As for the mountains separating these two distinctly different areas of southern Italy, I have crossed them by only one road, but it is one of the most scenic trips I have ever taken. There is almost always at least one town in sight perched up on the very top of a mountain, and usually you can see two or three of these at one time. From a distance they make an unbelievably beautiful picture, but occasionally the road meanders up the hill and wanders through the middle of one of them; then they lose some of their "Old World Charm" and just stink. Most of the hills and moun tains, except the highest and most rugged, are cultivated in some manner or other, being covered either with patchwork fields or vegetable patches, or spotted with trees, all of which makes for an entirely different type of mountain scenery than anything you see at least in the western part of the States, where Nature is usualy allowed to take her course in







HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Section 9 of Article 8 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by changing said Section 9 so as to provide that the Commissioners Court in any county may re-allocate the county tax levies authorized in said section by changing the rates provided for any of the same, but in no event shall the total of such taxes exceed eighty (80) cents on the one hundred dollars valuation for any one year; providing that before such Commissioners Court may make such re-allocations and changes in such levies that the same shall be submitted to the qualified property tax paying voters of such county at a general or special election and shall be approved by a majority of the qualified property tax paying voters, voting in such election; providing that if and when such re-allocations and changes in such county tax levies have been approved by the qualified property tax paying voters of any county as herein provided, such re-allocations and changes shall remain in force and effect for a period of six (6) years from the date of the election at which same shall have been changed by a majority vote of the qualified property tax paying voters of such county, voting on the proposition, after submission by the Commissioners Court at a general or special election for that purpose; providing that this section shall not be construed as a limitation on powers delegated to counties, cities or towns by any other section or sections of this Construction; fixing the time for the election for the adoption or rejection of said proposed Constitutoinal Amendment; making certain provisions for said election and ballots theraof and the method thereof; directing the issuance of proclamation therefor; prescribing certain duties of the Governor of the State of Texas; and making an appropriation to defray the expenses of said election. Section 1. That Section 9 of Article 8 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be so amended that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed thirty-five (35) cents on the one hundred dollars valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy more than twenty-five (25) cents for city or county purposes, and not exceeding fifteen (15) cents of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws. This section shall not be construed as a limitation of power delegated to counties, cities or towns by any other section or sections of this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a general election to be held throughout the State of Texas, be the country voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax; not to exceed itifteen (15) cents on the one hundred dollars valuation; and no texpectation of the property subject to taxation in such county. > Families of prisoners of war are urged not to write too often and not to write long letters in order that the mail may be sure to be delivered. And they are asked to put the address toward the bottom of the envelope in order that the postmarks may not make the name undecipherable.

The deportation of civilians and their confinement in concentraficult problems in communications. A distinction is made between persons confined in concentration or labor camps and between interned civilians.

Persons in concentration camps are not assimilated to the Geneva Convention despite frequent efforts on the part of the International Committee of the Red Cross, it has not been possible to obtain for them any of the privileges of the Geneva Convention. Civilian internees are assimilat-

ed and may send and receive mail. Representatives of the International Committee of the Red Cross are not admitted to concentration or to labor camps.

SLEEPING SICKNESS (Horses) It is generally believed that this ease is transmitted by blood sucking insects. Tests have shown that 10 different types of mosquitoes can carry or spread disease. People are subject to this disease as same as horses. Children are more susceptible than grown people.

From July to frost is the most common time that sleeping sickness breaks out. With continued rains followed by period of hot dry weather favors the outbreak or spread of sleeping sickness. Nearly every animal that develops sleeping sickness develops a fever, sleepiness, grinding of teeth, wobbly gait, with difficulty in chewing and swallowing.

One type of sleeping sickness may not go any further than this stage but the other type may continue to cause involvement of the brain and spinal cord. The lips become loose and droopy, sometimes wrinkled or perhaps drawn to one side. Head, shoulders and flanks sleeping sickness.

As you'd muscles may twitch spasmodically. Some animals may back persistently, stumble or circle in one direction, switching tail as they move. Whinnying is common symptom. In most cases the ania few become wild and unman- ber 5th:

The dejected sleeper, when aroused may show interest in eating or drinking for few minutes but will probably go to sleep with food or water in mouth.

As preventative measure, approved, commercially available chick embryo vaccine with the virus killed by solution of formaldehyde is recommended. This vaccine may be purchased with eastern, western or both types of virus. Since the virus has been destroyed by the formaldehyde there is no danger of infecting well animals with disease

In the past there has been several reactions or deaths resulting from injection of vaccines. These results can be prevented by injecting vaccine into the skin and not under skin and 'not in the

One dose of vaccine lasts only be given in 7 to 10 days.
