Childress stops Bronchos 35 - 8

The State Ranked AA Childress Bobcats won the game on the scoreboard but they knew they had been in a game. The smaller, scrappy Bronchos came to play even though they were overmatched at the line of scrimmage. The Bobcat Backs were given some good licks by the Broncho defense and the Bronchos were still hitting hard in the 4th Quarter.

The Bronchos came out throwing the ball and came within a hair of putting a score on in the early minutes of the game. However, it was two Broncho fumbles that led to the Bobcats' first TD's. The Bronchos could manage but 62 yards rushing against the stout Childress defense but were able to move through the air. Gary McClellan completed 9 of 21 for 112 yards and Lynn Thompson 1 of 2 for 31 yards and 1 TD. Leading ground gainer over the last three games Billy Gardner scratched and clawed for 26 yards on 15 carries.

Kelly Choate received the opening kick-off and the Bronchos began their first series from their 27 yd. line. The Bronchos went to the air on the second play of the game for an 8 yd. gain to Choate. Then a beautiful 38 yd. pass to Tim Brown a few plays later and the Bronchos were sitting on the Bobcat 20 with two minutes' gone into the game. On 1st Down, Billy Gardner was stopped for a 3 yd. loss, then an incomplete pass, so gain on the ground, and the Bronchos were faced with 4th Down. The Bronchos elected to go to the end zone and Tim Brown - only a last minute knock down of the pass took a TD from the Bronchos as Brown had his man beaten.

The Broncho defense held Childress for 3 downs on their first possession and the Bobcats had to punt. The Bronchos took over at their own 33 yd. line. Then disaster struck. Gary Mc-

Clellan and Billy Gardner couldn't get together on a pitch out and the Bobcats had their first opportunity from the Broncho 34 yd. line. However, the Broncho defense gave them absolutely nothing and after a penalty Childress faced 4th and 14 at the 39 yd. line. #40 Ricky Anderson took a pitch-out from Morren and started left, turned the corner, and the last man to have a shot at him McClellan was blocked and Childress had 6 pts. The kick was good and Childress led 7-0 in the 1st Quarter.

Clarendon moved it to the 15 and on 3rd Down once again the Bronchos had a pass to the end zone - just out of the reach of a diving Ronnie Davis. A 31 yd. FG try by Lynn Thompson was no good. The Bronchos again held Childress and forced a punt gaining possession at their own 46 yd. line. But for the second time the fumble was to befall the Bronchos. Mark Jack lost the handle in the pile and Childress had their second opportunity. This time it took Childress 5 plays and a 12 yd. scoring strike from Perry Morren to #82 Marty Morey. The kick was good and Childress led 14-0 with 6:40 left in the 2nd Quarter.

However, the Broncho Offensive Unit came right back on back to back 8 yd. gains through the air to Ronnie Davis and Kelly Choate plus a 15 yd. unnecessary roughness penalty and Clarendon was on Childress 30 yd. line. Gary got a huge

Cotton festival to be held this week

[Taken from an article from the Hedley Informer, Aug. 11, 1939]

In 1890 and 1891 a number of settlers located just west of the present town of Hedley, on land belonging to the R.O. Ranch. In 1893 the little settlement became a town and was called Rowe for Alfred Rowe, owner of the ranch.

Among the settlers living in the vicinity at the time were J.P. Devine, John Henry Mayers, Pat and Tom Powell, the Naylor family, Tom Owens, and Mr. and Mrs. W.I. Rains, Mr. and Mrs. W.T. White, and G.R. Cash. At that time "nesters," as they were called, were given 160 acres of land by the state, provided they lived on it three

years. The state also sold land for \$1 and \$2 per acre. The settlers, however had far from an easy time. Money was scarce and there was no employment to be had except on the ranches and the railroad.

Sweet potatoes, kershaws, blackeyed peas, sorghum molasses and cornbread were standard articles of diet. Wild game, which was very plentiful, aided to solve the pioneers' food problems.

In 1907 the town was moved to the present site. Several names were proposed, and at the suggestion of Col. W.E. Reeves the town was named Hedley in honor of Mr. Hedley, a resident of Hedley at the time.

The townsite was bought by R.H. Jones and Mr. Reeves, both still residents of Hedley. Mr. Reeves was at that time president of the old Rowe State Bank. Other business firms in Hedley at that time include Cicero Smith Lumber Co., The Cash Store J.C. Woodridge, Bond W. Johnson, Tarpley's Restaurant; D.W. Jones Lewis and Son Gin, Tarpley's Barber Shop, Dr. J.S. Stidham, Dr. A.M. Sarvis, Dr. J.A. Odom and Johnston Hardware Co.

The Clarendon Bronchos hit the road for the third time this season to face the Sanford-Fritch Eagles. It will be Homecoming at Fritch and kick-off is scheduled for 7:30. The Eagles come into the game 3-1 and the Bronchos are 2-2. Fritch has victories over River Road, Vega, and Memphis (26-14) last week. Their only loss has been to Boys Ranch 21-14.

W. I. Rains came to County 1890

W.I. Rains, his grandfather Isaac Smith and wife, his mother Mrs. Dollie Rains came to Donley County in 1890 from Clay County. W.I. Rains and Willie C. Crawford were married at Giles, Texas in February of 1898 moving to the land he homesteaded which is still owned by his grandchildren. They pioneered the town of Rowe in 1893, later the birth of

Hedley in 1907. Rowe was named for Alfred Rowe. Among early settlers were J.P. Devine, John Henry Myers, Pat and Tom Powell, Naylor family, Tom Owens, George Cash, W.I. Rains and W.T. White. At that time the 'Nesters' as they were called, were given 160 acres of land by the State provided they lived on it 3 years - the state sold land for \$1.00 and \$2.00 an acre.

Hedley Baptist Church

[Reprinted from The Baptist Voice, May 30, 1939]

The First Baptist Church, Hedley, was organized in the summer of 1909 with 27 charter members.

The first two pastors were Bro. Hensley and Bro. Hem-bree. K.W. Howell served as the first clerk and Sunday School superintendent. W.T. White as the first treasurer, and Miss Laura Brinson as the first church organist.

The congregation met in a little one room building until 1912, when a new building was built under the leadership of pastor Reese. He resigned in 1913 and was succeeded by pastor Horschler, who served the church three years. Rev. J.C. McKenzie was pastor during 1916. Under his leadership the indebtedness against the pews and other church furnishings were lifted and the first piano secured. Miss Era Johnson, the first pianist, was largely responsible for collecting payments on the piano. Pastor Archer served the church during 1917 and pastor Wade in 1918 and early part of 1919. Rev. J.M. Mizzell served as pastor during the latter part of 1919 and in the spring of 1920. He led the church in successfully raising their quota for the "75 Million."

Bro. Orrick was the next pastor, serving the church about a year. He was succeeded by Y.F. Walker, who came March 13, 1921 and remained until May 1923. Under his leadership they added the basement and arranged several Sunday School rooms in it, built two more rooms on the pastor's home, trained a large number of workers and reached the A-1 standard in Sunday School. Rev. K.F. Keller was the next pastor, serving from 1923 to 1925. He was succeeded by J.H. McCuley, who served until 1927, and he in turn by C.B.

Books. Some time during his two years stay a baby grand piano was purchased. Rev. Geo. C. Hutto came next and served one year as pastor.

Pastor M.E. Wells accepted the Church in August 1931, and has served acceptably for eight years. During this time the congregation has gone steadily upward. The building has been repainted and repaired, new plumbing added in the basement, and the kitchen rearranged. The Church has given each month through the Cooperative Program and to District Missions, according to the pastor, and has an active Brotherhood with most of the men as members.

There have been 112 additions during the last four years, 51 coming by baptism, 2 by statement, and 59 by letter. The officers of the Church, at present, are: M.E. Wells, pastor; C.W. Bain, chairman of the deacons, and one of the old standbys, Chas. Rains, Sunday School superintendent; R.W. Alewine, Clerk and treasurer; and Mrs. T.E. Caldwell, W.M.U. president. Rev. Lewis Ellis is the present pastor of the Hedley Baptist Church.

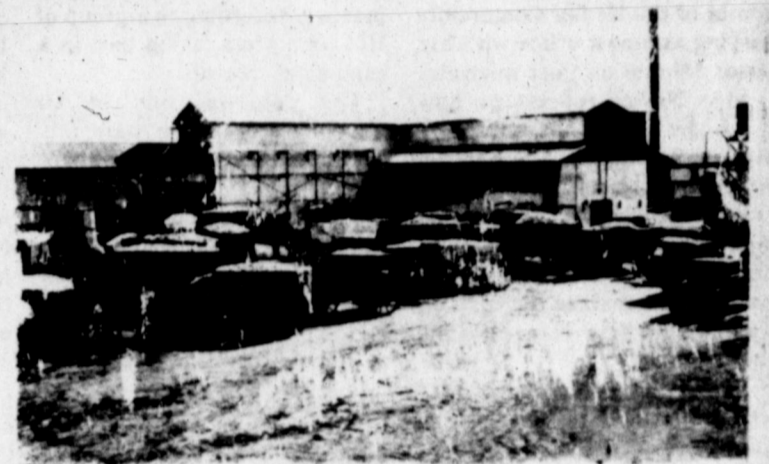

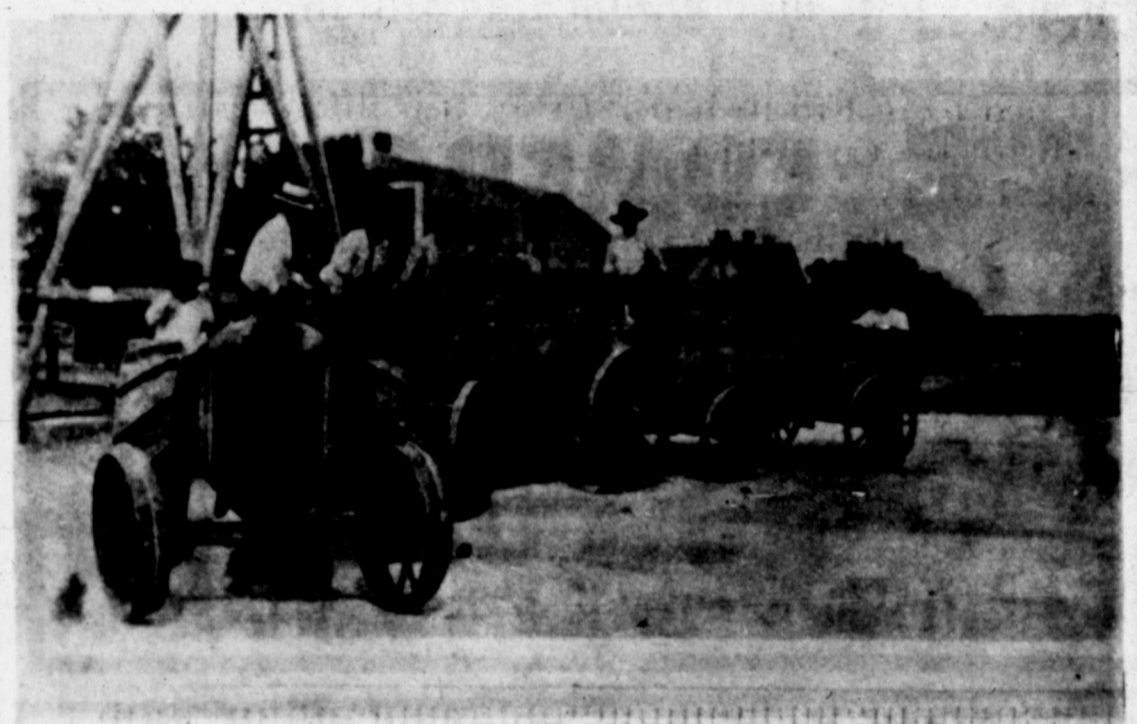

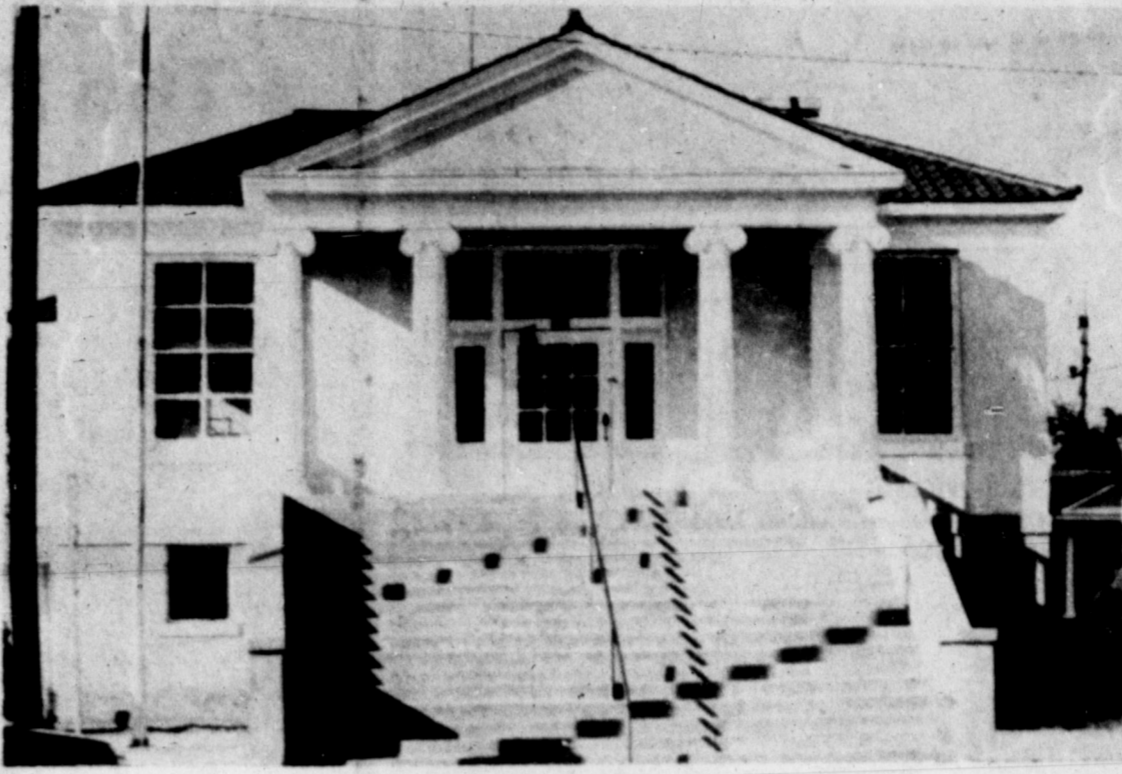
"One of his first commitments as Governor will be to require state agencies to justify current expenditures. Furthermore, any new expenditures for

Work has been completed on the Clarendon City Hall

Work has been completed on the exterior repair and painting of the city hall and the roof, wood work and walls are newly finished and in keeping with the structure of the venerable building.

Erected in 1918, and given to the civic needs and betterment of Clarendon, Mrs. Cornelia Adair, donor of the building made it possible for Clarendon to enjoy the luxury of an indoor swimming pool. The pool was part of the YMCA but was not restricted to Y membership.

Use of the facility has been varied over the years and at the present time the city hall occupies the building for the second time. Previously the upper floor was used for city business and later the offices were moved to the old red school building and ground level for greater convenience to everyone. Recently the sale of the school building was the reason for the city offices to return to the downtown site, this time on the ground floor where the library once was installed.

Other city departments and organizations have used the building also. In addition to many residents who can remember swimming in the pool as a child, a lot of them belonged to ladies clubs who met in the club room which occupied the space on the north side of the city hall office.

During the second World War the club rooms were vacated by the club women who met in their homes and the Red Cross used the room to roll bandages, pack kits and do whatever they could for the war effort.

The American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars met upstairs at one time and the Boy Scouts of America were the donees of the building, but alone could not maintain the facility.

The Clarendon Volunteer firemen have their fire station in the lower north part of the structure. Recently they worked to remodel their quarters for greater mobility with the equipment. This organization does a fine job and are charged with the responsibility of containing any fire before it does much damage.

It seems safe to say every resident of Clarendon has been served in some way by the use of this handsome building in its sixty years of service provided by the generosity of Mrs. Adair.

Melvin Boothe was the contractor for the last part of the work done on the city hall and C.R. Hunsucker assisted by Kelly Tunnell did the painting on the building. Drive by the city hall for a look at the restored exterior and be proud of the beautiful old building and the work done on it.

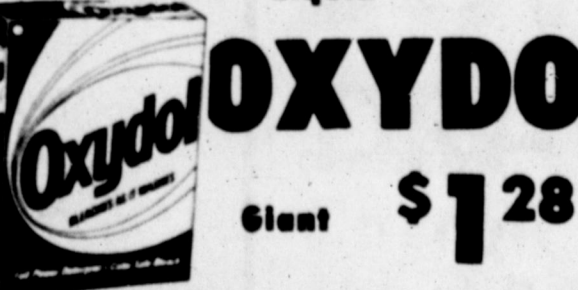

Large chunks of it came on passes to #22. He made a diving catch at the goal line with 25 seconds in the half. The QB took it in on a 1 yd. plunge and kicked the point to make it 21-0 with 23 seconds left in the Half.

The second Half opened with the Bronchos trying to gain possession with an on sides kick. However, Childress began from their 42 yd. line and eight plays later #40 Ricky Anderson took it in from 15 yds. out. With 7:32 left in the 3rd Quarter it was 28-0. The Broncho Defense was to hold them from scoring again until 1:16 was left in the game. The Bronchos Defense made two goal line stands late in the 3rd Quarter. Jimmy Lampier promoted to General Telephone Co. foreman

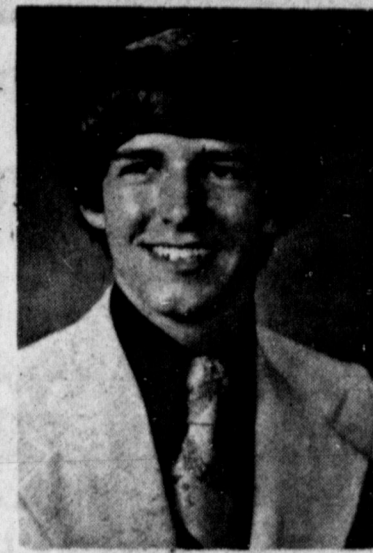
Jimmy Lampier has been promoted to installation and maintenance foreman for General Telephone Company at Clarendon, according to J.H. Davis, Division Manager.

Children's bedtime offers a "special time" for both children and parents—when parents follow some thoughtful guidelines.

Making bedtime easier on the child is the key.

Of course that idea also means avoiding struggle, conflict, fears and dread.

The following are some "easy bedtime" ideas:

- Avoid active and over-stimulating play just before bedtime. Instead give the child time to settle down with quiet, non-active play.

- Be sure the child empties his bladder before going to bed.

This special time with parents can mean a lot to young children.

- After reading out loud, give the child a favorite book to "read" alone.
- After a while, you will probably be able to pull the book out from under a sleepy head.
- Soft music also helps relax a child.

Classical music, easy-flowing folk songs or guitar music are peaceful ways to calm children for bed.

- Use a night light to add security, if the child is afraid of the dark.

As children get older, they usually outgrow this fear.

- Close the day with an "I love you."

It's a great way to assure a child before bedtime.
