Greenbelt Water Authority totals record sales in '77

For the second straight year the sale of water by the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority passed one billion gallons and the 1977 sales were 1,149,318,000 gallons. In 1976 the sales totaled 1,045,279,000 gallons.

The 1977 sales made a new record for the Authority. Each year, since the Authority first began operation in 1967, there has been an increase in sales over the previous year.

Sales in 1977 totaled 1,149,318,000 gallons. In 1976 the sales totaled 1,045,279,000 gallons. In previous years sales were as follows:

The largest amount was sold in July when 163,743,000 gallons were purchased.

Members of the Greenbelt Water Authority are Clarendon, Hedley, Childress, Quanah, and Crowell. The Authority services additional customers with the Red River Authority of Texas and Georgia Pacific at Acme, Texas being two leading customers. The Red River Authority purchases water for rural water systems and their demand for more water each year gets higher as more systems are put into use. Towns such as Cary, Kirkland, and Estelline are served through the Red River

Authority as are many rural farms.

Greenbelt Water Authority is governed by a Board of Directors. Each member city has an appointed director. R.A. Yarbrough of Childress presently serves as president and Carroll Knorpp of Clarendon as vice president. Other board members include Virgil McPherson of Hedley, Howard Stanley of Quanah, and Henry Black of Crowell.

Conditions of water pumped from Greenbelt Lake are monitored constantly at the water treatment plant located north of Clarendon.

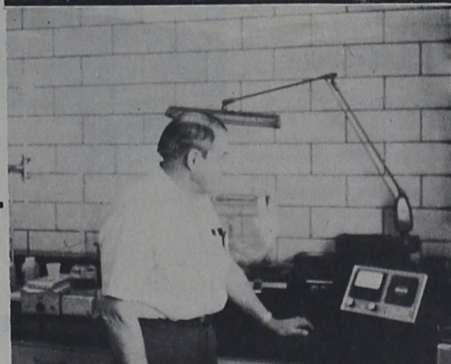
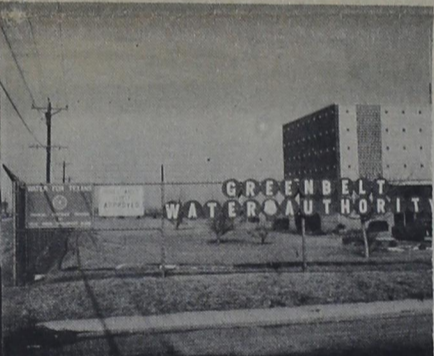
Each hour samples are brought in and tested for condition of chlorine. Chemical structure analysis (turbidity, alkalinity, and ph) are taken on a daily basis seven days per week and these readings are reported to the State Health Department on a daily basis at the end of each month. Bacteria samples are taken each week from locations at the head of each member city plus in-between city locations.

Three samples per week are sent from the Clarendon lab to the State Health lab. Also, once each month seven samples are taken from the

lake for examination.

A total of eleven are employed on a full-time basis by the Authority plus part-time help during the busy summer season. General manager of the plant is James L. Kuhn; Operation Supervisor is Frank Drummond.

"A major factor in operating the Authority is keeping abreast with constant changes in requirements set by the Environmental Protection Agency," said Drummond. "Also, another concern we have is for the cost of production in the future."

Filing deadline nears for those seeking county office; Feb. 6 is the last day

County offices hold a high interest for citizens as more continue to toss their bid in the ring for these important positions. Filing to date for the place of County Judge are the incumbent W.R. Christal and H.S. Hinds of Hedley. Seeking the post of County Chairman is Nina Dale, the incumbent opposed by Dee Williams. Incumbent P.C. Messer has announced his bid for another term as District and County Clerk. Vying for the Justice of the Peace job is incumbent Carroll Lewis with Ernest Kent as opponent for the Clarendon place. In the bid for Hedley place Justice of the Peace M.O. Weatherly is seeking election. In the county com-

missioners race Precinct 4 William Chamberlain, Glen Adkins and the incumbent Jess Finley have filed. Seeking the job as Commissioner of Precinct 2 are Claude Moore and the incumbent Olace Hicks.

Mary Cooke, Democratic County Chairman and James F. Hayes, Republican County Chairman remind all interested citizens that February 6 at 6:00 p.m. is the deadline to file for a county office.

A filing fee of \$300 is required for all elective county offices with the exception of Justice of the Peace. That office requires a \$200 filing fee.

To run for office in Donley County, a person must be a

citizen, be mentally competent, not have been convicted of a felon (unless full rights of citizenship have been restored), be eighteen by the time one starts his term in office and have resided in the county six months prior to the election. There are no special requirements for any of the elective offices, such as specialized schooling or college credits, at the time of election. Some special training may be necessary after assuming the duties of the office, in which case, a person would generally have one year to meet those

requirements.

Offices to be filled in this year's election and the salary set for the offices are: County Judge, \$8,460.00 plus \$900 car expense; District and County Clerk \$9,060.00; County Treasurer \$5,512.00; County Commissioner Prints 4 & 2, \$5,256.24 plus \$1,500 car expense; Justice

of the Peace, Clarendon \$7,200.00; Hedley \$4,135.20.

The first primary will be held Saturday, May 6. From February until May will be a time of campaigning for candidates and decision making for qualified voters as to who will hold these important county offices for the next four years.

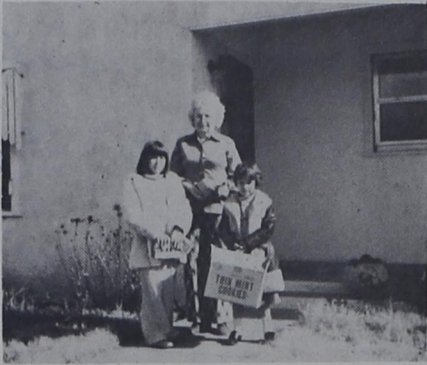
at Donley County Medical Center and later able to return home. The van she was driving received heavy damage.

On Monday night January 9 we all made dishes and brought them to eat with the bread and spaghetti. Everyone dressed up and we all looked nice. The ones

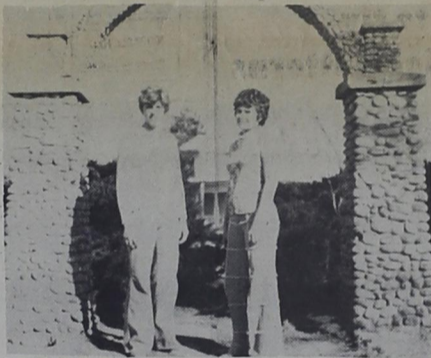
participating in this event were Jill Wallace, Traci Burch, Christi Page, Thersa Percival, Rachel Bowling, and Janet Risley.

Some of the nation's most outstanding doctors and scientists presented the latest information on the causes of cancer and methods of control. They also revealed information con-

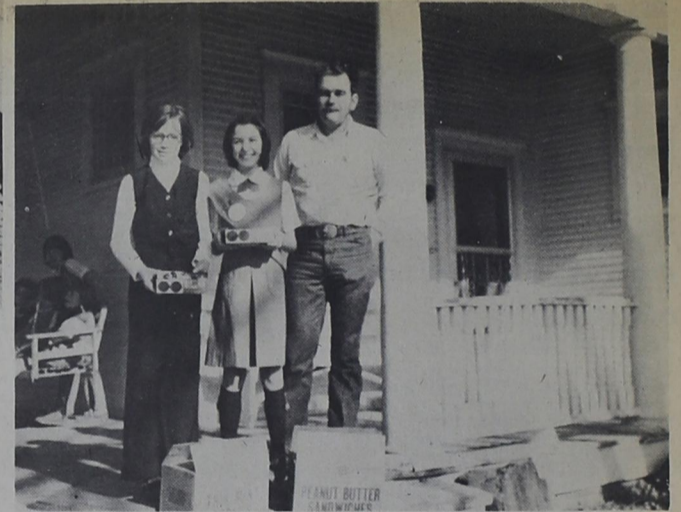
cerning cancer research.

Ray Lemmon candidate for Railroad Commissioner

Ray Lemmon has announced his candidacy for Texas Railroad Commissioner, unexpired term, in the May 6th Democratic Primary.

Lemmon, a former state representative, has been directly and indirectly involved in energy, transportation and related matters for an extended period of time. He has long advocated the proper conservation and development of our energy resources.

In announcing his candidacy for Texas Railroad Commissioner, Lemmon stressed his government

service as a two-term state representative. He served as chairman of the House Oceanography Committee, chairman of the Coastal and Marine Resources committee and was the first chairman of Statutory Texas Coastal and Marine Council.

Lemmon is a graduate of the University of Houston, a Marine veteran of World War II, a devoted family man, dedicated public servant (a lifelong Democrat) and successful independent businessman for twenty-three years.

"I believe that my background, a combination of business, legislative and membership in the organizations related to the activities of the railroad commission, qualify me for the office of Railroad Commissioner," Lemmon said.

Whaley meets campaign workers here

Foster Whaley of Pampa, a democratic candidate for State Representative from the 66th District, met with some two dozen enthusiastic workers Thursday, January 26, to map campaign plans.

H.M. Breedlove, serving as Whaley's Donley County Campaign Manager, introduced the Pampa candidate. Breedlove pointed out his long acquaintance and respect for Whaley's integrity, ability and good judgment.

Whaley, a retired County Agent of 26 years, farmer and rancher has recently reduced his farming operation by leasing out land he owns and operates in Armstrong, Carson and Gray Counties so he can devote his full attention to his campaign and later to his duties as state representative.

On State issues, Whaley told the group that more publicity and even public

hearings were needed on bills introduced before the legislature. He cited the new vehicle licensing law as a bad example.

"I don't think we need all the 900 new laws passed last session of the legislature out of 4000 introduced." "It will be my policy to vote 'No' on any kind of legislation I don't understand that is being hurried through the legislative mill in Austin," Whaley said.

It was pointed out that because of the friendly business climate, Texas was

growing faster than most states. Texas is destined to have two additional representatives in 1980. This growth factor and because of inflation the annual increase in revenue for the State had jumped eight hundred fifty million per year over the last two years.

Whaley said he will

strongly oppose any new taxes unless the higher courts rule the property tax for schools illegal. In such case a substitute tax (not an increase in taxes) will have to be passed. He stressed the need to restrain the environmental agencies and balance environmental decisions with economic decisions. It was pointed out that Whaley was the first to sound the alarm state wide when a governmental agency tried to pass a compulsory soil and water conservation law.

Whaley closed by pointing out his personal acquaintance with many of the legislators over the State and key officials in Austin would be of great benefit to a freshman legislator and the 66th Legislative District.

Whaley has a close and personal friendship with Regan Brown, Commissioner of Agriculture, and Governor and Janey Briscoe.

Revised target prices for barley and grain sorghum have been announced. They are: Barley-\$2.15 bu. and Grain Sorghum-\$2.28 bu. If you have received a low yield payment on grain sorghum, payments will be recomputed, and if this procedure provides a greater benefit, you will be issued a supplemental payment.

Deficiency payments for grain sorghum will be made on the acres planted within the allotment. Final determination on deficiency payment rates will be made in April, and payments will be made soon after that.

ASCS-503 CARDS
If you have not brought in the cards showing your 1977 cotton production, you should do so as soon as possible. 1978 yields cannot be determined until we have this information.

For farms intending to participate in the 1978 program, the signup period will be March 1 through May 1.

SAC bombers to fly practice mission patterns near this area

Strategic Air Command (SAC) bombers are flying a new low level training route in Colorado, Oklahoma and Texas. These missions began January 20 and the route will continue to be used until January 10, 1979.

Aircrews flying this training route, designated "Oliver Branch 55" will begin descending from high altitude north of Goodland, Kansas. They will begin the low-level portion of the route south of Yuma, Colorado, proceed south toward La Junta, where they will make a left turn and fly toward Boise City, Oklahoma.

From north of Boise City aircrews will fly south-easterly to the Oklahoma-Texas border near Higgins, make a 120-degree right turn and fly toward Amarillo, Texas. Southeast of Amarillo aircrews will turn left and fly to Silvertown, Texas making another left turn toward Matador, Texas. Aircrews will exit the low level portion southeast of Post. After exiting, aircrews will make a turn toward Jayton, Texas and continue to climb to a higher altitude.

This low level course has both an alternate entry and exit point. The alternate entry is near Boise City, and the alternate exit point is east of Amarillo near Shamrock.

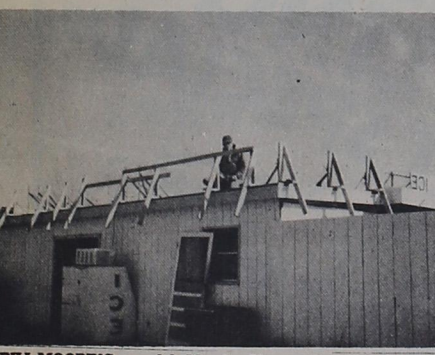
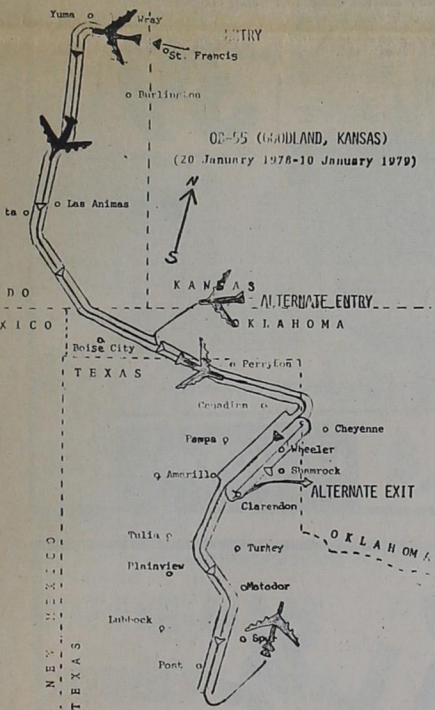
Aircrews desiring additional training at the completion of simulated bomb released near Lefors,

will make an 180-degree turn near Clarendon, fly northeast toward Cheyenne, Oklahoma, and re-enter the route north of Wheeler.

The giant eight-engine B-52 Stratofortresses and swing-wing FB-111 fighter-bombers will fly the training route at subsonic speeds along a center line of an eight-mile wide corridor at altitudes ranging from 600 to 2,000 feet above the ground. The route will be used to measure precision bombing, navigation training and electronic countermeasure activity.

Aircraft do not carry bombs on these training flights. All bombing is simulated and radar scored by ground based scoring sites. Radar bomb scoring equipment will be located near La Junta, Colorado; Hitchland, Texas; Lefors, Texas; and Post, Texas. These sites using radio and radar signals, measure the accuracy of simulated bomb releases and simulated launching of short range attack missiles.

The Strategic Air Command conducts low-level bombing and navigation training to assure bomber crews are kept combat ready at all times. The routes are changed periodically to provide unfamiliar targets and radar returns. Populated areas are avoided as much as possible and all routes are coordinated with the Federal Aviation Administration.

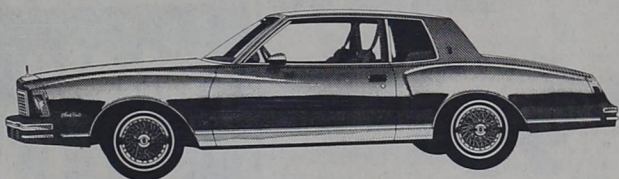

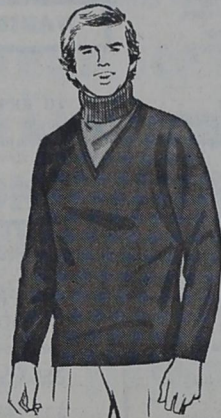

These sales can offer good buys on children's clothing, especially cold weather fashions, including coats, hats, boy's suits and shoes as well as general clothing items.

Check these features for comfort and good fit:

- Neckline does not gape or bind.
 - Shoulders are wide enough for free arm movement.
 - Sleeves are roomy and will not pull out with strain.
 - Shirts and blouses are long enough to tuck in at the waist and stay tucked in.
 - Pant legs are short enough so the child won't trip on them.
 - Fabrics are soft, not stiff or scratchy.
 - Elastic at the waistline or wrist is not tight enough to cause red marks on the skin.
- Look for these growth features in children's clothing:
- Deep hems in skirts, pants and sleeves can be lengthened as a child grows taller.
 - Remember to use decorative stitching, rick-rack or trim to hide marks from the old hem if necessary.
 - Wide seams at the center back of pants allow adjustments in width.
 - Two-piece garments usually have more room for growth than one-piece items.
 - Adjustable straps and waistbands allow for increasing sizes.
 - Garments without a definite waistline can be worn longer than those with fitted waists.
 - Stretchy fabrics and knitted garments have "give" to allow for growth.
 - For durability and care check for these features:
 - Wide seams that will not ravel or pull out, or on knits, narrow seams that are stitched and overcast securely.
 - Double stitched seams at pants' crotch or arm holes for strength.
 - Reinforcements or patches on the knees and elbows of clothes that receive hard wear.
 - Evenly stitched button-holes.
 - Reinforcement stitching, such as bar tacks, at points of stress, at pocket corners and the ends of flaps.
 - Check the labels and hang tags for terms like "machine washable, permanent press, soil release, little or no ironing, crease resistant

In order to receive testimony concerning Volume I, Basic Data Report, of the Water Quality Management Plan for the Red Basin. This document is the first of two volumes which, upon completion of Volume II, will form the Water Quality Management Plan for the Red Basin. Volume I, Basic Data Report, includes information on existing wastewater treatment facilities; existing water quality; existing land use patterns; existing population; and projections of economic growth, population, and probable land use patterns. Volume II, Plan Summary Report, will present the recommended plans for water quality management and the legal, financial, and institutional requirements of each plan. Also included in Volume II will be descriptions of feasible alternatives, an environmental assessment, and a summary of the public participation activities conducted during the development of the plan. The Water Quality Management Plan for the Red Basin is being developed to satisfy the requirements of Section 208 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments of 1972, and pursuant to Title 40 Code of Federal Regulations Parts 130 and 131 and the State of Texas Continuing Planning Process. The public hearing shall be conducted in compliance with Section 26.037 [formerly Section 21.089], Texas Water Code. The study area for this plan includes most of the Red River Basin. 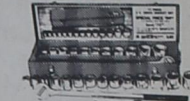

The course is open to drivers of all ages, and on completion, participants will be awarded certificates which will be honored for discounts on automobile insurance. The Certificates are good for three years. If you now hold one of these
