

To go into every detail of this is entirely too much, but most all persons, including merchants garages, preachers, doctors, lawyers, insurance agents, farm and ranch employes, income tax accountants, and others from Constable to President, except those working for salaries subject to the withholding tax, and whose income for 1943 or 1944, if married, did not or will not reach \$3500 or

more, and if single and will not reach \$2700 or more, all subject to withholding and you have no other income other than salaries are required to file before April

Farm owners, farm operators, (not farm hands) who will receive as much as 80% of their income from farms, have until Dec. 15th to file reports, except those who receive cash rents, or its equivalent, in advance, must file before April 15th.

Also at least ¼ of your estimated tax for 1944 must be paid at the time you file your reports. Then ¼ each quarter of the year, so by Dec. 15, you will have paid your estimated tax, then after home at Miami after spending a January 1st, you will file your

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




