Funeral services for John Earnest Topper, age 47, a resident of Clarendon for the past 11 1/2 years, were held at 3:00 p.m. on Sunday, November 5, 1978 in the Wheeler Church of Christ, Wheeler, Texas with Don Stone, minister of the Clarendon Church of Christ, and Bright Newhouse, Associate Minister, officiating. Interment was in Wheeler Cemetery. Arrangements were under the direction of Robertson Funeral Directors of Clarendon and Wright Funeral Home of Wheeler.

Mr. Topper died at 2:15 a.m. on Friday, November 3, 1978 in St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo after a lengthy illness. He was born January 5, 1931 in Wheeler County, Texas. He married Betty June Robinson on August 2, 1949 in Pampa, Texas. He had served as Deputy Sheriff of Wheeler for 14 years and had served as a Brand Inspector for the Texas and Southwest Cattle Raisers Association for the past 12 years. He had been a resident of Shamrock for 10 years before coming to Clarendon 11 1/2 years ago. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge and the Church of Christ.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. June Topper of Clarendon; his mother and step-father, Mr. and Mrs. George Warren of Wheeler; one daughter, Cindy Topper of Clarendon; three sons, John Mark Topper of Pampa, Brian Keith Topper and Jeffrey Kyle Topper both of Clarendon; three sisters, Mrs. Katie Finsterwald of Mobeetie, Mrs. Mary Ann Maxwell of Phillips, Mrs. Wanda Lou Mitchell of Pampa; three brothers, Bill Topper of Safford, Arizona, Herman Topper of Borger, Paul Topper of Wheeler; and one granddaughter, Jennifer Topper of Pampa.

Ronnie McAnear honored by Texas Agricultural Extension Service

A select group of farmers from the Texas Panhandle were honored here Tuesday, Oct. 31, in observance of Farm Demonstration Month.

Honored on Donley County was Ronnie McAnear.

The program at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center here commemorated the 75th anniversary of the first successful farm demonstration in which a volunteer producer applied new scientific methods to improve local production.

The introduction of this teaching method in 1903 on the Walter C. Porter farm near Terrell, east of Dallas, led to the formation of the nation's Cooperative Extension Service. It has been credited with making America's agriculture the most bountiful in the world and has been adopted by countries around the globe.

Honored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service Tuesday were farmers in each of the 20 counties of Extension District 1. They have been leaders in conducting agricultural demonstrations to introduce new methods to their communities.

Ronnie has cooperated with County Agent Ronald Gooch for the last nine years in conducting demonstrations on his farm. He has conducted farm demonstrations on soil fertility, cotton varieties and weed control. He currently has an irrigated cotton variety demonstration on his farm south of Clarendon.

Each honoree received a plaque. Presenting them were State Reps. Bob Simpson and Danny Hill.

Kenneth Holloway, Moore County Extension agent and director of the Texas County Agents Association, was master of ceremonies. The recipients and guests were welcomed by Gaines Franks, Potter County Extension agent and vice president of the TCAA.

District Extension Agent Paul Gross related the origin of the farm demonstration method and its history in the Texas Panhandle. A documentary film, "I Am Thinking of the Harvest," traced the history of the Porter farm demonstration and the organization of the Extension Service.

Reporting on research and demonstrations conducted in the Panhandle were area Extension specialists Dr. Frank Petr, agronomy; Dr. Ray Sammons, economist-farm management; Dr. Gene Cope, animal health; Dr. John McNeill, beef cattle; Dr. Carl Patrick, entomology; and Dr. Tommy Welch, range management.

Gross and Holloway noted that the farmers being honored were representing the hundreds who had assisted Panhandle agriculture over the years.

"This is a two-way street," responded Carl Jahnel, honoree from Hemphill County. "There hasn't been a demonstration carried on at the Jahnel farm that we haven't gotten more from it than anyone." He also noted that it was an early Extension agent who had encouraged him to go to college.

A car bash will follow the Pep Rally and will be held on the parking lot across the street north from the post office at 8:30. Y.A.C. (Youth Against

Cancer) members will have the names of the Memphis football players written on the car to be bashed, and for 25c anyone may take a sledge hammer and BASH Memphis!

Trade Days are designed to give something extra to the values customers receive during the fall shopping period by having a drawing with a ticket representing each \$1 to \$10 purchase, to be given by the buyer. The buyer in turn signs his name on the ticket (or tickets) and places them in the container provided for their deposit in the store where the purchase was made.

Tickets will be picked up by a member of the Chamber of Commerce and put into a hopper. One name per week will be drawn from the hopper. If the person whose name is drawn is not present the amount of merchandise credit is added to the next weeks amount. The amount of the first weeks credit value will be \$100.00.

After the first drawing on Thursday Nov. 9, the drawings will be held each Saturday at 11 a.m. on the Farmers State Bank parking lot. You must be present to win. The final drawing will be on Thursday, Dec. 21, for the entire amount of the jack pot.

There will be no money exchanged in Trade Days, but merchandise credit will be issued to the winner each week with instructions how to use the credit at any or all stores participating.

Two outstanding 4-H members from Donley County will be honored at the District 1 4-H Gold Star Award Banquet at 6 p.m. on Saturday, November 18, at the INN, 601 Amarillo Boulevard West, Amarillo.

A boy and a girl from each of the 20 counties in District 1 are eligible to receive this highest county award each year. It recognizes outstanding achievement, leadership, and contribution to the county 4-H program. Winners from Donley County are Sherilyn Walker and

Drew Thornberry. The event is sponsored annually by Deaf Smith, North Plains, Rita Blanca and Swisher Electric Cooperatives. Mrs. Becky King, Dallam County Judge will be the banquet speaker. The theme is "The Future Is Ours". Phil Moreman of Donley County, Chairman of the Dis-

trict 1 4-H Council, will be master of ceremonies. The District 1 4-H Gold Star Committee is the district council which will direct the program. Special guests will be parents, adult leaders, Extension service officials, county commissioners and judges, representatives of the cooperatives and other friends of 4-H.

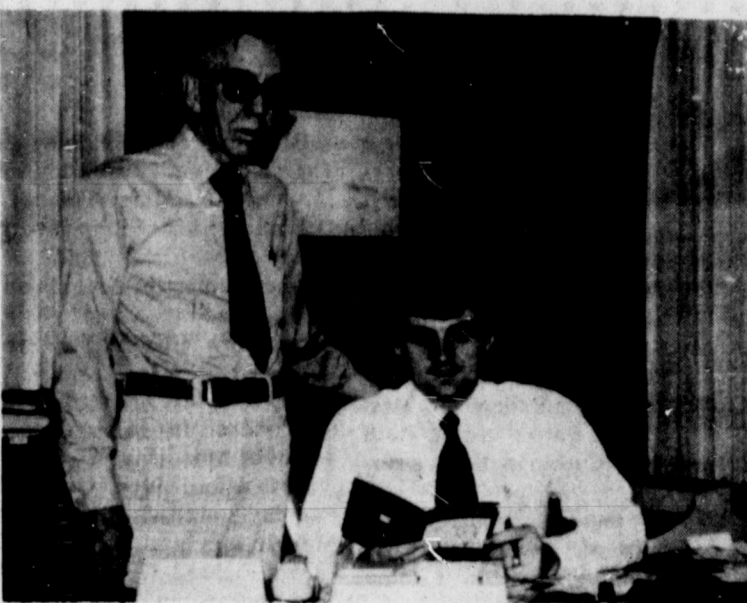

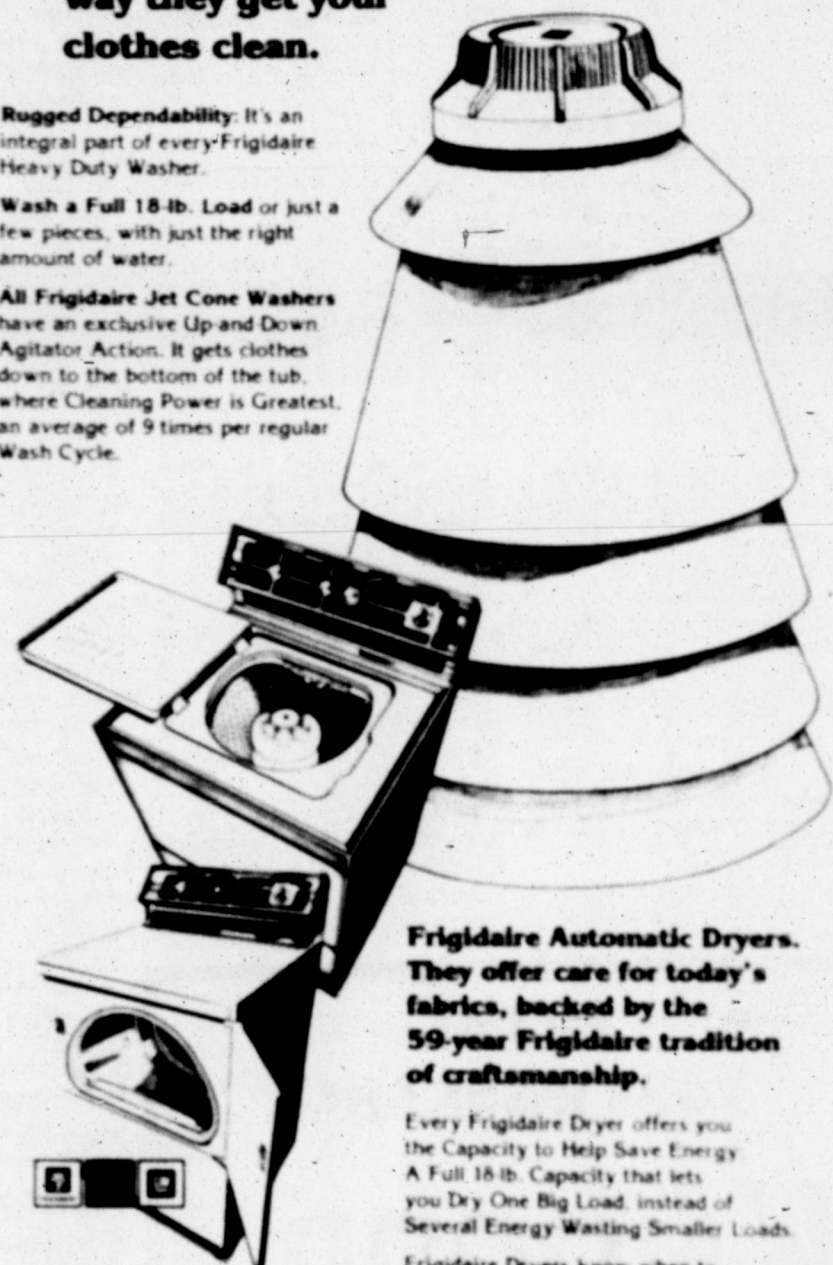

Cosmetology, the art of science and beauty care, is one of the vocational courses at Clarendon College which continues to grow each year under the instruction of Mrs. Dalton (Virginia) James. This fall is the beginning of the fourth year for Mrs. James who was invited to become a part of the Vocational Department of Clarendon College, and accepted the offer.

There is no easy way to become a cosmetologist, this is not a Micky Micky Mouse course. Under the complete control of the Texas Education Agency and maintaining set standards to fully comply with the Texas Cosmetology Commission Rules and Regulations students must meet requirements for a minimum of 1,500 clock hours to be eligible to take the state examination. Some of the required items are to attend class eight hours a day five days a week. No student may practice on the clinic floor until 150 hours of classroom work has been completed.

No student is allowed to become a class member without a physical check up and a TB test, not more than eight weeks old.

Virginia James has been instructing for 11 years. She trained at National Beauty School in Dallas and instructed there; attended classes at Pivot Point International of Chicago, Ill. and was graduated from their advanced hair styling school in Dallas. This training added to her enjoyment of people, interest in working with hair, dedication to the science of all beauty care and pleasing personality, combine to be reflected in the quality of instruction her students receive.

Classroom study is over subjects that vary from "CAREERS in Cosmetology"; "Sanitizing Implements and Equipment"; "Giving Scalp Treatments"; five chapters on coloring hair and "Selecting Hairstyles"; facial treatments, applying makeup and manicuring the nails.

This is the only vocational course which a student may be enrolled each month.

Of vital interest to any beauty operator is the Planning and Operating of a beauty salon, anatomy and physiology in cosmetology, bone structures, muscles and nerves; anatomy and physiology in cosmetology; the vascular system and the endocrine system.

For the individual who is interested in bread and butter trade, the shop as most persons think of the cosmetology business, these areas are the ones dealt with on a day to day basis but many careers are open such as: a state board or Commission of Cosmetology member; public school instructor; salon owner or manager; competition stylist; platform stylist; research technician; field technician; manager-operator; licensed or registered cosmetologist; member of state board of examiners and cosmetology student.

To pass the cosmetology course at Clarendon College students must maintain a grade level of 75, both in the classroom and in clinic work.

In the classroom slides, cassettes and High Fashion Magazine a monthly publication, from Pivot Point International, of Chicago are used. A ratio of 1 1/2 hours of demonstration (including much use of the blackboard) to 2 hours of application is about average. A test is given over each study period, both a written and practical examination, and the student must pass in both areas.

There have been no failures in the Cosmetology Department for the past three years with the students observing the basic study and willingness.

Cooperation really is the name of the game and students act as models for each other. Students are not allowed to practice, even at home on anyone other than immediate members of the family, sisters, mothers, fathers and brothers. Failure to comply with this rule can mean stiff penalties and fines of as much as \$2,500.

During the time a student is in the clinic he or she must keep a time chart for each appointment for each day. This is training in the scheduling of appointments with the proper time allotted to the services. A perm takes more time than a shampoo and blow dry and failure to remember may be pretty rough for the novice.

This is the place where students can sell their training

to a customer. A more suitable hair style for a certain type hair or to compliment the shape of face, a facial for more benefit to a delicate complexion or maybe a scalp treatment.

After these many hours of study and work with skin, hair and nails the student has earned the chance to take a state board examination. The examination consists of a written exam of 100 questions with time limits on all the items, it takes an entire day to complete.

In addition there are more than questions on operator procedures such as shampoo, rolling hair, a manicure, permanent wave and wigs.

There are roughly 10 to 15 graduated students who are working in shops or have their own in the Clarendon-Hedley Memphis and Wellington area and others are at the Salon Rouge, Station 2900, in Amarillo and the Cut and Curl in Hereford.

The area is widely represented with students from Wellington, Memphis, Turkey, Ohio state, Allison, Pampa, Wheeler, Shamrock, Silverton and Quitaque as well as Clarendon.

"Community support is good," stated Mrs. James. "It has grown and the shops cooperate with us. We appreciate their thoughtfulness. It is a good feeling to have community support and many of our Senior Citizens come to us to benefit the school."

Students are available to working on customers after their morning class work is done around 9:30. Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Fridays are busy days and to be sure to get in the customer needs to make an appointment, if possible.

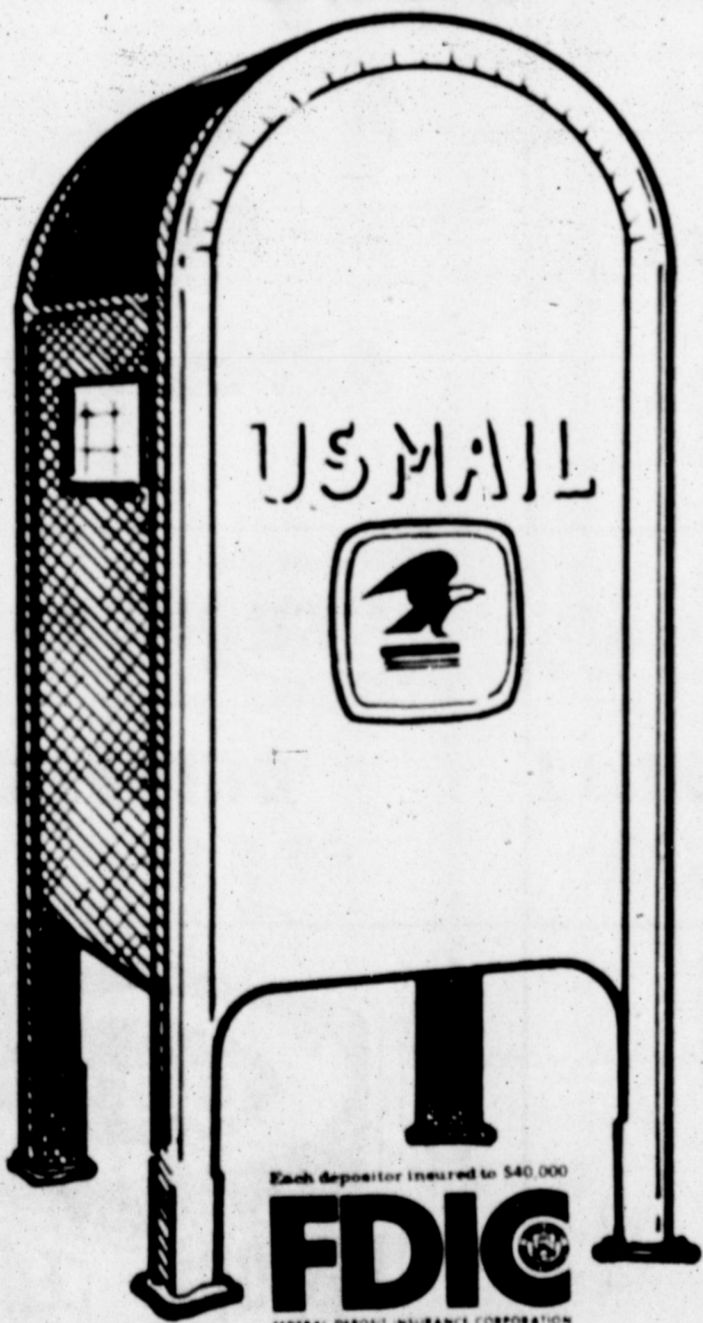

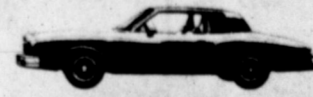

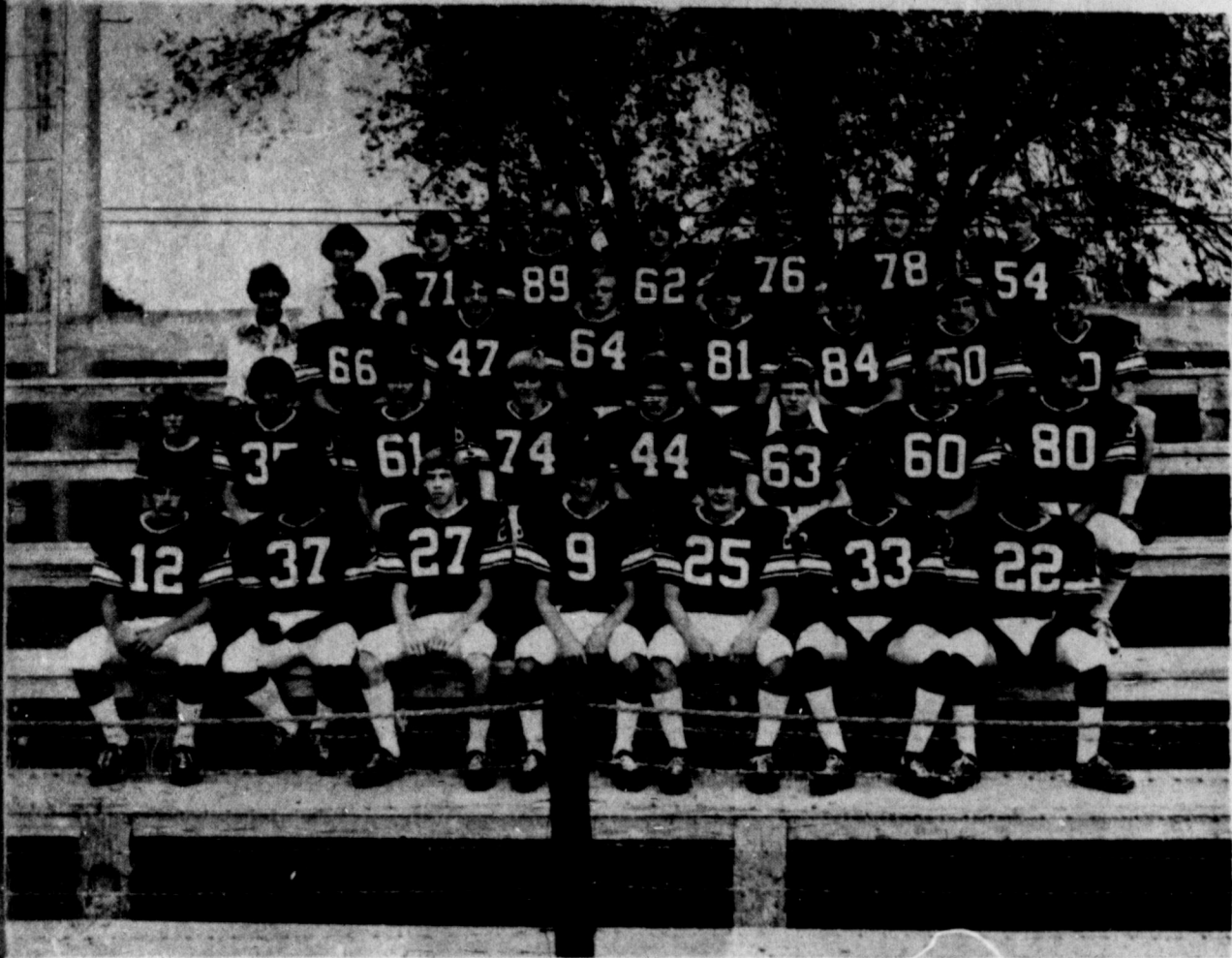

Confederate war dead graves designated for markers

Confederate War dead graves have been designated for markers from the government in the Vicksburg City Cemetery soon, and this announcement comes in time for Veterans Day.

Veterans Administration will provide headstones for all 1,604 graves in the Confederate section of the cemetery. In 1906, Congress authorized the permanent identification in stone of graves of Union dead buried in national cemeteries, then six years later provided markers for Union soldiers in private cemeteries.

The Confederates were not accorded similar treatment until 33 years later. VA expects the first 260 gravestones to arrive in the once-belonged Confederate stronghold in late October.

Plans call for a dedication ceremony - probably next spring - possibly April 24. That's Confederate Memorial Day. Things may not be going so well in some parts of the world but another step is being taken to improve North-South relations, 113 years after their armies stopped firing at each other.

The latest in detente between Union and Confederate is this: more than 1,600 graves of rebel soldiers killed during the Battle of Vicksburg will soon be marked for the first time - with headstones provided by the U.S. government. The graves are in a special three-acre plot in the Vicksburg City Cemetery, land owned and maintained by the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

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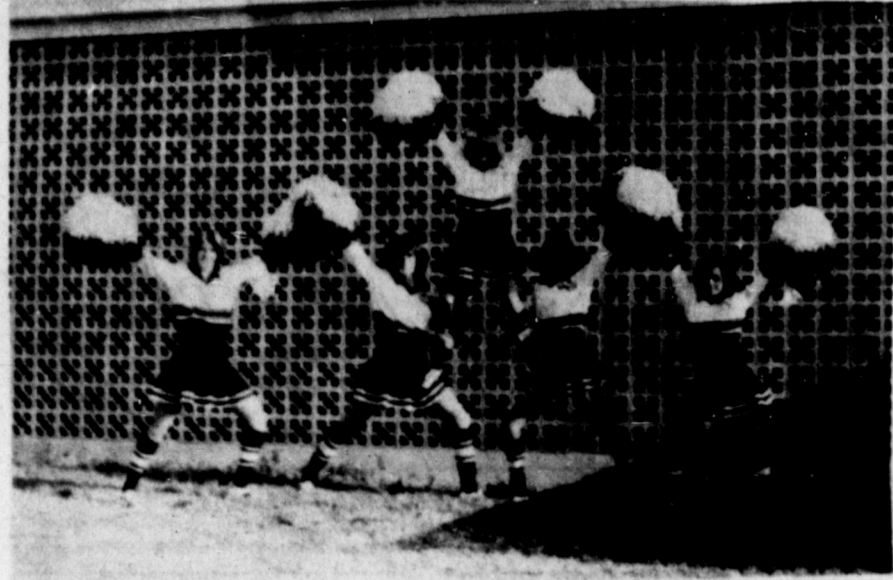

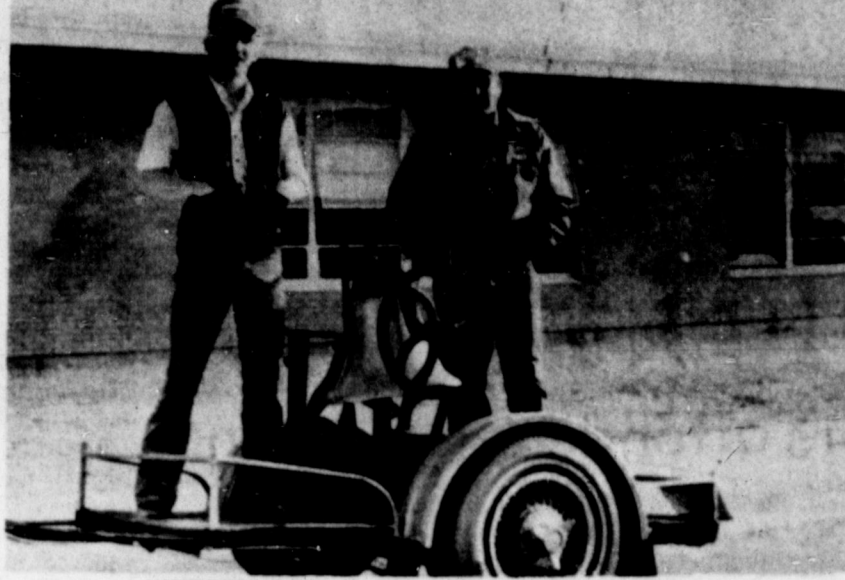

The Wellington Skyrockets slowed down the Clarendon Broncho attack to take a 47-0 victory Friday night in Wellington. The Skyrockets, who were the District 2-A pre-season pick, are still tied with Memphis for first place. Both teams are still undefeated in District play. By no means are the Bronchos completely out of the picture. With victories over Memphis and Panhandle and should Memphis defeat Wellington, the district could end in a three way tie. Those are a lot of "ifs", but strange things happen in the game of football.

The Clarendon Bronchos brought all their spirit and emotion to Wellington Friday and were definitely ready to play. The Skyrockets put 20 points on the scoreboard in the first quarter which if you were there was hard to believe. The Bronchos were victims of two questionable calls - one that resulted in a fumble recovery for the Skyrockets that led to their second touchdown and a 78 yd. touchdown run by Billy Gardner that would have tied the game called back because in the officials judgment a clip had been committed. For the Bronchos, life became miserable from then on. The big, aggressive Skyrockets just lined up and teed off on the Bronchos at the line of scrimmage.

The Bronchos' Billy Gardner kicked off to the Skyrockets and the specialty team did an excellent job in covering it, and the Skyrockets were stopped on the 18 yd. line. The Broncho defense had done their homework and did a fine job in stopping the Skyrocket backs on three downs. The Skyrockets punted and the Bronchos had good field position at their own 37 yd. line. However, on three straight jabs by Billy Gardner, the Bronchos couldn't get their first down. Center Ed Bromley's snap was too high for Lynn Thompson to handle and Wellington recovered on the Broncho 35 yd. line. The Skyrockets moved to the 25, lost yardage on a fine defensive play by Shawn Barker, and threw two incomplete passes (one was caught out of the end zone). Facing 4th down at the Broncho 25, QB Carl Taylor hit #83 Robert Powell in the end zone for the

TD. The Extra point was no good and the Skyrockets had the lead 6-0.

Billy Gardner returned the Skyrocket kick-off to the 17 yd. line. On the first play from scrimmage, Billy made 5, and on the next play took the hand-off from QB Lynn Thompson and broke clear on an exciting 78 yd. touchdown that brought the Broncho fans to their feet screaming with excitement. However, this was to be short lived as the referee had thrown a yellow flag in front of the Broncho bench. In his opinion, Kelly Choate had clipped a would be Skyrocket tackler. So just as quickly as the game was tied - it wasn't. However, the Bronchos bounced right back, as Gary McClellan picked up 25 yds. and a first down. But for the second time a referee's flag and judgement was to spell doom for the Bronchos. Lynn Thompson and Gary McClellan missed connection on a hand-off with Wellington recovering but the Bronchos had already been whistled for illegal procedure. The play should have been dead before the fumble. However, the ball was awarded to the Skyrockets. (The referee later admitted to Coach Allen he made a mistake as Coach Allen had to call a time-out to get an explanation). They took over at the Broncho 30 yd. line. #33 Ricky Jones immediately broke loose and Kelly Choate finally knocked him out of bounds at the 4 yd. line. On the next play, Jones carried it over for the score. The two point conversion was no good and with 2:46 left in the 1st quarter, the Skyrockets were leading 12-0.

Things were not to get better for the Bronchos. After the kick-off the Bronchos started from their own 28 yd. line. On the first play Lynn Thompson's pass slid off his hand directly into #33 Ricky Jones' hands who took it untouched into the end zone. So within 35 seconds the Skyrockets had another touchdown. QB Carl Taylor made the two points and padded the lead 20-0. So a near tie score earlier by the Bronchos had suddenly turned into a 20 point deficit. The Broncho offense again couldn't penetrate the tough skyrocket defense and had to

punt after three plays. The Rockets began to move the ball once again, but Kelly Choate knocked down a 4th down pass in the end zone. Health Hints for today

BACKACHE — Being human, we all develop a backache at some time in our lives. It can be an acute back strain from injury or a chronic backache. Here are some tips to help you with a back problem.

An acute back strain is almost always caused from improper lifting. Men frequently injure their back in lifting boxes and turning. Too often they're in a hurry and start jerking the box or weight. This can cause the classical catch in the back with some painful muscles. Women, however, do most of their lifting by stooping over, which causes a sore back rather than a catch.

For both of these injuries heat, rest and a hard bed help. The heat is a hot tub bath. The hot water relaxes the muscles better than a heating pad. If you have a recliner chair, it really helps. The slight bend at the knees takes the strain off the back muscles. Gentle massage with a liniment helps if the massage is not painful.

Chronic backaches are a little more common in women than in men, because of higher heeled shoes. All persons with chronic back problems should have an extremely firm bed. Put boards between the mattress and springs if necessary. Stretch out on the floor with the legs flexed, pull one leg up to the chest, then the other, then both together. Do this twenty times every day. It will help strengthen your back muscles.

For those of you with the sore back between the shoulder

blades, the secretaries, businessmen or anyone who works at a desk, take five minutes every hour to stretch, look at the ceiling, roll back your shoulders, and let your mind rest. These simple tricks will help prevent the ache between the shoulders at the end of the day.

To prevent backaches, don't stoop, lean or twist when lifting. Keep your back straight, bend and lift with your knees. Strengthen your back with exercises. There is no medicine or operation that will cure the problem. The best cure is prevention.
