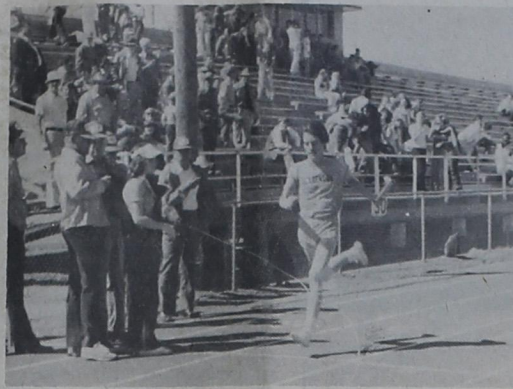




JOHN HALL HANDS the baton to Keith Topper for the second lap of the mile relay.

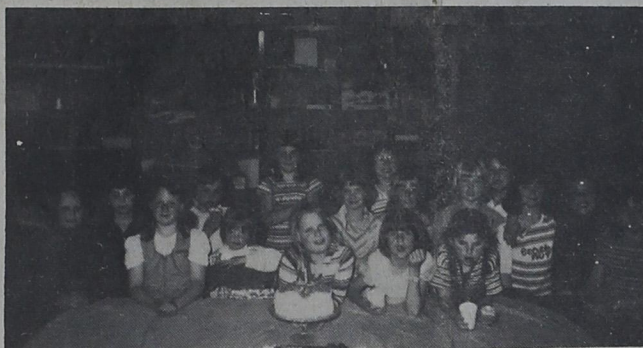

Grain reserve ready March 1

As of Mar. 1, farmers may place their 1977-crop wheat, oats and barley directly into the grain reserve being developed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Previously, farmers who wished to enter grain in the reserve needed to wait until a government loan on the crop matured, points out Roland Smith, grain marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Early entry of 1977-crop corn and sorghum into the reserve program is expected to be announced later by the Secretary of Agriculture.

There is also a change in the farm storage facility loan program. Under the change, a farmer will be able to obtain a loan for storage structures to store two years' crop production. However, in determining eligibility, existing capacity used to store grain in the reserve program will be excluded.

USDA offers farmers an opportunity to place their grain in the reserve program for a three-year period and receive storage payments annually in advance, notes Smith. Storage payments are 25 cents per bushel for wheat, corn, barley and

sorghum and 19 cents per bushel for oats. In return, farmers must agree to hold their grain off the market at least until the price reaches the minimum release level (140 percent of the current loan rate for wheat and 125 percent for feed grains) or the contract expires. Under current procedures, farmers must pay 6 percent interest on the loans.

The goal of the grain reserve program is to accumulate about 17 million

metric tons (670 million bushels, corn equivalent) of feed grains and around 9 million metric tons (330 million bushels) of wheat. Participation will be on a first come, first served basis until the goal is reached.

A farmer without an existing loan can obtain a loan and immediately place grain into the reserve by contacting his county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office, adds Smith.

J.P. voting explained

In reply to the many inquiries regarding qualifications for voters for Justice of the Peace, county officials have provided the following information.

Justice precincts and voting precincts are the same. The present division of the City of Clarendon by precincts came about as a result of a Federal ruling. The ruling, one man one vote, caused precincts which had previously remained outside the city limits to be extended into the city. This extension of precincts one and four into the city is preventing city residents in these precincts from voting for precinct two justice of the peace candidates.

According to the election code no one may vote in two precincts. City residents in precincts one and four would

be doing just that, voting in two precincts, if they voted as they did before the one man one vote law became effective.

City Council meets in regular session

Meeting in regular session March 7, 1978 City Council members approved minutes of the previous meeting, granted payment of bills, reviewed and approved the financial statement and disposed of other routine business.

A letter of resignation was tendered by Henry Michels, effective April 15.
Owners of Cable T.V. of Clarendon, J.R. Willis and H.C. Ford, were present to discuss two additional channels for Clarendon patrons. These channels, Channel 17 from Atlanta, which will be carrying sports and movies, and Christian Broadcast Network, with religious and educational programming, will each be 24 hour stations.
There would be an additional cost of approximately \$1.50 to current charges because of installation expense. Additional charges would not be made until patrons were receiving the new programs.

Bronchos' track teams in Panhandle Relays

Last Friday and Saturday the Clarendon Bronchos' varsity and freshman track teams competed in the Panhandle Relays. Overall the varsity finished second with 58 points and the freshman finished third in their division with 30 points.
Friday was spent competing in field events and qualifying in the running events. Keith Floyd finished second in the high jump when he cleared 6 foot 2 inches. This tied the school record which Keith tied last year. Darrell Gilliam placed third in the freshman high jump and sixth in the shot put. Lance Thornberry placed fourth in the freshman high jump. These were the only boys who placed in the field events.
In the running events John Hall qualified in the 220 yard dash Friday with a time of 23.4 seconds. Other qualifiers were Keith Topper in the 440 yard dash with a time of 55.8 seconds, Gary McClellan in the 100 yard dash with a time of 10.9, Dan Brandes in the intermediate hurdles with a time of 42.3 seconds, sprint relay with a time of 45.4 seconds and the mile relay with a time of 3 minutes 44.2 seconds.

ASCS news

Set-aside requirements:
1. Set-aside acres may be seeded to crops in the fall for harvest in the next crop year.
2. Stubble residue from the prior year crop, provided the stubble residue is adequate to control erosion and weeds are controlled without destroying the residue.
3. Stubble mulch with minimum tillage in the current year only as necessary to control weeds, provided sufficient stubble remains to control erosion.
4. At no time can set-aside be clean tilled, except in the fall for fall seeded crops.
April 1 through September 30 has been set as the non-grazing dates for set-aside acreage.
April 1 has been set as the latest date which wheat for grain can be grazed and still be expected to produce a normal crop.

Reporting final date 5: May 15, 1978-Wheat, barley, oats and other small grains. August 1, 1978-Cotton, corn, grain sorghum, and other spring seeded crops.
SIGNUP: The final date to sign up in the 1978 farm program is May 1, 1978.

Normal crop acreage:
Your notice of Normal Crop Acreage, and yields for cotton, wheat, corn and grain sorghum will be mailed in the near future. Appeals may be made within 15 days from the date of the notice.
If you have not brought in your ASCS-503 card for 1977 cotton production, you should do so as soon as possible so that 1978 yields can be computed.

Senate Bill 1883, big laborers' so-called Labor Law "Reform" Bill, will be going to the senate floor before long for consideration. The union lobbyists and their senate allies have been plotting ways to cutoff debate and railroad the bill

through to passage. If passed, S.1883 would provide union organizers with dangerous new legal weapons to force employers into delivering employees into unwanted unions. Any employer who balked at the signing away his employees'

freedom would risk severe new penalties imposed by government edict. It has been an obvious effort to get S. 1883 passed before the bill learns the hill learns the true meaning of the bill.

If S. 1883 passes, hundreds of thousands of additional workers would be forced to join or support unwanted unions. Millions of dollars in compulsory union dues would be automatically deducted from employees' paychecks. Labor unions are warning U.S. Senators that S. 1883 is a key bill far more important than the energy shortage, unemployment or inflation.

The president and Congress should keep in mind

that the great majority of working Americans do not belong to unions and apparently do not want union representation. Ignoring their responsibilities to the millions in the labor-not union-force would be a blatant sellout of basic right shared by all Americans: individual freedom of association. If the right to work is denied in this country, we cannot call ourselves truthfully "The Land of the Free." Most people must work to live. Paying tribute to work, therefore, is paying tribute to being alive. The alternative is the freedom to starve.

Economist who keep a watchful eye on the cotton industry are pointing to several factors that should help ease the difficulties cotton growers face in view of this season's sharply increased production and only slightly improved demand. Among factors cited by the National Cotton Council were: (1) a moderate increase expected in total foreign cotton consumption in 1977-1978; (2) a rebuilding of foreign stocks which at the beginning of the current season were at their lowest point in six years; (3) mid-January U.S. exports commitments of more than 5 million bales; and (4) a major increase in U.S. export credit funds for the current fiscal year.

There are 1,350 Lioness Clubs serving communities and the less fortunate in 45 nations as compared to approximately 29,000 Lions Clubs in almost 150 countries. The community of Hedley and the entire panhandle of Texas has reason to be proud of the Hedley Lioness Club.

The Lioness Clubs program is one of the most gratifying success stories in the history of The International Association of Lions Clubs. 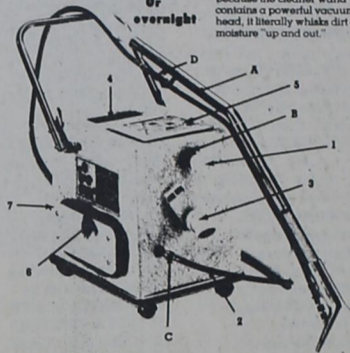

**USDA
shorting payments
due to legal loophole**

Texas grain farmers will be shorted several million dollars in deficiency payments due to an Administration level decision to exclude thousands of acres in each county when figuring farm payments for the 1977 crop year.

The disclosure of information came through members of Texas Farmers Union currently in Washington and has been openly admitted by officials in the Production Adjustment Division of USDA. The result will be confirmed to all grain sorghum producers in Texas when the payments are released in the coming weeks.

In question is the production allotment given each grain farmer on which the amount of payment is based. In the past there has been no distinction made between allotments of corn, barley and grain sorghum and county officials usually termed all allotments simply "feed grain" allotments. Many farmers have even attempted to convert unused corn allotments to grain sorghum, but were told that it was unnecessary since disaster payments have always been figured solely on "feed grain" allotments.

Now, with deficiency payments due grain farmers for the first time, USDA officials are instructing ASCS offices to count only specific grain sorghum allotments and to exclude corn bases. An example of the net difference can be seen in Hill County in Central Texas where the enforcement of specific allotments will cost the county's farmers at least \$600,000.

Texas Farmers Union President Jay Naman of Waco has called upon Texas Congressmen to challenge the USDA's decision and Congressman Jack High-tower from North Texas' 13th district has already committed to call for a reversal of the decision.

Older methods more energy efficient

foods and home freezers judiciously.

For energy-efficient home food preservation, older methods, such as home canning and drying, leave freezing "out in the cold".

Food preserving by freezing is an "extravagance" energy-wise, although it is probably the quickest and easiest method.

For example, it takes more energy to keep corn frozen longer than 22 days than it would to process it in a can.

Also, keeping a one-pound package of corn frozen for a year uses 17 times more energy than it does to manufacture a can to put it in.

For consumers interested in more energy-efficient methods of preserving foods, we recommend a return to older methods, such as canning and drying.

Home canning requires energy to process a product, but it uses little or no energy during storage.

Also, home canning efficiency increases when the waterbath or pressure canner is filled to capacity during processing.

In addition, drying can be an energy-efficient means of preservation, even though the process is limited to a smaller variety of food items.

Dried foods use no energy during shelf storage.

Although freezing will continue as a popular means of food preservation, it is "energy wise" to use frozen

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
