## No motive known in the murder

Police in Clarendon investigated a fatal stabbing of a 57 year old man in Clarendon on Thursday, November 25. It is believed the stabbing occurred either Wednesday afternoon or before 1 a.m. on Thursday.

The victim, who was identified as Louis Mathews by a sister later in the week, was discovered in his residence about 3 p.m. on Thursday, November 25. There was no heat or other utilities in the house, and it appeared that stabbing was the cause of death. Two stab wounds to the abdomen were found, according to Bill Hodges, Chief of Police, for the city of Clarendon, M.O. Weatherly, Donley County Justice of the Peace ordered an autopsy according to Hodges.

### Bryon Baldwin services held

Bryon Baldwin, 85, long-time community leader and local historian, died Saturday in Amarillo.

Services were at 2 p.m. Monday, December 1, in the First Baptist Church with the Rev. O.K. Bowen, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery by Spicer Funeral Home.

Mr. Baldwin was one of the founders of the Hall County Heritage Hall, a Memphis museum. He was

active in the hall, directing tours, giving slide presentations and recounting Memphis-area history to visitors.

"Bryon is a walking scrapbook," Bill Combs, editor of the Memphis Democrat newspaper, once said. Mr. Baldwin said his local historical knowledge included four or five generations.

Mr. Baldwin wrote a column in the Memphis Democrat. Entitled "B.B. Shots," the column was published weekly. He submitted his final column last week, shortly before he became ill and was hospitalized.

He earned 50-year pins in both the Memphis Rotary Club and the Masonic Temple.

Mr. Baldwin was a member of the First Baptist Church. He was a deacon of the church. In 1965, he compiled a history of the church to commemorate its 75th anniversary.

He owned and operated the Baldwin Variety Store until his retirement in 1965.

The store had belonged to his father, who had brought the family to Memphis from Woods Post Office in 1907 to open the dry goods store. But his father lost the dry goods store in 1929 as a result of the Great Depression. The younger Baldwin bought the store in 1932, operating it until 1953, when a fire destroyed the building. He rebuilt the store as a variety store.

Mr. Baldwin married Willie Mae Thompson in 1917 at Memphis. He also maintained farming interests in Hall County. He was a past president of the Memphis Chamber of Commerce and was honored with a community service award by the chamber in 1976.

Survivors include his wife, of the home; two sons, Dr. Jack Baldwin of Clarendon and Dr. James Baldwin of Dallas; a brother, Dr. Alvin Baldwin of Dallas; two sisters, Mrs. T.L. Rouse of Memphis and Mrs. J.O. Haynes of Tyler; seven grandchildren and two great

grandchildren. Casket bearers were Ben Parks, Hubert Jones, Gene Lindsey, Robert Breedlove, Wendell Harrison, Homer Tribble, Edwin Thompson and Robert Moss.

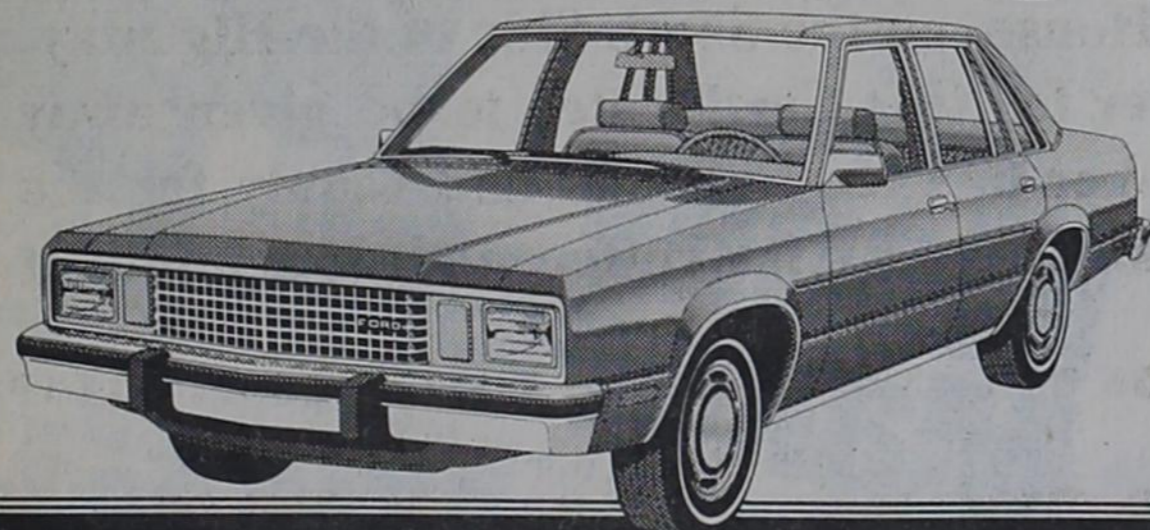

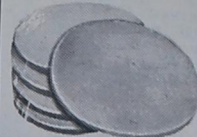

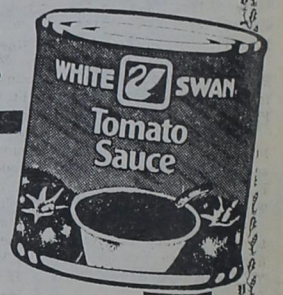

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### Holiday tips on mail order by buying

1. Examine the offer carefully. If it sounds too good to be true, it often is. Beware of exaggerated claims on products or price. If the claims relate to your health or physical appearance, your family doctor may be a good source of advice as to the likely value of the product. Be particularly wary of claims by unknown sellers that they have achieved a "scientific discovery" that somehow eluded the big companies or established professionals. Read advertising claims for what they actually say rather than what you might hope they offer.

2. Do not rely solely on a picture of the item. Note the description, size, weight, color, and contents. Be sure to completely describe the article or service you are purchasing in the order.

3. Give explicit instructions.

4. When ordering holiday gifts by mail be sure to do so well in advance to avoid heavy seasonal mail volume. If the company offers such as service, be sure to specify whether or not the gift should be sent directly to the recipient. Clearly indicate

recipient's name and address and how the gift card should be signed.

5. Look for a company policy on returns. If the policy is not stated, ask for it.

6. If a substitute is acceptable, indicate it.

7. Be sure to enclose shipping, handling, or tax charges with the order.

8. Do not send cash with the order. Pay only by check, money order, or, if acceptable, credit card.

9. Keep a record of the order, including the name and address of the company with which you are dealing.

10. If there are any doubts about a company, check it before placing an order. You might be guided on a company's reliability by inquiries to the Better Business Bureau and Chamber of Commerce in the area of the company, or you can consult your state or local consumer protection office. Because a product is advertised in a responsible newspaper or magazine, do not assume the claims have necessarily been verified by the publishers. In most cases, the publishers have no choice but to assume the advertiser is honest. Similarly, the fact that a product is offered for sale by mail does not mean the Postal Service has verified the advertiser's claims.

### Tax Office staffing explained

Tax appraisal of property, assessment, and tax collection will all be combined in one central office serving all of the Donley County District. Its purpose is to improve the record accuracy and increase efficiency.

Donley County Appraisal District has been created by recent Texas legislative provisions to implement the appraisal of all property within Donley County. It is to assess market values on all property and have these values available for use by all local Tax Entities. All of the seven local Tax Entities have joined with the District in a contract with Charles SoRelle to do the real property appraisal work to be completed by December 31, 1981.

The local Tax Entities also have joined with the District to have all property appraisal and all tax assessment and collection done from one central office beginning in 1982. Further, they have employed Charles SoRelle to be the Chief Appraiser and Tax Office Administrator for a three year period including the calendar years of '82, '83 and '84.

Although January of 1982 is beyond the immediate future, the District is now accepting applications for the deputy positions in the Combined Tax Office. There will be four full time and possibly one or more part time positions. The Chief Deputy will be a work-management position under the Appraiser-Administrator; the Chief Deputy will be responsible for the daily office management, accounting, and share in the assessment-collection work load when time permits.

Deputies will do the various work duties of a tax office, including but not limited to record keeping, revision, statement preparation, receipt recording, filing and tax payer assistance. All positions require the use of logic, basic arithmetic, reading, writing, knowledge of ad valorem tax theory, and a good and cheerful attitude with people; some positions require typewriter and other office machine skills. Pay will be commensurate with education, experience, ability and desire to do tax office work. Full time deputies will be salaried employees while part time assistants will be on hourly pay.

Application forms are available at the Appraisal District Office in the northwest room of the Courthouse Annex.

### PHYSICAL FITNESS

One reason many physical fitness programs fail is that they're boring. Jogging and calisthenics are both beneficial, but because they're repetitive, many people lose interest after a while.

There's one sport that's considered anything but boring and can satisfy both those who like competitive and non-competitive sports. It's playing with a flying disc such as the Frisbee disc. "Frisbee" is the brand name and registered trademark of the Wham-O Mfg. Co. It should not be used to describe other disc-shaped toys.

But a Frisbee disc is more than a toy. The sport of playing with a Frisbee disc has thousands tossing and catching for fun and in competition.

Though the activity provides good exercise, few think it is boring. It's always changing. A Frisbee disc can be thrown and caught in a variety of ways.

Almost limitless challenge is presented by different established techniques, and a few you can develop on your own.

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### Not too soon to plan for the Christmas puppy

With Christmas but a few weeks away, now is a good time to give serious thought to a Christmas puppy, according to Dr. Charles Banta, Director of the ALPO Center for Advanced Pet Study.

A puppy is not always just a puppy. There are 120 different breeds of dogs recognized by the American Kennel Club. Breeds range from the tiny Chihuahua weighing from two to four pounds, up to the Great Dane which will stand two and one-half feet tall and weigh in at 130 pounds when fully grown.

What is the right breed for a family? Dr. Banta, gives this advice: "In the short run it is a matter of family preference. But consideration should be given to what size the dog will be when it is fully grown. All puppies are fun and a delight. Bear in mind, though, that today's roly-poly puppy can grow up to be a big dog in just a few months."

"The puppy will become a new member of the family. Who will care for and train the new puppy? What about housebreaking and training to the leash? This is essential if the puppy is to take its place as a member of the family, and not be a public nuisance."

"Dogs housed in city apartments must be walked at least twice a day. Suburban communities, for the most part, no longer allow dogs to roam free. Pets are a definite responsibility. The family must decide if it wants a large or small responsibility."

Finally, Dr. Banta adds,

Consult a breeder once the family has decided on a particular dog. Chances are that a veterinarian can recommend a breeder. Breeders are truly fond of their breeds. They know the joys and limitations of the breed when fully grown. The breeder can and will guide in pet selection, especially if this is the first puppy at home.

A puppy's age is important. Puppies should be no younger than ten to twelve weeks old, according to Dr. Banta. The puppy should be strong, healthy and alert, and raised in a good kennel situation where the puppy has received love and care.

Veterinarians are important. Decide on a small animal veterinarian in your community. He can further advise the family on pet selection, and guide you on the vaccinations necessary to protect the puppy from diseases, proper feeding to keep the puppy happy, healthy and growing.

Many good books are available on the care and training of dogs and puppies. Breed books are also available on the history and growth of the breed. A family will do well to purchase one or more of these dog care books before the puppy comes home.

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### WHEN TO COUGH

When secretions build up in the lungs and windpipe, the body protects itself by activating the "cough reflex". In this way, mucus and other materials are moved up and out of the lungs. If coughing did not occur, it would be possible to literally drown in one's own secretions.

Some degree of coughing is desirable in many conditions including asthma, chronic bronchitis, and cystic fibrosis. If coughing makes a person tired or sore or deprives one of rest, it may be good to suppress the cough. Suppression of cough is also wise after surgical procedures or in certain eye disorders where coughing could damage blood vessels.

Cough may often be alleviated by simply sucking on hard candy or nonmedicated "cough drops". This coats and soothes the throat. More difficult coughs sometimes respond to dextromethorphan which is found in many prescription and non prescription cough formulas.

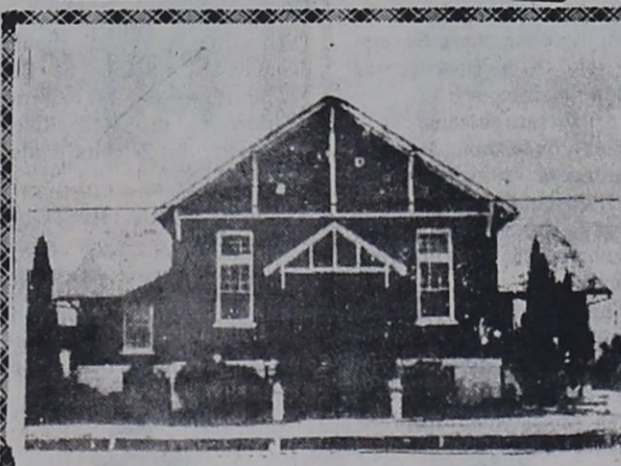
For severe coughs or when suppression is essential, the narcotic-type cough medicines are required. A prescription is required for the most effective (and most habit forming) products.

Most of us experience excessive and troublesome coughing from time to time. When coughing continues for long periods or if more than a trace of blood is produced, a physician's examination is in order. Cigarette smokers should be especially concerned with a cough that continues for weeks or months.

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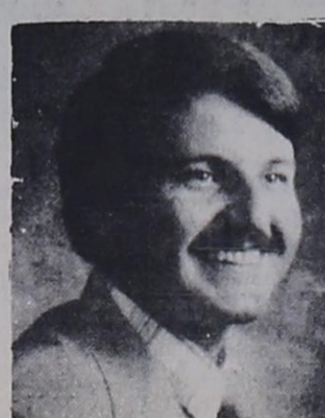

## Advisory Committee named

The Red River Authority has the responsibility for water quality planning along the Texas portion of the Red River Basin from the New Mexico state line to the Arkansas state line.

Cities, unincorporated communities, lakeside developments and densely populated rural areas will be included in the study. Discharge from wastewater treatment plants, agricultural run-off and other possible pollution sources will be investigated and areas of need identified.

Detailed studies will be made for these areas and various alternatives developed. These alternatives will include recommendations for a management plan for the area and the best type of facilities needed.

## RECREATION TIPS

Off-highway motorcycling consumes about half the energy burned by a TV set in a year, and about the same amount of energy required to play 2 1/2 radios for a year.

About 12 million enthusiasts use 5 million motorcycles off-highway for economical recreation and competitive purposes every year.

**Let My people grow!**  
Going through an old magazine the other day I noticed an intriguing article by Dorothy Haskin on the dwarf trees in Japan.

Imagine a pine tree, no more than 3 feet high, growing out of a shallow dish. It sounds incredible, but these miniature pines look exactly like their larger counterparts. Their small trunks are gnarled and twisted. The needles are perfect but tiny.

Or it may be a maple tree with tiny, autumn-tinted leaves; or a rosebush with wee petals.

The secret of this dwarf beauty is in the roots. The young plant is put into a small dish, and from time to time it is taken out and the roots trimmed. The plant grows in beauty and resemblance, but it cannot grow larger than its roots permit. I think it's pathetic to see a

tree that could be tall and majestic cramped into this small size. Yet many Christians are like these dwarf trees. They have the potential to grow tall and strong—persons with whom the Lord could be pleased. But instead they are miniature Christians. They are fine, as far as they have grown, but their roots are cramped. They have not followed the verse of Scripture that says to "take root downward, and bear fruit upward" (2 Kings 19:30).

The secret of growth, then, is in your roots. You must not cramp them. Reach out into the things of the Lord, into His Word, into a life of praise and prayer, into Christian service, into a greater involvement in carrying out the Great Commission; so that you may be not a dwarf Christian, but a growing one.

Do you want to change your life? All it takes is a solid understanding of what stewardship is all about.

Stewardship comes to grips with the question of ownership. To whom do you belong? To whom have you surrendered your will? Who calls the shots in your life?

Jesus Christ bought us with His blood. Unfortunately He hasn't had His money's worth. He paid for all, but He

has had but a fragment of our time, our energy, our earnings.

Stewardship means recognizing your obligations to God because of Calvary. The Cross is big enough to cover all our sins and to pay all our debts. And God asks that you, in turn, love Him with all your heart, soul, mind, and strength (Mark 12:30).

Stewardship means that God owns you and is counting on you to become an instrument through which He can love and save the world. It's as simple as that, but it will redirect your entire life.

Are you serving God "full time"? If not, whom do you serve the rest of the time? Being a Christian is a full-time occupation.

Yield your little to God and watch Him work. Let Him use you the way you are. Let Him make the changes He wants to make.

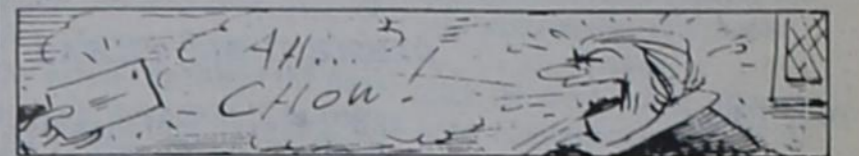

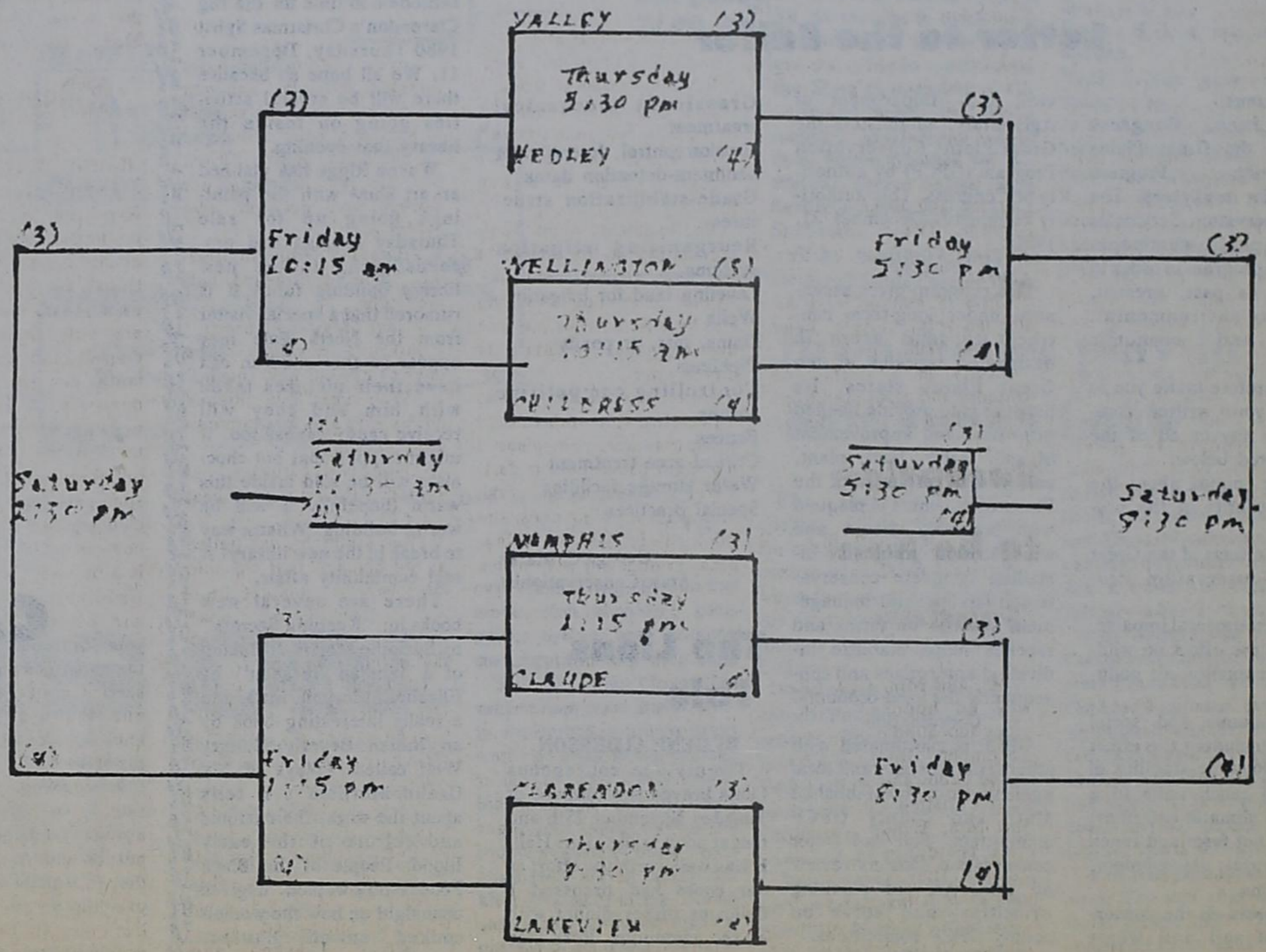

**Letter to the Editor**

Dear Citizens:

Last June, Congress extended the Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP) for ten years. The Soil Conservation Service is seeking public comments about the program in order to evaluate its past, present, and future environmental, social, and economic impacts.

We therefore invite you to give us your written comments on any or all of the issues listed below:

I. Your opinion about the overall benefits of the program.

II. The effects of the Great Plains Conservation Program.

A. Environmental impacts, including the effect on wildlife, water quality, air pollution.

B. Economic and social impacts, including the effect on the economic stability of farm and ranch units in a region of climatic extremes; effect on net farm and ranch profits, rural development, small farms.

C. Impacts on the conservation of soil and water resources.

III. The need for any new program initiatives, direction, or management to improve operations.

IV. Any problems that have hindered or delayed achievement of GPCP goals.

V. Possible alternatives for implementing GPCP more efficiently.

These are some facts that explain the programs in more detail.

The Soil Conservation Ser-

vice, U.S. Department of Agriculture, administers the Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP) by authority of Congress. This authority terminates December 31, 1991.

Purpose

This program gives assistance under long-term contracts to land users in designated counties of ten Great Plains states. Its purpose is to provide needed protection and improvement of soil, water, land, plant, and wildlife resources of the Plains area, which is plagued with recurring drought and wind erosion problems. Installing complete conservation treatment and management systems on farms and ranches helps stabilize individual enterprises and consequently the local economy.

Coordination

GPCP is coordinated with other federal, state, and local agencies through established state and county GPCP committees. Soil and water conservation districts review all contracts, set planning priorities, and serve on county GPCP committees.

Other facts

To-date, 16,234 contracts have been signed in Texas on 20,914,717 acres.

Texas has 147 counties participating in the program, 24 of which were added during 1980.

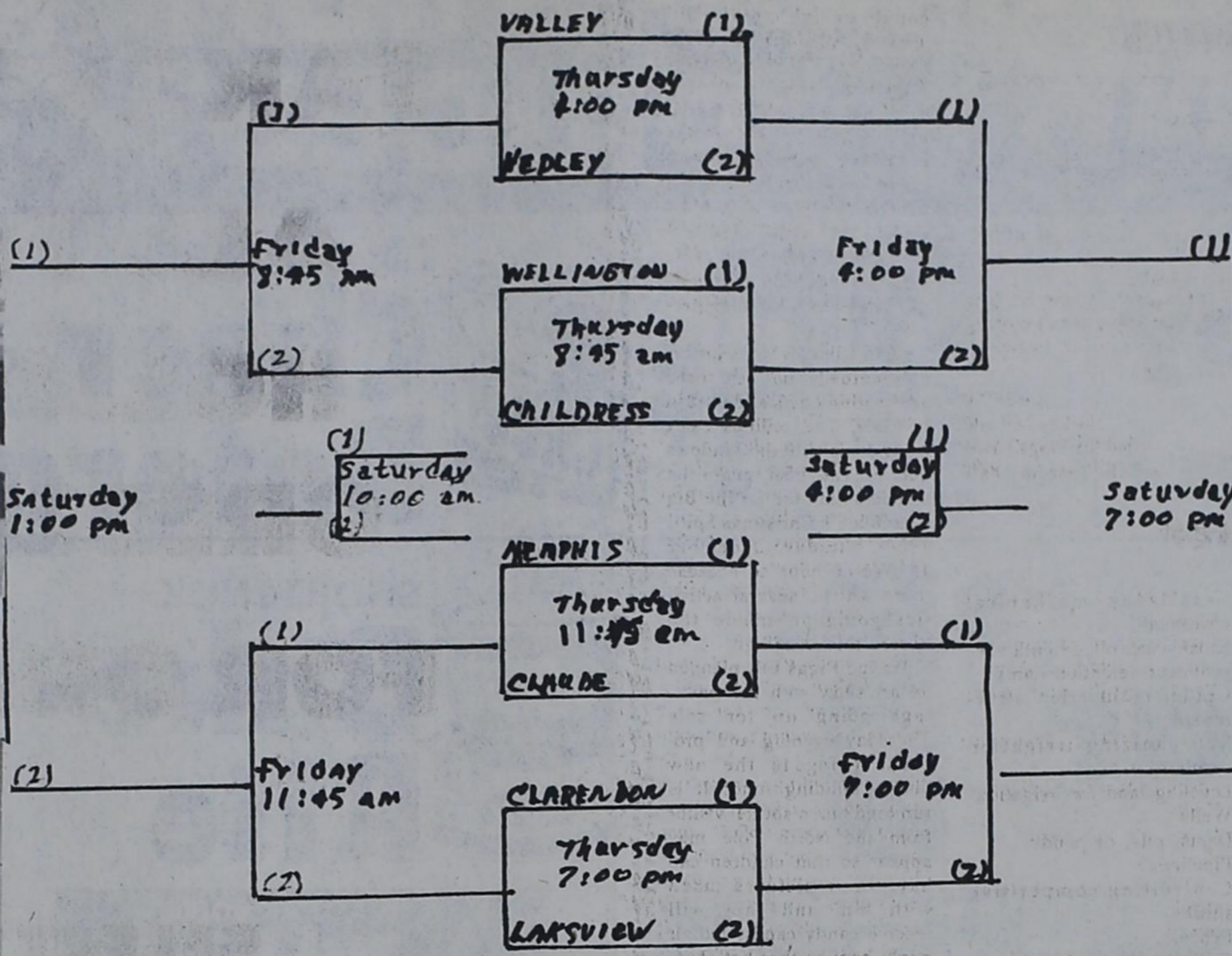

## HEATS ON

Let's talk about baking Christmas gifts to give to our friends and neighbors or to have around the house when all of the parties and

company begins to roll in. I think I might take a couple of columns to write about holiday baking, so if you have a particular recipe you'd like me to run, call the newspaper or bring it by and we'll sure be happy to include it.

Sometimes you make a recipe just as it tells you to do and it still fails. That can be a kitchen disaster this time of year! Let me suggest some things to check before you get going with your baking.

EGGS: Unless the recipe specifies otherwise, use eggs graded "extra large" because you will need that much yolk to get a lovely cake. Cookies aren't quite so critical with the kind of egg you use. Some folks I know use a medium egg and add an extra yolk to equal an extra large egg. You can freeze egg whites and egg yolks in custard cups. This comes in handy because in the summer you will have a lot of egg whites left over from ice cream making to use in your winter baking.

FRUIT: How many times have your raisins been bone hard in your cookies? The reason may have been that they weren't soft to begin with. Be sure your currents and raisins are soft by boiling them in water for a few minutes. Drain them and dry them off. If you are putting raisins in bread or cake, roll them in flour first so that they don't all settle to the bottom but will spread themselves out evenly.

OATMEAL: Always remember that when the recipe calls for oatmeal it means uncooked and never use instant oatmeal in cookies. Oatmeal that cooks in 1 minute is just passable, the 3-5 minute kinds are better because they'll be crunchy.

SPICES: Did you notice that our cinnamon seems weak lately? That is because our main source of cinnamon used to come from Vietnam. But, take heart, you can get a terrific cinnamon by writing to Paprikas Weiss Importer, 1546 Second Ave. NY, NY 10028, it comes from mainland China and is strong and flavorful.

To keep your spices lasting longer, it is suggested that you store them in the refrigerator or the freezer. If that isn't possible, keep the lids tightly shut and store them in a dark, cool place. A drawer is fine and preferable

over a spice rack close to the stove. You shouldn't keep spices over a year because they begin to lose their zap. SUGAR: I didn't know this until it happened just recently, but lumps in brown sugar won't go away in the baking! I had a particularly sweet bite into a cake with brown sugar in it; I hadn't sifted the brown sugar and there was a huge lump still in the batter after baking. Sifting brown sugar and powdered sugar is necessary in order for it to evenly be dissolved in your batter.

Well, those are a few hints that may help your next batch of cookies or breads tastier. Remember, dear readers, please send in some of your holiday recipes so we can all share the Christmas spirit.

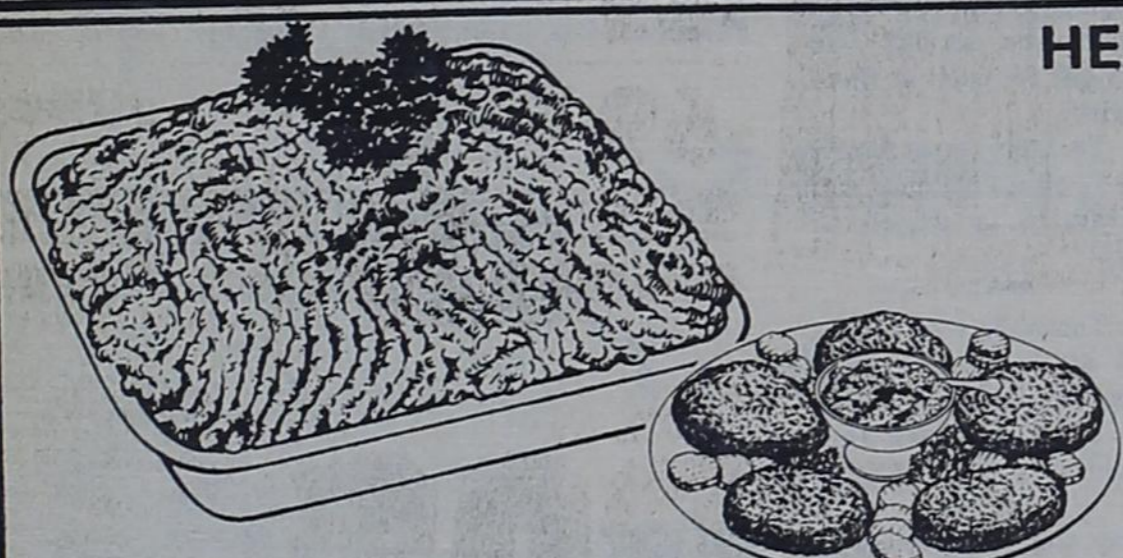
