Cotton growers and ginners are hard at it harvesting the cotton crop which was late maturing, but which also had a late fall to help some.

Earl Shields, of the Paymaster Gin in Lelia Lake reported that he wa sending cotton from his gin to the Paymaster at Brice and Memphis to avoid a bottleneck and help his customers.

When he reported earlier in the week they had ginned 2700 bales there and had 800 on the yard. Help is on the way from the south plains, he said in the way of a module builder. It will 14 bale per acre less than

estimated. The crop is still above average in yield but the low mike is resulting in a \$40 to

\$45 per bale loss to the grower. This is the margin of profit for

#### **Energy conference slated**

The farmer's increasing con-cern over the nation's energy supply will be approached from two directions--as a liability and as a potential asset--during the Energy for Agriculture Confer-ence to be held here Tuesday, December 11. December 11.

December 11.

Finding alternative fuels for agricultural use and using agricultural products as sources of energy will be among the topics of the conference which begins at 8:30 a.m. It will be held at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and sity Agricultural Research and Extension Center, 6500 Amaril-lo Blvd. West. The conference is being sponsored by the Panhandle Economic Program and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said Paul Gross, district Extension agent.

The current energy situation will be reviewed by Dr. Otto Doering, agricultural economist at Purdue University, Lafayette, Ind. Alternative fuels for agriculture will be discussed by Dr. Seeper Bage of the Canter Dr. Spencer Baen of the Center for Energy and Mineral Resour-ces at Texas A&M University, College Station.

Legislators from two states will discuss energy legislation and opportunities. Kansas State Rep. Dean Shelar, of Minneola, will explore gasohol from the standpoint of fuel and as a cash crop. Texas State Sen. Bob Price of Pampa will report on energy legislation in the Lone Star State.

#### Ginners get temporary reprieve

The National Cotton Council has received a letter from officials of the U.S. Labor Department stating that cotton ginners temporarily will not be cited under provisions of the cited under provisions of the Farm Labor Contractor Regis-

The Council earlier had objected to Labor Department enforcement of the new law, because farmers, ginners, and certain other employers are

Herbert J. Cohen, assistant administrator of the Labor Department's wage and hour division, said in the letter that

ndependent

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certain sections of the law were under review. "Based on this review, it has been decided to restudy the department's posi tion and to issue a clear opinion on these sections of the act.'

He added, "Until such time as the department issues the opinion, enforcement activity under the act will be suspended in the activity in the suspended in the activity is industry." in the cotton gin industry.

Cohen's letter also said advice and assistance from ginners will be sought by the department during the course of the study. He indicated that the Labor Department plans to meet with ginners "to facilitate with ginners achieving maximum voluntary compliance with the act.'

After numerous ginners were cited for failing to register, the Council urged the Senate to intervene and 52 Senators signed a letter to Labor Secre tary Ray Marshall expressing activities against exempt

The Council said it will continue to monitor developments and will work with Labor Department officials to seek permanent relieffor ginners and other agricultural employers.



#### Lice on cattle

Lice cost U.S. cattlement about \$67 million last year, so it's important to control them, says Ronald Gooch, Donley

County agent.

Lice begin to reproduce rapidly with the onset of cool weather, so peak populations on early spring. Uncontrolled lice can soon infest a whole herd because with cold weather, cattle tend to bunch up more so that the pests can move easily from one animal to another. Heavy hair coats on animals during cold weather also afford protection for the parasites and allow for increased reproduc-

Both types of lice-bloodsucking and biting-infest cattle.
Sucking lice pierce the animal's skin and suck blood while biting lice feed on particles of hair, scale, scab and skin esudation, explains Gooch. Lice infestations irritate ani-

Lice infestations irritate animals, causing itching, scratching and rubbing on fences or anything else available. This produces denuded areas, bruises and lacerations on the affected animal. Heavily infested animals will have an inhelifty appearance and will unthrifty appearance and will suffer weight reduction, de-creased milk production, ane-mia or even death. Lice infested animals may also be more

subject to infectious diseases.

subject to infectious diseases. Heavy lice infestations often stunt calves.

Spraying or dipping infested animals with the proper insecticide is the most effective means of controlling lice, says Gooch. However, properly placed and maintained dust bags offer effective control and save both time and labor. Position dust bags prior to lice buildup so that cattle can become accustomed cattle can become accustomed to using the bags. A dust bag station should serve about 30 head. Depending on cattle size, place the bags so that they hang 18-24 inches above the ground. Forced-use of dust bags, where they are placed so that cattle must pass under them to get or water, begin to control lice sooner than those used free-

sooner than those used free-choice. By allowing a two-to-three week adjustment period, free-choice bags can be about as effective as forced-use types.

In a spraying or dipping program an animal must receive a thorough soaking in each of two applications 14-18 days apart to effectively control lice, contends Gooch. The second spray or dip will kill any lice hatching from eggs that were laid prior to the first spraying. When spraying, use a high pressure (250 pounds per square inch) and thoroughly wet animals to the skin.

Livestock and Poultry" at the

nsecticide container and pay particular attention to warnings, estrictions and waiting periods, especially if some of the cattle are being prepared for slaugher, cautions Gooch.
