## Chamberlain's has open house for new facilities

Openhouse this Friday and Saturday, December 15 and 16 will be the culmination of plans and construction for a new building and remodeling of existing ones at Chamberlain Motor Company in Clarendon which comprise a plant complete from new car to renewed trade in.

The new construction consists of a 315x40 foot structure which will accommodate the showroom, sales offices, bookkeeping offices, the receptionists desks and provide a waiting room for customers.

Planning for this new structure and the remodeling has been in the formative stage for four or five years and even part of the basic construction was done as long ago as two years. This is part of the reason the entire project went off so smoothly. Panhandle Steel Buildings of Amarillo were the contractors, architects and builders for the entire project, handling even the interior decorating. The same firm has done all the construction on the site for Chamberlain Motor Company.

The exterior of the building is of medium brown brick, a rich natural color to complement the soft ochre on the painted portion and the wood touches. Enough brick to do such a large job appeared to be presenting a problem when the builder saw the train come in with a car load of good brick. He inquired to see if they were sold, which they were not and he purchased the lot for the Chamberlain building. This same luck or chance or well planned timing endured for the entire project. Just at the last weather did delay the paving but that was not such a problem as material holdups could have been.

A trim canopy at the main entrance covers the curved walkway to a handsome door

with beveled edge diamond panes of leaded glass flanked with matching windows of the same leaded glass. Inside the receptionists desk is conveniently positioned opposite the door. A balcony on the far side of the central area across from the entrance adds a touch of interest with stained turned wood banister and posts. The final furnishing for the area has not been determined as yet.

The vast expanse of the southern exposure is glassed with salom bronze for maximum temperature control and the light which comes into the building adds to the spacious feeling. To heighten the light walls are decorated with soft yellow to bring a sunshine feeling inside.

More than 1500 square yards of carpeting cover the floor with variegated tones of yellow, golds and browns and tables with pedestal bases and club chairs in soft leather upholstery are a mute invitation to sit and rest as you wait for servicing or to visit. The coffee bar is always a busy place and there is seldom a time when conversation is not lively at the tables.

Lighting at either end of the show room is recessed in the conventional height suspended ceiling. Plans are to keep about 25 or 30 cars on the floor of the

showroom. The same recessed lighting is used in all of the offices.

Separate offices for the salesmen and bookkeepers offer a maximum of privacy for consultation and concentration. These offices have wainscoting of Mediterranean stained wood which is repeated in the custom made desks and the storage cabinets lining most of one of the long walls. One section of cabinets is ceiling high with recessed door panels and bronze hardware. Walls are covered with ricecloth wall paper and one deep window which ends above the cabinet counter has a wide sill and wrought iron work to bar the outside. The decorative iron work accents the Mediterranean decor.

Not all decorating is complete at this time. Although the sun is most welcome at this season, some screening of its light will need to be provided for during the summer months. This is something to be planned near that time.

Most of the paving has been completed for the car lots outside. About forty light standards were installed for lighting the exterior building area and car lots. The classic round orb light fixtures provide an outside touch of the decorating theme in the main building.

Broncos thump Lynx, 52 - 26

Clarendon's pressuring defense and precision shooting coupled with Spearman miscues rocketed the Clarendon Broncos to a 52-26 romp over the Lynx here Tuesday night.

"We've been trying for 2 1/2 years to beat them and we finally did. It was really a team effort," said Dean Overcast later. "They aren't as good as they will be later 'cause they

just got out of football (after winning their district and losing to Childress in Bi-District)." The Broncos will play the Lynx in Spearman during the Christmas holidays.

Keith Floyd paced the winners with 16 points while Zane Newton and Scott Martin led Spearman with 6 apiece. Good bench help aided the Broncos, too.

Bronchettes fell to Lynettes, 39-31.

"If we had hit our layups and free throws we would have won it."

It's hard not to agree with Coach Dean Overcast about that matter. Clutch misses kept the Bronchettes from upsetting the always-tough Spearman girls.

However, Overcast is quick to point out the "Tremendous hustle" the Bronchettes displayed throughout the game.

"The girls are improving daily," added Overcast. "By District time we'll be tough."

Janette Myers led all scorers with 18 points, much of which came from her hot spot, the corner. Ricci Tunnell had several good defensive rebounds and a good game on the offensive boards.

As time goes on the team looks better and better. Could a district championship await both Clarendon teams? Possibly, says Coach Overcast. But come to Bronco gym for the next home game and see for yourself.

Discussion regarding detention facilities for Donley County took up much of the afternoon session of the Commissioners Court this past Monday with one fact clearly evident: there will be no easy or inexpensive solution to the problem, for the commissioners or county residents.

The most recent county jail inspection report lists 72 items which fail to comply with minimum standards. This inspection was made 11-28-78. A time limit has been set for the county to begin and complete corrective measures; time begins following the receipt of the Notice of Noncompliance. The report states flatly that the jail does not comply.

This time span would appear to be about 13 or 14 months or whatever time the commission set. Failure to abide by the non compliance order could result in the closing of the jail in Donley County.

Two options seem to be open to the county; to provide for a holding facility in Clarendon for Donley County prisoners for 72 hours and becoming a part of the Detention Facility Plan with Collingsworth and Hall Counties and transporting jail inmates requiring longer retention. A similar plan could be offered by other combining counties.

The second choice is to build a complete facility in Donley County and be independent of a multi-county plan. In either of these cases the cost is considerable and the Donley County Commissioners are endeavoring to determine the best course of action.

If the decision is made to provide for a holding facility here, the estimated cost given several years ago was \$20,000 to make the jail meet requirement for the holding facility. In

addition 24-hour supervision will be required when anyone is detained in the holding facility.

One of the required personnel is a dispatcher. These requirements will add additional employees to the county payroll. A dispatcher office with the City of Clarendon paying half of the expense and sharing the benefits was recently proposed but never got off the ground. Although there was no dollar figure available the expense would include operating and maintenance salaries and transportation to Wellington (if that plan is agreed on).

The original plans for the Wellington based detention facility was for four counties, Collingsworth, Donley, Hall and Wheeler. Wheeler dropped out and will build their own jail. The cost of construction will be borne by the counties participating. If Donley County joins their share of the \$376,980 facility, less \$160,000 grant, for \$216,980 would be assessed on a 40%, 30% and 30% breakup of the amount. Collingsworth for 40% and Donley and Hall for 30% each.

Added to the cost of construction will be the share of salaries, maintenance and operating costs to be paid whether Donley County has prisoners there or not. Food costs would be assessed only if there were persons from Donley County to be fed. Also is the fact of rising costs of all operating items. Allowances would doubtless be made for these adjustments.

For the three county plan, Collingsworth, Donley and Hall, a projected estimate calls for 15 persons to be support people. Included in this number are 7 jailer/dispatchers, 2 part time cooks, one part time dietitian and one part time R.N.

The construction cost of the

above jail would be \$10,750 per year for 20 years, if it is paid for by the year.

No definite dollar figure had been arrived at to be discussed at the December 11 meeting. The alternate course is to construct a complete jail facility for Donley County. At this time there is no information available on specifications, plans, cost of construction or other pertinent information on this aspect. It is possible, however, to get grant funds if money for this type construction is available.

Corgan Associates, Inc., Architects and Engineers of Dallas estimated the remodeling costs of Donley County to be comparable to a new facility in the Phase 1 Detention Facility Plan with the other counties mentioned earlier in this article. This cost is for an average expenditure of \$45 to \$60 per square foot and would mean about \$150,000 facility. This cost estimate is for a holding facility.

By agreement of the court further discussion was tabled until a later meeting.

Item 10. Storage for first aid equipment is not provided and litter (stretcher) and fresh first aid equipment is not on hand.

Item 11. Space for medical use or written program not provided.

Item 12. Adequate secure storage for drugs and medical supplies is not provided.

Item 13. Space for administrative personnel, for equipment and supplies is not provided.

Item 14. Secure weapon storage is not provided at entrance where weapons are prohibited.

Item 15. Single cells do not constitute 30% of jail capacity.

Item 16. Dayrooms are not provided in the facility.

Item 17. Safety vestibules are not provided for 3 or more inmate area (the "run around" cell has 4 bunks in it)

Item 18. Reliable remote means is not provided for opening of cell doors (note, in use only 2 cells and "run-around" contain inn)

Item 19. Cell areas are 7' ceiling - required is 8' ceiling.

Item 20. Bunks in Female cell in "runaround" and 1 bunk in male cell are not securely anchored. Lavatories are not constructed to resist vandalism.

Item 22. Separation cell is not provided.

Item 23. Sufficient lighting is not provided for normal activity, light controls, conduits and fixtures are not out of reach of inmates.

Item 25. Housing and control

areas are not variably illuminated at all times to permit permit observation and custodial function.

Item 26. Ball bearing type hinges not provided on jail doors.

Item 27. Door stops are not provided for swinging detention door.

Item 28. It is the opinion of the inspector and Sheriff that electrical system would not meet statutory requirements.

Item 29. Provision is not made to reasonably maintain temperature be

Item 30. Doubtful plumbing will meet statutory requirements

Item 31. and hot water is not 110 degrees or below at lavatories and shower.

Item 32. Plumbing is subject to vandalism.

Item 33. Plumbing space in corridors exposed facilities not lockable.

Item 34. Rapid reliable means to remove occupants not provided due to no emergency set of keys and jailer not on duty 24 hours at the facility. No alarm system and communication.

Item 35. Prompt reliable means to remove occupants not provided - jailer not at location 24 hours per day, no emergency keys, no alarm system and no communication.

Item 36. Stairway width is not 44 inches (30 inches)

Item 37. Means of egress not continuously illuminated.

Item 38. Emergency illumination is not provided.

Item 39. Exit marking is not provided.

Item 40. Exit doors do not swing with direction of exit traffic namely corridor exit door and one entrance door.

Item 41. Alarm initiation is not provided.

## Wildlife group asks help in taking eagle census

The National Wildlife Federation is calling on federal and state agencies as well as bird clubs and other outdoor groups to assist in its first nationwide bald eagle count.

The survey, which is planned as an annual census, will be conducted during the last three weeks of January under the auspices of NWF's Raptor Information Center. That period was chosen because eagle movements are at a minimum at that time of the year, according to William S. Clark, director of the Raptor Information Center. Elton Fawks, of East Moline, Ill., an NWF consultant who has conducted eagle surveys in the Mississippi Valley for many years, will be cooperating in this nationwide effort. Because eagles are plentiful and not threatened in Alaska, and not found in Hawaii, the survey will be confined to the "lower 48" states.

"We need a more accurate estimate of the number and distribution of wintering bald eagles in the 48 contiguous states," said Thomas L. Kimball, NWF Executive Vice President. "The Midwinter census will provide valuable information on total numbers and age ratios, and will identify important wintering locations. In the past, this data has been partly conjectural due to incom-

plete coverage of all potential wintering habitat."

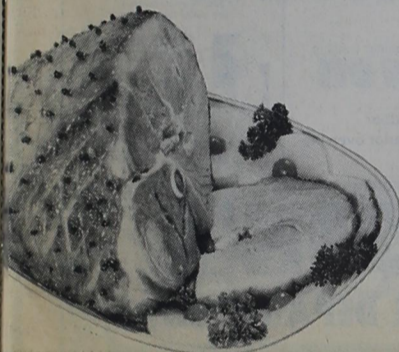

### The Lions Tale

The Lions Agricultural Committee brought the slide program to the meeting on the History of the Agriculture Stabilization Conservation Service. (ASCS)

The ASCS began in 1933, serving farmers to save agricul-

ture from low prices, 2c/lb cotton and 25c/bu wheat. Most crops were sold for taxes or debts.

County committees were organized to cut back production. Over production caused depressed farm prices.

Marketing control regulated by Congress limited interstate and foreign trade. Allotments and storage price supports helped prevent flooded markets causing price drops.

During World War II production was increased to meet world demands, but at the end of the war abundance became a burden once again.

In 1956 the Soil Bank was started, retiring land from soil depleting crops to grasses and legumes.

The present Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service was given its present name in 1961. Set asides also began that year allowing farmers to receive payments on lands not planted.

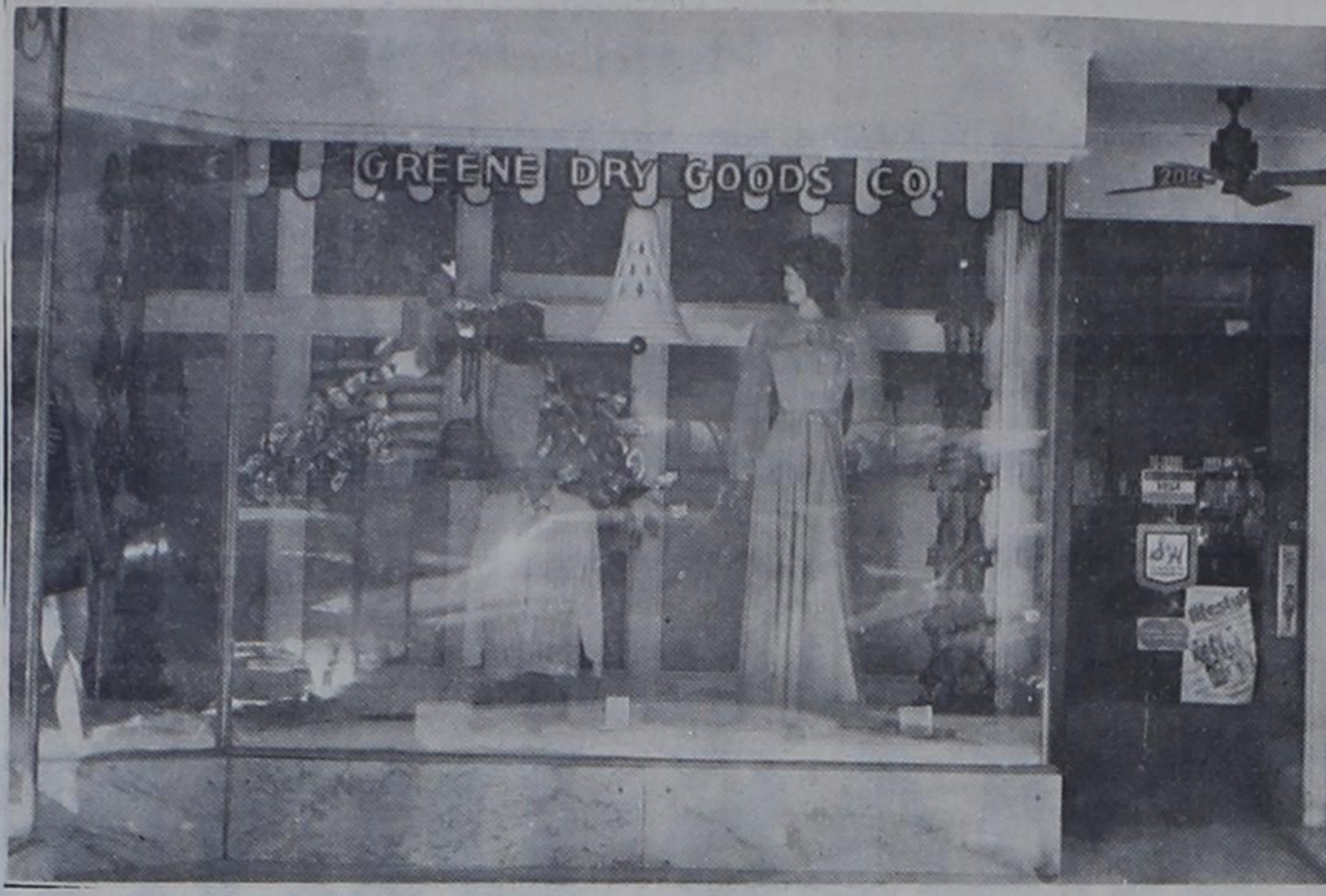
In 1973 the program changed again encouraging farmers to plant fence to fence. This put marginal farm land back into production. Target prices guaranteed the farmers fair prices for his grains.

Presently there are controls over total planted acres, but these are not limited to a specific commodity. Farmers may receive cost share on conservation practices through the ACP program.

**WTU proje**

A research project could lead to development of alternative fuel for gas plant boilers has been announced by West Texas Utilities Company and the other operating companies with Central and South West...  
The project is a gas experiment, designed to produce a gas from heavy oil such as oil and coal. The gas being tested would reduce undesirable sulfur before gas is used, making it essentially clean.  
The program is being conducted at the La Palma Station, operated by Power and Light Company of Corpus Christi near San Antonio in the Lower Rio Grande Valley. Participants are the United States Environmental Protection Agency, the Foster Wheeler Corporation, and the Central and South West Corporation. EPA funded engineering and operating supplies are providing monitoring of environmental effects. Wheeler designed the CSW and its four companies provided for construction of a research unit.  
The companies are in the process of finding fuels to use in their existing gas-fired power plants. Still provide most of the Texas System's generation. Texas Utilities Co. has eight major generating units converted to fuel oil. Natural gas is curtailed in extremely cold weather.  
According to S.B. Phillips, chairman and chief executive officer of the CSW Corporation and its operating companies "are fully committed to programs of research and development, especially that show the highest potential for resulting in practical, economical sources of energy."  
At the moment, Phillips says the most promising project supported is the gasification program at La Palma, now of Dallas, former president of WTU in 1974.  
The CSW companies support nuclear fusion being conducted near...  
The gasification research is being conducted on a pilot unit at the La Palma station, which is CPL's oldest power plant. Electric power generated during the experiment will be fed into CPL's transmission system for customers.  
Other CSW operating companies are Southwest Electric Power Co., Shreveport, La.; Public Service Company of Oklahoma, Tulsa, Okla.

Diane Chamberlain acts as receptionist and title clerk and Carol Chamberlain Powell is chief title clerk. These are busy ladies who take care of so much detail work for Chamberlain Motor Co.

### Sales Department

### PARTS DEPARTMENT

Connected to the main new building by an overhead breezeway, the parts department has been enlarged to include the part of that building which did house the showroom. There are now 3,000 square feet in the department with a sizable increase in the inventory. With the enlarged stock it will operate much like an independent parts store with a selection of various car makes, other than the lines handled by Chamberlains. This will appeal to the automobile hobbyist and the do-it-yourselfer.

Joey Lee is the parts manager. Lee first worked for Chamberlain Motor Company on a part time basis while he attended Clarendon College and has now been with them for some time. Other personnel is Larry Doane, who attended Clarendon schools and College and McKinley Louis, who is a 25 year employee of Chamberlain Motor Company.

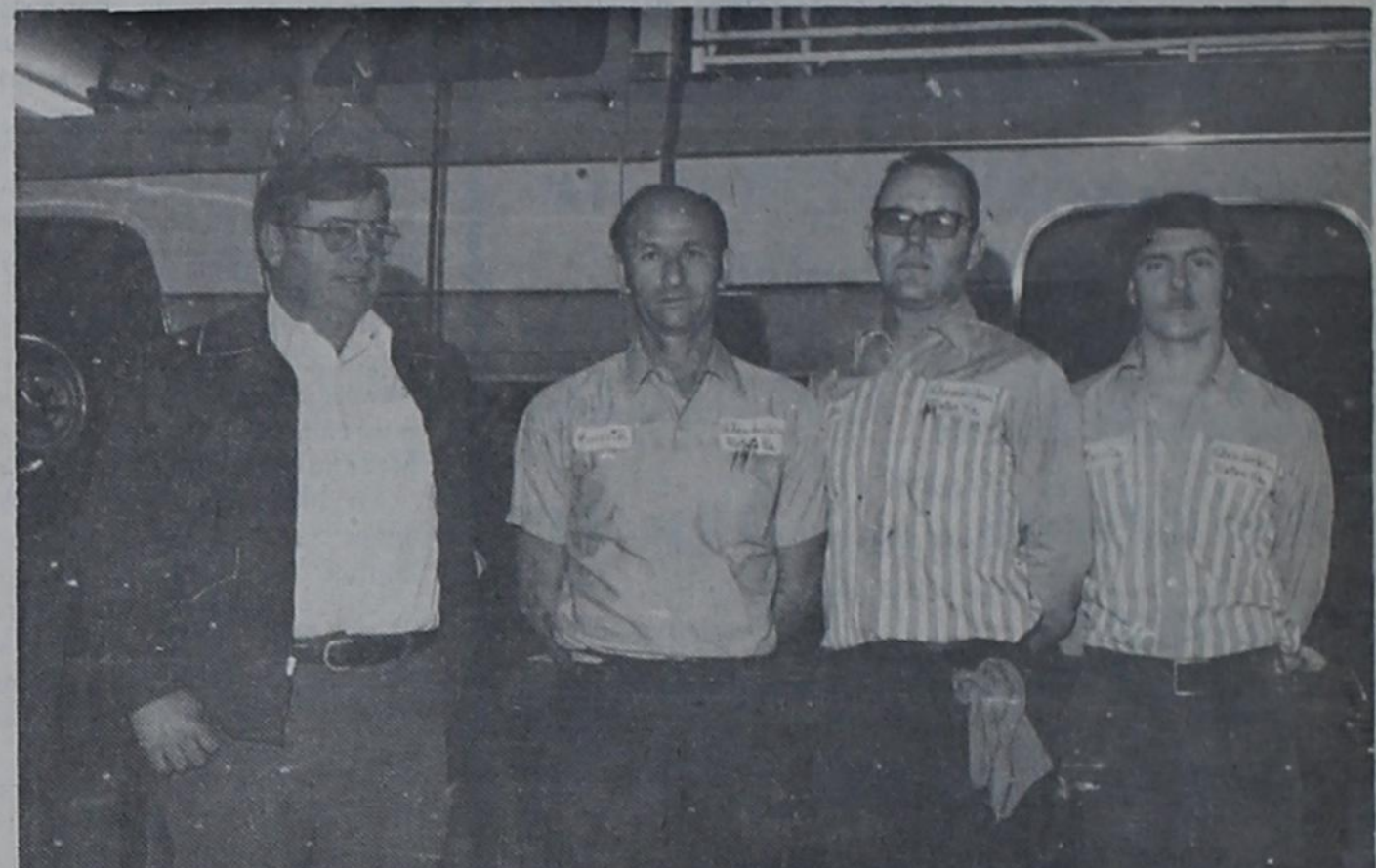
### Service Department

West Texas Utilities Co. depends entirely on natural gas at its eight major generating stations except that several can be converted to fuel oil when natural gas is curtailed during extremely cold weather.

According to S.B. (Si) Phillips, chairman and chief executive officer of the CSW, the corporation and its operating companies "are fully committed to programs of research and development, especially those that show the highest possibility of resulting in practical and economical sources of energy."

At the moment, Phillips said, the most promising project CSW supports is the gasification program at La Palma. Phillips, now of Dallas, formerly was president of WTU in Abilene.

The CSW companies also support nuclear fusion research being conducted near Houston.

The gasification research is being conducted on an operational unit at the La Palma, which is CPL's oldest active power plant. Electricity generated during the experiments will be fed into CPL's transmission system for use by customers.

Other CSW operating companies are Southwestern Electric Power Co., Shreveport, and Public Service Company of Oklahoma, Tulsa.

## Buy safe products

It's a fact. Some children's products can go up to 50 miles an hour downhill. And they don't all have brakes, seatbelts or steering wheels.

With the holiday season right around the corner, the ever-popular bicycle, skateboard and roller skate will serve as gifts for many youngsters across the land. So will sleds, snow disks and toboggans. These products, while a source of great fun, can also contribute to some serious injuries if not used properly.

Last year, the Commission estimates they were involved in more than three quarters of a million injuries serious enough to require care in hospital emergency rooms. Bicycles were associated with the greatest number of injuries—we estimate more than 500,000—followed by skateboards estimated at over 140,000 injuries, roller skates at 85,000 injuries and sleds, toboggans and snow disks with a combined total estimated at 50,000 injuries. Many of these injuries resulted from consumer misuse, careless selection and poor maintenance.

Because of the number of injuries associated with bicycles, the Commission in 1976 set safety requirements for new bikes to ensure safer performance and product design. New bicycles now require reliable brakes, strong handlebars, firmly attached wheels, and reflectors, among other items.

Skateboards, the force behind a youth fever sweeping the country, comprise the theme of a holiday public education campaign to promote safe riding only in protected environments like skateboard parks and use of protective equipment such as gloves, helmets and pads.

As part of the annual CPSC Holiday Safety Program, the Commission will be alerting consumers to the potential hazards associated with such popular items as skateboards, bikes and other motion products, and giving safety tips on proper selection, use and maintenance.

If you're thinking of giving a youngster one of these products as a gift, here are some important points to keep in mind:

**Bicycles.** Select one that suits the rider's age, size and abilities. Check hand and foot-brakes for fast, easy stops, and make sure there are no sharp points or edges, particularly along the fenders. Remember, it's up to you to teach children to observe traffic laws and signals, just like automobile drivers do.

**Roller skates.** Here's some advice to give children: Don't skate too close. Don't push, shove or fool around. Watch out for cracked or uneven surfaces that could send a skater flying.

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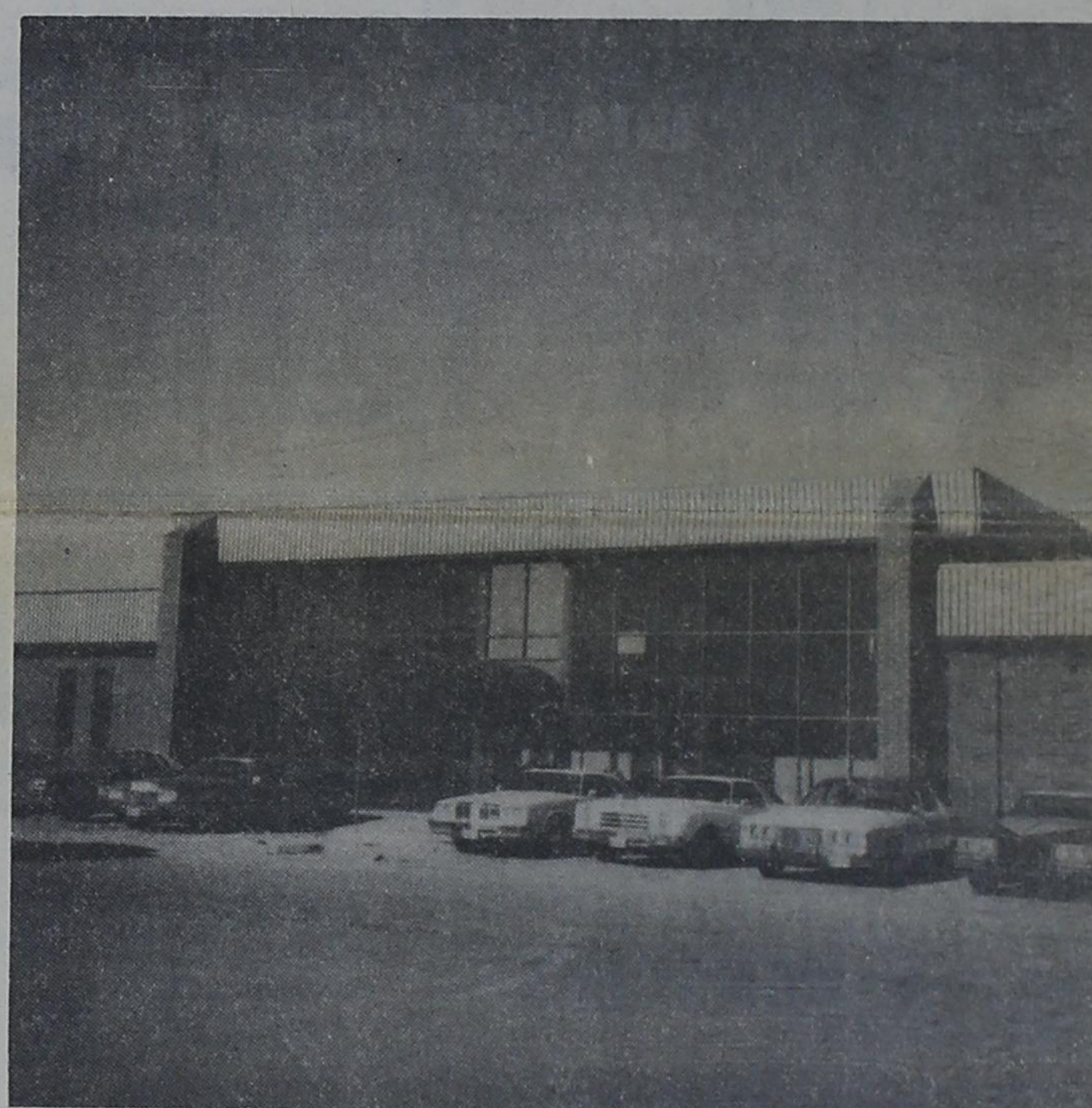

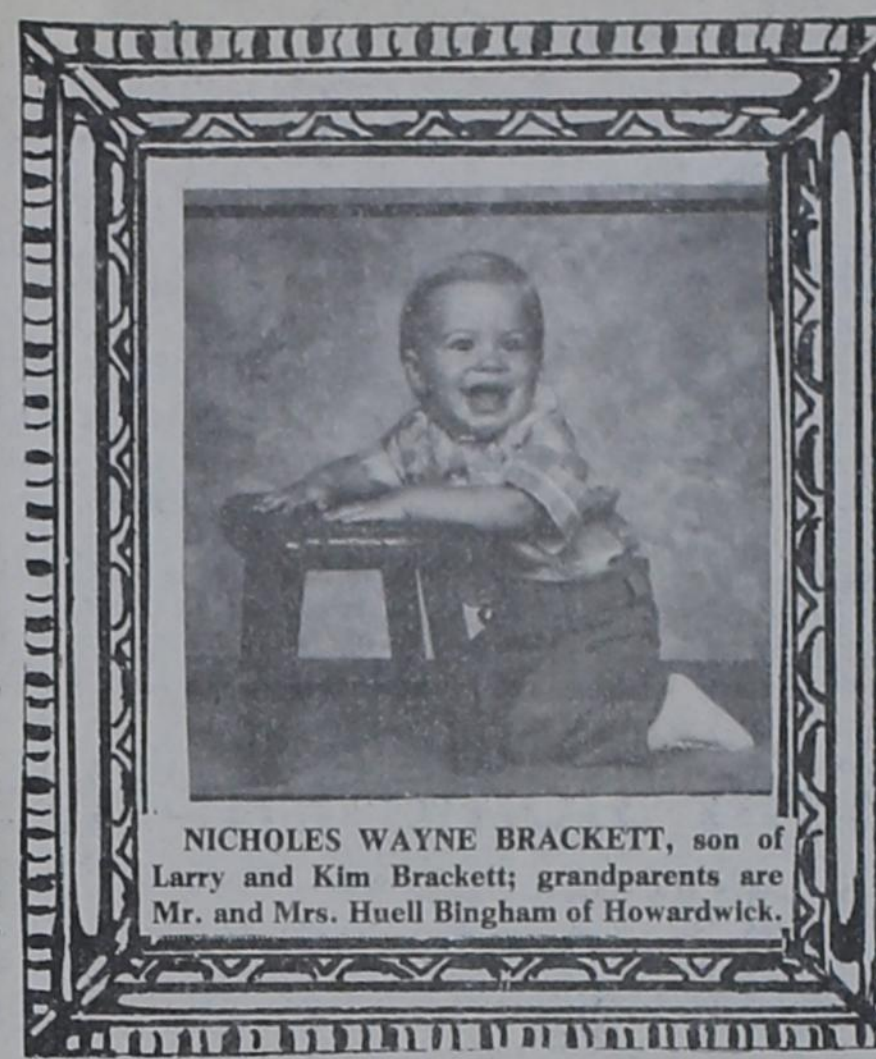
