County Commissioners Court meets

Donley County Commissioners Court met in regular session Monday, June 12, with all members present. Business was transacted as follows:

- A motion was made by Olace Hicks and seconded by Buford Holland to approve the minutes of the last meeting. Motion carried.

- On a motion by Buford Holland seconded by Gene White the court agreed to pay 1/2 of the electric bill for the communications tower.

- Jess Finley made a motion seconded by Buford Holland to pay the bills as presented. Motion carried.

- A motion by Jess Finley seconded by Olace Hicks making an offer of the bus by Panhandle Area Agency available to Senior Citizens at no cost to the county passed.

- On a motion by Buford Holland seconded by Jess Finley it was voted to approve the resolution presented by General Telephone Company for the laying of some underground cable.

- The court on this date canvassed the votes of local option election results which were as follows: 147 for, and 268 against. Cost to the county was \$750.

- Gene White made a motion seconded by Buford Holland to approve and adopt a resolution presented by the Texas Panhandle Community Action Corporation, and to give the county Judge authority to sign it. This is in regard to the CETA program.

- A motion by Jess Finley seconded by Gene White was made to pay 1/2 of the secretary's salary for the month of July, at Gabie Betts Burton City County Memorial Library. On call of question commissioners White and Finley voted for, Holland and Hicks voted against. Judge Christal voted for the motion and it carried.

- A motion was made by Gene White seconded by Buford Holland to do needed improvements in the county agent's office in the amount according to the county School Superintendent's figures. Motion carried.

- On a motion by Jess Finley seconded by Buford Holland it was agreed to approve the bond of Ernest Kent as Justice of the Peace.

- A motion was made by Gene White seconded by Olace Hicks to adopt and approve a resolution regarding increases of the rate of public utilities.

- Motion was made by

Olace Hicks and seconded by Jess Finley to purchase \$200 worth of equipment for Little League baseball. Motion passed.

- Motion was made by

Gene White and seconded by Jess Finley to approve reports for January through May inclusive, as presented by the county clerk, justice of the peace and county agent.

Motion carried.

- On a motion by Buford Holland seconded by Jess

Finley the court voted to recess.

Dr. Quezada not coming to Clarendon after all

Information about medical service to Clarendon is both good and disappointing this week as a result of the decision of Dr. Quezada to locate in a different section of the state.

Good news is the work in progress in organizing a five-county project, with Donley, Swisher, Armstrong, Hall and Briscoe as participants.

The Department of Health and Welfare will fund the project and it will be sponsored by PRPC. The initial grant of \$175,000 has been applied for and the greater part of the impact of that amount will be felt by Clarendon which is planned for the hub of the project.

The organization, Panhandle Rural Health Initiative Corporation is part of the National Health Corps Physicians. The object of the five county participation is to utilize to the fullest extent the facilities available.

Clinical facilities can be enlarged in Clarendon to accommodate several doctors. Graduates from the Texas Tech School of Medicine will be doing some of the staffing. Staff members will serve two to three years and Clarendon will be allotted 2 1/2 doctors.

More comprehensive coverage of this plan will be made at a later date.

Dr. Quezada said his decision was made by two circumstances: first, the location he chose provides enough medical help so he can do less general practice and do more of his specialty.

Secondly, the community has a large Catholic population and church, which Mrs. Quezada likes.

The planned medical services explained are to be non profit in nature.

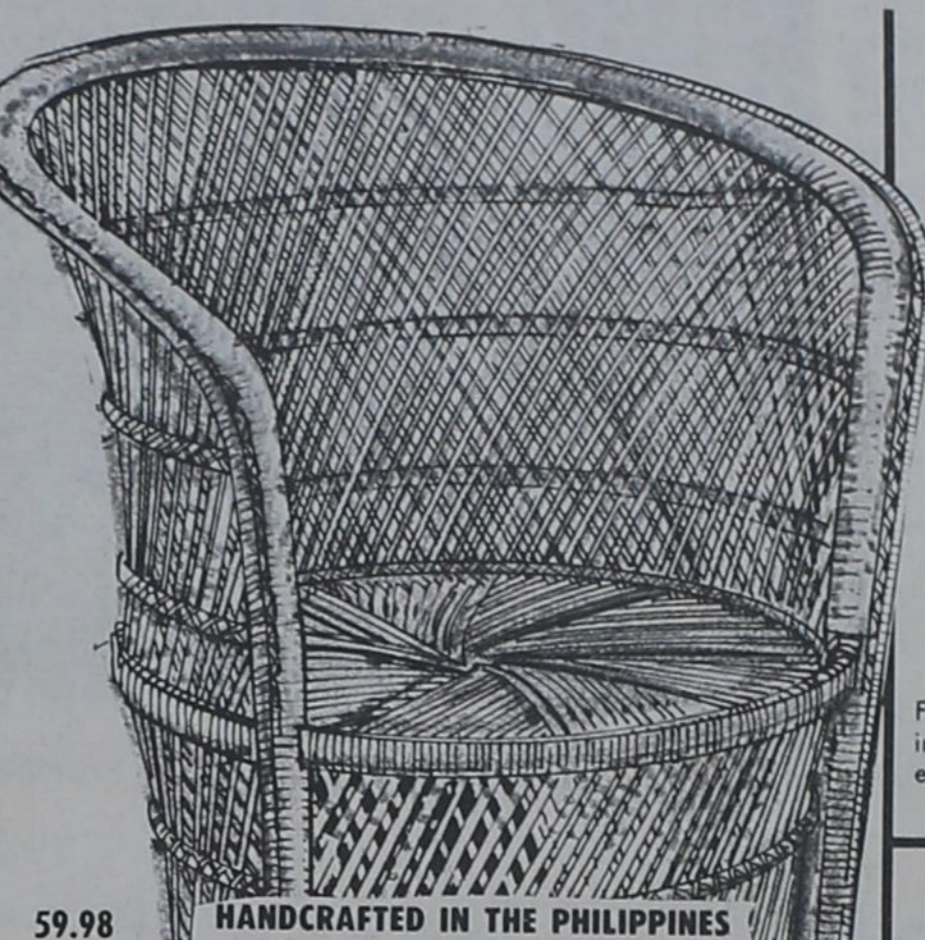

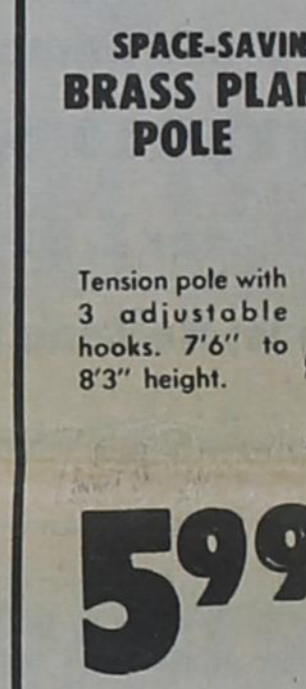

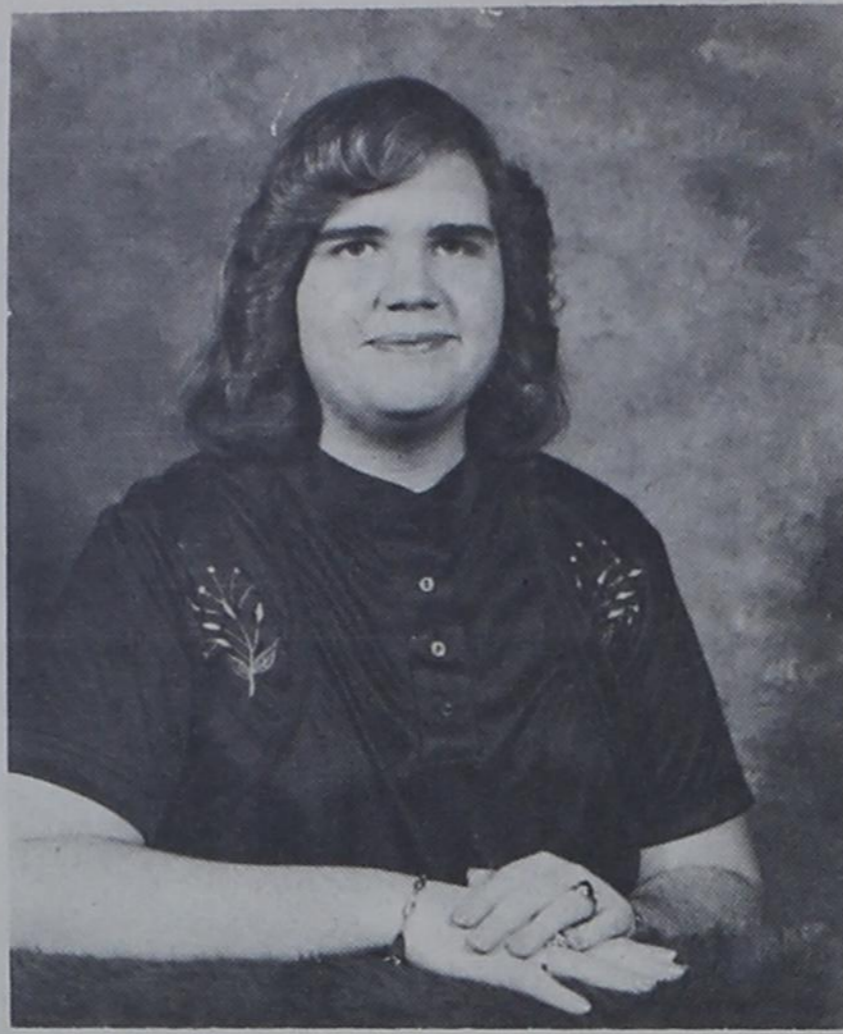

West Texas Utilities Co. news

West Texas Utilities Co. has urged the Public Utility Commission of Texas not to adopt innovative utility rate structures or new electric use management controls until it is proven conclusively that benefits outweigh costs and that the customer will readily accept the changes.

In a statement prepared for hearings which began Monday in Austin, G. Holman King, a WTU vice president, advised against rate concepts "which might be politically attractive in the short run but which would have disastrous effects on the public in the long run."

Specifically, King said WTU opposes widespread application of time-of-day pricing, mechanical load management techniques, and life line rates.

Time-of-day pricing would charge more for electricity consumed during the hours when demands on an electric system's generating capacity is at its peak. By trimming the peak, a utility company could delay capital outlays for new power plants and benefit all customers.

Load management deals with non-pricing methods for changing the level or pattern of demand for electricity. It could involve devices which curtail operation of appliances such as water heaters and air conditioners at certain times.

The so-called lifeline rates are designed theoretically to help the poor by providing a low cost the minimum amount of electricity necessary to maintain a modest quality of life.

King said WTU's position is that electric rates should be based on the cost of service to all customers, but that it should be recognized that costs of providing electricity vary widely among different classes of customers.

"There seems to be a basic misconception," King said, "that because residential customers on the average pay more per kilowatt hour than industrial customers, the large industries are being subsidized by the smaller residential users."

"This viewpoint is of course, completely erroneous and reflects a basic misunderstanding of electric utility economics," he said. Time-of-day pricing has been found practical for some of WTU's large electric customers which have flexibility to change their time of use, King said, but is not considered feasible for most residential and commercial customers.

A major objection, he noted, would be the initial cost of special time-of-day meters. Cost of installation throughout WTU's large, sparsely populated territory would be almost \$25 million, which is equal to the cost of the company's newest power generating plant.

Another obstacle would be customer resistance. Shifting a desired amount of electric load away from the peak demand period would require customers to turn off their air-conditioners during the hottest hours of the summer. Load curves of WTU's 1977 system peak demand show that to accomplish a significant reduction of electric usage, the period defined as "on-peak" and subject to higher rates would have to be extended from early afternoon to almost midnight.

"This would defeat the purpose of air-conditioning and be completely unacceptable to our customers," King said.

He added that WTU's experience with time-controlled water heaters indicates that customers will not accept time clocks or other devices which drastically interfere with their living patterns.

Concerning lifeline rates, the WTU statement recognizes "the severe economic squeeze being felt by the poor and by those on fixed incomes," but rejects lifeline rates as a method of relieving these problems.

"Our study in the City of Abilene in 1976, using U.S. Census Bureau data, block canvassing, real estate evaluation, and other information showed no consistent correlations between financial income and kilowatt hour usage."

King said the Crisis Intervention Program administered by the Texas Dept. of Community Affairs worked reasonably well this past winter in identifying and assisting those with real needs.

"We believe this approach to be far more cost effective and efficient than lifeline or other socially oriented utility rate forms. WTU endorses the idea that the poor need relief from rising utility bills, as well as other inflated living costs, but believes the better solution lies in the use of social agencies qualified to determine an individual's need and to act accordingly."

The hearings have been scheduled for nine days, and were requested by the Texas Legislature. A Commission spokesman said the purpose is to "find rate structures which meet present-day conditions."

After considering the findings, the Commission will issue recommendations to the Legislature late this year.

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City of tress and other greenery

Clarendon has been called a city of trees and the appellation is apt this spring, with heavy foliage resulting from our abundance of rain.

A drive about town brings an amazing variety of decorative shrubbery, flowers and trees to the eye, such as the pecan trees growing next to the city barn on First Street. Last year the crop of nuts attracted numerous squirrels.

A magnolia tree in the front yard of Sadie Wilsons home is blooming and the mimosa trees all over town are particularly beautiful in full bloom this season. One of the showiest ones is growing next to the Conoco Station on West 287.

The most attractive telephone pole in Clarendon has to be the one on West Second Street on the block with the Episcopal Church, which is covered with Virginia Creeper all the way to the top.

Lace Vine has covered fences at the Frank Hommel home and is blooming with abandon. The yard at the D.E. Leathers' home is a study in greens with its cedars, spruce and pines highlighted by the volcanic rock arrangement.

Next door south, roses and daisies in the flowerbed at Allen Estlacks makes a pretty picture against the fence.

The Arizona Spruce in the front of the Stina Cain home has the beauty of symmetry not often seen in our section of the state, particularly in older trees. It must be an especially wind resistant specimen.

One stately Sycamore, at the Lloyd Risley home sold them on the house there when they bought. And most of the women in Clarendon are familiar with the magnificent American Elm at the back door of the Patching Club House.

An interesting tree is on the property belonging to the

Jerry Courtneys. It is Hackberry planted by Sam Lowe years ago and is really three trees twisted and trained to grow together. Two tall Pines stand as sentinels in the yard of the Ross Hills. The huge Elms at the Frank White home shade the yard and part of the street providing a cook looking retreat.

Fifth Street has a parade of Maples along the Estlack, McMurry and Bell walks, with tall Elms luring playful squirrels in their branches at the home of Mrs. W.J. Lewis.

All across the City of Clarendon apricot trees are laden with their bright fruit. Neighborhoods are being invaded by pickers to get the fruit before the wind shakes it off.

Sycamore trees at the Jack Hall residence foil the morning sun and an avenue of Poplars is lined between the B.B. Joiner house, Roses in the front of the Thomas Perkins home are bloom in an assortment of pretty colors.

Cottonwoods grown at an interesting angle with wind and age rustle along the bank of the little creek (mostly dry) that winds through the city park and across Sixth Street and under the bridge on Kearney Street.

At the city park is probably the most used tree in town. It belongs to every resident who has a wish to climb a tree. That is the old Elm tree by the little rock bridge. Its great branches hold big and small alike, foraging squirrels and an endless variety of feathered life.

All this is but a sample of the growing things, to say nothing of lush gardens from one side of town to the other, to be seen on a drive about town.

Clarendon folks have always been proud of their yards and gardens as well they might be.

Awesome and mysterious lights that appear in the sky will be recreated on the planetarium dome of Amarillo's Don Harrington Discovery Center in a spectacular new show, which opened June 3.

The show, called "Skyfire," illustrates and explains the amazing variety of natural lights that can be seen in day and night skies. "Skyfire" will be presented at the Discovery Center daily at 8 p.m. and also at 3 p.m. on Saturdays and Sundays.

Created by the Strassburgh Planetarium at Rochester, N.Y., "Skyfire" explores both common and rare phenomena that occur in the earth's atmosphere and in space. Some of the skyfires shown can be seen with the unaided eye, under the right conditions: rainbows, the northern lights, lighting that travels in a ball, and the sun disappearing in a green flash.

Other scenes are of events within our solar system, such as eclipses, meteor showers, and flares on the sun. And some of the fires in the sky come from deep in space, where stars explode into glowing cluds of gas
