We constantly hear that there is an education crisis in America. Judging from recent anti-free trade riots in Canada and around the world, I'd say we have a global education problem.



Police dealt with the situation as best they could, but one protestor said he was "appalled" by the presence of 6,000 police officers.

"It's just amazing to see the kind of police state overkill with these, you know, three meter high fences, the cops everywhere, army helicopters flying around," he told ABC News. "The tear gas is making it so that right now I can't see out of one eye."


There was no word on whether this peacenik was "appalled" by his fellow protestors who showed up with gas masks, concrete chunks, and hockey pucks.

Canada isn't alone in dealing with these fringe groups. In recent years, Seattle and Washington, DC, have dealt with them. This week, May Day globalization protests have sprung up in Germany, Australia, Sri Lanka, and Britain.

British Prime Minister Tony Blair had a message for protestors in his country, according to FoxNews.com.

"There is a right way to protest in a democracy, and there is a wrong way," Blair said on Monday. "The limit of tolerance is past when protesters, in the name of some spurious cause, seek to inflict fear, terror, violence and criminal damage on our people and property."

These folks are upset because national leaders in North and South America are interested in creating a hemispheric free trade zone - essentially NAFTA expanded from pole to pole. This, protestors say, is bad

Rural Texas needs link to global economy

for the environment and bad for workers' well being.

Looking at the United States of America as an example, however, would seem to contradict the protestors messages. Citizens of the USA enjoy the benefits of one of the freest economies on Earth (although it could be freer), and things just seem pretty good here.

A five-year study by the Cato Institute of 120 countries looked at economic freedom in those nations as it related to size of government, level of taxation, sound money policy, secure property rights, and free trade. Writing for Cato, James Gwartney and Ian Vaquez concluded the report favored the benefits of free trade.

"The report confirms Adam Smith's insight that trading partners in rich and poor countries alike can achieve higher income levels through gains from specialization and large-scale production," they wrote. "Free economies have indeed grown more rapidly and achieved higher income levels than less free economies."

Gwartney and Vasquez, available on Cato's website, state that Latin America needs a free-trade zone specifically to battle poverty in those countries. As an example, they say economic growth of seven percent in Chile from 1987 to 1998 allowed that country to reduce its poverty rate from 45 percent to 22 percent.

Economic prosperity brought on by free trade provides a powerful impetus for governments in Latin America to implement political reforms necessary for stability.

Anti-free traders and labor unions will say that free trade costs American jobs. During the debate over NAFTA, presidential candidate Ross Perot warned that we would hear a "giant sucking sound" as American jobs were drawn into Mexico if the agreement passed.

It passed, and the United States has enjoyed record low unemployment rates in recent years. The economy was humming along pretty good, too. (That is until Alan Greenspan cooled it off last year with his interest rate hikes and the ineptitude of Clinton's energy policies caught up with us.)

In the next few weeks, the Texas Legislature has the opportunity to greatly enhance the lives of people and success of businesses in rural Texas without raising taxes one cent.

Rural Texas conjures up images of fields of cotton, cattle grazing on vast expanses, and silent pumps coaxing black gold from beneath the soil. All these thoughts revolve around the wide-open spaces that once lured settlers to the Lone Star State.

But agriculture and oil and gas extraction, once the mainstays of rural Texas, now employ only half as many workers as they did in their heyday. Meanwhile, people are moving to our state seeking high tech-related jobs. The spaces are still wide open, but they are now invisible and "cyber."

It is no surprise the economists now view high-speed Internet access as a key tool for local economic development. It's becoming as critical as access to a trained labor pool and private capital.

Confirming this view, both a recent legislative study committee and the Public Utility Commission (PUC) have emphasized that access to high-speed Internet, or broadband communications technology, at competitive prices is critical to the future prosperity - if not the survival - of rural Texas.

What does affordable access to broadband communications technology mean to

class education via the Internet to the most remote school. A science teacher, for instance, could use broadband technologies to stay current on the subject and help students learn from scientists living hundreds of miles away.

It means businesses have the option of locating in smaller communities. The Internet is a way to put rural Texas on a more even footing with other parts of our state, indeed the entire country.

It means top physicians and life-saving medical information is accessible not just to the best city hospitals, but also online to rural clinics in any part of Texas.

Without affordable access to this vital new-economy infrastructure, rural Texas will surely continue to lag in economic performance. Texas can't afford it.

However, as was the case with electricity and telephones in another era, private investors have no incentive to bring these technologies to areas where there aren't enough people to make their capital investment pay off. We may agree on the need, but how does it get paid for?

Here's a partial solution. One PUC commissioner has proposed using what the PUC says are local phone companies' over earnings - excess money these companies make just to connect your interstate long distance calls.

Specifically, Texans pay almost six cents per minute to local phone companies for an in-state long distance call, compared to just over a penny per minute for a call

About a penny.

According to a study by The Perryman Group, this gap in pricing means Texans pay as much as \$536 million per year more than necessary on their phone bills. Rural customers pay \$132 million or one quarter of the total.

This burden is disproportionately harder on rural customers, who spend 14 percent more time on long-distance calls than their urban neighbors. Most rural Texans also pay higher rates - many of the least populous areas have access rates well above the state's average, some as high as 15 cents per minute. In addition, these costs eat up a bigger portion of budgets in rural areas, which have lower per capita incomes.

If these funds were returned to rural customers, they would begin to help rural Texas. However, using these funds to augment investment in high-speed Internet services would produce more dramatic economic gains. Even on a conservative basis, The Perryman Group estimates the benefits over one decade to be \$2.33 billion in yearly production and almost 35,000 jobs.

We have a unique opportunity to see that rural Texas has the means to develop the needed broadband Internet infrastructure it needs for long-term economic progress. Let's ensure that the wide-open spaces now linking the global economy also encompass those original wide-open spaces where the Texas economy began.

"Between 1980 and 1996, the real value of goods and services imported into the United States tripled, from \$323.5 billion to \$959.8 billion (in 1996 dollars)," he writes. "During that same time, real Gross Domestic Product expanded by 50 percent, and total civilian employment rose by 27.4 million."

The economic growth that will be enjoyed throughout the Americas makes a hemispheric free trade zone worthwhile. Protests and rock throwing won't solve the problems facing Latin America, and tossing hockey pucks at police won't do anything to benefit US citizens.

Opening up new markets for US products is good for the US, and spreading employment opportunities to neighboring countries benefits the people living there as well as consumers living here.

Letting those Latin American countries help themselves by trading with us will allow their nations and their people to become more prosperous, which, in turn, will give them the resources to deal with their own environmental and labor concerns.

The Donley County Tourism Council and local business and ranch owners working together make all of this possible. We appreciate it so much and hope lots of people will take advantage of it all year long.



"Producers who have not yet applied for the program need to contact the Donley County FSA Office and schedule an appointment as soon as possible," said Steven Orr FSA County Executive Director.

"The program pays for losses experienced between August 1, 2000, and November 15, 2000, due to drought. Producers must have owned the livestock for at least 90 days prior to August 1. Livestock purchased after May 1, 2000, will become eligible once the 90 day period has been met," Orr said.
