County had crop saving rains

Good rains which began on Friday of last week covered the county with moisture amounts of two and a half to three inches plus in most instances, although some spots in relatively small areas got very little.

Dams, tanks and ponds were being filled and farmers and ranchers prospects for the year are improved.

Most farmers have been putting down weed killer and fertilizer, but some had planted cotton. J. L. Butler, in the Lelia Lake community reported as almost a sure thing that he would have replant cotton land. David lane, reportedly was washed out at Ashtola too.

Brice received more than three inches of rain and although all fields were not

dry enough to check, some early plantings will have to be done over. Range lands have been soaked for the first time this year and with cattle prices up this is encouraging to the rancher.

Moisture came too late to do dry land wheat much good but in this area most acreage in cultivation has been diverted to cotton with few acres affected. There appears to be another fruit crop in the making and with adequate moisture that harvest prospect has improved.

Clarendon received 2.52 inches of rain turning grass and trees green and benefiting gardeners.

No reports of severe weather or damage have been made.



Greenbelt water use increases

Purchases of water from the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority by member cities and other users continued to set records, as has been the case for several months, during April, according to information released by Jimmy Kuhn, general manager.

Total sales during the month were 104,361,000 gallons. Last year the total was 73,162,000.

Childress has remained the biggest user, buying 33,506,000 gallons. "This compares with hot, dry summer months," Kuhn said. Last year Childress purchased 20,553,000 during the same period.

Clarendon was the second largest user and bought 16,853,000 gallons. In the same month last year Clarendon bought 10,642,000.

Quanah was in third spot, purchasing 15,056,000 gallons. During the same period last year gallons bought totaled 11,681,000.

The Red River Authority, which provides water for rural areas, bought 13,452,000 gallons. Last year the purchases totaled 10,874,000.

Crowell's purchases were 11,677,000 compared with 8,885,000.

Bestwall at Acme bought 10,915,000 gallons. Last year the firm bought 8,500,000 gallons.

Hedley's purchases went from 1,972,000 in 1977 to 2,783,000.

Absentee voting now in progress

Absentee voting began May 24 and will continue through May 30, for the second Democratic Primary to be held June 3. Ballots may be cast at the office of the county clerk between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 5 p.m. Persons are asked to bring their yellow registration receipts, if they have them, to simplify the voting.

Voting boxes over the county will be same as the ones in the May 6 Primary with box #1 Howardwick, #2 Old Courthouse, #3 Lelia Lake School building, #4 Old College Building, #5 Hedley City Hall, #6 Martin Church Building, #7 Jericho Elevator, #8 Farmers State Bank Hospitality Room, #9 Skillet-Glenwood-Whiteface, the Hedley residence from 7 a.m. - 7 p.m.

Of local interest are the five run-off races for county positions. For county judge runoff candidates are W. R. Christal incumbent and J. S. Hinds of Hedley; for Tax

Assessor-Collector, Chauncey Hommel and Mrs. Kay McCowan; for Treasurer, Nina A. Dale and Mahdene (Dee) Williams; for justice of the Peace, Ernest W. Kent and J.T. Jake Roberts; and for Precinct 4 Commissioner, William Chamberlain and Jess Finley.

another layer of ten dollar bills, another layer of twenty dollar bills, another layer of fifty dollar bills, another layer of one hundred dollar bills, another layer of five hundred dollar bills - THEN on top of these seventeen layers of money, place another layer of five hundred dollar bills and sixteen more layers of hundred dollar bills - the money on that football field would still not represent the economic loss suffered from traffic accidents in Texas for the year 1977.

Donley County voters in Precinct 1 will be casting their votes in a local option election to determine if the majority are in favor of the legal sale of alcoholic beverages for off premises consumption.

This is in effect the legalizing of the operation of a package store, a store where alcoholic beverages may be purchased. Proponents, those in favor of such a store, point out the increased revenue that would be brought into the city treasury. Those against say nothing good comes from intoxicants.

Presently Precinct 1 is the only "wet" precinct in Donley County with the sale of alcoholic beverages confined to the Howardwick area on Highway 70 north of the Greenbelt Dam. Polls will open at 7 a.m. and be open until 7 p.m. for Precinct 1 residents to make their decision on the issue. Voting places are: Precinct 1, Box #1 Howardwick City Hall. Precinct 1, Box 4 Old College Building; Precinct 1, Box #6 Martin Baptist Church; Precinct 1, Box #8 Jericho Grain Elevator.

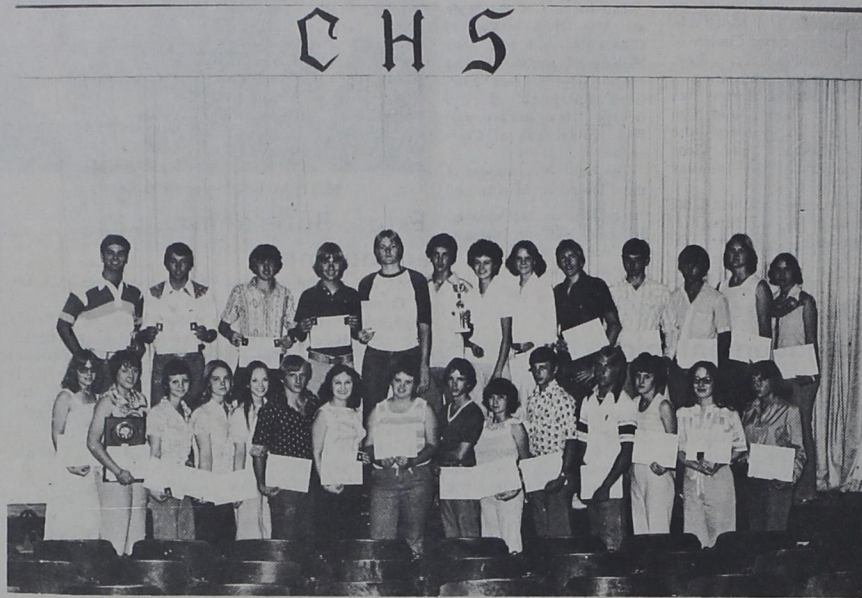

The Roundup will officially open with ceremonies at 5:30 p.m. June 6, notes McArthur. Distinguished service awards will be presented by the Texas 4-H Foundation to five outstanding individuals, organizations and businesses during the opening assembly. The 4-H Foundation is the service organization of 4-H in Texas.

A number of scholarships will also be presented to outstanding 4-H members. These are being provided through the 4-H Foundation by the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, Raymond Dickson Foundation, Texas Farm Bureau and C.J. Davidson.

Competition in the various contests begins bright and early on June 7. At a special luncheon, 28 outstanding

4-H adult leaders will be recognized by the 4-H Foundation.

A "Panorama of Contests" that afternoon will feature tip entries in the various contest areas.

Roundup activities will officially conclude with a recognition assembly at 8 p.m. to honor top award winners in all contests and donors of contest awards.

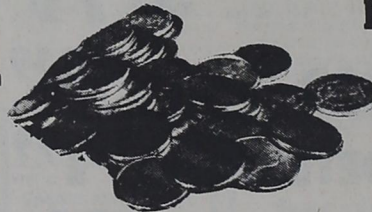
Pete Bromley Salvation Army camp chairman

May 29 Memorial Day

Memorial Day, or Decoration Day as it was called properly for many years, dates from 1868. Civil War soldiers' graves were decorated with flowers before that time, more specifically in the southern states.

As early as 1863 a group of Columbus, Miss. women decorated graves of Union and Confederate dead. In April 1865 in Vicksburg and Winchester, Va. women went to cemeteries and decorated graves of soldier dead with flowers.

In 1865 Adjutant General Chipman, of an organization of Union veterans suggested to his superior that arrangements be made to decorate Union graves on a uniform date throughout the country. General Logan issued a general order to all Grand Army posts stating "The thirtieth of May, 1868, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village and hamlet churchyard in the land."

Still not a legal holiday, New York veterans were successful in getting a legislative act passed in 1873 for "Decoration Day" to be a public holiday. Rhode Island followed suit in 1874 and Vermont in 1876. By 1891 it had become a legal holiday in all northern states and territories.

Decorating resting places of the dead is a custom of great antiquity and was used by the ancient Greeks and Romans. The custom in the United States has gradually come to include the dead of all wars and all dead and loved ones gone from this earth.

Southern states vary on

the exact day conform with the Monday nearest the 30th of May. Today Memorial Day is a legal holiday in most of the states of the union.

Protein diets

dangerous

Liquid protein diets have resulted in 40 deaths in the United States, according to the Food and Drug Administration (FDA). These diets are dangerous to the millions of weight-conscious people who have gone on them, especially without adequate medical supervision.

Liquid diets are even more dangerous for infants, children, pregnant or nursing women, people taking medications and people with kidney, liver or heart diseases. These people especially should not take liquid protein products.

Liquid protein not diet food

Labels on liquid protein products themselves show that these are really intended to be used as protein supplements--not as diet food. None of the liquid protein products contain all of the nutrients necessary for good health. Therefore, it is not recommended that people take them alone--even though some people claim these products supply enough nutrients to maintain the lean body mass. Most of the liquid proteins sold under a variety of trade names are made from predigested protein (collagen or gelatin) obtained from animal hides, tendons and bones.

Weight-loss claims not on labels

Although labeling of the liquid protein products themselves falls under the responsibility of FDA, the label directions do not mention using them for weight loss. People have heard about the weight-loss claims from books, word of mouth or the media. These claims cannot be controlled by the FDA. In addition, the FDA cannot seize or recall the product unless it has been adulterated.

Currently, FDA is involved in research about the liquid protein. It has proposed that manufacturers voluntarily put a warning on labels, saying the product may cause serious illness or death--and that it is not intended for weight reduction or maintenance.

Quick-weight loss hazardous

Any quick weight-loss plan and chemical dieting aids are just as hazardous to a person's health as being overweight. There is really no safe and effective way to lose weight other than by a well-balanced diet of lower caloric foods.

Losing weight--and keeping it off--requires self-discipline, persistence and patience. Also it takes a permanent change in eating habits.

To put one's body through the extraordinary stress of the liquid protein diet is indeed the ultimate absurdity.

Ticks out in large numbers

Tick numbers are high this spring, causing in convenience and health hazards, notes an entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Two of the most common ticks in home landscapes are the brown dog tick and the American dog tick. Several sprays or dusts are effective against ticks--diazinon or ronnel in the home and diazinon or carbaryl (Sevin) on the outside. Heavy infestations in the home may require treatment by professionals. Cutting grass and weeds and clearing debris from the landscape reduces tick numbers.
