

Enterprise launches new site

The Clarendon Enterprise proudly unveiled its new website this week and encouraged readers to go online and get involved.

ClarendonLive.com will ClarendonOnline.com, replace which has served the newspaper since 2000.

"The old site served its purpose, but it was time for a change," said publisher Roger Estlack. "The new site is more interactive, it is more convenient for our readers, and it will be updated more frequently."

ClarendonLive will allow readers to post comments on stories, submit story ideas and photos, and place classifieds and announcements online. In addition, visitors to the site can still search more than nine years worth of archives that were transferred from the old website.

"We want ClarendonLive.com to become the spot everyone goes to for information about Clarendon and Donley County," Estlack said. "We also want to see people get involved on the site and hope that it generates civil discussion on local topics."

Readers can also sign up to get e-mail alerts when the site is updated, and a link is available to follow the Enterprise on Facebook.

Enterprise staff members have been working since December to get ClarendonLive ready, and the new site will still be fine tuned in the coming days and weeks.

"This has truly been a team effort," the publisher said. "Contributing Editor Ashlee Estlack has put a lot of ideas and guidance into the site, and Julie Shields did a tremendous job learning the new interface and transferring content from the old site.

"Anndria Newhouse also provided great support and suggestions. We've also had a team of volunteers looking at the sight for about a week now."

Much of the credit for the new site goes to Dr. Randy Reddick, who chairs the Journalism Department at Texas Tech University.

"Dr. Reddick taught me publication design, and he has graciously taken us under his wing in the development of ClarendonLive," Estlack said. "He has done a lot of work behind the scenes, spent a day with our staff, and was on the telephone for many hours with us over the last few weeks. We truly appreciate all his efforts on this."

The Enterprise has a long tradition of reporting local events. The paper has been through many changes since its establishment as The Clarendon News in 1878. It was one of the early community papers to begin a digital edition with Enterprise-D in 2005, and ClarendonLive. com will continue that spirit of innovation.

"We will always have a newspaper, but increasingly readers will want more local news on the web," Estlack said. "That's the purpose of ClarendonLive - to keep our readers informed and connected to our community."

Health reform will increase dependence

President Bill Clinton once declared, "The Era of Big Government is over!" And it now appears that he was right. We will soon be longing for the days of "big government" now that the "Era of Gargantuan Government" - or possibly the "Era of Omnipotent Government" - is upon us.

The Imperial Congress narrowly approved the hostile takeover of the American health care system Sunday. The bill was hailed as a way to extend health care to some 32 million Americans who are currently not covered by insureditor's ance of some kind. In typical liberal fashion, the other 275 million of us are supposed to feel good about supporting and

caring for those 32 million helpless individuals. If you voluntarily want to help someone by paying for their medical bills, that's called charity. But when the government forces you to give up your

money and your rights in support of someone else, that's not charity. It is tyranny.

It is true that there are people in circumstances that are difficult and that there are people who genuinely need a helping hand. But there are also a great many people in this country who are freeloaders and only want something for nothing. This health reform caters to the second group while pointing to the sad stories of the first group.

It is, in fact, none of the federal government's business whether you have health insurance. Constitutionally, it is really none of its business whether you ever even go to the doctor or get treatment for an illness. That's up to you and private medical service providers.

But the reality of the situation is that the government has made this its business. With Medicare and Medicaid and a host of regulations, it has thrust itself into the doctor-patient relationships of millions of Americans. And no one can really say that it has been a financially sound decision. Medicare and Medicaid both have budget woes; and Medicare, like Social Security, is currently on the road to bankruptcy.

It makes no sense for the government to further tangle up this mess. A better solution would have been to enact market-driven reforms and gradually reduce people's dependence on the government. The opposite is now happening - more government and more dependence. Politicians and bureaucrats will gain more power; and if they can't squeeze enough taxes to cover the cost, Uncle Sam will just put it on his Chinese charge card.

Someday - some sweet day - either the federal government's finances will collapse, or the People will take this country back. Let's hope it's the later, and let's hope that day is in November.

Meanwhile...

Barack Hussein Obama is destined to be remembered as one of the greatest men in American history. (I'll pause as you catch your breath.)

Yes, the health care reform bill is now the law, and President Obama will justly get the credit for it. He will be mentioned in the same breath as Franklin Roosevelt and John F. Kennedy and Lyndon Johnson and take his place in the pantheon of American Presidents... or at least Democrat Presidents.

Two years ago this column said that the Democratic Party deserved a candidate like Barack Obama someone who believes wholeheartedly in the goals of the national party and will stand up for and work hard to achieve those goals. Path to adulthood has its moments



probably is not the most mature route to take, it feels like I am standing up for myself, which I never miss an opportunity to do.



What the health care bill means

Health care reform has now passed. The path it took has really has been extraordinary. It started with an issue that touches every single American and represents one-sixth of the U.S. economy. Then came 2,000 plus page bills to overhaul the system and give vast new powers to federal regulators. That led to public outrage and concern and to increased political interest and activism throughout the country. It all culminated in the use of unusual procedures to limit debate and prevent amendments. And now it has passed, despite the clear opposition of a majority of the American people.

It would be hard to find another example of legislation this significant which has become law in spite of the clear objection of the American people. No Member of Congress could have failed to hear the concerns that people had. Those who voted for the bill simply chose to ignore them.

My view is that we need reform. But Congress has a better chance of getting it right and of maintaining the trust of the American people if it takes reform in bite-sized chunks, starting with one or two reforms and building on them. That was not the path chosen by President Obama and the Democratic leadership of the Congress. They chose to do it all

What does it all mean for you?


Some of the consequences are clear from the words of the bill. Every person in the country will be required to have health insurance. If you do not have it, you will be fined. Every employer who has at least 50 employees will have to provide health insurance to its employees or

The government will create "health exchanges" from which people can buy insurance. There are tax credits and other subsidies to help some people buy insurance through the exchanges.

Medicare spending will be reduced by \$500 billion, much of it from the Medicare Advantage programs which serve about one-fourth of Medicare beneficiaries.

Tax increases of about \$569 be imposed, making job creation even



sequences are by rep. mac thornberry just as clear to those who have studied the bill. Those who currently have health insurance will pay more. One study estimated that premiums will be 10 to 15 percent more than they would have been without this bill because of the new mandates,

panies. The national debt will rise even higher. The new programs and benefits will cost more money, not less. The cost estimate provided by the Congressional Budget Office considers ten years of tax increases and Medicare cuts but only six years of benefits. If we look at an equal amount of time for revenue and benefits, the bill will undoubtedly increase debt and put an even greater strain on Medicare, a program already in financial trouble.


The federal government will be more intimately involved in decisions that are made on your health. The bill creates a number of new offices and commissions with powers to affect and

We are guaranteed to face constant political battles over health care. As the government gets more involved and controls more decisions about insurance and about care, it is inevitable that Congress will be drawn into disputes about coverage and payments.

I am often asked whether this law can be repealed or modified. Of course, it can. But doing so will require the consent of the President or an overwhelming number of votes in Congress to override the President's veto. That will be difficult to accomplish, at least for the next two years of President Obama's term. But, most of the provisions do not take effect right away. There is some time to modify them if a bill to do so is signed

into law. I know of no country that has ever gone down the path of government-run health care that has ever reversed course, but I know of no country on earth like the United States of America. Many of the people in our area are very disappointed that this bill has passed. I am too. But if people stay engaged to make their views known, it can be changed.

In 1988 Congress passed an expansion of Medicare that infuriated seniors across the country. They made sure that their elected representatives at every level knew their views. A year later, the law was repealed. It can be done. We should work to make sure that this bad health bill meets the same fate.

The Lady Broncos will continue their district schedule as they travel to McLean Friday, March 26, beginning at 4:00 p.m.

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

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Drugs in the News

Statins May Delay Progression of Prostate Cancer Millions of Americans who take a "statin type" drug to lower their cholesterol recently received exciting news about the antiinflammatory properties of these medications (Zocor, Lipitor, Crestor, Pravachol). A new study published by the American Association for Cancer Research indicates that statins may have an added but unexpected benefit of reducing the risk of prostate cancer progression. Researchers looked at tumor tissue samples from those undergoing prostate cancer surgery. They compared the amount of inflammation among men who took one of the statins in the year prior to prostate surgery with men who did not. Those who took statins had a 69% decrease in risk for having inflammation inside their prostate tumors. Men with prostate cancer currently taking statins should be encouraged by this potential added benefit. According to the National Cancer Institute, over 2 million men are living with prostate cancer in the U.S. Conventional treatment options depend on the stage of the cancer and include surgery, hormone therapy, radiation, and "watchful waiting".



I COULD NOT ... AND WILL NOT

(Jeremiah 20:9) ".....But his word was in mine heart as a burning fire shut up in my bones, and I was weary with forbearing, and I could not stay." Sometimes God's people just give up speaking out against wrong, or try to. Jeremiah couldn't stop and I can't either. It's not popular to speak out against wrong. The Lord did it and He was crucified.

Every year, about this time, a prom is scheduled and many people get so excited. Every year I and a few others speak out against it. It's not popular, but we will face God one day and give an account of our deeds done, whether good or bad (Rom. 2:5-6).

A few people left early because of this filth.

Why do some parents feel that they "must" allow their children be involved in this immoral behavior? I'm told that it is a "rite of passage." I read about and hear about parents allowing their children to have alcohol at their home with their friends so they will be safe. "They're going to do it anyway.....", they say. CHILDREN are taken to a doctor to be put on birthcontrol because, "They're going to do it anyway...." How tragic!

True love would be to teach a child why these things are SINFUL! True love would be to tell a child NO! It seems many do not have the guts or moral standard to teach their children what is right and wrong. Society has to reap the benefits. Pregnant teens having children that are basically wards of the state as we fund their behavior as a taxpayer. Drunk teens wrecking and hurting others causes heartache and higher insurance premiums. Worst of all it is a horrible example to our children that we are trying to teach Godly ways. Our children are teased and taunted by those who are "doing it" (drugs, sex, etc). The pool of possible future spouses for

our children is getting smaller by the minute. If we truly love our children, we keep them from destructive behavior. Does that mean that they won't make mistakes? Of course not, but we shouldn't enable them either. Giving them alcohol at home, permission to wear immodest clothing, obtaining birth control for them, allowing them to attend and participate in the activities at the prom and some parties is enabling them. It is also sin on the parents' part. I pray that everyone would look deep inside themselves and do what God would want. If the Lord came back while taking your child to get birth control, what would you say to your Savior? If He came back while serving alcohol to your child and his or her friends, would He be o.k. with that? If He came back while your daughter was wearing a very revealing gown at the prom, would you feel ashamed? May God give you the courage to stand for what is right and then to speak out against it. I pray that wanting to do right would become a "fire in your bones" like Jeremiah and you won't be able to contain it.

Livestock winners




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Run-off election to be April 13
