## Saturday is Election Day

Saturday, May 6, is the Texas Primary election for political parties in the state and will determine the candidates who will be in run-offs later in the year and in some instances the winning candidates for the next terms of office.

Interest has been running high this year in political circles and voters have turned out in exceptionally large numbers to support their candidates. This is a definite indication that the people are making decisions and acting upon them responsibly.

For Donley County officials the slate of candidates includes: Billie Christal, J.S. Hinds and Lawrence Neece, Democratic candidates for Donley County Judge; Claude Moore and Olace Hicks are Precinct 2, Democratic candidates for county commissioner.

William Chamberlain, Jess Finley and Glen Adkins are Democratic candidates for county commissioner in Precinct 4. P.C. Messer, Democratic candidate for county clerk is running unopposed, but Democratic candidates for county treasurer are Mrs. Nina Dale, Mahdene (Dee) Williams and Nadine Bobbitt.

Justice of the Peace Democratic candidates for Precinct 2 are Ernest Kent, Carroll Lewis, Allie Mae Maxey and Jake Roberts. In Precinct 3 the Democratic candidate is M.O. Weatherly

Weatherly, who is unopposed in his bid for re-election.

This is the first time county voters have elected a Tax Assessor Collector apart from the sheriff's office. The two offices were separated in an election last year with Chauncey Hommel, Kay McCowen and Lyndel W. Moffet on the ticket as Democratic candidates.

In the 60th State Legislative District, Bill Hale is the Republican candidate and Glenn Conrad and Foster Whaley are Democratic candidates.

For the 13th Congressional District, Jack Hightower is the Democratic candidate.

Donley County Democratic voters will ballot at boxes #1 Howardwick, #2 Old Courthouse, #3 Lelia Lake School building, #4 Old College Building, #5 Hedley City Hall, #6 Martin Church Building, #7 Jericho Elevator, #8 Farmers State Bank Hospital Room, #9 Skillet-Glenwood-Whiteface, the Hedley residence from 7 a.m.-7 p.m.

The Democratic Party sample ballot is for Precinct 2. Precinct 1 ballots will not list candidates for county commissioner or for justice of the peace but will list for County Democratic Chairman Precinct 1, Hubert Rhoades. Precinct 3 ballots

will not list candidates for county commissioner and will list M.O. Weatherly as candidate for justice of the peace for Precinct 3 and for Democratic Chairman Precinct 3 J.L. Butler. Precinct 4 will not list justice of the peace candidates, will list for County Commissioner, Precinct 4, Jess Finley, William Chamberlain and Glen Adkins. Also listed will be for Democratic Chairman Precinct 4, Fred E. Chamberlain Jr.

There have been absentee votes cast in the Democratic Primary in Donley County this year. Remember to cast your vote on Saturday, May 6.

## GOP County Chairman urges vote on tax limitation proposition

Donley County GOP Chairman, James F. Hayes, said today that the average Texan is "fed up to his ears" in high taxes and that he, as an individual voter, can most effectively register his displeasure with the present system by voting for a Tax Limitation proposition which will appear only on the May 6th Republican Primary ballot.

"It is getting to the point where taxes are eating up the very substance of the incomes we are supposed to live on. The time has come to put our foot down and draw the line."

Mr. Hayes urged all Donley County residents to vote in the Republican Primary on May 6th so that they could cast their ballots on Proposition 3 which calls for a State Constitutional Amendment that would place a limit on the amount of tax which state and local governments could collect.

A similar proposition was recently approved by voters in Tennessee and one in

California is stirring much interest for the elections here in June.

The proposition on the May 6th Republican primary ballot (it is not on the Democrat ballot) calls for a "yes" or "no" vote:

"Do you favor the proposition that the next session of the Texas legislature should propose a Constitutional Amendment limiting taxes of state and local governments?"

The tax issue is one which Republicans across the state are bound to be using to their advantage in many campaigns in 1978.

## 4-H'ers will compete at State Roundup

The 4-H Club Range Evaluation and Range and Pasture Grass Identification contests for Districts 1, 2 and 3, will be held May 4-7 at Guthrie, according to Ronald Gooch, County Extension Agent.

Registration for the day-long event will start at 9 a.m. at the Guthrie Community Center. The Range and Pasture Grass Identification Contest will be held at the Community Center and the Range Evaluation Contest will take place on the 6666 Ranch near Guthrie.

Awards, sponsored by local people, and ribbons will be presented to all winning teams and individuals.

Donley County will enter a senior team in the Range and Pasture Grass Identification contest, Gooch said. Team members are Terry Cole, Jack Craft, Drew Thornberry, and Lance Thornberry.

Range and Pasture Grass Identification Contest participants will have to identify 30 grass plants and check several characteristics of the plants. The grasses will come from a master list of 70 grasses. Ability to identify range plants is a key to good

range management, Gooch said.

The Range Evaluation Contest consists of three parts. The team must identify 20 plants from a list of 119 grasses, forbs, legumes and woody plants. The team must also determine the degree of utilization, range site, range

condition and make grazing and improvement decisions for a specified area. Finally, the team must select four plots on the basis of range condition and evaluation of the four plots on the basis of 10 categories given on a scorecard. Range evaluation contests provide a practical way to learn good range

management, Gooch said. In either contest, a team consists of three or four members. The scores of the top three individuals will be used for a team score. The top two teams from each of the three districts will compete in the state contests at 4-H Roundup at Texas A&M University on June 5-7.

## Report of 4-H Club

The 4-H Clothing project will soon begin and will run through May and June, and will climax on July 17 with the County 4-H Dress Revue. Forty 4-H'ers are currently enrolled in the project. These groups enjoy learning how to sew or shop for the things they wear.

In the clothing project 4-H'ers learn self-confidence and poise, by developing skills in selecting and making clothing which is expressive of their individual personalities; skills necessary to

plan, select and construct clothing for different occasions; ability to select suitable and becoming accessories; and skill in the use of a decision-making process.

At the dress revue on July 17th the 4-H'ers will model the garments they have made in the project. Other activities that have been scheduled is a tour to the Levi Strauss plant, in Amarillo on June 13 and a group visit to the cosmetology school at Clar-

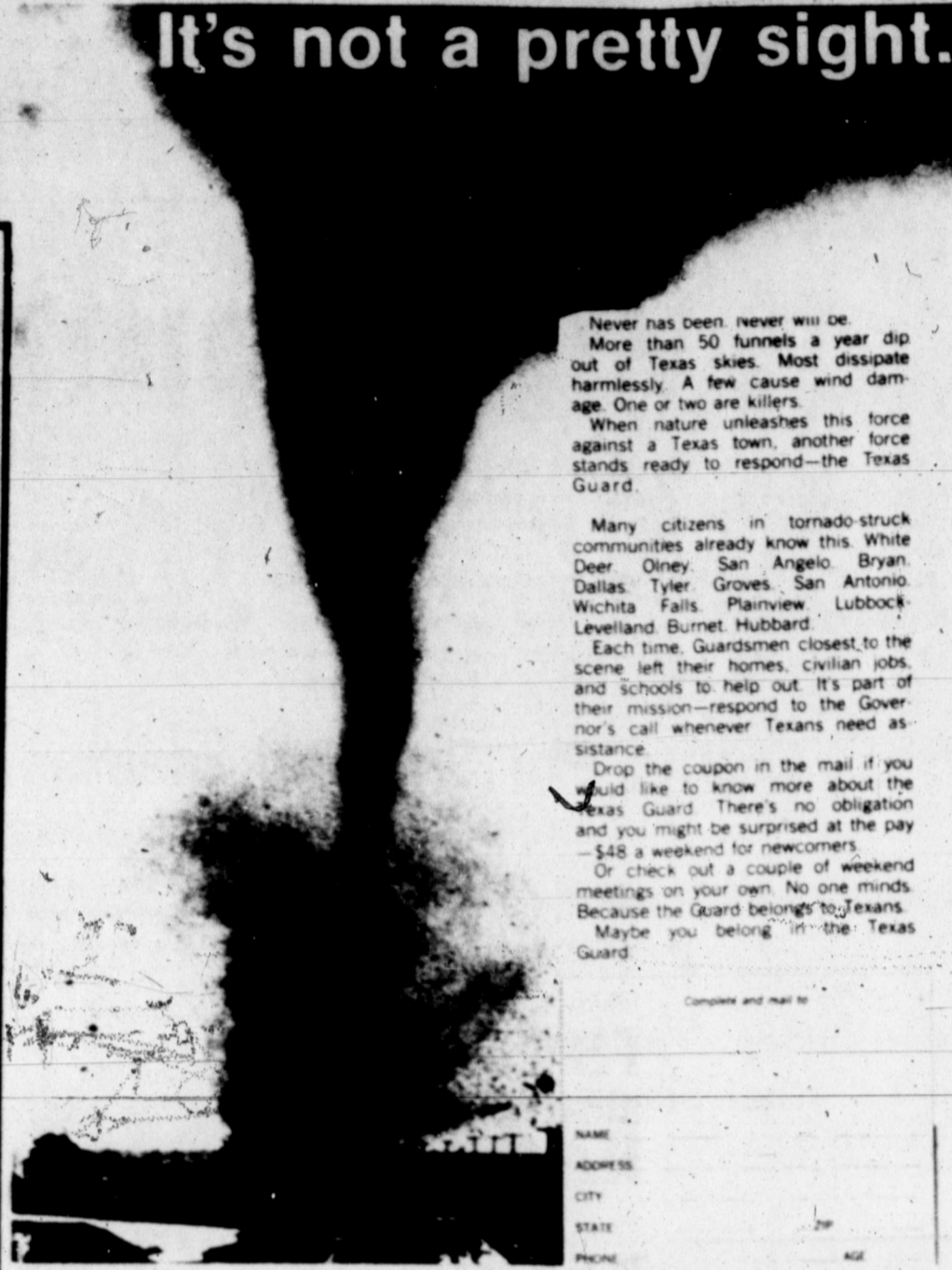

**Department lists weather warning signals**

With spring comes the threat of violent weather conditions again. To help alert people to potential danger from heavy weather, the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department is listing the two signals city residents should be on the alert for during violent weather conditions.

Fire Chief Jerry Gage explained last year's use of the two blast threatening weather signal caused some confusion and led some to believe a tornado had been sighted.

"When you hear two blasts of the siren it means there is threatening weather and that we've been notified of possible damaging storms by the weather bureau. People should keep an eye on the skies and watch their TVs for developing weather information. They might also make some preparations for seeking shelter should the weather worsen," explained Land.

The continuous blast of the fire siren means a tornado has actually been sighted approaching Clarendon. All persons should immediately seek shelter from the approaching funnel cloud.

Gage pointed out that persons without storm cellars or basements may come to the fire-station's basement shelter. During the approaching heavy weather conditions the Sheriff's Department will have units out keeping watch and the Fire Department will likewise have one unit patrolling.

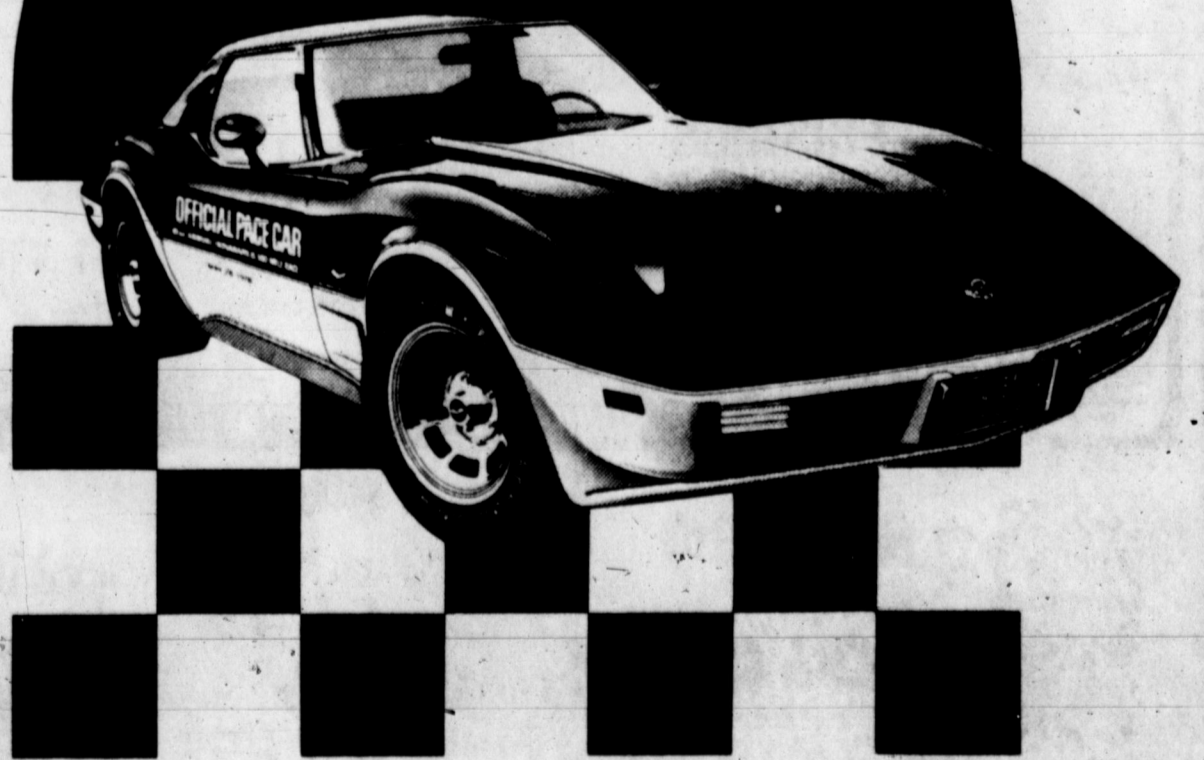

### Facts you should know about Botulism

By themselves, the spores are harmless--eat them often in raw fruits and vegetables. But the toxin formed by these bacteria is a deadly poison. In the absence of oxygen--as in a sealed container--and with low acidity of the food, these spores will germinate and produce gas and their deadly toxin.

Signs of botulism poisoning begin usually with 12 to 36 hours after contaminated food is eaten. The symptoms include double vision, inability to swallow, speech difficulty, and progressive paralysis of the respiratory system. Despite available antitoxins, most people affected with botulism die because they do not get medical treatment fast enough. Early symptoms are too often overlooked or the symptoms aren't identified quickly.

Since 1925 only five deaths--the most recent in 1972--have been attributed to botulism poisoning from commercially canned products. However, during the same time, some 700 deaths were traced to botulism poisoning caused by improper home canning. Undercooking--such as not using a high enough temperature, or not cooking food long enough--or both--is the real culprit in home canning. Commercial canners use large pressure cookers to heat foods and kill any botulism spores that may be present. Unless similar precautions are taken when you're canning at home, the deadly toxins can form if the spores are present.

HERE ARE A FEW TIPS for you to remember: -- Don't buy cans of food that are swollen, leaking, or bent. If you find a swollen can on your shelf, return it to the store and report the incident to your local health authorities. -- Never taste questionable food. One spoonful of food contaminated with botulism toxin can kill you quickly. Many deaths have occurred from just this experimental tasting of a suspected home canned food. -- Immediately destroy any food that has an unusual odor or shows evidence of spoilage (such as off-color). Make sure this discarded food can't be eaten by children, pets, or stray animals. -- Can at home without a pressure cooker only high-acid foods, such as acid fruits and tomatoes. Botulism spores cannot grow in an acid medium. -- Cook all other foods--such as meat, poultry, string beans, and corn in a pressure cooker when canning at home. Also, make sure your pressure cooker is working properly. -- Do not taste or serve home canned meat and vegetable foods before heating them for 10 minutes at 212 degrees F. This simple precaution could almost eliminate botulism deaths in the United States.

### Value of farmlands

Some five million acres of rural land are lost to non-agricultural use each year in the United States. This is a special concern during this year's celebration of Soil Stewardship Week, April 30-May 7, notes Ronald Gooch, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Theme of this year's Soil Stewardship Week, "Compelling Ventures," also stresses the importance of controlling water pollution caused by run-off from unprotected farms, ranches, roadsides and construction sites.

Soil Stewardship Week is a nationwide observance which emphasizes man's responsibility to protect and conserve soil, water and

other natural resources. Traditionally, churches and local citizen's groups participate.

Nearly 3,000 conservation districts throughout the U.S. will focus their attention upon conserving and preserving America's best farmlands during this 21st annual observance of Soil Stewardship Week. The U.S. Department of Agriculture estimates that of the five million acres annually lost to agriculture, nearly one million are classed as "prime" land--the best and most productive land we have. These top-quality farmlands should be preserved for farming rather than their indiscriminate use for housing developments, highways, shopping centers and the like.

There has been a lot of talk about parity lately, but few people really understand the term. Parity is simply a measure of farmer buying power. Here is an example of parity that demonstrates what has happened to farmer's buying power in the last few years.

In 1973 a popular size and brand of diesel tractor was selling for \$14,189.00 and that same year cotton was selling for 65¢ per pound. It took 43 bales of cotton to buy the tractor. Today the same tractor costs \$27,487.00 - and the same grade and staple of cotton is selling for 45¢ per pound. To buy the same tractor today it takes 122 bales of cotton. Simple mathematics tells us it takes 79 MORE bales of cotton to buy the tractor today -- than it did as recently as 1973.

An average cup of coffee contains about 100 to 150 milligrams of caffeine, reports Mary K. Sweeten, foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Caffeine—a chemical found in the leaves and beans of the coffee tree—acts as a cerebrospinal, circulatory and renal stimulant, she explains.

Friday and Saturday the regional qualifiers from the Broncho track team competed in the regional meet at Odessa. Field event finals and running preliminaries were held Friday at the Odessa Junior College track.

In the field events the Broncho didn't fair too well as Dean Hawkins didn't place in the pole vault. Keith Floyd finished in a tie for fifth place. Both of these boys had set new school records this year. Dean had

set a new pole vault record of 11 feet eclipsing the old record of 10 feet 3 inches. Keith set a new high jump record of 6 foot 5 inches at the Memphis meet.

In the running preliminaries the afternoon started off badly when the 440 relay failed to qualify even though they did run the best time of the year - a 44.25. They were unlucky because they got in the fastest qualifying heat.

Irven Thomas qualified in the 120 yard hurdles while John Hall qualified in both the 100 yard dash and 220 yard dash. Dan Brandes turned in the best qualifying time in 330 intermediate hurdles with a 40.4 clocking.

William Thompson lowered the school record as he qualified in the mile run with a time of 4:49.4.

Saturday the qualifiers returned for the finals. Irven Thomas was the first to run. He did an excellent job in the 120 yard high hurdles placing fourth and at the same time lowering his school record time to 15.1. John Hall finished in seventh place in the 100 yard dash and third in the 220 yard dash.

Dan Brandes had the toughest luck of the day when he had to run the 330 intermediate hurdles twice because of a protested race. The first time he was nudged

out at the finish line for second place. In the second run he placed fourth.

William Thompson completed the day with a sixth place finish in the mile run.

### Brucellosis vaccination

Texas cattlemen may now have their heifer calves vaccinated with Strain-19 brucellosis vaccine free of charge, points out Ronald Gooch, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The vaccination program is voluntary and will be conducted through participating, accredited veterinarians. These veterinarians will be able to obtain the brucellosis vaccine free and will be reimbursed for their services from state and federal funds on completing a vaccination chart.

Only eligible female calves will be vaccinated and will be identified by an ear tag and tattoo. Female calves of dairy breeds from two through six months of age and beef breeds two through ten months are considered eligible.

According to Gooch, all the cattlemen has to do is call his local veterinarian and schedule a time for the vaccinations. Of course, the calves should be confined. This new vaccination program does not include vaccinating calves at livestock markets.

To reimburse participating veterinarians, some \$450,000 of state and federal monies has been made available for this vaccination program for fiscal year 1978.

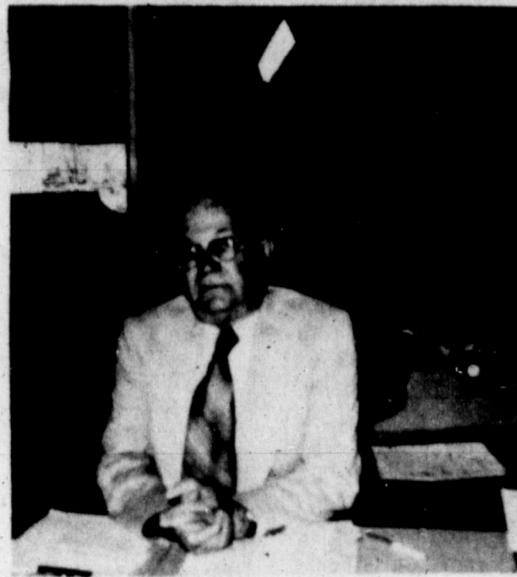

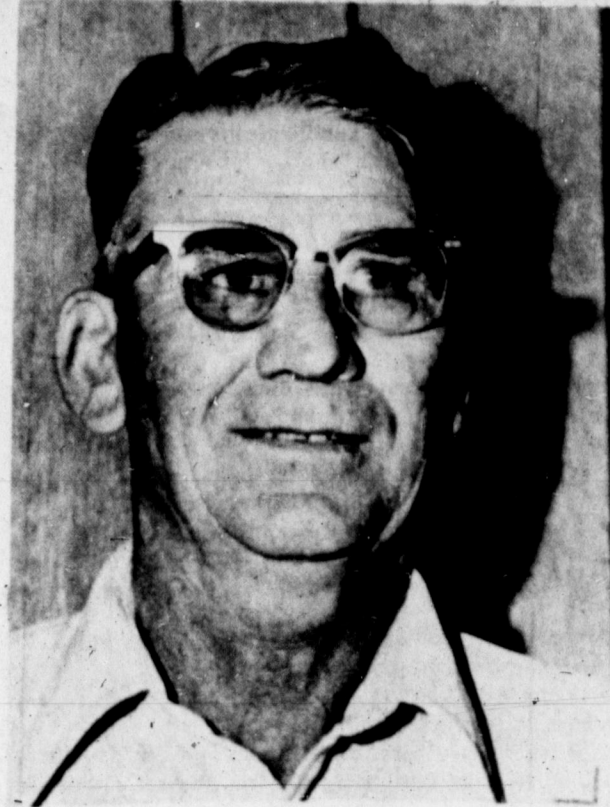

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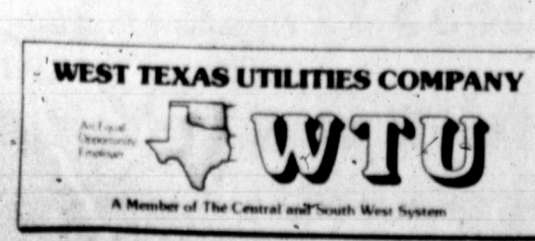

## Guide for job seekers

Young job-seekers trying to get a handle on employment will want to consult the first edition of "Occupations in Demand at Job Service Offices" published by the U.S. Department of Labor.

The edition lists 87 occupations frequently in demand by employers that require some college or high school preparation.

The edition lists 13 occupations with greater than average gains in the number of openings registered by employers with the National Job Bank System during 1977.

The edition also indicates job training requirements. Examples of jobs that require high school training but in many cases, little or no experience, are manager-trainee, general office clerk and typist. Those requiring only high school preparation but some experience are exemplified by administrative secretary, mechanical drafter, service establishment manager, and tool and die maker. Examples of jobs requiring college, but in many cases, little or no experience, include nurse (R.N.), practical nurse (L.P.N.), and recreation leader.
