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

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

May 29 Memorial Day

Memorial Day, or Decora-tion Day as it was called properly for many years, dates from 1868. Civil War

dates from 1868. Civil War soldiers' graves were decorated with flowers before that time, more specifically in the southern states.

As early as 1863 a group of Columbus, Miss. women decorated graves of Union and Confederate dead. In April 1865 in Vicksburg and Winchester, Va. women went to cemeteries and decorated graves of soldier dead with flowers.

In 1865 Adjutant General Chipman, of an organization of Union veterans suggested to his superior that arrangements be made to decorate Union graves on a uniform date throughout the country.

Uniongraves on a uniform date throughout the country. General Logan issued a general order to all Grand Army posts stating "The thirtieth of May, 1868, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village and hamlet churchyard in the

land."
Still not a legal holiday,
New York veterans were
successful in getting a
legislative act passed in 1873
for "Decoration Day" to be a
public holiday. Rhode Island
followed suit in 1874 and
Vermont in 1876. By 1801 it
had become a legal holiday in
all northern states and
territories.

Decorating resting places of the dead is a custom of great antiquity and was used by the ancient Greeks and Romans. The custom in the United States has gradually come to include the dead of all wars and all dead and loved ones gone from this

Liquid protein diets have resulted in 40 deaths in the United States, according to the Food and Drug Administration (FDA). These diets are dangerous to the millions of weight-conscious people who have gone on them, especially without adequate medical supervision.

Liquid diets are even more dangerous for infants, whild

Liquid diets are even more dangerous for infants, child-ren, pregnant or nursing women, people taking medications and people with kidney, liver or heart diseases. These people especially should not take liquid protein products.

Liquid protein not diet food
Labels on liquid protein
products themselves show that these are really intended that these are really intended to be used as protein supplements—not as diet food. None of the liquid protein products contain all of the nutrients necessary for good health. Therefore, it is not recommended that peanot recommended that peonot recommended that peo-ple take them alone-even though some people claim these products supply enough nutrients to maintain the lean body mass. Most of the liquid proteins sold under a variety of trade names are made, from predigested made from predigested protein (collagen or gelatin) obtained from animal hides, tendons and bones.

Weight-loss claims not on labels

Although labeling of the liquid protein products themselves falls under the responsibility of FDA, the label directions do not mention using them for weight loss. People have heard about the weight-loss claims from books, word of mouth or the media. These claims cannot be controlled by the FDA. In addition, the FDA cannot seize or recall the product unless it has been adulterated. Although labeling of the been adulterated.

Currently, FDA is involved in research about the liquid in research about the inquient protein. It has proposed that manufacturers voluntarily put a warning on labels, saying the product may cause serious illness or death--and that it is not intended for weight reduction or maintenance

Quick-weight loss hazardous

Any quick weight-loss plan and chemical dieting aids are just as hazardous to a person's health as being overweight. There is really no safe and effective way to lose weight other than by a well-balanced diet of lower

caloried foods.

Losing weight--and keeping it off--requires self-discipline, persistence and patience. Also it takes a permanent change in eating habits.

To put one's body through the extraordinary stress of the liquid protein diet is indeed the ultimate ab-
