

To begin the second half, with the score still 12-0, the defense stopped the Buck offense as Tommy Lane broke through to sack the quarterback and force White Deer to punt.

Lance Thornberry was responsible for most of the yardage on the next drive as he ran for 30 yards around left end and then nailed Bill Cornell in the corner of the end zone for the touchdown. The Broncs then led 18-0.
