Farmers face SBA filing deadline

For farmers and ranchers who suffered drought damage to 1977 crops, the deadline for filing loan applications with SBA is October 11, 1978, which is six months from the original date established when the disaster was declared by the U.S. Small Business Administration.

So far more than 8,500 farmers and ranchers in Texas have either interviewed or filed drought loan applications totaling in excess of \$125 million, and more applications are expected as next month's deadline approaches.

205 East 5th Street Amarillo, Texas 79101 SBA Office managers are recommending that the farmers and ranchers come in person to pick up applications and then return them the same way. This assures that the application is complete, which in turn expedites processing of the loan. The loan program for farmers who suffered financial hardship because of the drought includes unrecovered production costs on 1977 crops at 3 percent for the first \$250,000 and 6 5/8 percent thereafter. The drought is widespread in Texas. Approximately 90% of the 254 counties are eligible for the drought loan program.

A. A program participant will qualify for a target price guarantee, provided a target price payment is made, on all the wheat for harvest as grain when it is at least 15 percent less than the 1978 acreage.

Remember, production must be reported for low yield purposes within 15 days from the date harvest is completed on each farm. For acreage you do not harvest, be sure to check with this office before use is made of the land.

Bronchos to play Quanah

The Clarendon Bronchos travel to Quanah Friday night for their second game of the year. Kick-off is set for 8:00 p.m. The Indians were overmatched in a 34-0 loss to Childress Friday night. Both the Bronchos and the Indians will be looking for their first victory of the year. Quanah in AA last year defeated the Bronchos 13-7.

Coach Allen's comments: Quanah has dropped down to A this year after going 1-9 in

AA last year. The Indians have a new head coach in Bill Johnson, a former asst. on the staff. Offensively they will run from what they call a "Floating T" utilizing three running backs lining up in a straight T. From this set, they will shift into different formations. Their backs are all speedy and very quick. The QB #7 Wood is a good passer. On defense they will employ a split 4 or a 5-3, both of which are a 8 man front. They are good tacklers.

#67 McSpadden moves well from his linebacker position. #33 Cummings is active from defensive end. Quanah will use 7 or 8 players both ways. We came out of the Boys Ranch Game with no injuries and should be ready to take on Quanah. We will have to improve mentally because many of our mistakes were mental. Sometimes fumbles are caused by hard hits but others are mental errors. I hope we are over those.

Roughriders beat Bronchos 21-0

The Class AA Boys Ranch Roughriders spoiled the 1978 Clarendon Bronchos home opener with a 21-0 victory Friday night. Much of the first quarter was played in a slight drizzling rain. The Bronchos fell victim to their own mistakes which kept them in poor field position nearly the whole game. The defense had to turn back the "quick" Roughriders backs seven times at the goal line on 4th down plays. However, Boys Ranch did manage to penetrate the Clarendon goal three times, two of which were set up by Broncho fumbles deep in their own territory. All in all the Bronchos had 10 fumbles, losing seven. This was a problem that had not bothered the Bronchos in their two scrimmages.

Boys Ranch won the toss and elected to receive the opening kick-off. Billy Gardner, kicking off for the Bronchos, skidded the ball and the Roughriders set-up shop at their own 37 yd. line. The first game jitters seemed to get to the Bronchos on Boys Ranch first possession as they drove 63 yds. in 9 plays to score. With 8:52 left in the 1st quarter -- #25 Ollie Johnson scored on a 25 yd. run. His extra point try was no good and with a little over three minutes gone the Bronchos were trailing 6-0. The Bronchos took the ensuing kick-off and on their first possession produced a first down. However, on the 3rd play of the second series, Soph. Kelly Tunnell lost the handle and Boys Ranch once again had a scoring opportunity at the Broncho 32 yd. line. This time it only took 6 plays to hit paydirt with #30 Lyn Bell scoring on a sprint draw from 9 yds. out. Ollie Johnson hit the extra point this time and within two minutes the Roughriders had scored again making it 13-0. With 6:46 left in the 1st quarter, the Bronchos tried to regroup and get their offense moving. A fine 65 yd. run by Billy Gardner breaking numerous tackles along the way brought the Broncho fans to their feet. Shawn Lightfoot finally chased him down and was charged with a face mask penalty, putting the Bronchos at the Roughriders five yard line with a first and goal. But the "old nemesis" bit the Bronchos again as Gary McClellan fumbled the snap and the noseguard Ollie Johnson recovered. The Roughriders put together a 12 play drive that gave them a first and goal inside the 5 again. But they too had their problems hanging on to the ball in crucial situations. The fullback, Johnson fumbled the ball what appeared to be into the end zone. McClellan had recovered on the 1 ft. line. The Bronchos put together their best drive of the night starting with their backs to the wall. Tunnell moved it out 12 yds. for a little running room. Then McClellan connected to Gardner

on a pass to the 30 yd. line and a first down. In 12 plays, the Bronchos had moved it from their goal line to the 48 yd. line making four first downs. A pass to a wide-open Tim Brown was slightly overthrown down field at the Roughriders 30 killing the drive and Lynn Thompson came into punt. His punt traveled 15 yds. and Boys Ranch went to work from their 42 yd. line. The defense stiffened and the Roughriders had to punt for the first time. As if things weren't going badly enough for the Bronchos, the punt died on the 1 yd. line. On the first play, Tunnell fumbled again on the 4 yd. line. However, Boys Ranch didn't want it either as Larry Davis made the initial hit on Johnson and he fumbled into the end zone and Gary Thomas recovered for the Bronchos. But the offense couldn't "muster" a charge and Thompson punted 17 yds. on 4th down. Once again, the Broncho defense were called on to defend their goal line. This time, two crucial pass plays were broken up by linebacker Barry Hightower and cornerback Alvin Reese saved a TD in the end zone. The ball went over on downs as the first half ended with Clarendon trailing 13-0. The Bronchos received the second half kick-off and immediately went to work with McClellan and Kelly Choate teaming up for a fine 33 yd. pass play with Choate making an excellent juggling catch. However, McClellan was hit hard on the next play relinquishing the ball again. But the turnover did no damage as the defense held the roughriders on downs. Kelly Choate returned the punt 30 yds. as an excellent wall was set by the Broncho specialty team. This field position was to no avail as Alvin Reese fumbled and Boys Ranch recovered inside the Broncho 30. Lyn Bell carried the ball all the way to the 15 yd. line and things looked bleak again for the Broncho defense. But the Broncho corners Billy Gardner and Alvin Reese made some outstanding plays and the Bronchos held again inside the 5 yd. line. But the offense couldn't gain a first down, and Lynn Thompson got a fine 42 yd. punt off. The play was called back, however, Cont. on page 2

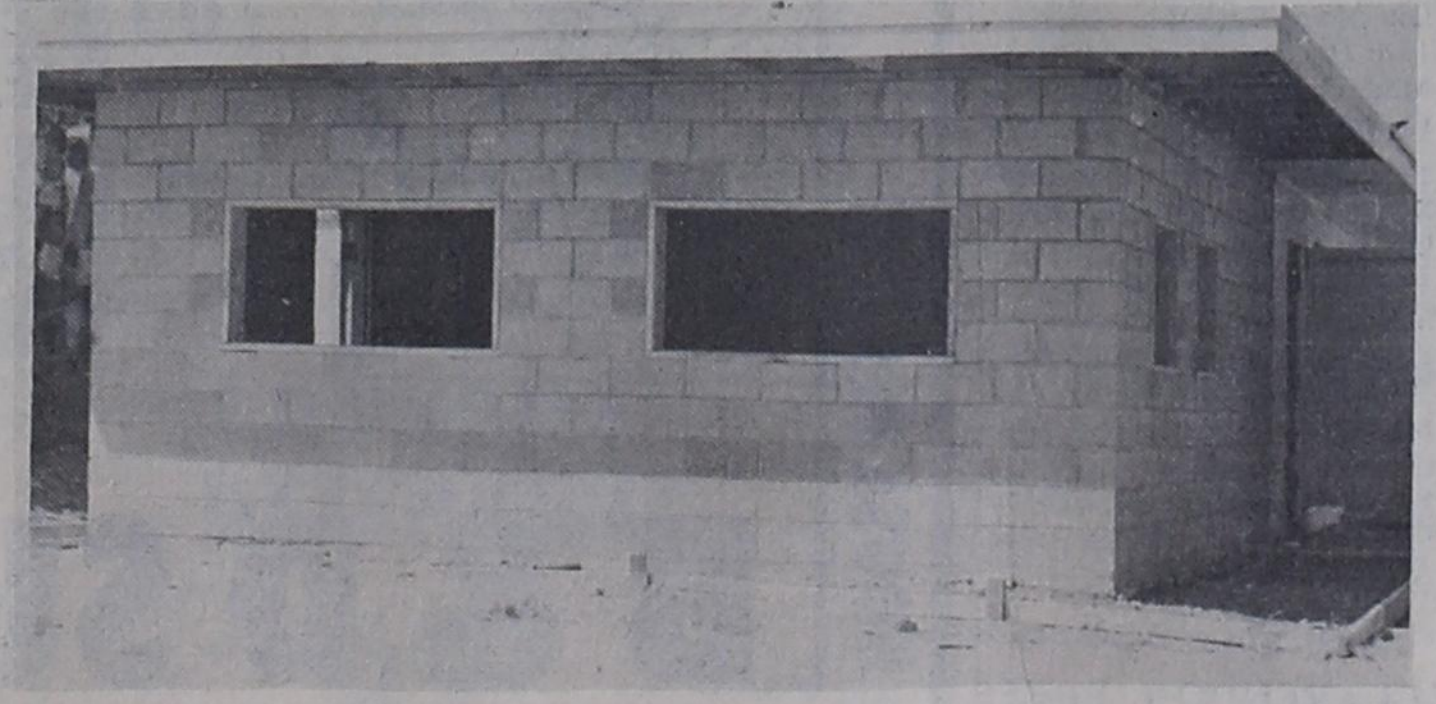

and the Broncos regained possession 15 yds. further down the field as the Roughriders were penalized for roughing the kicker.

With 4 minutes gone into the 4th quarter, the Roughriders again recovered a McClellan fumble after being hit hard - began play from the Broncos 13 yd. line. It took two plays and they were knocking at the door with a 1st and goal at the 5. The Broncos-ONE MORE TIME: held on three downs, but Lyn Bell finally punched it in on 4th down. The kick was no good, but the Broncos were offside, and the Roughriders electing to go for two points were successful with Lester Goin making the catch in the end zone. So, with 7:34 left in the 4th quarter, the Broncos were looking at a 21-0 deficit.

Arthritis - With cool weather coming, many of us start suffering from arthritis. It usually starts with a stiff and painful joint. Frequently it is in a knee, but it can also affect the back, hands and feet. Although there are many types of arthritis, the most common is osteoarthritis and rheumatoid arthritis. Most of us get osteoarthritis, which makes good weather forecasters ache when a weather change comes. This arthritis is caused by normal wear and tear on joints. It is also the easiest to treat.

Rheumatoid arthritis is more serious. It is the crippling arthritis. It usually starts in the hands and feet and affects both sides of the body at the same time. The type of arthritis the stiff joints does not leave a person getting up and moving about must be actively treated to prevent severe deformity.

Treatment of these two types of arthritis starts with the use of aspirin. The Mayo Clinic gives up to twenty aspirin tablets for the inflammation, but for the inflammation of the joint. If you can't take aspirin, you could use a non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drug, but it doesn't work as well.

What do you do if you wake up in the morning with stiff and sore joints? A hot shower usually helps. Then is the time to start aspirin, and use two, four or six a day. Twenty a day is too much. Prevention works too. Many patients who turn to an electric blanket in cold weather find it helps.

Rheumatoid arthritis is more serious. It is the crippling type. It usually starts in the hands and feet and affects both sides of the body at the same time. In this type of arthritis the stiffness and soreness does not leave after getting up and moving about. It must be actively treated to prevent severe deformity.

Treatment of these two types of arthritis starts out the same. It is aspirin. The mayo clinic gives up to twenty aspirin a day. The aspirin is not for the pain but for the inflammation about the joint. If you can't take aspirin, you could use tylenol, but it doesn't work as well.

What do you do if you wake up in the morning with various stiff and sore joints? Moving about and minor exercises often will loosen you up. If not, a hot shower usually helps. If not, then is the time to start the aspirin, and use two, four times a day. Twenty a day is too many. Prevention works too. I have many patients who turn up their electric blanket in cold weather

and prevent the stiffness and soreness in the morning. And if the copper bracelet really works, Mother Nature has caused a remission of your arthritis. Go ahead and wear it if you wish, but get a pretty one. The only true value of the copper is cosmetic.

We're all going to get a touch of arthritis if we live long enough. But there is no need to

let it be painful or crippling if it can possibly be prevented. And most of the time it can.

Cystic Fibrosis campaign starts Monday

According to Mrs. Selvidge, contributions to the Kiss A Baby Campaign will help support a national network of over 100 Cystic Fibrosis Centers, research projects around the world and various educational programs.

Cystic Fibrosis Centers, most located at teaching hospitals affiliated with leading medical schools and universities, provide diagnosis, treatment, and referral to children suffering from cystic fibrosis, asthma, chronic bronchitis, bronchiectasis, "childhood emphysema" and recurrent pneumonia.

Hospitals dealing with gastrointestinal disorders related to C/F are located in Dallas, Houston and San Antonio. "Most of the funds that are raised in the Kiss A Baby Campaign go to these very important national programs," she said. "But, almost 50 percent of the monies stay in

this Chapter area to support services for local children with cystic fibrosis and other lung-damaging diseases."

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PUBLIC NOTICE SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 7, 1978

"The Tax Relief Amendment" (H.J.R. 1)

H.J.R. 1 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution allowing the legislature to exempt intangible personal property, requiring the legislature to exempt certain household goods and personal effects, and allowing the legislature to exempt all or part of the personal property homestead from state and local property taxation.

The amendment requires the legislature to provide for the taxation of farm and ranch land on the basis of its productive capacity instead of its market value and allows the legislature to provide for the taxation of timber land on its productive capacity.

The amendment permits local governments to extend the present exemption of not less than \$3,000 of the residence homestead of persons 65 and older to include certain disabled persons.

The amendment grants an exemption from public school property taxes of \$5,000 of the market value of the residence homestead. It authorizes the legislature to grant an additional exemption from public school property taxes of an amount not to exceed \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homesteads of persons 65 years of age or older and certain disabled persons. If a person 65 years of age or older qualifies for this exemption, the total amount of public school taxes imposed on that person's homestead may not be increased.

The amendment prevents local governments from increasing property taxes unless the governing body provides public notice and conducts a public hearing. The amendment requires the legislature to provide by law for each property owner to receive notice of the revaluation of his property and the amount taxes will be increased.

The amendment limits appropriations from state tax revenue to an amount not to exceed Texas' estimated economic growth rate, with the legislature authorized to make exceptions for emergencies.

The amendment prohibits the statewide appraisal of real property for property tax purposes. Enforcement of uniform standards and procedures for appraisal of property for property tax purposes is required to originate in the taxing

authority where the property tax is imposed.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for tax relief for residential homesteads, elderly persons, disabled persons, and agricultural land; for personal property exemptions; for truth in taxation procedures, including citizen involvement; for a redefinition of the tax base; for limitations on state spending; and for property tax administration."

NUMBER ONE (S.J.R. 50)

S.J.R. 50 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to delete an archaic reference to the "Deaf and Dumb Asylum." The amendment would allow the State of Texas to purchase products and services done by handicapped individuals in nonprofit rehabilitation facilities without complying with bid requirements applicable to other state contracts. The amendment also would eliminate the formality of the approval of certain state contracts by the Governor, the Secretary of State and the Comptroller of Public Accounts.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment deleting the archaic reference to the 'Deaf and Dumb Asylum' allowing certain products and services of handicapped individuals to be used by agencies and departments of state government, requiring the procurement of other products and services required in the operation of state government to be made under bids awarded to the lowest responsible bidder, making all such procurement processes subject to laws enacted by the legislature, and eliminating the requirement that the Governor, the Secretary of State, and the Comptroller of Public Accounts of Texas be personally involved with such transactions."

NUMBER TWO (S.J.R. 55)

S.J.R. 55 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to permit local governments to issue bonds for the reconstruction or acquisition of facilities (land, equipment and improvements) designed to develop employment opportunities. These bonds would be payable solely from the revenue from the sale or lease of these facilities. The building or acquisition of such facilities must be determined by the local government to be necessary to develop employment opportunities.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide that the legislature may permit political subdivisions to issue bonds to develop employment opportunities for their citizens."

bonds would be payable solely from the revenue from the sale or lease of these facilities. The building or acquisition of such facilities must be determined by the local government to be necessary to develop employment opportunities.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide that the legislature may permit political subdivisions to issue revenue bonds to develop employment opportunities for their citizens."

NUMBER THREE (S.J.R. 44)

S.J.R. 44 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution which would allow the legislature to authorize cities and towns to issue tax increment bonds to finance the redevelopment of blighted areas. The bonds are to be paid solely from revenue from municipal tax increments. Payment cannot be made from the revenue of municipal taxes, utilities, or other services.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize cities and towns to issue bonds to finance the redevelopment of blighted areas and prohibiting any city or town from granting its money or lending its credit for such purposes."

NUMBER FOUR (S.J.R. 53)

S.J.R. 53 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to allow the legislature to exempt from taxation solar or wind-powered energy devices.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from taxation solar and wind-powered energy devices."

NUMBER FIVE (H.J.R. 37)

H.J.R. 37 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to grant exclusive jurisdiction to justices of the peace in civil cases where the amount in controversy does not exceed \$200, except where the legislature gives exclusive jurisdiction to another court.

The amendment grants justices of the peace concurrent jurisdiction with county courts where the amount in controversy is between \$200 and \$500, except where the legislature gives the county court exclusive jurisdiction. The amendment also grants justices of the peace concurrent jurisdiction

with both county and district courts where the amount in controversy is between \$500 and \$1,000, except where the legislature gives the county or district court exclusive jurisdiction.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to extend the jurisdiction of justices of the peace in civil cases."

NUMBER SIX (S.J.R. 45)

S.J.R. 45 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to allow the legislature to expand the number of judges on any court of civil appeals. Presently courts of civil appeals are limited to a chief justice and two associate justices. The amendment also would allow the courts to sit in sections, with the concurrence of a majority of the judges sitting in the section necessary to decide a case.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to increase the number of justices on a court of civil appeals, permitting a court of civil appeals to sit in sections, and requiring a concurrence of a majority of justices to decide a case."

NUMBER SEVEN (S.J.R. 48)

S.J.R. 48 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution eliminating the State Building Commission and the State Building Fund. The authority of the State Building Commission has been transferred by law to the State Board of Control.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to repeal the constitutional authority for the State Building Commission and the State Building Fund."

NUMBER EIGHT (H.J.R. 42)

H.J.R. 42 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution allowing certain political subdivisions or districts in the state that can presently issue bonds or otherwise lend their credit to engage in fire-fighting activities and to issue bonds or otherwise lend their credit to support such activities.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendments authorizing certain districts to engage in fire-fighting activities and to issue bonds or otherwise lend their credit for fire-fighting purposes."
