## A new vocational program

A new vocational training program has been started at Guthrie Job Corps Center. The program is Motor Freight Occupations. There are five divisions offered with this program. They are: (1) Tractor, trailer truck driver (2) Truck driver, heavy (3) Truck driver, light (4) Material handler (5) Cleaner, Truck washer

This program is being offered at the request of a consortium of six Oklahoma trucking companies who are anxious to develop a resource for more, and better trained, truck drivers and handlers.

If you are between the ages of 19 and 21 years old you are eligible. The program is 4 to 6 months long and upon satisfactory completion of the program the graduate is guaranteed employment. A graduate can also expect to start at a salary range of above \$10,000.00 a year.

## SBA suggestions to help farmers and ranchers

The U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) today issued suggestions to aid Texas farmers and ranchers who plan to apply for SBA's Physical Disaster Loan Program.

"Agricultural producers who had losses on 1978 crops because of the extreme drought conditions which have plagued much of the state may be eligible for a low-interest loan," said Alicia Chacon, SBA Regional Director. "Loan applications must be completed and returned to SBA before the March 6 deadline."

Copies of tax records and legal documents such as deeds, leases and mortgages must be included in the application. A cash flow projection for the 1979 crop year is also necessary.

If the applicant is a partnership, each partner must submit a personal financial statement and return. In the case of a corporation, a personal financial statement must be submitted for each officer or director and for anyone owning twenty percent or more of the voting stock.

SBA disaster loans cover only the amount of the actual loss in yield as certified by ASCS. A producer may not borrow more than the amount of his losses, and SBA loans cannot duplicate other disaster or deficiency payments.

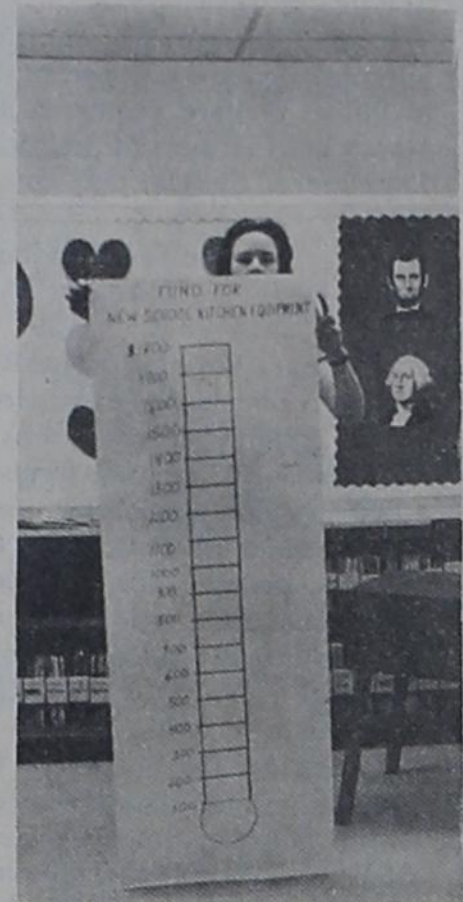

The meeting which will include a nostalgic reception with Lone Star and Pearl Beer, is open to the consenting public and is one of hundreds taking place this week as Texas Exes revive one of the oldest traditions of The University (only commencement is older). At each local gathering, Exes will sign a "Declaration of Dedication" pledging continued support to UT, and declarations from around the world will be presented to President Lorene Rogers during Texas Exes Round-Up, March 30-31, in Austin.

Weekdays the time will be 7 p.m. and on Sunday the times will be 11 a.m. and 6 p.m.

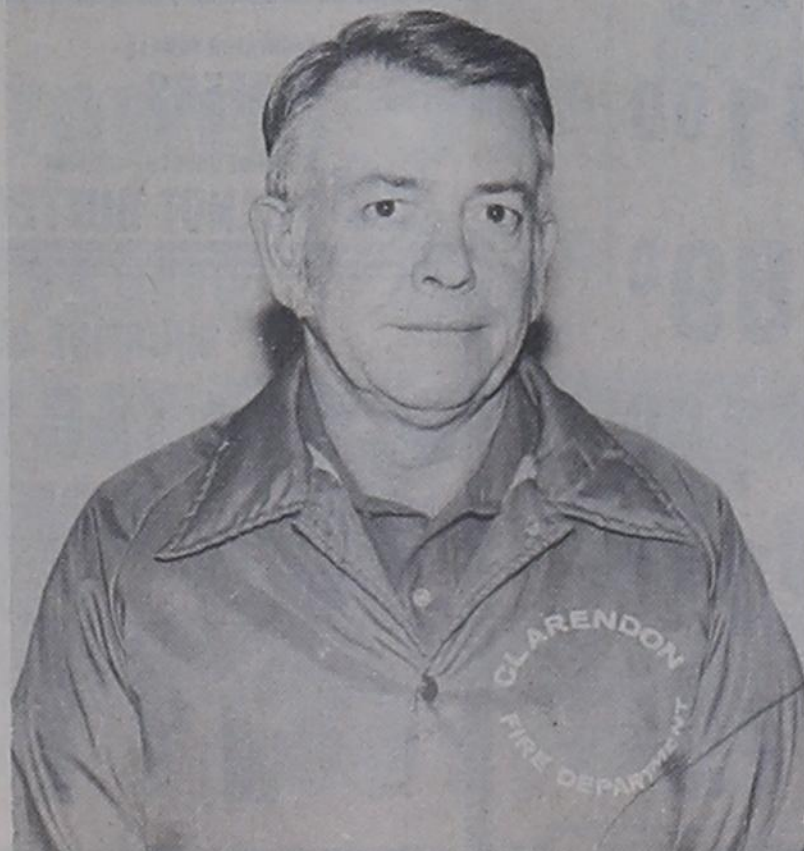

You will find attached a copy of an Attorney General opinion (Opinion WW429). In the middle of page 2, reference is made to Section 39, which is the portion that our agency has used to establish a tenant/landlord relationship in most Texas counties.

You probably know, each county is responsible for the "indigent and the paupers". Historically,

we as an agency, have taken over most of a county's responsibility in this area. In return most counties have reciprocated by providing the Texas Department of Human Resources space for us to work out of while administering programs and helping the counties take care of their "indigents and paupers".

Additionally, we feel like we are making an investment in your county. This investment will benefit all of the citizens of the state or county, not just one or two individuals. My estimate for the interior cost of our office space is \$45,000. Hopefully, we can use this space from now on, but at least for the next eight years. If we stay in our present location and IF the rent is not increased, our cost will be recovered in 7 1/2 years. From that point forward all of the taxpayers will benefit from the investment we will be making in a capital improvement in Donley County.

We as an agency appreciate the reciprocity of the Donley County Commissioners Court. Our relationship has been healthy and has benefitted the Donley County residents. During the first nine months of 1978, some \$375,927 was funneled through our agency to your citizens. Had services not been handled by our agency, the taxpayers of Donley County would have had this expense, or your less fortunate citizens would have suffered.

Please let me know if I can be of further assistance to you.

RE: County Provided Space

The Clarendon Press carried a news item in last weeks paper that had some erroneous information.

The article stated in part that no other counties in this part of the state were providing space to our agency, the Texas Department of Human Resources. This is not true.

In the communities close to Donley County, we are in county provided space as follows: Memphis, Wellington, Canyon, Amarillo and Pampa. In fact, in our 40 county panhandle region, we have offices in 27 counties. Only Donley County and four others are NOT providing the Texas Department of Human Resources space in which we help the counties meet their constitutional responsibilities. Twenty-two counties are reciprocating by providing space.

Opinion No. WW-429

Re: Is the State Department of Public Welfare authorized to make the necessary repairs and renovations to office space allocated to the Department rent-free by a municipality or county and to expend appropriated funds therefor?

Dear Mr. Winters:

Your request for an opinion reads as follows:

"We request your opinion as to whether this Department is authorized to make necessary repairs and renovations to office space allocated to the Department rent-free by a municipality or county and to expend appropriated funds therefor. Such space or building being owned by such municipality or county.

"The Department is of the opinion that it is authorized to make such necessary repairs and renovations pursuant to the authority contained in Subsection (7), Section 4 of Article 695c of Vernon's Texas Civil Sta-

tutes, Items 58 and 87 of the appropriation to the Department contained in House Bill 133, Acts of the 55th Legislature. Pursuant to Article 695c, this Department has entered into various agreements whereby space is allocated to the Department rent-free and the Department makes certain necessary repairs and renovations. Such repairs to include but not limited to painting walls, repairing floors, furnishing removable partitions and fixtures, etc. Whenever it is necessary to use non-expendable items (such as partitions and fixtures) in making the repairs and renovations, such items remain the property of the State and is carried on the inventory of the Department." Subdivisions 5 and 7 of Section 4 of Article 695c, Vernon's Civil Statutes provide in part:

( ) Assist other departments, agencies and institutions of the local State and Federal Governments, when so requested and cooperate with such agencies when expedient, in performing services in conformity with the purposes of this Act;

"(7) Establish and provide such method of local administration as is deemed advisable, and provide such personnel as may be found necessary for carrying out in an economical way the administration of this Act..." Section 39 of Article 695c, Vernon's Civil Statutes, provides:

"Sec. 39. No provision of this Act is intended to release the counties and municipalities in this State from the specific responsibility which is currently borne by those counties and municipalities in support of

public welfare, child welfare, and relief services. Such funds which may hereafter be appropriated by the counties and municipalities for those services may be administered through the county or district offices of the State Department, and if so administered, shall be devoted exclusively to the services in the county or municipality making such appropriation."

Pursuant to the above quoted provisions, it is the duty of the Department of Public Welfare to cooperate with the municipalities and counties of this State in carrying out the program provided for in Title 20A of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925.

Items 58 and 87 of the appropriation to the Department of Public Welfare contained in House Bill 133, Acts of the 55th Legislature, Chapter 385, provide:

"For the Years Ending August 31, 1958 August 31, 1959

"58. Rent, bond premiums, postage, telephone and telegraph, freight, express, drayage, stationery, printed forms, office supplies, equipment, repairs, examining fees, medical services, maintenance and miscellaneous and contingent expenses (includes Merit System.. \$188,895 \$188,895

"87. Provided that in addition to the appropriated state funds for Child Welfare Services, assistance payments and administrative expenses for the biennium, the State Department of Public Welfare is authorized to accept from the Federal Government any funds that may be allocated by said Government to the State Department of Public Welfare for Child Wel-

fare Services, assistance and administration; and said Department can use such Federal Funds allocated for Child Welfare Services, assistance payments and administrative expenses in addition to funds appropriated for those purposes out of State Funds, estimated to be \$93,353,121 \$93,353,121"

In view of the provisions of Article 695c, the State Department of Public Welfare is authorized to enter into agreements with municipalities and counties for the purposes of carrying out the Welfare Program. It is, therefore, our opinion that the Department of Public Welfare is authorized to

make necessary repairs or renovation to office space allocated to the Department by a municipality or county as outlined in the request, and to

expend appropriated moneys for such purposes.

### SUMMARY

The State Department of Public Welfare is authorized to make necessary repairs or renovation to office space allocated to the Department rent-free by a municipality or county, and to expend appropriated funds therefor.

## Help speed up your refund

Taxpayers can help speed up the processing of their Federal income tax return and receive their refund much faster by using the pre-addressed, peel-off label on their return, the Internal Revenue Service said.

The label, which is located on the cover of the tax return package, lists the taxpayer's name, address, and social security number. If any of the information is incorrect, the taxpayer should make needed changes directly on the label.

Married taxpayers filing joint returns should be sure that both social security numbers appear on the label. If only one spouse's number is shown, the other number should be placed on the label, according to the IRS. Taxpayers may also speed the mailing of their refund by sending their return in the coded envelope provided with the tax package and making sure they have attached all required schedules and forms, the IRS said.

## Ancient coins at UT

AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.) - Thought to be the largest collection of ancient Greek, Roman and Byzantine coins in the southern U.S. is the Swenson Coin Collection at The University of Texas.

The almost 3,500 gold, silver and bronze coins span 19 centuries of monetary history, from the beginning of coinage in the Sixth Century B.C. down to Late Byzantine issues of the 13th Century A.D. The strength of the UT collection lies in its 2,000 coins of ancient Rome (each Roman emperor - of which there were about 100 - being represented by from one to 150 portrait-emblazoned coins).

Study of such coins is useful for understanding ancient art, history and economic life.
