1890 A church is organized

With the coming of the Fort Worth & Denver Railroad and the move of Clarendon's townsite in 1887, Clarendon changed from a colony on the plains to a city of tents almost overnight. Newcomers seeking rich and fertile land came by wagon and train to settle along the railroad. In this bustling settlement members of the Baptist faith joined together under the leadership of Elder E.J. Brice of Memphis and organized the First Baptist Church of Clarendon March 10, 1890. Elder Brice lived in Memphis but was elected pastor of the Clarendon congregation. The church adopted the Baptist Articles of Faith and the church covenant. Pleaching services were held once each month. Charter members of the church included: W.A. Cooper, R.W. Hall. J.W. Singletary, Mrs. C J. Hall, Miss Laura Hall, Mrs. N.A. Singletary, Miss Kate-Cooker and Mary Shacksy.

June 18, 1891 W.A. Cooper was elected as the first deacon of the church and was ordained by Elder J.W. Brice and Elder T.H. Shorts, who was serving as preacher in the First Baptist Church in Amarillo. Feb. 14, 1892 church records state: "At the urgent request of Elder J.W. Brice, the church decided to build a church for worship. J.W. Brice and W.A. Cooper were appointed as a committee to collect the building." 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

What's in a Name By Gene Prevo

Have you ever looked up your name in a dictionary of names to see what it means? I did. And I was pleasantly surprised to discover that my given name is of Greek origin and it means "noble; wellborn." My surname is of French origin.

A name denotes personality. Your name is very personal to you. And that personal relationship always enhances the value. The American Indians gave their children names which had special meaning. Sometimes a child was not given a name until it had distinguished itself, as for example, by displaying courage or some other characteristic.

A name denotes nationality, or national origin. Anyone who does research on names soon learns that the names need to be traced to their national origin. Each nation has its distinguishing characteristics in the names which are chosen. The gutteral sounds (those made by sounding in the throat) indicate German, or perhaps Greek, origin. The labial sounds (those made by the lips) indicate origins from the romantic languages of French, Latin or Spanish. The Scandinavian countries have their own distinguishing characteristics, and the same is true of other

A name denotes character. One is reminded of the name Enoch in the Bible, and the man who was given that name. Enoch "walked with God: and was not; for God took him" (Gen. 5:24). One can fill in the details with the imagination. Enoch and God were walking together, and one day God said to Enoch, "We are closer to my house than we are to yours. Why not come on home with me"? And so Enoch went home to be with God. The Bible says he was translated. His name


