COLLEGE STATION, March 18 -All 1941 farm-stored wheat, rye and barley loans may be extended to April 30, 1943, according to P. O. Colgin, state AAA commodity loan specialist.

Only grains in good, sound condition on which required inspection fees have been paid are included in the new regulations which will apply in certain eastern and southern areas to be announced later, he said. Present maturity date for all these loans is April 30, 1942.

Panhandle Citizens Asked to Cooperate With Flying School

LUBBOCK, March 19. - With the Lubbock Army Flying School here now training its first aviation cadet class, South Plains citizens may at any time find themselves called upon to take an active and important part in the nation's campaign to "Keep 'Em Flying."

Co-operation between civilians and Army personnel in case of airplane accidents or forced landings in this area has been asked by officials at the twin-engine flying school, who have issued an Army Air Forces Headquarters bulletin outlining the procedure for such co-operation.

Any military aircraft forced down, it is requested, should be strictly guarded against molestation by unauthorized persons after crewmen have been rescued, since it may be carrying live bombs or ammunition.

Anyone witnessing an aircraft accident, according to the bulletin, should report immediately to his local police officials, who will relay the information to the nearest Air Corps station and will provide proper protection for the scene of the accident until Army personnel arrive.

"Law enforcement officials," it continues, "can best co-operate with military authorities by assisting injured crew members, obtaining names and addresses of witnesses and making certain that no one moves any part of the plane or its equipment after crew members are rescued."

College Careers Will Begin May 27 For

School Students

CANYON, March 19.— College careers will begin May 27 for high school students who "speed up" their educations as urged by many federal agencies. Some of them will complete work for degrees before reaching the induction age of 20 years for the military services.

West Texas State's summer session has been organized to meet the needs of these beginning students, as well as others. Freshmen may start regular work in most departments and, by attending each session, complete work or degrees by mid-winter of 1945. Entering juniors and junior college graduates may finish by the summer of 1943.

The summer session will be in two terms, one of nine weeks and one of six weeks-or a total of 15 weeks. Each week will be of 51/2 days, with classes lasting one hour. In this 15-week session the student may complete approximately the same amount of work ordinarily done in a regular semester. Tuition and fees for nine weeks will be \$30 and for six weeks will be \$20.

Defense courses will be offered in many departments. Isdustrial arts, business courses, and work in first aid, safety, health, cooking, radio, and preparation for officers' training in the armed forces will be stressed. The usual summer courses also will be offered, but special classes in government, history, geography and other subjects will be added.

Porter Tomato Sure Yielder

COLLEGE STATION - The Porter tomato does what other varieties do, but outyields them and fruits while others fail.

This endorsement comes from J. F. Rosborough, horticulturist of the Texas A&M Extension Service, who urges that the variety be included in Food For Victory

The Porter, according to the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, is widely adapted, while L. F. Locke of the U. S. Southern Great Plains Field Station at Woodward, Oklahoma, has reported that the variety led all others in yield for five of the six years it was tested by 400 farmer cooperators in competition with 70 other varieties grown in the Plains region.

The principal objection to the Porter, according to Rosborough, is that it is mall in size. It is, however, excellent for juice, preserves, salads, canning whole, and high in quality for eating out of hand or for table use.

"It may not be popular with people who want tomatoes that will produce two and a half to four inch slices," the horticulturist pointed out, "but if they plant the Porter they can have tomatoes when all other varieties have failed." The variety not only succeeds in seasons when no other tomatoes fruit, but also yields over a

much longer period, he said. Rosborough recommended that the usual varieties of tomatoes be planted but that in every case the Porter be included.



This figure does not include the grain that will be needed to insure increased production of milk, eggs, and mutton, increased marketing of beef, and the usual feed for workstock

Texas farmers apparently are not only going to meet the USDA War Board's call for marketing of 2,672,694 hogs in 1942-an increase of 842,638 over 1941-but are going to overshoot the goal by a considerable margin.

It is entirely probable that Texas will produce a million hogs above the 1941 figure, according to E. M. Regenbrecht, swine husbandman of the Texas A&M College Extension Service.

Approximately 16 bushels of grain are needed to bring a hog to market weight.

Texas has no great reserves of corn under the Ever-Normal should not apply. Granary plan, as is the case in the corn-hog states. With the exception of 121,321 bushels of grain sorghums under the loan, Texas farmers will have to produce grain for hogs as they go.

Science Preparing Substitutes For War Materials

AUSTIN, March 18.-Contributions of science in preparing substitutes for strategic raw materials were detailed before a University of Texas audience this Barker. week (Tuesday, March 17) by Dr. Harry N. Holmes, president of the American Chemical Society.

Speaking before the Central Texas Section of the Society, Dr. of chemistry at Oberlin College, gave special attention to the part being played by science in developing synthetic rubber, toluene, formaldehyde, chlorine, silk, aluminum, magnesium, mercury, manganese, chromium, steel, mica and cork.

"We are increasing our stock pile of these natural raw materials rapidly at present, but we began too late," Dr. Holmes declared. "Scientists had pointed out the threatened shortage but these warnings went unheeded, with the result we are now having to throw every ounce of scientific effort into development of acceptable substitutes."

Land Use Planning Committees Active

COLLEGE STATION, March 14 -Although Texas county and community land use planning committees engaged in a large number of activities in 1941, their principal work was on local problems with resultant plans put into action whenever possible.

Among those activities was the organization of approved variety wheat counties in the Panhandle area, says C. Hohn of the A&M College Extension Service who acts as land use planning leader. County committees sought the varieties adapted to produce the highest quality wheat, and at the same time give a high acre yield. It is estimated that 95 percent of the wheat sowed in Hansford County, one of the leaders in the movement, was Turkey, Tenmarq, or Kanred, the selected varieties. A definite increase in cash return to farmers resulted.
