The first American Thanksgiving Day was celebrated during the second winter the Plymouth colonists spent in the New World. The first dreadful winter in Mass. had killed nearly half of the members of the the colony. But new hope grew up in the summer of 1621. The corn harvest brought rejoicing. Gov. William Bradford decreed that Dec. 13, 1621, be set aside as a day of feasting and prayer, to show the gratitude of the colonists that they

Thisis **National** Family Week

National Family Week is to be celebrated during Thanksgiving week. Congress passed a joint resolution authorizing President Jimmy Carter to proclaim the week, and Mr. Carter signed the measure into law. The resolution and the proclamation both call upon Americans to recognize the importance of the family unit and the role it has played as the nation's backbone.

Thanksgiving is the traditional time for families to gather together. This year will be the third year in the last four that national recognition of family week has been authorized by law.

The originator of National Family Week is Sam Wiley, an assistant principal at a high school in Indianapolis. He also directs the National Family Foundation, Inc.

Pilgrims Give Thanks at First Thanksgiving Feast His congressman, Representative John T. Myers (R Ind) first proposed the national proclamation in Washington. It passed the house 400-3. The senate passed it unanimously.

In urging passage of the resolution, Rep. Del Clawson (R - Calif.), house sponsor this year, recalled the pilgrim families.

"The family was their unit of survival," he said. "Techniques essential to self-preservation taught within the family circle along with traditional book learning when there were no schools. Family served as Thanksgiving Day unity was reinforced more often than not with family

Clawson also noted that President Carter stressed the importance of the family in his inaugural address.

The congressman then had an editorial reprinted in the Congressional Record about children who became successes despite adversity.

The conclusion: "The Family is the key. The achievers are found to have close family ties which support positive values and where love is in abundance. The other young people fend for themselves and prey on society in an atmosphere of materialism and permissive-


Concluding his message in support of National Family Week, Clawson said:



Hedley to honor longtime businessman on 80th birthday

Hobart Moffitt is well known throughout Donley County and the area. Once a person becomes acquainted with Hobart they never forget his polite. friendly, kind helping manner. Hobart. a very successful business man in the sales of hardware for over sixty years in Hedley, has seen many changes over the years.

Born in Corsicana in 1897,

Hobart came with his parents and family on what he calls a "coffeepot train" to Rowe in 1903. The town of Rowe was located one mile west of present site of Hedley. In 1905 Hobart's father, William, sold the family farm for \$12.00 per acre and moved to Elida, New Mexico. Then in 1910 in a covered wagon traveling a week to cross 225 miles, the family moved back to Rowe. After arriving in Rowe, Hobart recalls the family received mail at two locations, both in Rowe and Hedley as those were the days when the townsite of Rowe was vanishing and Hedley was being formed in its present location. Continuing on the move in 1913 the moffitt family once again moved away from Donley County. This time they settled at Hollis. Oklahoma for a year, moved the next year to the free state of Van Zandt, then to Corsicana in 1915, and finally returned back to Hedley in October, 1917 to make their home ever

since. In 1918 Hobart began years. working for Moreman -Battle Hardware Company in Hedley and continued with them until January 1927, when he became employed by Thompson Brothers Hardware in Hedley. He worked for them until 1947. In that year he purchased Moreman Hardware and in 1948 bought Thompson Brothers Hardware. Hobart combined the two hardwares Hall. No gifts please.

Hobart has seen buggies and wagons for sale as hardware items. He has seen coal oil heaters and coal oil cook stoves replaced with electric and gas appliances. He has seen 22 short shells sell for 15 cents a box and Super X 12 guage shot gun shells go for 85 cents a carton. Today they sell for \$6.40 per box. Moffitt has seen nails sell as low as 5 cents a pound; today he sells them for 50 cents a pound. In days of lower prices, Hobart recalls, "We made better profits because goods were sold at cost plus per cent rather than at the manufacturers suggested retail

Through the years moffitt has proved himself a very capable and successful businessman always able to establish a good rapport with his clientele. Local people say he always maintains an excellent stock and he draws trade from those throughout the country who know him for his fine reputation.

Joined by his sister, Ruby Beeckler, who moved to Hedley from Atlanta, Georgia in August of 1977, the two as a team provide excellent customer service today. Moffitt. who will celebrate his eightieth birthday on Sunday, operates the largest business in Hedley. He operates the business he has known and loved for sixty



A colorful design of a rural mailbox, crammed with letters and packages, will add a cheery touch to holiday mail and customers interested in history may choose the design of General George Washington kneeling in prayer during the winter of 1777-78 at Valley Forge.

Both stamps are on sale currently at the main post office and all branches.

The Washington stamp pays tribute to the Continental Army which spent Christmas, marred by severe hardships and semi-starvation, at Valley Forge in Pennsylvania.

After an unsuccessful effort against the British at Germantown, General Washington wrote: "We have this day no less than 2,873 men in camp unfit for duty because they are barefooted or otherwise naked..."

This design, by artist Stevan Dohanos, is based upon a painting by J.C. Leyendecker which appeared as a Saturday Evening Post cover in 1935. Mr. Dohanos also is noted for his paintings which appeared on more than 100 other covers of the

PHSA VOICE **PROTEST**

The Governing Body of the Panhandle Health Systems Agency, a representative regional planning organization, voted to protest recently published national health guidelines developed by the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

The Governing Body unanimously voted to send a letter of protest to HEW outlining objections to the application of national population/bed ratios and other arbitrary criteria to Panhandle hospitals.

The guidelines which focus on "short-term opportunities for cost containment and quality enhancement" would require regional compliance within about 5 years, limit the maximum number of hospital beds to 4 per 1,000 population. The Panhandle currently has a ratio of 5.9 hospital beds per 1,000 population.

If adopted, the national guidelines would require a 33 percent reduction in the number of hospital beds available throughout the Panhandle region.

General areas covered by the guidelines include a minimum 80 percent occupancy rate, a minimum of 2,000 deliveries annually in metropolitan obstetrical units and 500 deliveries annually in rural hospitals, and a minimum of 20 beds in a pediatric unit.

Specialized services guidelines are proposed for neonatal intensive care units, open heart surgery, cardiac therapy, computerized tomographic scanners, and end-stage renal disease.
