Memorial fund set up

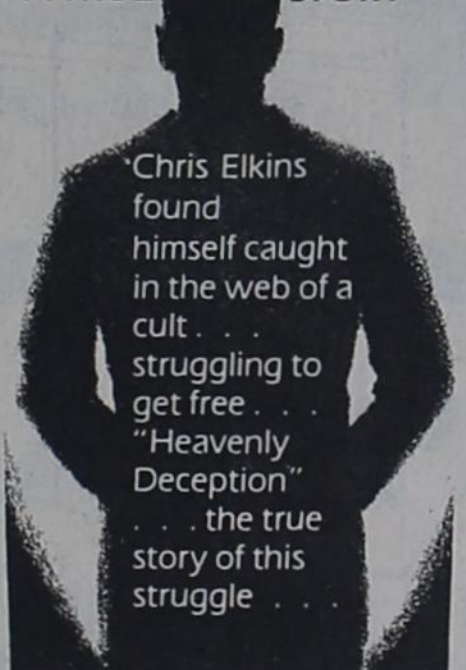

A meeting to discuss the grasshopper situation and the possibility of organizing a Cooperative Grasshopper Control Program will be held Tuesday night, May 27 at 8:00 p.m. according to County Extension Agent Ronald Gooch. The meeting will be held in Room 102 of the Classroom and Administration Building of Clarendon College in Clarendon.

A cost-share grasshopper control program is available through the Animal and Plant Inspection Service and Texas Department of Agriculture for large areas of rangeland only. The rangeland must be blocked-up in 10,000 acre or larger units.

All ranchers interested in a government cost-share grasshopper control program should attend this meeting as the program must be organized now, Gooch said.

Hedley Baptist Bible school

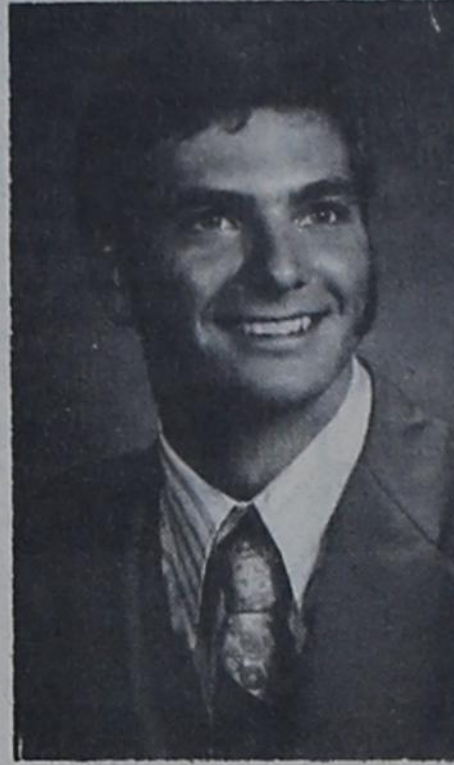
Dates for the Vacation Bible School for the First Baptist Church of Hedley have been announced by Rev. Wayne Naylor, minister.

Dial your own long distance calls

General Telephone customers were urged today to dial their own long distance calls for the best results.

"Management people are manning our operator positions during the strike, and while they are making every effort to give our customers the best service, they are not the experienced operators customers are used to," R. Rex Bailey, vice-president-marketing and customer service said.

Bailey added, customers can usually dial several long distance calls for the price of an operator assisted call.

"If you are calling person-to-person, you can usually call the distant number, ask for the person you want to speak to, and if they are not available, determine when to call back, then call back at that time and still save money," he explained.

Bailey added customers encountering a "fast busy" signal when dialing their own long distance call should hang up and try again.

"The faster than normal busy signal means all circuits are busy. The operators are using these same circuits and if you are running into busy circuits, they will be encountering same conditions."

Bailey said directory assistance services would not be fully staffed since studies indicate over 70 percent of calls to directory assistance are for numbers listed in the directory.

"If only those customers really needing directory assistance will call, calls will be answered promptly. However, if the load increases, customers dialing and not getting a prompt answer should let it ring instead of hanging up and redialing."

your dance partner?

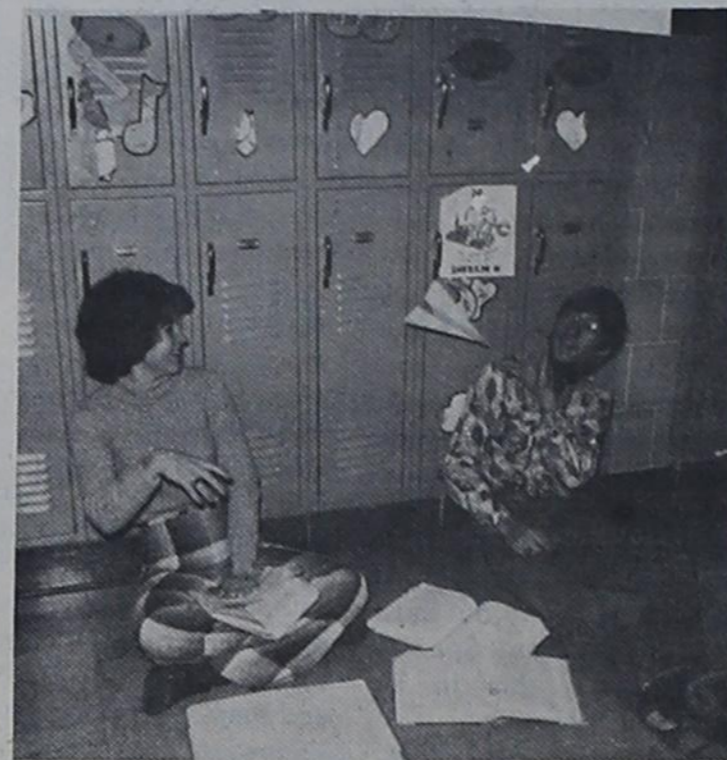

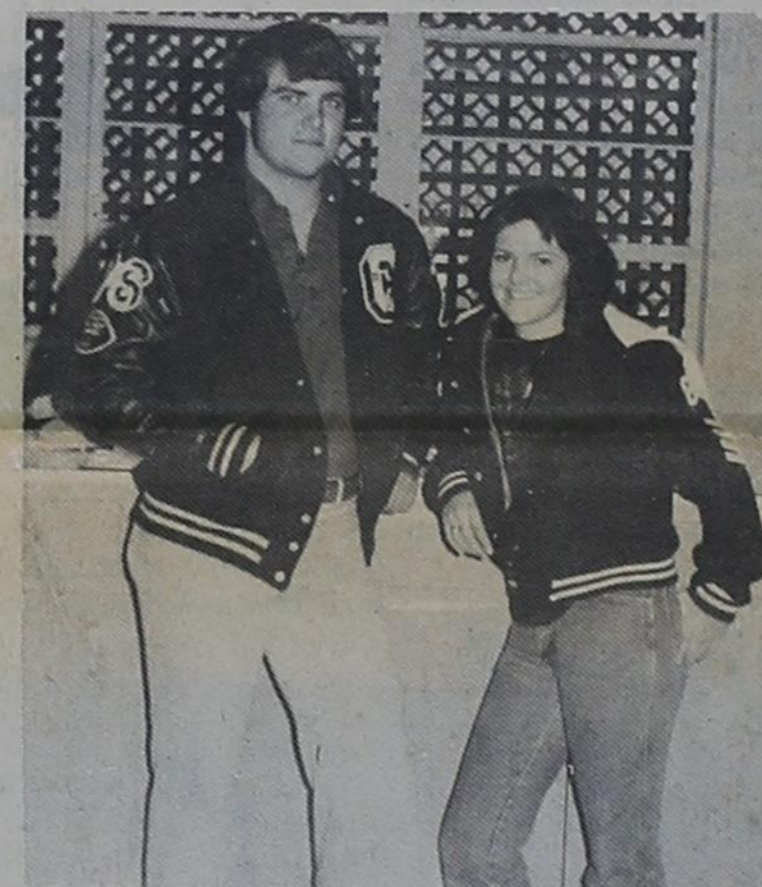

A special thanks goes to Miss Veach and the members of the Annual Staff for hosting such a fine pageant.



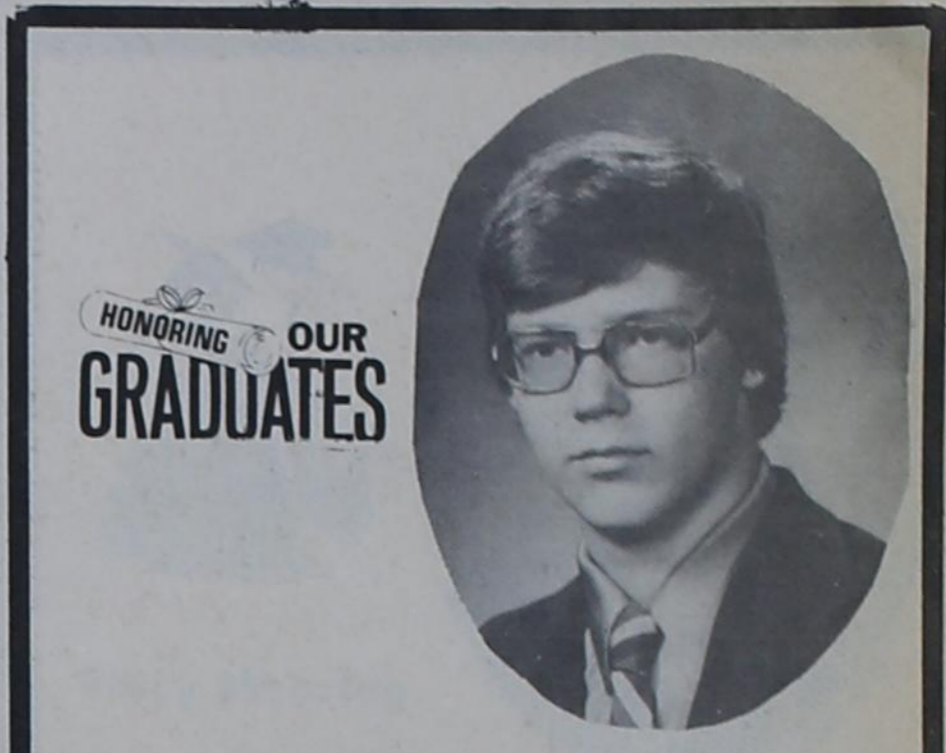
Golf

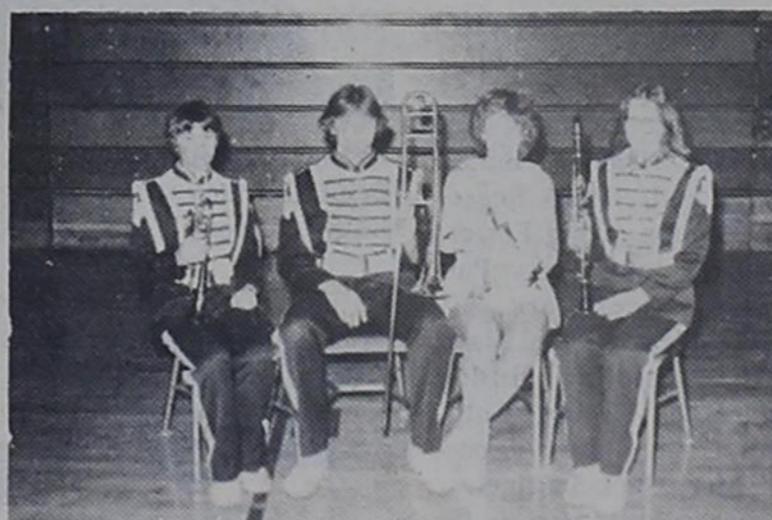

What's the Evidence?

"Therefore if any man is in Christ, he is a new creature; the old things passed away behold, new things have come." (II Cor. 5:17)

The evidence of a good farmer is the good harvest; the rancher is healthy cattle and horses; the teacher is good students and accomplishments by those students; and for the Christian it has to be a changed life.

It doesn't take forever for a person who comes to know Jesus Christ in the free-pardon of his sins to expect this change. One of the meanest men in a small town in Montana found Christ as his Savior one night. The next day someone was giving his wife, who was a waitress in his cafe, a bad time and he hit the offender with his fist as was his custom. It dawned upon him that this was not the conduct of a Christian so he helped the fellow up apologized to him and said, "Last night I became a Christian and I shouldn't have hit you." This man who had been mean could no longer be mean or be accused of being mean, because Jesus had been given first place in his life. This incident means that what Christ does for us today whether in Worship, First Time Experience with Him, Recommitment to Him ought to lap over into tomorrow. And if the Eternal Christ has come into our experience and we remain in tune with Him this lap ought to be into all our tomorrows.

One of the changes that took place in men and women of the New Testament was the immediacy of their willingness to witness to their new found Savior. Paul immediately began to share what had happened to him on the Damascus road. We are encouraged to share what happened to us when Jesus came into our hearts as someone has said, "If you don't have eight minutes in which to share with someone your experience with Christ, perhaps you are living too fast." Paul took about four minutes to tell his Damascus road experience to the Jerusalem Hebrews in their language.

There ought to be a difference in our lives, a difference in our testimonies, a difference in our families and communities, since Jesus came into our lives. An old rancher was told by the preacher that if he would trust Jesus and ask for forgiveness, confess Him as Savior that the horse he rode would ride different the next day. They Rancher Trusted Christ that night and came back the next day to state that the horse was different, but it may have been because he was ridden by a new Creature in Christ Jesus.

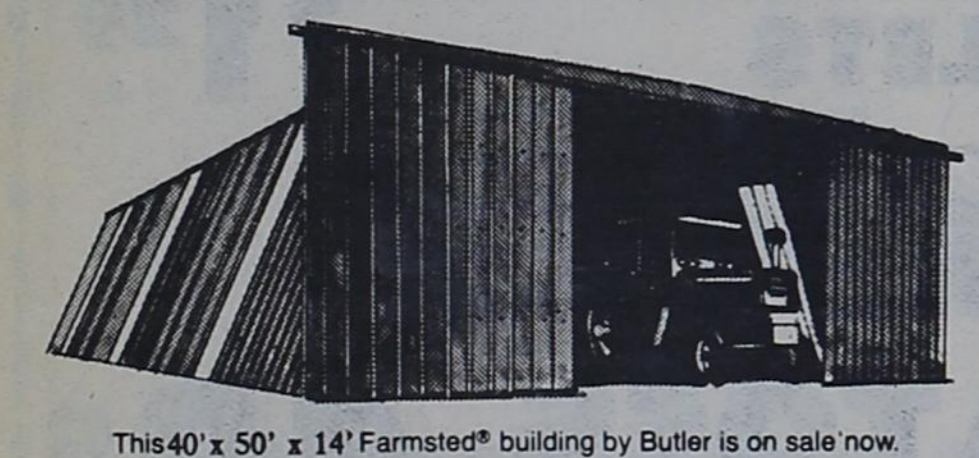
