to sell the notion of "cost effective" irrigation systems as spiraling energy costs drive up the price of watering_crops._

One irrigation system gaining favor among conservationists is furrow diking, a method of placing blocks along crop rows that will hold precipitation on the ground. By capturing the precipitation, moisture from the rain is given time to soak beneath the soil and be stored in plant roots_

Editors of the Cross Section, the official publication of _Lubbock-based High Plains Underground Water Conservation District, devoted a quarter page to the system in the newsletter's

March edition. Cost effectiveness was emphasized. Dikers can be purchased for between \$175 and \$200 per row, depending on_financing costs. The article went on to say that in limited water situations, at least one additional inch of water could be saved each growing season

According to the article, that inch_could. mean increased vields. of 30 to 50 pounds of lint cotton, 300 to 400 pounds of grain sorghum or.400 to 500 pounds of corn. Multiply by additional vields by the average price of those High Plains crops, and it is easy to see where the dikers

could save money. Enthusiasm for furrow dikers within the water district is not limited to the newsletter staff, either. In.a recent .interview, district agriculturalist. Kenneth Carver was quick to extole the

benefits of the system ... "Dikers can be used in all soils found on the High Plains, from sandy to really heavy." Carver said.. "And, best of all, it can be used in conjunction with other irrigation methods."

He said the system could be_used with alternate-row irrigation, another popular conservation method. Carver said there is a potential for substantial water savings by watering every other row and placing furrow dikers in a similar pattern.

Farmers apparently agree. Carver said. an informal survey conducted by his district, the North Plains Water District and the Panhandle Water District, indicate a significant increase in furrow diking in the region.






