Voters will cast their ballots at the City Hall in this election. For the Clarendon College Board of Regents Billie Christal, Bright Newhouse (incumbent) and Dr. R. L. Gilkey have announced for the three places to be filled. Seven persons will be on the ballot for two positions vacant on the public school board of trustees: Bob Cole, Stina Cain, Mrs. J. Frances Devish, Henry Haas, Cheryl Burch, Mrs. W. T. Weatherly and Don Robinson. Voting places for the college and public school are the same, in the public school administration-tax office. Those who have announced as candidates for the hospital board of directors are C. C. Myers, Bud Hermesmeier (incumbent), Dikki Howell, E. D. Castner and Albert J. Burston. Howell and Castner are contenders for place 7. There are three polling places for voters in the hospital district, in Hedley voters go to the city hall, in Howardwick the city hall and in Clarendon the ballot boxes are at the school administration-tax office.

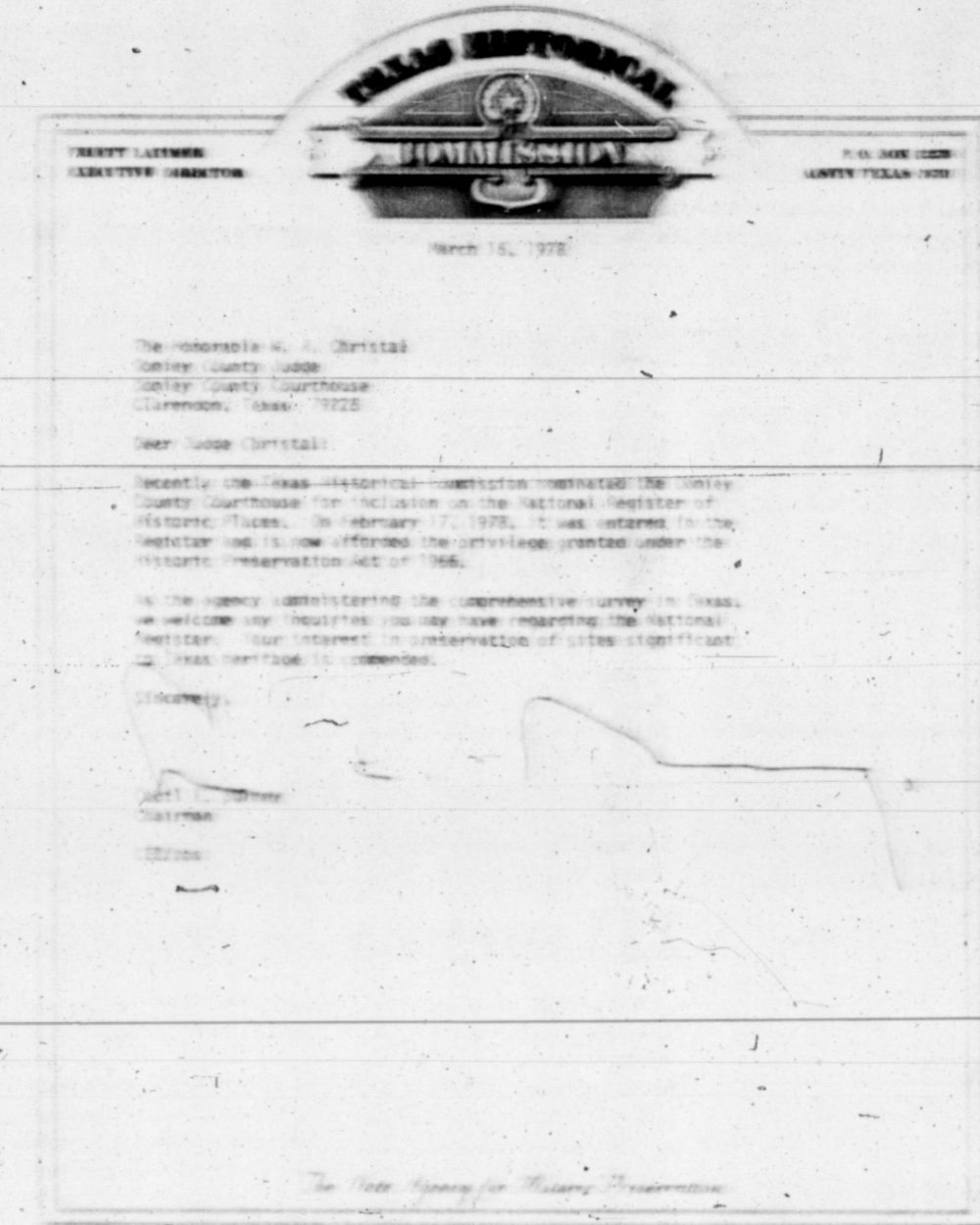

First quarter sales up

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said his office Wednesday mailed checks totaling \$69.2 million to 915 Texas cities as their March share of the one percent city sales tax.

The March rebates are 17.4 percent larger than those for the same month last year and raise the year-to-date total to \$201.5 million, up from \$189.4 million for the first three months of 1977.

"This increase, which represents increased retail sales, is just another indicator of the bullishness of the Texas economy," Bullock said.

Clarendon received net payment this period of \$9,168,722 as compared to \$8,924,45 from same period for 1977.

East and West friendship

Several mornings a week Mai (pronounced as my) Johnston and Rubye Tidwell spend some time as student and tutor, reading English. Mai, is from Asia. Rubye Tidwell is the widow of a Baptist minister, and the two women are friends.

Mai was born June 15, 1942 and was named Trong Thi Kuan Mai. She explained her name this way: Trong (her father's last name) Thi (Thi denotes a girl, a boy would have a different word) Kuan (a middle name) Mai (pronounced my) to be called by. Mai lived in Can Tho, Viet Nam, at 134 Kien Quoc.

Her childhood and life in Viet Nam was fairly typical. When she was 13 her mother died leaving her and a 15 year old sister alone with their father. Mai's father remarried after a time and four half brothers were added to the family of children.

There are many rivers in Viet Nam and Mai's family lived near one in Can Tho. Houses are built parallel to the rivers and their surface is the waterway for boat transportation. There are no highways and to need for them as everyone travels about by boat. For longer trips, say 30 miles, a water taxi is used but almost all families have a small boat with sail.

The section of the country where Mai lived was lush and green with vegetation. With a mild climate and six or seven months of rain it is ideal for the production of Asia's staple, rice.

Schools are very similar to ours with 12 grades and educational subjects, such as the three R's, history and English. Girls are taught to cook and to sew.

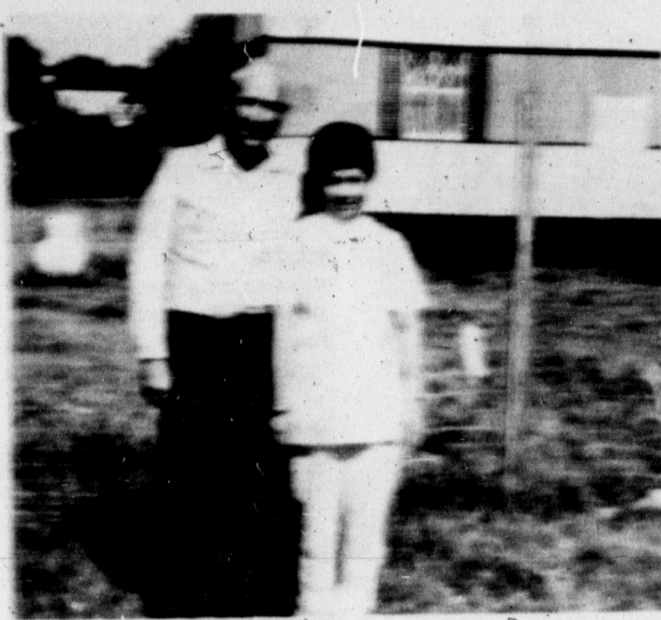
Games for children were jump rope, a top-scooter type game, a form of London Bridge and for the boys, kite flying. This is a boys' sport in Viet Nam.

Mai met James (Slick) Johnston when he was stationed in Viet Nam with the U.S. Army. The Viet Nameese driver for Johnston was a cousin of Mai's and he introduced them in 1967. Later they were married and in 1972 they came to the United States and to Clarendon.

Rubye Tidwell found the Viet Nameese shopping routine interesting and Mai described an average trip shopping for groceries. Produce is brought in very early in the morning, about four or five a.m. by boat or by a lock-stair type vehicle with bicycle wheels. Shoppers gather as soon as the produce is displayed and often stocks are depleted by 10 a.m. If there is nothing to sell the shopkeepers go home and business is over for the day.

Mai purchased fish, shrimp, mushrooms, mangoes, pork and many kinds of greens. Little or no beef is eaten by the Viet Nameese people. Like other foods a taste must be cultivated for beef if it is unfamiliar. Mai also cooks American foods including homemade lightbread.

In October, 1973 Mai returned to Can Tho for an extended visit. She smiles when she recalls the several kinds of

bananas and coconuts that are available from the trees year around, and remembers the pleasure of getting to know her small neighbors and needs.

Although she has lived in Clarendon several years Mai misses her homeland and her people. After the recent trouble in Viet Nam when many persons fled from their homes and country, Mai lost contact with her family. Packages she sends are not returned but neither does she receive any word from them. This state of affairs is of grave concern to her.

The Johnston home is tastefully furnished with thoroughly American furnishings, but Mai has given it a subtle touch of her eastern elegance and charm. On her trip home she purchased straw hats and brought back a calendar advertising a Saigon Bank. One of the "souls" hats she gave to Mrs. Tidwell, who prizes it. The calendar has a small picture inset that is a chicken sitting on a nest of money. A banks penny wise adaptation of the Americanized "nest egg" a handsome pair of dark jade green pottery elephants are among the things Mai brought from Viet Nam with her. She says they are very ordinary household possessions used for seats, plant stands, and tables in most any place they are needed.

Rubye Tidwell is assisting Mai in English reading. She uses the Laubach method and anyone speaking another language and needing help to read English should contact her. Mrs. Tidwell is a tireless worker in her church and Mai goes with her to many church functions and helps Rubye. This work is a source of satisfaction to both.

Although it has been quite some time Rubye Tidwell is a former Clarendon resident. She was Rubye Duckett when she lived here previously. As a young woman she was a clerk for Greene Dry Goods. She married here and moved away after having lived only two or three years in Clarendon.

On a recent trip to Knoxville through the Baptist Church, Mai met another Viet Nameese woman. It was an unexpected and delightful meeting for both of them.

Rubye Tidwell is dedicated to service to her fellow man. Mai is an intelligent young woman, already in English speaking western world. They are engaged in a rewarding exchange of ideas, ideas and languages. Most importantly, they are dear friends.

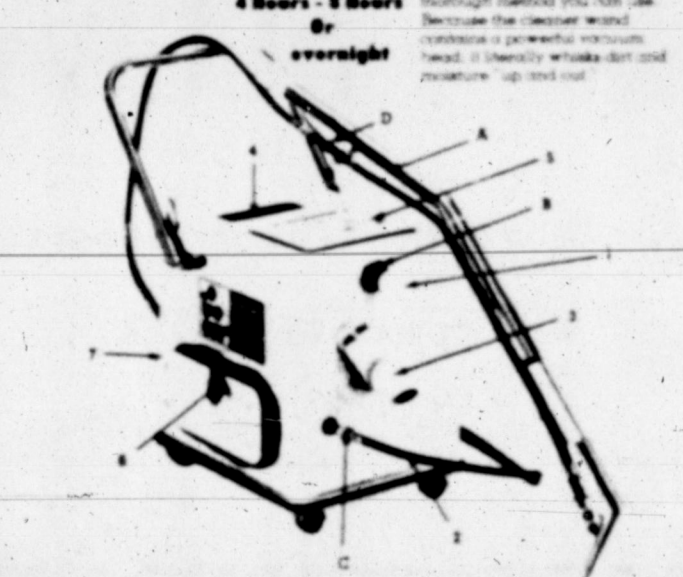

Gardening for 4-H'ers

Spring is almost here, and that means gardening time. Gardening can be a wholesome and worthwhile learning experience that can result in lots of fresh, mouth-watering vegetables such as cucumbers, tomatoes, green beans, watermelons, radishes, onions and lettuce.

It's enough to make anyone, especially a youngster, jump with joy. And youngsters can take an active part in growing these tasty treats through a 4-H gardening project, points out Cynthia, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Gardening is a good way for 4-H'ers to help their families beat the high cost of living and provide good homegrown meals. Furthermore, a gardening project helps youth learn responsibility and about such things as seed germination, plant growth and development, pollination and flowering.

Young people can also learn the basics of insect and disease control and fertilization principles.

A gardening project can range from a window box or pots and cans to a full-fledged backyard plot.

Plants grown in containers will have to be watered and fertilized more often than those grown in the ground. Soil should be a mix of organic matter, peat moss and sand.

Vegetables can also be grown around the edges of flower beds. A border of lettuce, onions, carrots, or parsley is attractive as well as edible. Plant tomatoes, peppers or eggplants with taller flowers and put beans and cucumbers against a fence or screen.

Whatever the size of the garden and the types of crops grown, a 4-H gardening project can be a most rewarding experience for youth.

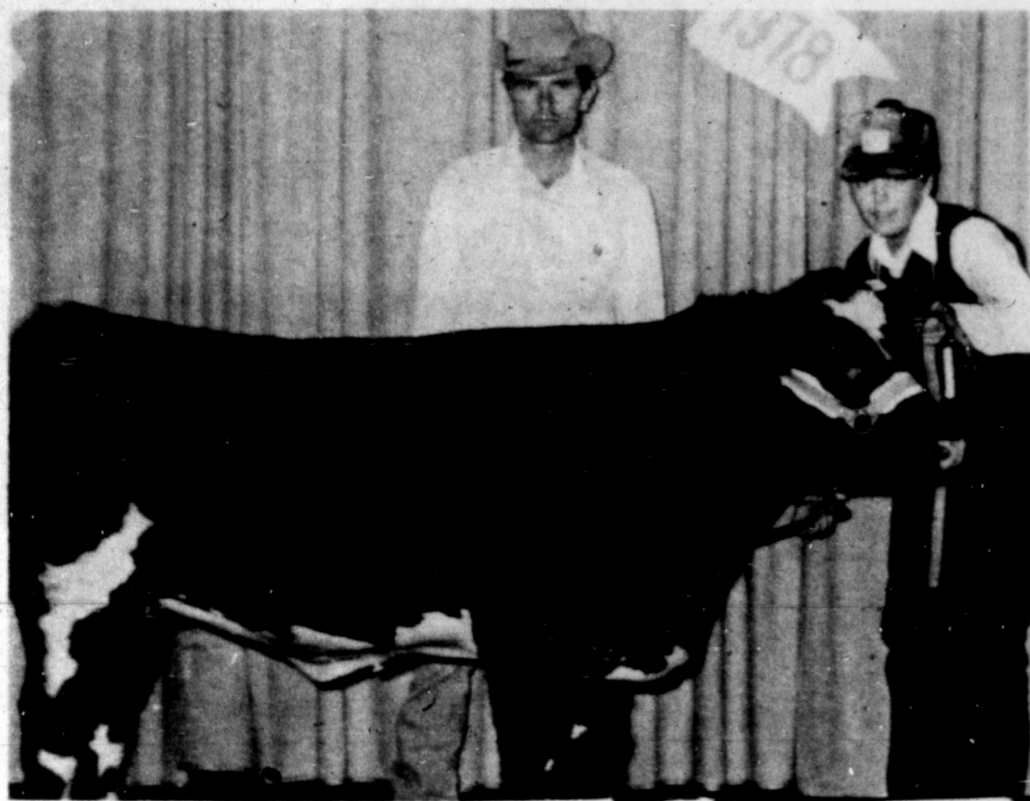

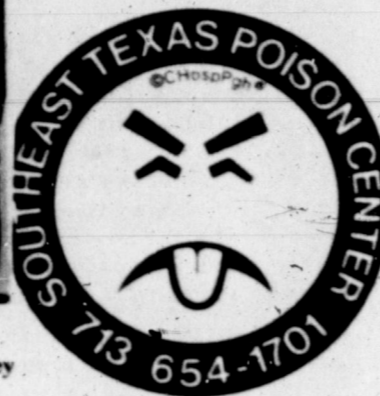

Poison center established

Last year more than 500 deaths, due to poisoning, occurred in Texas. Over two thirds of this number were children under five years of age. A newly established health service has been implemented to combat this needless tragedy.

The Texas State Poison Center in conjunction with the Southeast Texas Poison Center have an affiliation agreement with the National Poison Center Network (NPCN) headquartered in Pittsburg, Pa. as the regional center for Texas.

Regional and Satellite Centers are staffed by Poison Center information specialists, with physician back-up 24 hours a day, to answer telephones.

To curb the incidence of

accidental poisonings a campaign has been launched to promote the use of a sticker called MR YUK. MR YUK is designed to be used on dangerous products in homes and schools and portrays a green scowling face with protruding tongue.

Each MR YUK sticker carries the emergency telephone number of the NPCN Poison Center that serves the area. For Texas it is (713) 654-1701 for the Southeast Texas Poison Center.

For a supply of MR YUK stickers for use in the home, send a self-addressed, stamped business size envelope to Southeast Texas Poison Center, The University of Texas Medical Branch, Galveston, Tex. 77550.

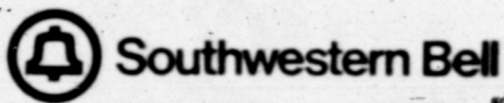
