Report on identification program for children

This week the Donley County Sheriff's Office fingerprinted children in Clarendon

Monday, April 30, 75 Pre-School age children were present at the Sheriff's Office to be printed for purposes of identification. Sheriff Jimmy Thompson signed all fingerprint cards after the children were printed by Jim Shadle and Kelly Rushing.

Tuesday, May 1, 233 students, grades Kindergarten grade 6 were printed in the Elementary school. Jim Shadle, Kelly Rushing, Doug Wright and Debbie Blackburn were present to fingerprint the students.

A fingerprint card has the child's name, age and date the prints were made. The police DO NOT keep a copy: therefore the parent or guardian possesses the only card made. A picture should be attached and updated yearly: or every 6 months for infants. These

cards need to be placed in a manilla envelope to prevent smudging. The cards were NOT sent home with the students. The parents or guardians will need to pick up their child's card at the

Those that intended to be printed, but could not make the above dates are to be reminded that they can go to the Sheriff's office at any time to do so. Also, older children, Jr. High and High School age may also be printed at the

Sheriff's office. This has been a community project involving the Sheriff's office, the Clarendon Elmentary School, and all the people of Clarendon. 
