## Local option results

In an effort to legalize the off premises sale of alcoholic beverages in a second location in Donley County, residents of Precinct #1 went to the polls Tuesday, June 6, and decided against the proposition to make the sale of such beverages legal. Results of the election were: Box 1, Howardwick

City Hall 29 for and 56 against; Box #4, Old College Building 89 for and 167 against; Box #6, Martin Baptist Church, 20 for and 34 against; Box #8, Jericho Grain Elevator, 9 for and 11 against.

Total votes were 147 for and 268 against.

## Severe weather signals listed

To help alert people to potential danger from heavy weather, the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department is listing the two signals city residents should be on the alert for during violent weather conditions.

Fire Chief Jerry Gage explained last year's use of the two blast threatening weather signal caused some confusion and

led some to believe a tornado had been sighted.

"When you hear two blasts of the siren it means there is threatening weather and that we've been notified of possible damaging storms by the weather bureau. People should keep an eye on the skies and watch their TVs for developing

weather information. They might also make some preparations for seeking shelter should the weather worsen," explained Land.

The continuous blast of the fire siren means a tornado has actually been sighted approaching Clarendon. All persons should immediately seek shelter from the approaching funnel cloud.

Gage pointed out that persons without storm cellars or basements may come to the fire station's basement shelter. During the approaching heavy weather conditions the Sheriff's Department will have units out keeping watch and the Fire Department will likewise have one unit patrolling.

## From Cynthia Manning

It's attractive. Perhaps it's  
brightly colored. Or maybe it  
looks like food. It's within  
reach. And it's poison:

An 18-month-old boy  
died after drinking floor  
cleaner containing petro-  
leum distillates. An 8-year-  
old grabbed a bottle of  
liniment that he thought  
was cough syrup and drank  
it down. A 1-year-old girl  
spent nine days in the  
hospital after swallowing  
charcoal lighter fluid from a  
can left in the yard after a  
family picnic.

Every year thousands of  
children are poisoned by  
hazardous household sub-  
stances. Medicines, furni-  
ture polishes, lighter fluid,  
turpentine. They're only a  
few of the numerous  
potentially dangerous pro-  
ducts commonly found in the  
home.

Yet most household poi-  
sonings can be avoided--  
if adults take proper  
precautions with hazardous

products. Do you? If you're  
not sure, the U.S. Consumer  
Product Safety Commission  
has a few suggestions to help  
you poison-proof your home:  
--No matter how attractive a  
hazardous product may be,  
children usually can't be  
poisoned by something they  
can't get their hands on.  
Therefore, one key to poison  
prevention in the home is  
keeping all medicines and  
other hazardous products  
locked up when not in use.  
--Don't depend on close  
supervision. It's impossible  
to watch a child every minute  
and children can move very  
quickly.

--Always read the warning  
labels on hazardous pro-  
ducts. These labels will tell  
you the seriousness of the  
danger and list all hazardous  
ingredients. If your child is  
accidentally poisoned, the  
first thing a doctor needs to  
know is the identity of the  
poison. The label will also  
tell you what immediate first  
aid you can give.

--Keep all hazardous pro-  
ducts in their original  
containers. Never store them  
in cups, soda bottles, or  
other containers that would  
normally contain food or  
drink.

--Avoid taking medicines in a  
child's presence. Children  
imitate adults, particularly  
their parents.

--Call any medicine by its  
proper name. Never suggest  
that medicine is "candy".

--When giving medicines to  
children, give them only the  
proper dosage. Don't think  
that because a little medicine  
gives relief, more would do  
an even better job.

--Promptly dispose of pre-  
scription drugs by flushing  
them down the toilet once the  
illness for which they were  
prescribed is over.

--Do not store any other  
hazardous products with  
medicines that are to be  
taken internally. There are  
many look-alike containers  
on the market.

You or your child could make  
a tragic mistake.

--Be careful when using a  
hazardous product. Always  
keep it out of children's  
reach. If you are interrupted  
while using the product, take  
it with you.


A wide variety of drugs and  
hazardous household  
products are now required to  
be packaged in containers  
with safety closures that are  
very difficult for most  
children to open. Other  
hazardous products will soon  
be added to the list.  
Child-resistant packaging  
has the potential to reduce  
dramatically the number of  
youngsters poisoned, but  
only if it is purchased and  
then properly used. Be sure  
to:

--Keep the product in its  
safety packaging.

--Close the container pro-  
perly after use, resealing  
the safety feature.

--Remember that poison  
prevention packaging is only  
an additional safe-guard.  
Safety closures can help but  
they can't do the whole job of  
protecting your children.  
Most children cannot open  
poison-prevention packages,  
but some can.

### School Facts

Q: I have just heard about a thing called a "homestead exemption" from school taxes. Does this mean I might not have to pay school tax on my home if I take this exemption?—M.B.

A: It is not very likely. Under this law, you are allowed to be exempt from \$3000 of the assessed value of your home. If your homestead is assessed at \$15,000, you would be able to compute your taxes at \$12,000. In order to be tax-free due to this exemption, you would have to have a home assessed at \$3,000 or less.

**United States Air Force scholarships available**

Selected applicants are commissioned as a second lieutenant in the Air Force Reserve and remain in student status until graduation. However, a 45-day active duty will be required each year during participation in the HPSF, officials said. During this period, students will receive full pay and allowances as a second lieutenant on active duty in the Air Force.

Receiving the most pledges for her ride was Tamra Phillips, with a total of \$251. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Donny Phillips.



## Good Nutrition

### Is Heart Disease Inherited?

Perhaps you have heard that heart disease is "in the genes." We all know of families where several members have died at an untimely age with heart failure the cause of death. Does this mean the tendency to heart disease is inherited?

Individuals differ in such obvious characteristics as color of hair and eyes, shape of ears and breadth of shoulders. They differ, too, in body chemistry. Some have inherited a system that handles cholesterol and other fatty materials so well that they get few cholesterol deposits in their blood vessels in spite of less than ideal diets. Other people are not so fortunate and have an inherited tendency to high blood cholesterol levels. They are more susceptible to heart attacks.

For most people there are predictable reactions to changes in diet. For example, their blood cholesterol level rises while they are gaining weight (getting too many calories) or eating a diet high in saturated fat and cholesterol. If they exercise more (use up more calories) and eat a less rich diet, their blood cholesterol level drops.

So let's take another look at this question of inheritance of heart disease. Has the family really inherited a special body chemistry? Or did the members acquire a set of habits likely to lead to heart disease?

Fortunately, genetic inher-

itance of a tendency to high blood cholesterol levels is not common; perhaps 0.7% of Americans have this problem. But everyone learns a set of habits at home. People frequently copy their parents in such health-threatening habits as smoking excessively, over-use of alcohol, too little exercise and a frantic tense attitude toward daily affairs.

Do you feel you are a victim of your upbringing? Have you learned to enjoy habits and tastes which are currently being blamed for poor health? If so, you may have it in your power to alter the way you live your life and, possibly, prolong it.

Some easy but meaningful changes in food choices can help cut down on saturated fats in your diet. Avoid fat-rich meats; use lean meats instead, and poultry and fish. Little-Known Facts About Translating The Bible

Please give us a little of the history of Bible translation.

A. Well, right now, there is more translating of the Scriptures than at any time in the past 2,000 years.

When the Bible Society movement began around 170 years ago, only 72 languages had any part of the Scriptures. Today there are over 1,600 languages, but a great many of these do not have a complete Bible—in fact, only some 260 of them. Somewhat over 400 languages also have a New Testament, but the majority have only a Gospel or two.

But there are at least 1,000 more languages that have nothing of the Word of God, and in which the Good News about Jesus Christ should be published, even though they represent less than 3 percent of the world's population.

So you see, we have our work cut out for us. Not only do we have to complete translations of the Bible for a lot of the world, but translations also have to start from scratch with all those new languages. And what's more we are being called upon to update scores of older translations so that they speak in a meaningful way to today's readers.

Dr. Eugene A. Nida, a distinguished Bible scholar and one of the world's foremost experts in language, has for over 30 years been in charge of Scripture translations at the American Bible Society, 1865 Broadway, New York, N.Y. 10023.






