Hawkins on Tech Horse Judging Team

Texas Tech University's horse judging teams have scored a double victory by placing first and third overall in the Southwest Regional Intercollegiate Horse Judging Contest at College Station.

Animal science Professor and coach Jim Heird said, "This is the sixth straight year we've won the Southwest Regional, but this is the first time we place two teams in the top five."

Out of the past 11 national-level collegiate horse judging contests, Texas Tech has placed first seven times, second twice and third twice. "We've been no lower than third in the past three years," Heird said. There are two teams, squad A and squad B.

Among Squad B members was Dean Hawkins, animal science senior, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Hawkins of Clarendon.

In the performance division, Texas Tech placed first and second. Squad A tied for first in the halter category. In reasons, Squad B took first and Squad A placed fourth.

Heird said nine universities participated with 15 teams.

In the individual winners Hawkins placed third in performances and third in reasons and a third overall.

"This was one of the best

showings at a contest in taking two of the top five team spots and four of the five overall individual places," Heird said.

The university horse judging team's next competition will be in October at the All-American Quarter Horse Congress in Columbus, Ohio.

Veterans Land Borad makes \$165 million available to Texas Veterans at 9.97 percent

In the largest sale of general obligation bonds in the history of the state, the Texas Veterans Land Board today accepted a bid with a net interest cost of 8.9939 percent from an investment syndicate headed by Citicorp Capital Markets Group to underwrite an additional \$165 million in bonds to fund the Texas Veterans Housing Program (VHAP).

"Because the program has once again shown such strength in the financial market place, it is possible for us to continue offering \$20,000 home loans to Texas veterans at 9.97 percent," Texas Land Commissioner Gary Mauro said.

Mauro, who serves as Chairman of the Veterans Land Board, said, "With the Federal Reserve discount rate and private conventional mortgage rates on the rise again, I think it is remarkable that the results of our second trip to the bond market have again enabled us to continue offering VHAP loans below ten percent."

Mauro said that the bid was particularly encouraging because of the track record AAA municipal bonds have had over the past few months in the financial market. "This is an outstanding bid in a bond market weakened by rising interest rates. It shows the faith the financial community places in the VHAP and the strength and success of this new program," Mauro said.

Mauro said the newly-cratred program, which offers \$20,000 loans to eligible Texas veterans to apply toward the purchase of a

home, has received over 2800 applications for home loans since the program began accepting them January 29.

Texas veterans are currently paying 9.97 percent interest on loans financed through the initial sale of \$85 million in bonds to fund the program.

Mauro said the number of approved lenders for the program is now over 125 with more than 400 locations across the state where veterans can apply for loans. Mauro said he believes the availability of lenders, VA participation in the program which enables veterans to get loans with no down payment, and the excellent interest rate "make the Veterans Housing Assistance Program the most attractive home loan program in the country."

Veterans Housing Assistance Program

In January 1984, the Texas Veterans Affairs Commission started certifying action for veterans wishing to participate in the Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program. Already the Commission has certified over 2,000 veterans, and Mr. Aubrey L. Bullard, executive Director of the Commission, states that he expects the applications to increase in volume as more veterans and lenders become more familiar with the Program. Bullard added that this loan may now be combined with a VA or FHA loan.

Veterans may apply for participation in the Program through a participating lender after picking out a home and having a contract for the purchase of that home.
