## Mr. and Mrs. Phillips killed in plane crash

An early-morning crash Sunday claimed the lives of three Stratford residents and critically injured a fourth.

Killed in the crash were Clifton Phillips, 44, his wife, Harlene, 42, and Gayla McCarver, 13, a friend of the Phillips family.

In critical condition Sunday at High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo was Brenda Phillips, 13.

Cause of the crash, which occurred about 1 a.m. Sunday was not known, an area farmer discovered the crashed plane.

Brenda Phillips stated she was asleep at the time of the crash and didn't know what had happened. She said when she regained consciousness, she found herself strapped upside down in her seat. She was trapped in the wreckage seven hours before help arrived, according to reports.

This in turn is likely to the community thereby lessening the influence of the church. I am familiar with this problem, having been married to a pastor for many years. He says if you want a job done ask a busy person to do it. This is because the majority of the members do not participate in the real work of the church. That sometimes causes the real workers to murmur about it, so Paul who knew these things spoke about it to a church.

However, his suggestion is applicable in home situations as well as the church. Especially is this true in the home where both parents have jobs outside the home. Who does what when both get home often causes murmuring, even disputing. This admonition is a good one for both husband and wife to consider as well as the children in the home.

It is a good policy in the job area also. No job description covers everything that has to be done, so a cheerful attitude toward unforeseen tasks oils the gears of cooperation between all the group involved. The major businesses pay overtime for extended emergencies of time, but still extra things pop up to be done within the allotted time period. When that happens, to do them without murmuring helps your blood pressure and just might be the ticket to a promotion. So Paul was giving some mighty up-to-date psychology in the first century to the church at Phillip. It is still current in our day which makes me realize just how far ahead of us the Bible really is. It is not an out of date history about people long ago. Rather it is front page news of the frailities of human nature in the twentieth century and the way to cope with the anxieties of the nuclear age.

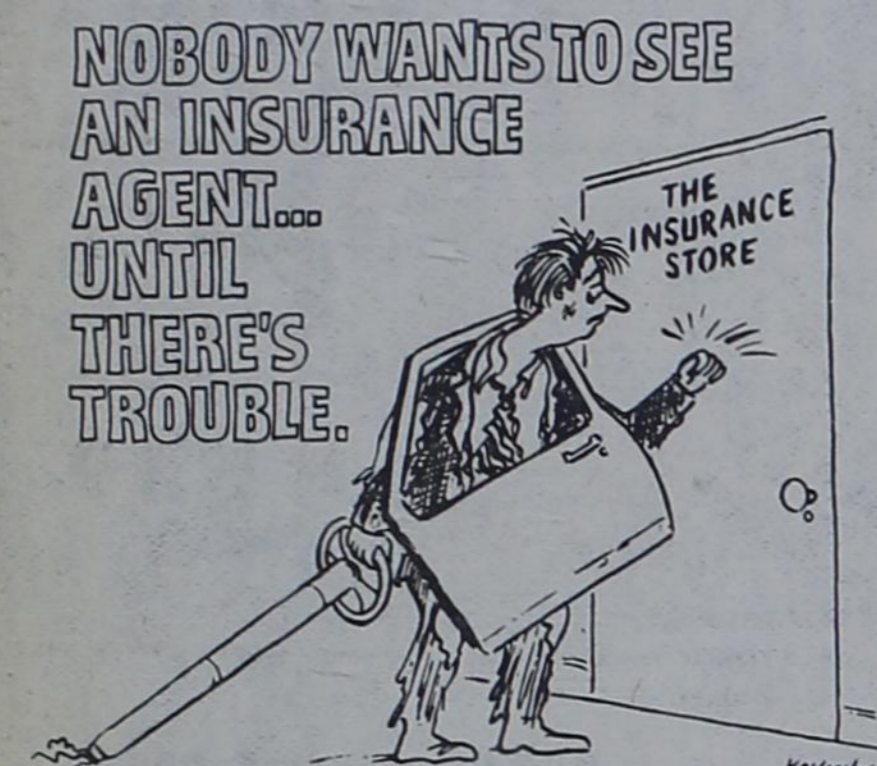

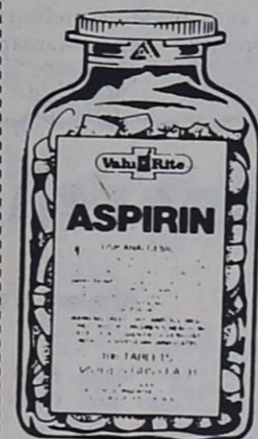

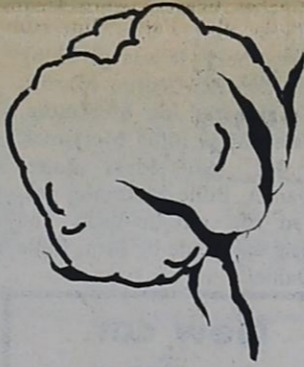

## Two Utility systems connect

Three major electric utility systems in the southwest have reached agreement on terms which will connect the intrastate Electric Reliability Council of Texas (ERCOT) into the nation's interstate Eastern Interconnected Grid. The agreement was announced jointly by officials of Central and South West Corporation, Houston Lighting & Power Company, and Texas Utilities Company.

Under terms of the settlement the single-state ERCOT system will be linked with the multi-state Southwest Power Pool (SWPP) through high voltage direct current (DC) interconnections in southeast and north central Texas.

Utility companies of the Dallas-based Central and South West Corporation include Central Power and Light Company, Corpus Christi, and West Texas Utilities Company, Abilene, both members of the intrastate ERCOT; and Public Service Company of Oklahoma, Tulsa, and Southwestern Electric Power Company, Shreveport, both members of the interstate SWPP.

Texas utilities Company includes Dallas Power and Light

Company, Texas Electric Service Company, Fort Worth, and Texas Power and Light Company, Dallas.

Durwood Chalker, Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of Central and South West Corporation, said, "The settlement will be beneficial to all parties involved with substantial dollar savings to our customers."

This savings will result from economics in providing electricity to over 1.3 million customers in the four-state service area of the Central and South West Corporation, said Chalker. Construction is expected to require about four years following approval of the settlement agreement by various Federal and state regulatory agencies.

Plans call for interconnecting lines to be constructed near Vernon in north central Texas between Public Service Company of Oklahoma and West Texas Utilities Company, and between Southwestern Electric Power Company and Central Power and Light Company as well as Houston Lighting & Power Company at the South Texas Project located east of Victoria in southeast Texas.

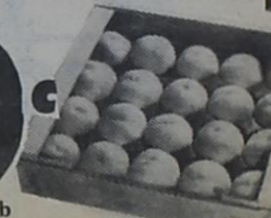

## Lovell Ranch tour a big success

Over 110 farmers and ranchers from the area attended the tour to the John Lovell Ranch last Thursday. People came from as far away as Temple, San Angelo, Vega, Paducah, Childress, Friona and Hedley and Memphis, Texas. Both the Donley County Bank and Farmers State Bank of Clarendon as well as the Security State Bank of Hedley furnished coffee and donuts to those interested folks who came early to the Clarendon College Cafeteria. Four school busses were used to take the tour to the ranch site. From there, four hay wagons with bales of hay as benches, was used to give the tour an authentic open air tour of the

most productive experimental ranch in the area.

Some of the items discussed by the experts along the route selected were the Savory Cell System of range management, and methods to help develop growth of wild forbes, grasses and flowers. The Savory System has been developed to improve the weight of cattle grazing off of grasses alone and at the same time to conserve and actually perpetrate grass and forbe growth while running more cattle per acre than is done now. For those ranchers and farm-

ers who feel that mule deer compete with cattle for grass, Bok Sowell of Texas Tech and Leslie Kryslie have done extensive studies on the mule deer grazing and have proven that the deer eat forbes, weeds, browse and very little if any, grass. This study also determined what would be required to successfully build trophy bucks on a range.

The local SCS office, the John Lovell ranch personnel and the SRM really offered an informative, stimulating experience for those interested in planning better grazing techniques or for building quality mule deer populations on their ranches.

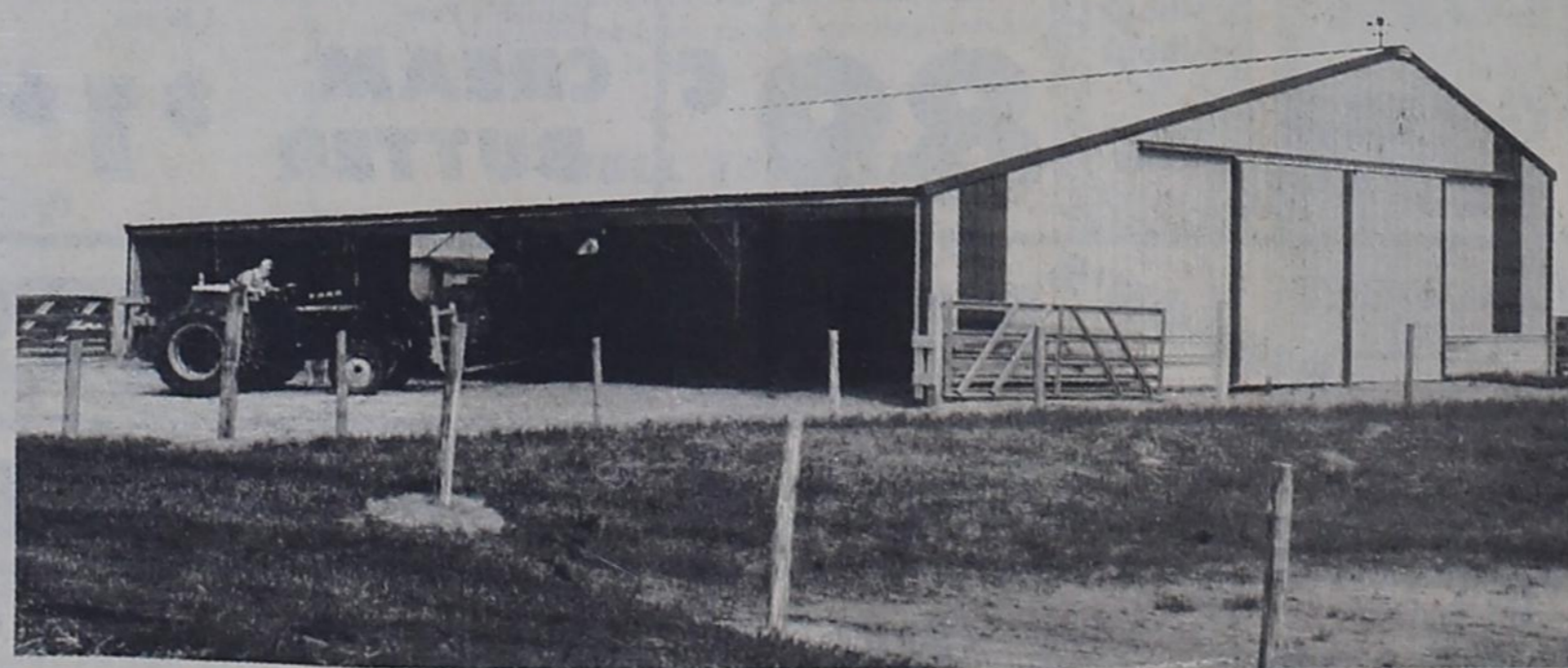



### Ways to stop bagworm damage

Bagworm damage to evergreens such as arborvitae, cedar, and other shrubs is being found now, says County Extension Agent Ronald Gooch.

Evergreens should be matched carefully at this time of year, especially if old worm bags are found on the tree. Wingless females crawl-out and die after laying eggs inside the bag. In this case, each bag may contain hundreds of eggs which hatch into tiny larvae.

The newly-hatched larvae immediately start to make bags by chewing off small pieces of the tree. Young worms carry the bags wherever they go. The larvae can be killed with insecticides applied when the bagworms are still small. Chemical controls are ineffective when worms are full grown.

Chemicals suggested as controls include Sevin, Malathion or Texaphene. The insecticide applications should be applied at 7 to 10 day intervals until the bagworms are eliminated. Directions on the container should be followed carefully, the county agent emphasized.

The feeding worms, when infestations are heavy, will remove the foliage and bark from all or parts of a tree or shrub, resulting in death of the plant or the heavily infested parts. If control measures are started too late, hand pick and burn the bags, because the worm goes through the winter in the egg stage within the bag, said Gooch.
