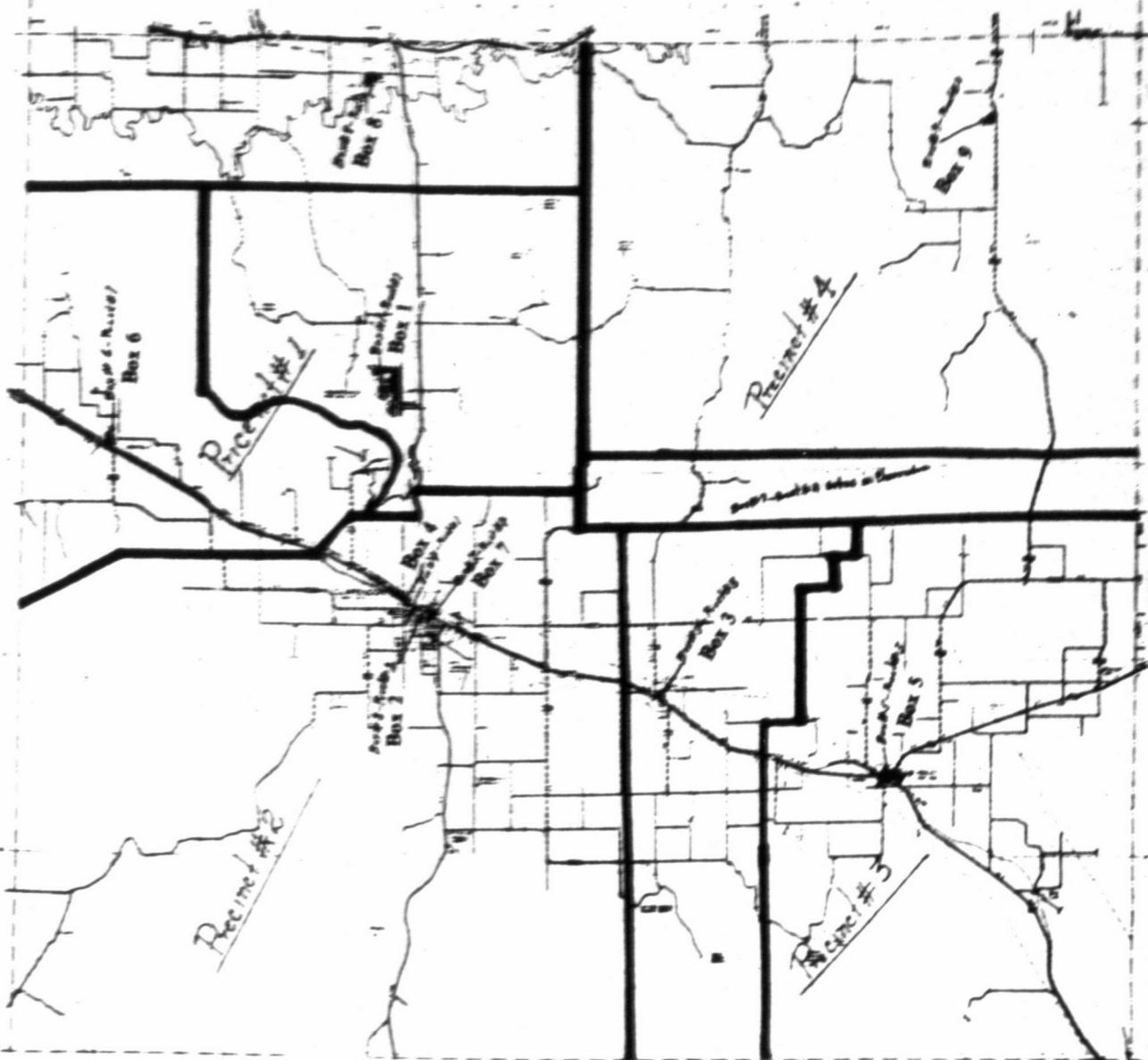

"These estimates will help farmers and ranchers adjust their operations and plan their future marketings," Findley added.

To reduce survey costs, Findley is urging farmers and ranchers to return the mailed questionnaires as soon as possible. The reported information will be combined for state and county estimates.

Annual county estimates are published for livestock, dairy, poultry, cotton, field crops, small grains, fruits and pecans, vegetables, and cash receipts from the sale of farm products.

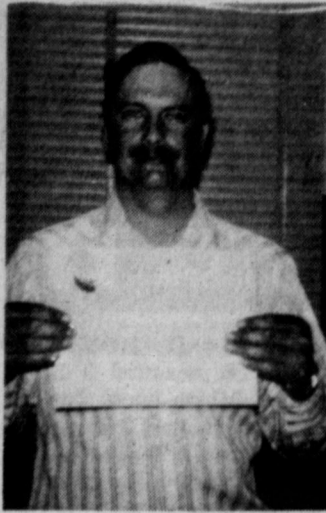
aign in different parts of the state. This week we have a group of farmers from Castro County campaigning in farming areas along the Gulf Coast," she added.

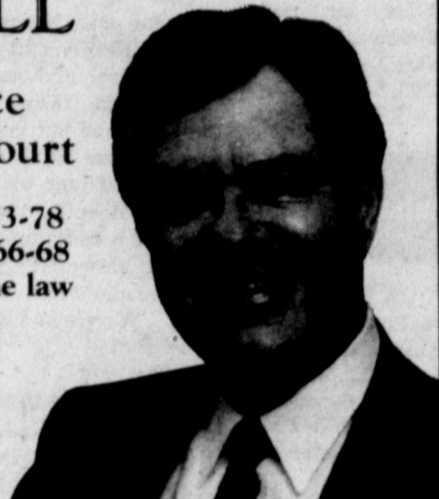

Mast class held Saturday April 28th

On Saturday, April 28, 1984, 20 EMTs and ECAs from Clarendon, Howardwick, Claude, and Groom met at the Clarendon Fire Station from 8:00 a.m. to 3 p.m. for a Mast trousers class instructed by Anthony Kingery, Paramedic from Silverton, Texas. The class was sponsored by the Clarendon EMS Association in cooperation with Panhandle Emergency Medical Services System.

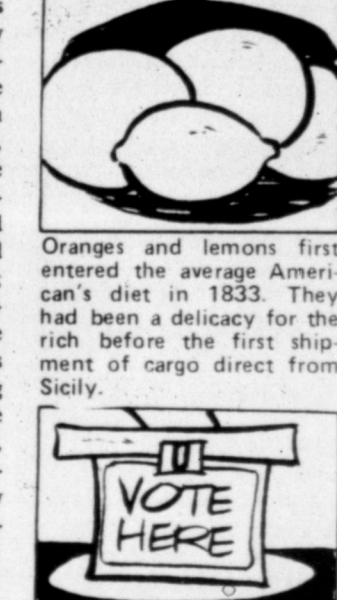
MAST trousers are relatively new to the Emergency Medical Services, having only come into widespread use in the last five or six years. They are inflatable trousers with each leg and abdomen chamber inflating individually. By applying these to a patient, his blood vessels in his lower body are compressed and more blood is auto-transfused to the heart, kidneys, lungs, and brain which can not do without blood or sufficient blood pressure for more than a few minutes. The legs and lower body can go without blood flow for a long time. MAST trousers are used in cases of severe shock due to low blood volume and pressure for whatever reason as well as being used to splint fractures of the lower extremities and pelvis. They came into being when the military developed them to use on pilots to stop black outs from gravity forcing all of the blood to the legs. The basic design and idea was adapted for use in the medical profession.

Although EMTs and ECAs are exposed to MAST trousers in their training, application is considered an advanced skill and can only be performed by Paramedics unless an EMT or ECA completes the class. Upon successful completion, they are assigned identification numbers to be used when requesting application permission and are taught how and when to apply them and when to not apply them. Clarendon has used theirs several times and actually saved two lives due to the amount of blood lost by the patient. Both patients, in

Jimmy Thompson for Sheriff

While Jimmy Thompson has been Sheriff, there have been over 1,600 arrests made for violations of State and Local law. A total of 15 felony cases were presented to the Donley County Grand Jury. Sheriff Thompson has provided office space for the District Attorney's investigation, thereby giving the Donley County Sheriff's Office instant access to the District Attorney.

Sheriff Thompson has also been instrumental in breaking up 2 multi-state car theft rings, including 1 which was headquartered in an adjacent county. Sheriff Thompson has volunteered his efforts and assisted in executing dope raids in other counties, his philosophy being "if you can remove the dope trade from surrounding counties, you will ultimately aid the residents of Donley County."
