Tax Office staffing explained

Tax appraisal of property, assessment, and tax collection will all be combined in one central office serving all of the Donley County District. Its purpose is to improve the record accuracy and increase efficiency.

Donley County Appraisal District has been created by recent Texas legislative provisions to implement the appraisal of all property within Donley County. It is to assess market values on all property and have these values available for use by all local Tax Entities. All of the seven local Tax Entities have joined with the District in a contract with Charles SoRelle to do the real property appraisal work to be completed by December 31,

The local Tax Entities also have joined with the District to have all property appraisal and all tax assessment and collection done from one central office beginning in 1982. Further, they have employed Charles SoRelle to be the Chief Appraiser and Tax Office Administrator for a three year period including the calendar years of '82, '83

Although January of 1982 is beyond the immediate future, the District is now accepting applications for the deputy positions in the Combined Tax Office. There will be four full time and possibly one or more part time positions. The Chief Deputy will be a work-man-Appraiser-Administrator; the Chief Deputy will be responsible for the daily office management, accounting, and share in the assessment-collection work load when time permits.

Deputies will do the various work duties of a tax office, including but not limited to record keeping, revision, statement preparation, receipt recording, filing and tax payer assistance. All positions require the use of ogic, basic arithmetic, reading, writing, knowledge of ad valorum tax theory, and a good and cheerful attitude with people; some positions require typewriter and other office machine skills. Pay will be commensurate with education, experience, ability and desire to do tax office work. Full time deputies will be salaried employees while part time assistants will be

With Christmas but a few weeks away, now is a good time to give serious thought to a Christmas puppy, according to Dr. Charles Banta, Director of the ALPO Center for Advanced Pet Study.

A puppy is not always just a puppy. There are 120 different breeds of dogs recognized by the American Kennel Club. Breeds range from the tiny Chihuahua weighing from two to four pounds, up to the Great Dane which will stand two and one/half feet tall and weigh in at 130 pounds when fully

What is the right breed for a family: Dr. Banta, gives this advice: "In the short run it is a matter of family preference. But consideration should be given to what size the dog will be when it is fully grown. All puppies are fun and a delight. Bear in mind, though, that today's roly-poly puppy can grow up to be a big dog in just a few months.

"The puppy will become a new member of the family. Who will care for and train the new puppy? What about housebreaking and training to the leash? This is essential if the puppy is to take its place as a member of the family, and not be a public

'Dogs housed in city apartments must be walked at least twice a day. Suburban communities, for the most part, no longer allow dogs to roam free. Pets are a definite responsibility. The family must decide if it wants a large or small responsibili-

Finally, Dr. Banta adds,

Consult a breeder once the family has decided on a particular dog. Chances are that a veterinarian can recommend a breeder. Breeders are truly fond of their breeds. They know the joys and limitations - of the breed when fully grown. The breeder can and will guide in pet selection, especially if this is the first puppy at

A puppy's age is important. Puppies should be no vounger than ten to twelve weeks old, according to Dr. Banta. The puppy should be strong, healthy and alert, and raised in a good kennel situation where the puppy

has received love and care Veterinarians are important. Decide on a small animal veterinarian in your community. He can further advise the family on pet selection, and guide you on the vaccinations necessary to protect the puppy from diseases, proper feeding to keep the puppy happy,

healthy and growing. Many good books are available on the care and training of dogs and puppies. Breed books are also available on the history and growth of the breed. A family will do well to purchase one or more of these dog care books before the puppy comes

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

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WHEN TO COUGH

When secretions build up in the lungs and windpipe, the body protects itself by activating the "cough reflex". In this way, mucus and other materials are moved up and out of the lungs. If coughing did not occur, it would be possible to literally drown in one's own secretions.

Some degree of coughing is desirable in many conditions including asthma, chronic bronchitis, and cystic fibrosis. If coughing makes a person tired or sore or deprives one of rest, it may be good to suppress the cough. Suppression of cough is also wise after surgical procedures or in certain eye disorders where coughing could damage blood vessels.

Cough may often be alleviated by simply sucking on hard candy or nonmedicated "cough drops". This coats and soothes the throat. More difficult coughs sometimes respond to dextromethorphan which is found in many prescription and non prescription cough formulas.

For severe coughs or when suppression is essential, the narcotic-type cough medicines are required. A prescription is required for the most effective (and most habit forming) products.

Most of us experience excessive and troublesome coughing from time to time. When coughing continues for long periods or if more than a trace of blood is produced, a physician's examination is in order. Cigarette smokers should be especially concerned with a cough that continues for weeks or months.

Advisory Committee named

Two Clarendon residents have been appointed to the public advisory committee for a water quality management study of the Red River Basin in Texas.

The study will investigate sources of pollution and recommend facility needs and management planning necessary for a high water quality through the year 2000, according to Fred Parkey, General Manager of the Red River Authority of

Parkey announced the committee members November 11, 1979. They are as follows by category:

Private citizens James W. Dunn, Retired, Clarendon.

Economic Interest Jimmy Kuhn, Gen. Mgr. Greenbelt Water Authority, Clarendon.

The Red River Authority has the responsibility for water quality planning along the Texas portion of the Red River Basin from the New Mexico state line to the Arkansas state line.

Cities, unincorporated communities, lakeside developments and densely populated rural areas will be included in the study. Discharge from wastewater treatment plants, agricultural run-off and other possible pollution sources will be investigated and areas of need identified.

Detailed studies will be made for these areas and various alternatives developed. These alternatives will include recommendations for a management plan for the area and the best type of facilities needed.

Example: a typical off-highway motorcycle uses 18.8 gallons of gas a year about a third of the amount wasted by an untuned automobile in the same period.



According to the Motorcycle Industry Council, offhighway motorcycling in a single year uses just 1/10th of one percent of the gasoline consumed in the U.S., and 1/100th of one percent of the total energy.

Off-highway motorcycling consumes about half the energy burned by a TV set in a year, and about the same amount of energy required to play 2 1/2 radios for a year.

About 12 million enthusiasts use 5 million motorcycles off-highway for economical recreation and competitive purposes every



Let My people grow! Going through an old magazine the other day I noticed an intriguing article by Dorothy Haskin on the dwarf trees in Japan.

Imagine a pine tree, no more than 3 feet high, growing out of a shallow dish. It sounds incredible, but these miniature pines look exactly like their larger counterparts. Their small trunks are gnarled and twisted. The needles are perfect but tiny.

Or it may be a maple tree with tiny, autumn-tinted leaves; or a rosebush with

wee petals. The secret of this dwarf beauty is in the roots. The young plant is put into a small dish, and from time to time it is taken out and the roots trimmed. The plant grows in beauty and resemblance, but it cannot grow larger than its roots permit.

tree that could be tall and majestic cramped into this small size. Yet many Christians are like these dwarf trees. They have the potential to grow tall and strong-persons with whom the Lord could be pleased. But instead they are miniature Christians. They are fine, as far as they have grown, but their roots are cramped. They have not followed the verse of Scripture that says to "take root downward, and bear fruit upward" (2 Kings

19:30). The secret of growth, then, is in your roots. You must not cramp them. Reach out into the things of the Lord, into His Word, into a life of praise and prayer, into Christian service, into a greater involvement in carrying out the Great Commission; so that you may be not a dwarf

By KATIE DVORAK Let's talk about baking Christmas gifts to give to our friends and neighbors or to have around the house when all of the parties and

company begins to roll in. I think I might take a couple of columns to write about holiday baking, so if you have a particular recipe you'd like me to run, call the newspaper or bring it by and we'll sure be happy to include it.

Sometimes you make a recipe just as it tells you to do and it still fails. That can be a kitchen disaster this time of year! Let me suggest some things to check before you get going with your baking. EGGS: Unless the recipe

specifies otherwise, use eggs graded "extra large" because you will need that much yolk to get a lovely cake. Cookies aren't quite so critical with the kind of egg you use. Some folks I know use a medium egg and add an extra yolk to equal a extra large egg. You can freeze egg whites and egg yolks in custard cups. This comes in handy because in the summer you will have a lot of egg whites left over from ice cream making to use in your

winter baking. FRUIT: How many times have your raisins been bone hard in your cookies? The reason may have been that they weren't soft to begin with. Be sure your currents and raisins are soft by boiling them in water for a few minutes. Drain them and dry them off. If you are putting raisins in bread or cake, roll them in flour first so that they don't all settle to the bottom but will spread them-

selves out evenly. OATMEAL: Always remember that when the recipe calls for oatmeal it means uncooked and never use instant oatmeal in cookies. Oatmeal that cooks in 1 minute is just passable, the 3-5 minute kinds are better because they'll be crunchy.

SPICES: Did you notice that our cinnamon seems weak lately? That is because our main source of cinnamon used to come from Vietnam. But, take heart, you can get a terrific cinnamon by writing to Paprikas Weiss Importer, 1546 Second Ave. NY, NY 10028, it comes from mainland China and is strong and flavorful.

To keep your spices lasting longer, it is suggested that you store them in the refrigerator or the freezer. If that isn't possible, keep the lids tightly shut and store them in a dark, cool place. A drawer is fine and preferable

over a spice rack close to the stove. You shouldn't keep spices over a year because

they begin to lose their zap. SUGAR: I didn't know this until it happened just recently, but lumps in brown sugar won't go away in the baking! I had a particularly sweet bite into a cake with brown sugar in it; I hadn't sifted the brown sugar and there was a huge lump still in the batter after baking. Sifting brown sugar and powdered sugar is necessary in order for it to evenly be dissolved in your batter.

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
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
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
