## Lisa McAnear to be in National Shorthorn LASSIE Queen Contest

Lisa McAnear will be in Louisville, Kentucky November 9th through 13th. As Texas Shorthorn LASSIE Queen, she will be vying for the National Shorthorn LASSIE Queen title. There will be sixteen state LASSIE organizations which is the women's auxiliary organization of the American and State Shorthorn Associations.

Louisville is the scene of the National Shorthorn Show and Convention. While there, the girls will be treated to a tour of the city, enjoy "South Pacific" at a dinner playhouse, and the crowning of the queen will take place at the annual National Shorthorn Banquet and Dance Monday, November 12th. They will also attend the Louisville Junior Shorthorn Heifer Show and the National Shorthorn Bull and Female Show.

The queen will be chosen by personal interview with a panel of judges. Scoring will be by personality, poise, and natural beauty, 15 points; speaking ability, 25 points; knowledge of the Shorthorn breed and knowledge of agriculture, 40 points; and involvement of the girl and her parents with Shorthorns, 20 points.

Lisa was crowned Texas queen at the annual Texas Shorthorn Association meeting and picnic at the Jim Cato farm in Whitney, Texas June 23, 1979. Clarendon head grid Coach Ted Allen said it best. "I don't think we were really that high for this game. We didn't talk Wellington in that much. This was just another game we had to win." And win the Broncos did, 15-0, over hated rival Wellington. Indeed, the Bronco-Skyrocket matchups on all levels in all sports have been heated, hard nose battles, with neither school sparing affection to the other. Such actions as walking off the field in the midst of a game, making the Broncos dress three blocks from the stadium, have proven Wellington's dislike for Clarendon. In the past, games between Wellington and the Broncos have been mismatches. Last year's score was 47-0 in favor of the Rockets. That was then, however, and this is now. It was not a solid thrashing, but the Broncos were happy with a win. It was a win doubly satisfying, as it raised the Broncos' season record to 5-3 and district slate to 2-1. With a win over Memphis, the Broncos would have to beat Panhandle in order to win district and enjoy a feast of hot dogs.

The game was a see-saw defensive battle from the beginning. The Rockets utilized runs from fullback Tim Anderson and halfback Robert Powell to get two first downs to the Bronco

On the first play for Clarendon, tailback Bobby Weatherton slashed off guard before being drug down by Rocket defensive back Kenneth Warren. On the very next play Weatherton went for 10 yards to the 40. Mark Jack ground out tough yardage to the 30 yard line where the Wellington defense stiffened. A 47 yard field goal attempt by Lynn Thompson fell short.

The Rockets' sputtering offense could produce nothing. On a third down play, Tim Anderson coughed up the football. The Broncos recovered. Jack rambled for 15 big yards and then came a rather bizarre play which turned up lucky for the maroon clad Broncos. On third down, Thompson threw deep to flanker Dean Hawkins. Hawkins and Rocket secondary man Stacy Urban wrestled for the ball. It popped loose, and the official covering the play ruled it a complete pass and a fumble. **Social Security  
news**

Q: A friend recently told me  
that some changes were made in  
the SSI Provisions on Resour-  
ces. Were changes also made in  
the income limits?

A: No. The income limits  
under SSI have not changed.  
An individual is eligible for a  
federal payment with countable  
income of less than \$208.20 a  
month; a couple with income of  
less than \$312.30 a month. For  
detailed information, call a  
Social Security Office.

Q: My grand daughter has  
been living with me since her  
parents were killed in a boat  
accident 5 years ago. Can she  
get social security benefits  
when I retire in a few months?  
A: A grandchild may be  
eligible for social security bene-  
fits on a grandparent's work  
record if the natural parents are  
dead or disabled and if the  
grandchild is living with and  
supported by the grandparent.  
For more information, contact  
any Social Security office. In  
Amarillo, call the teleclaims  
unit, 376-2231.

Q: When my first child was  
born, I quit my job as a  
bookkeeper. Now that all the  
children are in school, I've  
decided to return to work. Were  
the Social Security credits I

earned in my former job taken  
off my record when I stopped  
working?

A: No. Any Social Security  
credits you earn, regardless of  
when you earn them, remain on  
your social security record. Of  
course, if you stop working  
before you have enough credits,  
no benefits will be payable on  
your social security record. But,  
if you return to work, you can  
earn any additional credits you  
need to get benefits.

**No set-aside required for 1980 feed grains**

The Secretary of Agriculture has announced there will be no set-aside for 1980 feed grain crops (corn, grain sorghum, and barley).

**Low-yield**

Remember, if you are going to have a low yield on cotton feed grain, you must file for a low yield payment within 15 days from the date harvest is completed on the farm affected. You can file this application before your cotton is all ginned. In other words, you don't have to wait until you get the ASCA-503 card completed before filing a low yield application.

**Cotton production**

You will be receiving a cotton production card (ASCA-503). This card must be kept and used to report cotton production to the ASCA office.

Each farmer or rancher receiving a questionnaire is urged to fill it out carefully and return it to the Agricultural Statistician in Austin. Individual reports are confidential and used only for state and county estimates.

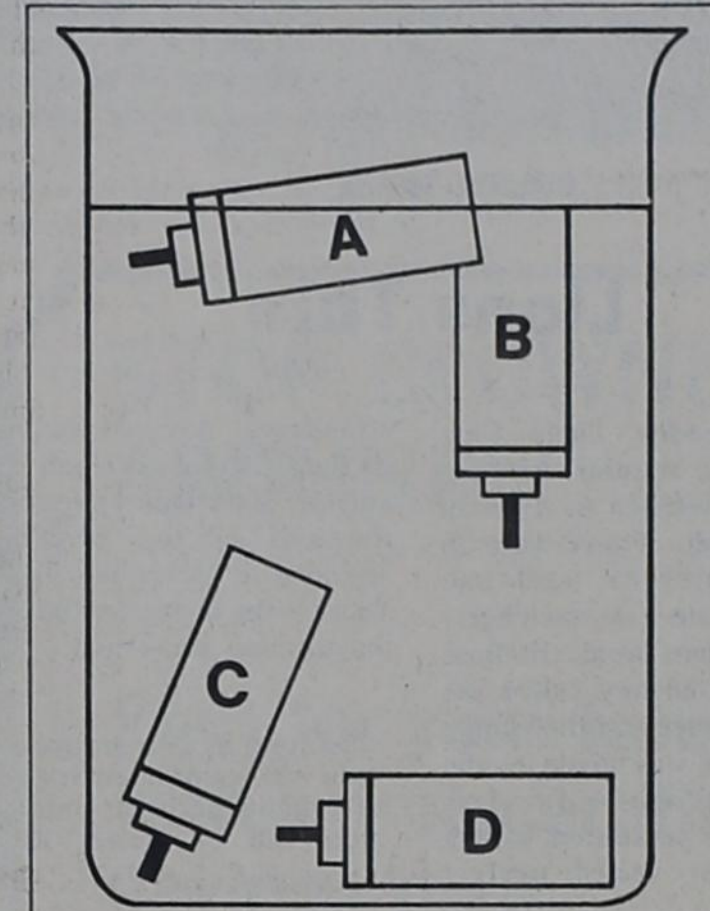

"The wise man is informed in what is right. The inferior man is informed in what will pay." Confucius

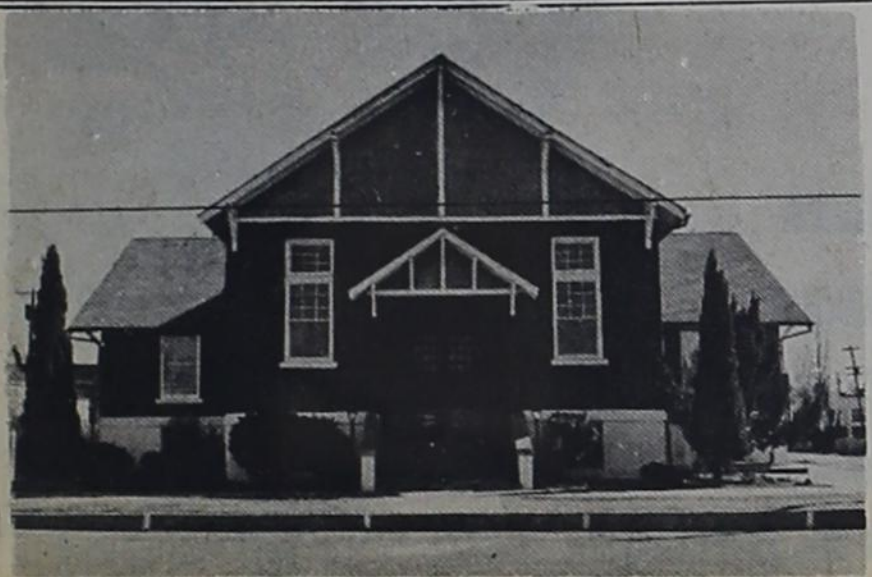

## National Cotton Council announces loan note

**LOAN RATE ANNOUNCED:** USDA has announced a 1980 loan rate of 48c per pound for upland cotton, 2.23c below the 1979 level. The rate is the minimum provided by law. A seed cotton loan program similar to that available in 1979, with recourse loans available to borrowers, also was announced.

USDA also said there would be a zero set-aside for cotton, feed grains, and wheat. The target price for cotton is 57.7c per pound and the antionnal program acreage is 10,634,181.

**SPECIALIST TO ASSIST CCI ON EUROPEAN MISSION:** Dr. Andrew Jordan, Naional Cotton Council manager of processing technology, will observe the U.S. bale package as it is received by European customers on a special visit as technical consultant for Cotton Council International. He will be in Sweden, Belgium, France, The Netherlands, and Germany November 6-17. When he returns from the visit, Jordan will report to the Joint Industry Bale Packaging Committee on Bale packaging and improvements that may be needed.

**EXPORTS CONTINUE TO CLIMB:** Sales of 187,900 running bales of upland cotton during the week ended October 21 brought the season's total orders to 5,555,800. The principal buyers were China,

## Donley County shares \$1,155,000 travel dollars

Donley County received \$1,155,000 of the State's \$7,032,369,000 travel receipts in 1978, a national study commissioned by the Texas Tourist Development Agency has disclosed.

The 1978 figures reflect an increase of 11 percent in travel receipts over 1977 for Donley County.

In addition to gross receipts, the study found that Donley County in 1978 had 41 of the state's 243,887 travel-related jobs, with an annual payroll of \$253,000.

It also estimated \$48,000 in state and \$7,000 in local taxes were paid by county visitors in 1978.

The study was done by the U.S. Travel Data Center in Washington D.C. an independent travel research organization funded jointly by public and private sectors.

It was based on the Center's

Travel Economic Impact Model which breaks out a state's share of the national travel market on a county by county basis.

Basic data for the model comes from the National Travel Survey, conducted every five years by the U.S. Census Bureau, and from the Center's own National Travel Expenditure Model.

It was the latter which estim-

ated that in 1975 Texas had dislodged New York for third place in the nation's travel industry. The 1978 figures, however, show Texas back in fourth place behind California, Florida, and New York.

"We're pleased that travel research techniques have finally developed to the point that states can determine where, within their boundaries, travel

dollars are spent and travel related jobs exist," said Frank Hildebrand, executive director of the Texas Tourist Development Agency.

"Now we can trace travel's considerable economic impact on a county by county basis, observe changing patterns annually, and help direct the rapid growth of this burgeoning industry."

## West Texas Utilities Company files for increase

West Texas Utilities Co. has filed for an increase in wholesale rates for electric energy it supplies to 14 rural electric cooperatives and one municipality.

The increase would average 10.6 per cent, and for most of the co-ops would be the first increase in base rates in 15 years. Most of them have been buying power from WTU under contract initiated in 1965.

WTU, in its filing with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission in Washington, estimated that the increase would amount to \$2,261,349 in additional revenue for the

Company during the 1980 calendar year.

The increase would be effective January 1, 1980. All of the existing co-op contracts expire on December 31, 1979. The contract with Sonora, which is the municipality involved, expires December 31, 1983, but contains provisions for rate changes.

W.P. (Bill) Sayles, WTU's vice president for customer services, said rising costs of providing service made the increase necessary. "Fifteen years without an increase is a long time," he said, "especially in a period of inflation."

He said the proposed rate structure is designed not only to bring charges to wholesale customers more in line with WTU's increased cost of service, but to encourage the co-ops to level their loads.

This incentive is provided in a demand charge, based on a ratchet clause which allows WTU to bill these wholesalers for up to 80 per cent of their peak demands over a 12-month period and helps level costs over the year. It also gives them the opportunity to actually decrease the unit cost of electric energy and minimize costs to their customers by shifting load to off-peak periods.

"We chose the demand charge because we feel it will be beneficial to the co-ops and their customers, and to the overall efforts to conserve energy," Sayles said.

"Without such a provision there is no incentive or benefit for the wholesale customers to implement load management programs."

Sayles said the proposed new contract had been discussed with all of the co-op managers and their engineering consultants before the filing was made with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission.

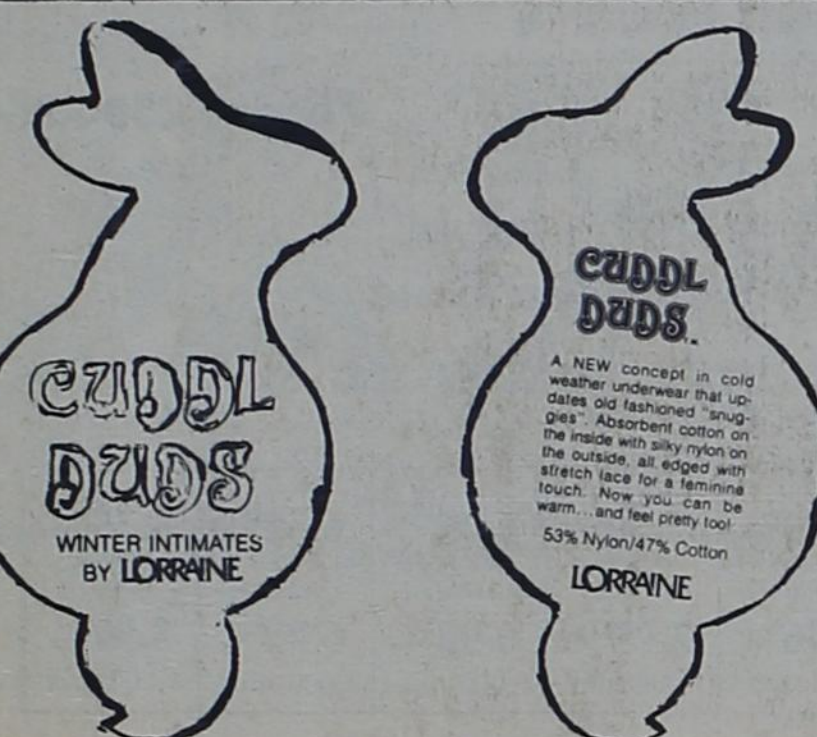

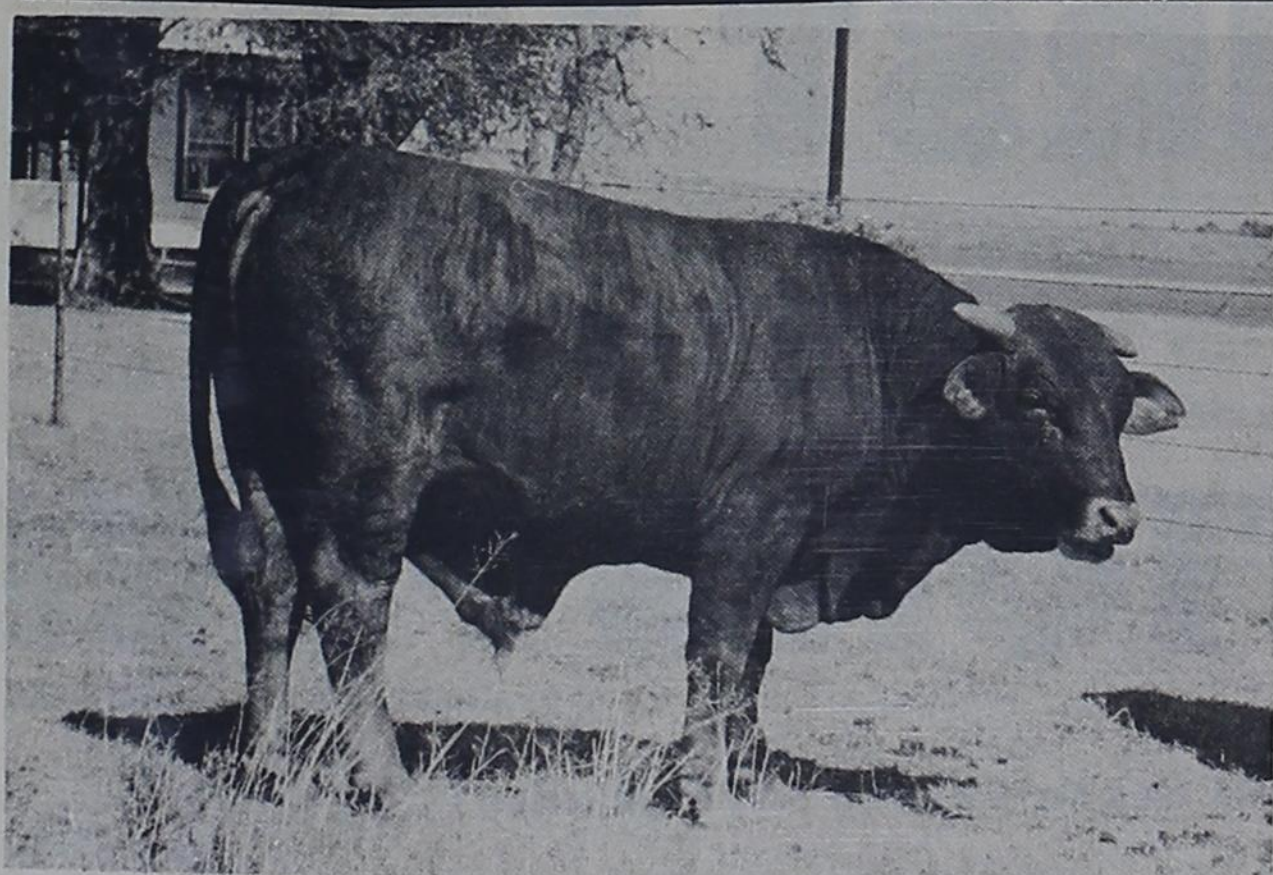

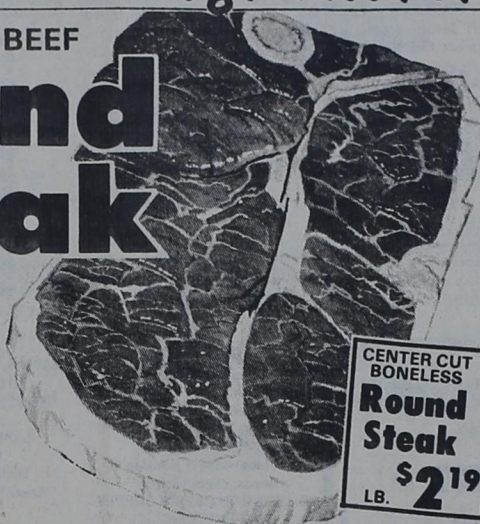
