Jerry Gage Chairman Saints Roost Celebration

Jerry Gage was elected to the most exhaustive position in Clarendon's social world, he is the Chairman of the Outdoor Entertainment Committee for the 1980 July 4th celebration. This prestigious title means that he is in charge of all of the other committees and he is ultimately responsible for the success of the entire three day and two night whoopedoo.

Thursday, July 3rd at 7:30 p.m. the festivities kick off at the rodeo grounds with the kids events of a wild calf race and a calf scramble which will also be held each of the rodeo nights. The famous Owens Country Sausage eight horse Belgian hitch team will be present to perform during the rodeo and they will also prance in the parade.

When you purchase your rodeo ticket, hang on to it. A drawing will be held for one half of a beef each night of the rodeo. To insure impartiality in the drawing, the first youngster John Grady, the rodeo chairman, spies, will be enlisted to draw the winning ticket each night.

After the rodeo, when the cowboys and cowgirls and spectators are exhausted and bruised, Johnny Hermesmyer, the dance chairman, will light the lights on the fabulous Clarendon outdoor dance slab at the rodeo grounds. Fiddling Frenchy Burke, David Nail & Ramblin Fever and Tiny Lynn will be the dance music for the made saddle, crafted by Richard Oliver of Amarillo, will be the prize to the All Round Cowboy or Cowgirl with the highest all round points. In years past, the saddle has been donated, but this year the Outdoor Entertainment Committee has upped the entry fee to the rodeo and the extra charge will be used to buy both the saddle and the beef to be given away.

The wild and unrideable stock will be furnished by Freddie Cordell to give the cowboys and girls a real challenge. Cordell also furnishes the rodeo announcer and the clowns, a favorite to the spectators and a must to the contestants.

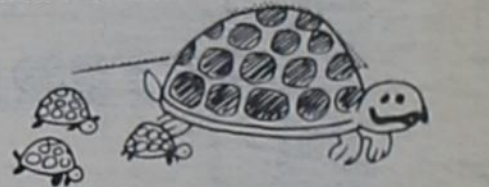

Catfish contest underway

Mooring's Bait and Tackle has initiated a little catfish catching contest. The trick is that the prize fish must be caught using rod and reel, no jug lines. Annual Terrapin race scheduled

If you are driving along and see a turtle racing to the side of the road, and if it is a terrapin, grab it to enter in this year's terrapin race! A terrapin is a turtle that lives in brackish or fresh water but crawls around on the land. You can't enter a sea turtle or a lizard or a dog disguised as a turtle, the entrants must be genuine land terrapins.

There are three age groups divisions; one day old to 5 years, 5-10 years and 11-15 years old. If you want to register your rapid reptile, come in person to Henson's and get a number for your turtle. No phone calls will be accepted to register for the race.

Census '80 asks "Were you counted?"

Were you counted in the 1980 Census of Housing and Population?

If you think you or your family might have been missed, fill out the "WERE YOU COUNTED?" form printed in today's newspaper as a public service. Cut it out and return it by mail to U.S. Census Office, P.O. Box 11094, Amarillo, Texas 79111. The form will be checked against the master address list for your area so there is no chance of an individual or household being counted twice.

This appeal to the public is made by William Soule, manager of the Amarillo area District Census Office. Soule says that the "WERE YOU COUNTED?" campaign is an additional effort to insure that no one is overlooked during the 1980 Census.

A few days before April 1, Census Day, questionnaires were mailed to all residential addresses in this area. They were to be filled out and mailed back on April 1. Since that time, the Census Bureau has hired and trained local residents as census takers and sent them out to call at homes from which no questionnaires have been received. They are also now contacting households that have returned inadequately filled-out questionnaires to gather complete information. The Census Bureau hopes that any households missed in these previous operations will respond during the "WERE YOU COUNTED?" campaign. Soule noted, "A check is now being made to ascertain that a questionnaire for every known household has been completed and shortly we will be able to turn over to local officials the population counts for their communities."

These preliminary population counts will be subject to a review by local elected officials. The purpose of Local Review Program is to give city and county officials an opportunity to spot errors while census workers are still in the field. This allows the Census Bureau to recheck any questioned population counts and should contribute significantly to the accuracy.

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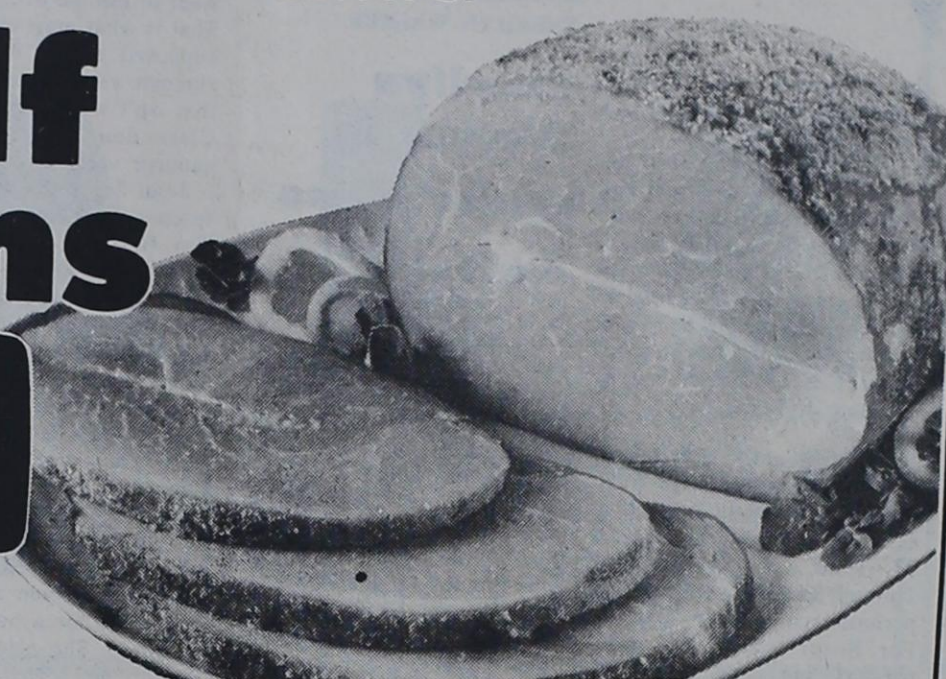

A Moment for Meditation

"Let your speech be seasoned with salt." Col. 4:6

Salt has been a very important commodity since ancient times. At some points in history it has been used as currency in trade between individuals and nations. Man and animals alike need it for the best state of being and it is a usual thing to see a cow licking the salt block near a feeding area. Our food seems tasteless without salt, so we shake it on to add flavor to our food.

But salt is also a preservative. In the days before refrigeration meats were salted to prevent their spoiling. Old timers remember the "smoke houses" where the meat was salted and then smoked to preserve it for winter use.

Salt is also a mild antiseptic to help keep down infections. Even today many physicians prefer that their patients with sore throats use a saline solution for a gargle rather than the ones sold over the counter.

Salt, then, is a very useful commodity and the Author of Colossians knew this when he used it in connection with our speech. The analogy suggests that our words need to be pleasant and courteous, giving flavor to all that we say. Certainly the tone of voice is most important as we communicate our thoughts, for a querulous tone erases the good effect that we might have intended. When frustration creeps into our voices it builds conflict in the one we are talking to. So, salt down the tone and make it palatable.

Our words often act as a preservative to the actions of others just as salt does on the things it preserves. None of us really understands the scope of his influence on others. Often those we least suspect are looking to us for guidance. This

is an awesome responsibility and one we would like to shirk, but we cannot. So it is important that our speech be seasoned

with salt to make it sweet to the taste, giving strength needed, and cleansing to a situation that may arise.

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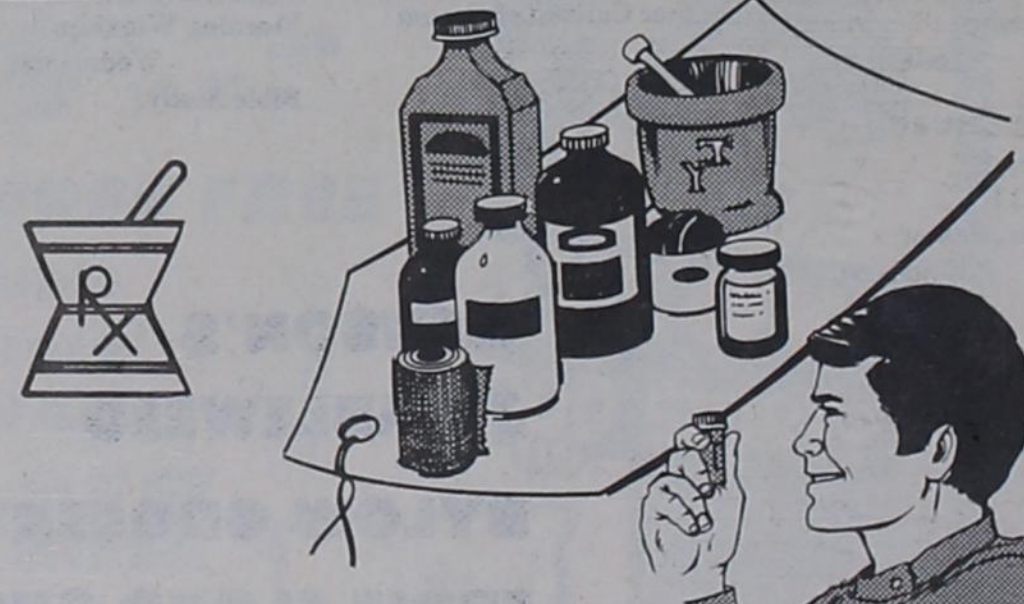

Census Bureau hiring now

Census takers are urgently needed in this county to assist in completing follow-up operations for the 1980 Census.

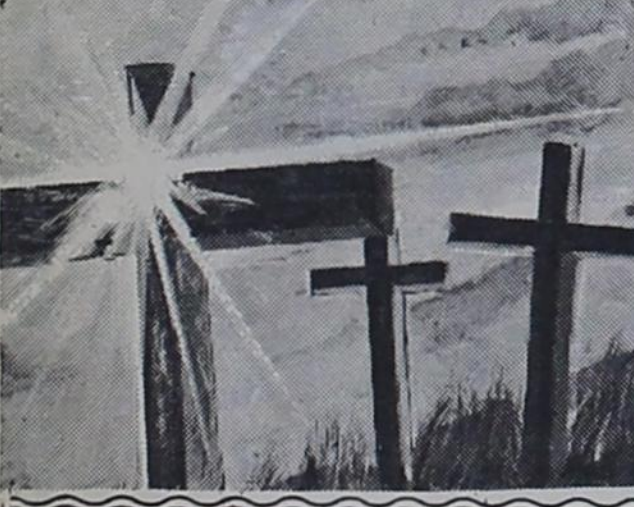

The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN—Most Texans earn a living by working for wages. Under the state's Semi-Monthly Pay law, private employers must pay their employees at least twice a month. What can an employee do if he or she is not paid on the correct day?

The employee should first demand the past-due wages from the employer. Under Texas law, the employer is obligated to pay within six days. If the employer still refuses to hand over a paycheck which the worker has rightfully earned, the Texas Department of Labor and Standards may assess a fifty dollar fine for each willful refusal to pay. These penalties often encourage employers to settle outstanding claims. However, state officials may not collect past-due wages for the employee.

In order to collect the money still owed, the employee should present a wage claim to the Department of Labor and Standards. The necessary form may be obtained from the Department. After completing the form, the complaining employee should have it notarized. Employees are asked for their dates of employment, the amount claimed by the employee as past due wages, the name and address of the employer, and a description of any dispute involved between the employer and the complaining employee.

After receiving the complaint, the Department immediately contacts the employer in order to hear the employer's side of the dispute. Most wage claims are resolved through settlement after this initial contact. If no agreement is reached, the Department may order a field investigation. This involves an examination of the employer's records, and statements from the complaining employee's co-workers. Such cases are

usually resolved in about two months. If the disagreement cannot be resolved through negotiation through the Department, the case is then turned over to the Office of the Attorney General for legal action. The vast majority of wage claims are resolved without a lawsuit.

The Department of Labor and Standards does not handle claims for past-due wages presented by contract workers. These claims usually go directly to small claims court.

Occasionally, an employer fails to pay his employees simply because he cannot. An employee still has some protection under the law when his or her employer goes out of business. When the employer is financially unable to pay, the employee's best recourse is to submit a claim in the employer's bankruptcy proceedings. The employee thus becomes a creditor of the insolvent firm. The employee's claim for back wages will be paid out of the remaining assets of the employer. The priority which will be given to the employee's claim is controlled by the rules of federal bankruptcy law. The Department of Labor and Standards will refer wage claims involving insolvent employers to bankruptcy court.

If the Department of Labor and Standards is unable to locate an employer, it usually asks for the help of the complaining employee in finding the employer. If it is impossible to locate the employer, the Department will close its file on the complaint and refer the complaining employee to the Attorney General's Office. Additional information about how to file wage claims in the state of Texas may be obtained from the Texas Department of Labor and Standards at 475-7001.

Ft. Worth & Denver Railway serving former Rock Island Railroad customers

The Fort Worth & Denver Railway is serving former Rock Island Railroad customers in North Fort Worth, Amarillo, and between Groom and Adrian, Texas, according to A.E. Michon, FW&D president.

Effective June 13, the Fort Worth & Denver Railway was given Interstate Commerce Commission authorization to provide interim service to Rock Island shippers located on 8.4 miles of trackage in North Fort Worth; terminal trackage at Amarillo and vicinity; and 90.6

miles of track between Groom and Adrian. The order authorizing the FW&D operation is a temporary one and expires on August 31. Approximately 85 former Rock Island shippers are located on the lines.

The Fort Worth & Denver Railway is a wholly-owned subsidiary of the Colorado & Southern Railway, Denver, Burlington Northern Inc., headquartered at St. Paul, owns 92.51 percent of the Colorado & Southern Railway.

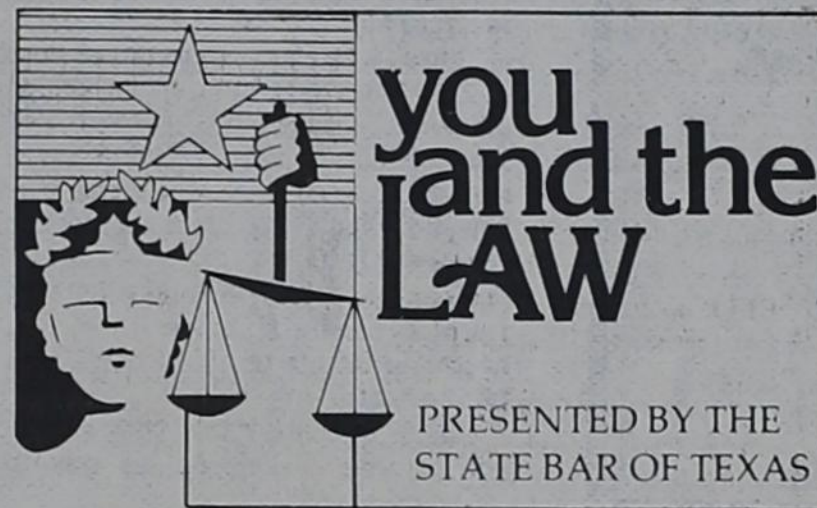

A: Texas does not have "no-fault" auto insurance, although approximately 18 other states do have some form of it. In Texas, the personal injury protection rider attached to an auto policy is sometimes called "no-fault", but the rider may be rejected by the insured. Rates of all auto insurance companies except one are regulated by the State Board of Insurance. All insurance companies admitted to Texas are regulated, and you can request a list of these companies from the Board.

Q: My son married 20 years ago in Philadelphia. Just before his wife left him, six years ago, she informed him that they were not legally married because she had not divorced her first husband before marrying him. He now has proof that she did, in fact, obtain a divorce some three years after they were married. Will he need a lawyer to untangle this mess or can he get a simple divorce?

A: Under the Texas Family Code the marriage between your son and his wife was void because she was already married but it became valid when the prior marriage was dissolved. If your son can prove that after his wife's earlier divorce, the couple lived together and represented themselves as married, they may have created a common-law marriage. In that case, a divorce must be obtained to dissolve that marriage.

Q: If a father pays his court-ordered child support payments on time but is constantly denied his visitation rights, what actions may he take to insure that his rights are protected and what, if anything, will happen to his ex-wife?

A: A father's payment of court-ordered child support on time is not a pre-condition to visitation rights. If the specific terms and conditions for visitation are not complied with, the father can file a Motion for Contempt and request the Court to fine or imprison the ex-wife for her failure to comply with a previous order. At the hearing on a First Motion for Contempt, it is common for any such punishment to be suspended on the condition the person complies with the court's visitation order.

Q: When I was filling out a credit application recently, I noticed that the form included a question on whether I was single, divorced or married. Isn't there a new law prohibiting discrimination based on marital status in the granting of credit?

A: The new Equal Credit Opportunity Act does not prohibit a lender from asking about marital status, but the form may have only three categories: married, unmarried, and separated. The federal law does prohibit discrimination in the granting of credit. This means that the creditor may not withhold favorable treatment of your application simply because of your answer to the marital status question.

WHAT TO DO WITH SUNBURN

Sunburn is an extremely painful condition that many seem to welcome during the summer season. The vacation period places people in the sun for long periods of time. The fishing, boating, or swimming is enjoyable but the aftermath of sunburn may be regrettable.

Most authorities recommend the use of cool tap water for relief of sunburn pain. Some suggest Burrow's solution compresses applied 3 or 4 times a day. Burrow's solution are available without prescription.

One dermatology reference recommends the application of ice cold milk compresses every 20 minutes until the pain begins to subside. The milk is placed in a bowl of ice cubes.

There are many home remedies espoused for the treatment of sunburn. These may range from the application of vinegar [an acid] to the application of baking soda [a base]. Because mild sunburn pain disappears quickly, it is difficult to evaluate the value of these procedures.

Many non-prescription preparations are available for relief of sunburn pain and discomfort. These may contain a local anesthetic designed to numb nerve endings. Hydrocortisone lotions, creams and sprays can provide dramatic relief.

It is probably best to prevent sunburn in the first place. When sunburn occurs, there are a number of ways to obtain relief of pain.



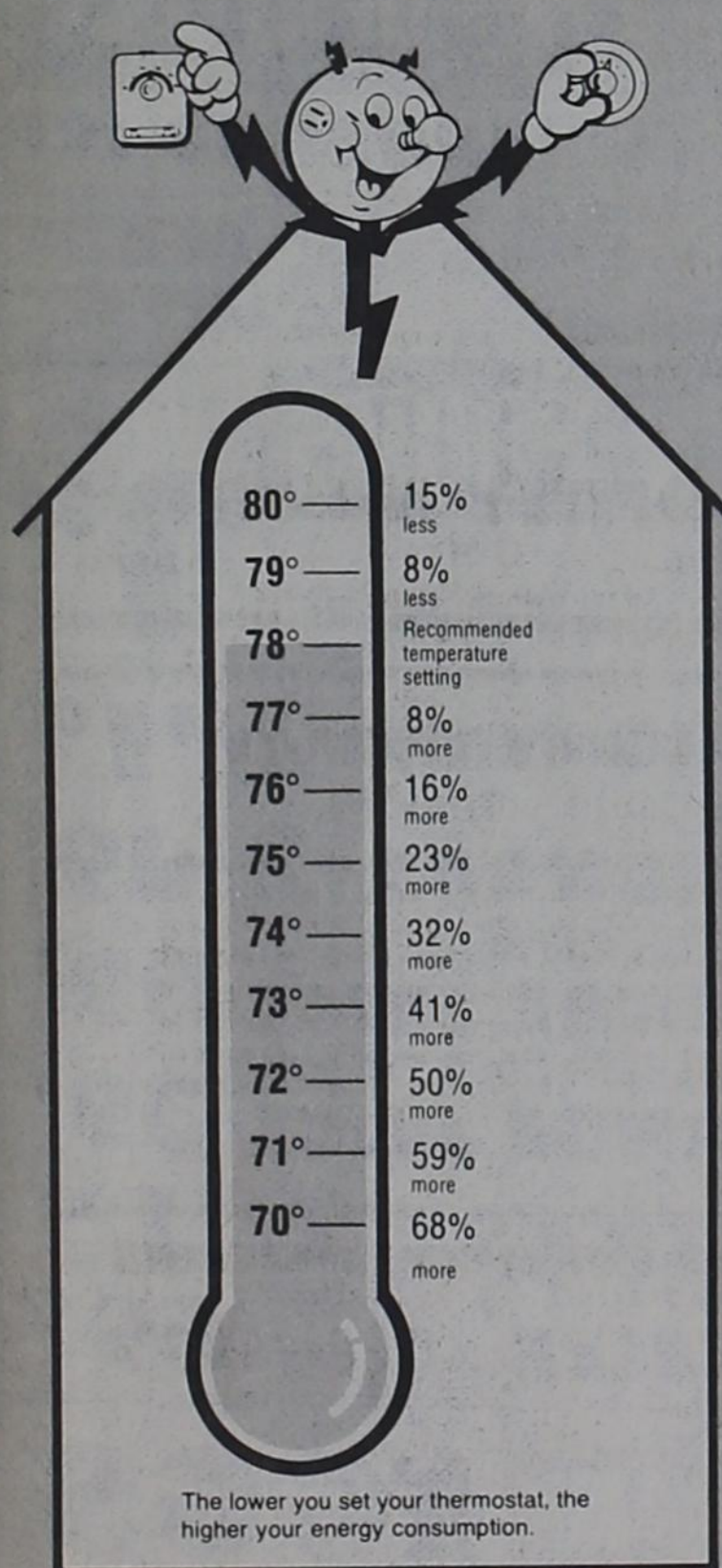

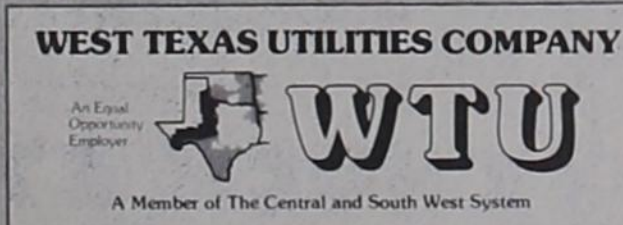

If your child is active in athletics...

Imagine all the potential athletes who've been turned off to sports by their parents.

I'm talking about parents who've confused their children's likes and dislikes with their own, parents who've pushed when they should have consoled, parents who've humiliated instead of tried to understand. It's easy to get involved in the athletic lives of children, and parents should be involved. The danger is over involvement.

Amarillo College's men's basketball coach Jim Calvin, quite a believer in the value of motivation, also is the father of two promising athletes at Bonham Junior High School. Kevin is an eighth grader and Kelly a seventh grader.

"I don't push them though," says Calvin, beginning his second season

as AC's cage boss and athletic director.

"My two kids have grown up in the gym, it's been there for them if they wanted to practice.

"They think their dad is the greatest coach in the world, but they've gotta understand they're going to have a hundred coaches by the time they graduate, and all of them will have something different to offer. They've got to accept each one of them, and if they put out and do their best for each coach, I'll be satisfied."

Calvin spent four summers teaching a week-long basketball seminar at York University in Toronto, Canada. The session was one of several arranged by Lloyd Percival to teach Canadian coaches and athletes in the various sports.

Percival heads Canada's physical education, athletics and recreational school programs. While researching a book on the role parents should or should not play in the athletic careers of their children, Percival (after checking with his wife) came up with the ten commandments for parents of athletic children.

Here are excerpts from those commandments:

1. "Make sure that your child knows that — win or lose, scared or

heroic — you love him, appreciate his efforts and are not disappointed in him.

"This will allow him to do his best, to avoid developing a fear of failure based on the spectre of disapproval and family disappointment if he does mess up.

"Be the person in his life he can look to for constant positive encouragement. Learn to hide your feelings if he disappoints you.

2. "Try your best to be completely honest about your child's athletic

maximum achievement and enjoyment, and you will get your kicks too!

6. "Don't compete with the coach. The young athlete often comes home and chatters on about 'coach says this, coach says that,' ad nauseam. This is often hard to take, especially for the father who has had some sports experience or for the mother if what the 'coach says' refers to the youngster's eating pattern.

"When a certain degree of disenchantment about the coach sets in, some parents side with the youngster and are happy to see him shot down. This is a mistake.

"It should provide a chance to discuss (not lecture) with the youngster the importance of learning how to handle problems, react to criticism and understand the necessity for dis-

cipline, rules, regulations.

7. "Don't compare the skill, courage or attitudes of your child with that of other members of the squad or team, at least in his hearing...

8. "You should also get to know the coach so that you can be assured that his philosophy, attitudes, ethics and knowledge are such that you are happy to expose your child to him. The coach has a tremendous potential influence.

9. "Always remember that children tend to exaggerate, both when praised and when criticized. Temper your reactions to the tales of woe or heroics they bring home. Don't cut your youngster down if you feel he is exaggerating — just take a look at the situation and gradually try to develop an even level.

"Above all, don't over-react and rush off to the coach if you feel an injustice has been done. Investigate, but anticipate that the problem is not as it might appear.

10. "Make a point of understanding courage, and the fact that it is rela-

tive.

"There are different kinds of courage...explain that courage does not mean an absence of fear but rather it means doing something in spite of fear or discomfort. In a way, parents are the primary coaches...it is worth all the effort when you hear your youngster boast that you played a key role in his success."

The President's Commission on Mental Health reports that one out of every four Americans suffers from mental health problems sometime during their lives. The report calls for \$600 million over a five-year period for treatment.

After-care is vital for ex-mental patients. Some of the best community programs are run by private, non-profit organizations. New York City's Fountain House, the country's first and oldest rehabilitation center, helps about 2,000 mentally disabled persons each year. This nonprofit institution is run entirely by ex-patients and a small staff.
