## County Eligible For Help

Judge Christal received a letter from George W. Bush, Texas Governor, declaring Donley county eligible for emergency disaster loans due to the damages and losses caused by drought.

Businesses depending on farmers and ranchers in Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Collingsworth, Donley, Gray, Hall, and Wheeler Counties can now apply for low interest Economic Injury Disaster Loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA). These loans are available to help businesses meet normal operating expenses that cannot be met due to the effects of a disaster. Drought which occurred January 1 through October 28, 1994 caused many farmers and ranchers to experience reduced incomes which may have had a adverse economic effect on businesses depending upon these producers. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible for this loan program but may be eligible for disaster assistance through other Federal agencies. However, nurseries that are victims of drought disasters can apply.

To obtain an application or received additional information, interested business owners may call the SBA toll free at 1-(800) 366-6303 or TDD (817) 267-4688 for the hearing impaired. The deadline for filing applications is September 26, 1995.

## Grand Jury Convened

The Donley County Grand Jury convened for its regularly scheduled meeting Monday, April 10, 1995 returning four indictments.

The 100th Judicial District Court was presided by Judge David McCoy and heard three pleas from two different defendants.

In Donley County cause #2723, State vs. Keith Allen Brinson, the defendant plea "guilty" to Unauthorized Use of a Motor Vehicle and received 2 years deferred adjudication and fined \$400.00. The defendant was also ordered to pay \$50.00 restitution.

In Donley County cause #2742, State vs. Keith Allen Brinson, the defendant pled "guilty" to Aggravated Assault and received 2 years deferred adjudication to run concurrent with cause #2723. The defendant was also fined \$400.00.

In Donley County cause #2753, State vs. Bonita Kay Thompson Miller, the defendant pled "guilty" to Felony DWI and received 3 years confinement TDCJ-ID, probated, with 30 days to be served in the County Jail. The defendant also was fined \$1000.00 and her driver's license was suspended for 2 years.

The State was represented in each cause by District Attorney Randall C. Sims.

The District Attorney Staff will be in Hall County Monday April 17, 1995 for its regularly scheduled meeting with the Grand Jury and other general business.

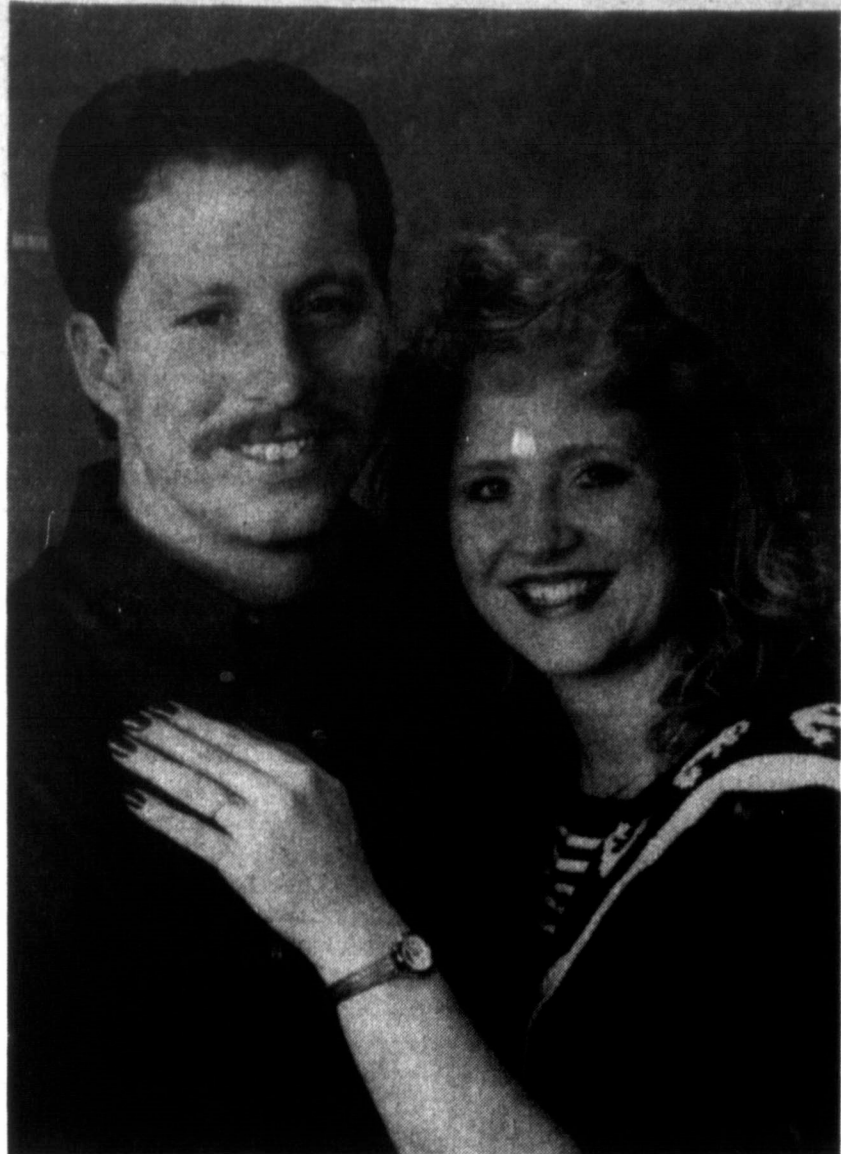

producers experienced crop losses and were not able to purchase goods and services at normal levels. Businesses that are dependent upon these producers may have experienced decreased sales, reduced gross profit margins, increased accounts receivable or difficulty in moving inventories at normal levels. To the extent these problems have caused the business difficulty in meeting its normal obligations, these loans may be of assistance. The loan can help a business meet installments on long-term debt, accounts payable and overhead expenses that would have been met had the disaster not occurred. Refinancing of long-term debt, however, is not eligible under this program. The loan is designed for those businesses with substantial disaster-related needs and is intended to supplement money the business owner can provide from other sources.

Loans may be approved for up to \$1,500,00 for actual disaster-related financial needs of the business. Interest rates are four percent and terms may extend to thirty years, depending upon the repayment ability of the individual applicant. To qualify, businesses must be small by SBA's size standard. Businesses which can meet their financial needs through other sources are not eligible.

### CC To Raise Money For New Facility

Pampa Center Steering Committee, and Clarendon College embarked on a campaign to raise \$4.9 million to fund a new facility for the Clarendon College - Pampa Center. The campaign was announced Thursday, April 6 at the Pampa Chamber of Commerce.

"We felt it was very crucial to the success of the campaign to make a major announcement so that local and area residents would be aware of what we are trying to accomplish for the Clarendon College - Pampa Center," commented fundraising committee chairman Loyd Waters.

The Clarendon College - Pampa Center is presently located in an old elementary school building that was closed to public use and was being used as a storage facility. The condition of the building is at a point that major renovations and repairs would need to be done in order to continue using the building.

"The costs associated with these improvements would be astronomical. It would also be something the college would be doing continuously in order to keep the building operable," said Clarendon College President Dr. Jerry Stockton.

The new building will provide nine additional lecture classrooms to the present ten, one additional computer lab, one multi-purpose meeting/classroom (seating 150), student lounge, sturdy areas, EMT lab room, an electronics lab, and a multimedia learning resource center. The facility will also be computer networked and cable TV ready for access to distance learning. This will provide the Pampa Center the capability of attracting four-year institutions to conduct upper level courses via video conferencing and distance learning technologies.

"The concept of building a facility that is top-of-the-line will provide Clarendon College with the chance to be on the leading edge of future technologies in the community college ranks. It will also allow us to attract more students and have a broader offering of courses," stated Pampa Center Associated Dean Joe Kyle Reeve.

Construction of the new building will be paid for with funds generated through tax deductible donation and gifts from individuals and local, regional, and national foundations. ## Predator Session Scheduled

The Texas Department of Agriculture will conduct a Predator Management Training Program on Tuesday, April 25, 1995 at the Clarendon Jr. College Ranch and Feedlot Occupations Classroom located at Clarendon Jr. College in Clarendon. The training session will begin at 6:00 p.m. and will end by 9:30 p.m. The program will include identifying causes of predation, alternative methods of predator control and M-44 sodium cyanide to control coyotes, feral dogs and foxes preying on livestock should attend the course. To continue using M-44 sodium cyanide, all M-44 applicators certified prior to April 18, 1988, must take this course and be recertified. Proper certification to use M-44 sodium cyanide also requires possession of a private applicator certificate or license, a non commercial applicator license or a commercial

applicator license to purchase restricted-use and state-limited-use pesticides. Information on obtaining these types of licenses will be covered at the training session, contact Crystal Wilbanks Predator Management Specialist, Texas Department of Agriculture, at (512) 463-0013, or Zachary Wilcox, County Extension Agent-Ag Donley County at (806) 874-2141.



Spier lot was discussed, an offer of \$10,000.00 now and \$10,000.00 next year with no interest, totaling \$20,000.00. Motion was made by Alderman Shawn

Barker to make this offer, seconded by Alderman Mac Stavenhagen. Motion carried. Offer accepted. Annexing was discussed and work will continue on the annexing of the land just north of city limits on Hwy 70. The sewer lines for Thunder Junction was discussed, no action taken at this time. The ticket for the fund raiser for the moving of the Depot was drawn, and a report of progress was given by Kevin Welch. The paving of the street in front of the car wash on McClelland was discussed and a motion was made by Alderman Delmar Wiggs to do a double seal coat thirty day apart when the weather is permitting, seconded by Alderman David Pitts. Motion carried. Bills for the month of March 1995, were presented. Motion was made by Alderman David Pitts, seconded by Alderman Bobbie Kidd to pay bills. Motion carried. Fire Department Receipts and Disbursements for the month of March 1995, were presented and upon a motion by Alderman Delmar Wiggs, seconded by Alderman Bobbie Kidd. Motion carried. There being no further business at this time, motion was made by Alderman David Pitts, seconded by Alderman Delmar Wiggs to adjourn. Motion carried.

### Farm Service News

Producers of wheat, oats, barley, and rye should be aware that the crop reporting date has changed from May 15 to April 28. If you plant these crops for any purpose, such as grain, grazing, baling, etc., you should certify these crops in the CFSA office for program eligibility if participating or carrying insurance and for history credit if not participating. These crops must be substantially destroyed (if not for grain) by the April 28 deadline. Producers wishing to hay or graze small grains that are not substantially destroyed after this date, must request to do so at the CFSA office before April 28. Wheat that is not substantially destroyed and is baled or grazed after April 28, with no request on file at the CFSA office, is considered harvested grain and will count toward your total harvested acres.

Producers of wheat, grain sorghum, peanuts, and cotton must purchase at least the catastrophic level of crop insurance (CAT) to remain eligible for USDA program benefits, price support, production adjustments, certain FmHA loans, and disaster assistance on crops that are not insurable. The sales closing date has passed, but the CFSA office can accept late filed requests for CAT coverage until April 28, 1995. Producers must have a program linkage requirement and certify that the crop is not planted yet or is in good condition (capable of producing 90 percent of the APH yield for the crop.) Actual production history (APH) will be used to determine your crop insurance yield. If you have production records for your insured crops you should bring it to the CFSA office within 45 days of the sales closing date of March 15, 1995. APH yields will be a minimum of four years and a maximum of ten years records. Transitional yields will be used for the year when no actual production is provided, no T yields will be used.

Producers must report any failed crop to this office within 15 days of the date the disaster caused the crop to fail. Do not destroy the crop prior to notifying the CFSA office. Your insurance agent should be contacted about the failed acres. Form ASCS-574 must be filed in the CFSA office. The County Committee can only approve the ASCS-574 for failed acreage when assigned or appraised yield is equal to or below the de minimus yield and the loss is due to an eligible disaster condition. The de minimus yield for wheat is four bushels/ac. If appraised at greater than four bu/ac. the crop could be approved for low yield but not failed. If the crop cannot be approved as failed, the acreage is not eligible for a "ghost" acreage of another crop, such as cotton.

Sign up for the 1995 farm program will continue from now until April 28, 1995. The 0/85/92 program will continue to be available. The deficiency payment rate will generally be based on the difference between the target price and the national average price received by producers during the designated five month marketing period. Producers must have a crop acreage base and comply with the 1995 provisions to be eligible for deficiency payments. Most of the 1995's are the same as or similar to the 1994 ARP provision. Call the CFSA office for an appointment to sign up in the farm program and/or to certify small grains.

The current livestock feed program will run through May 31, 1995 or until grazing conditions improve. Remember that livestock changes need to be reported by the tenth of each month at the CFSA office.

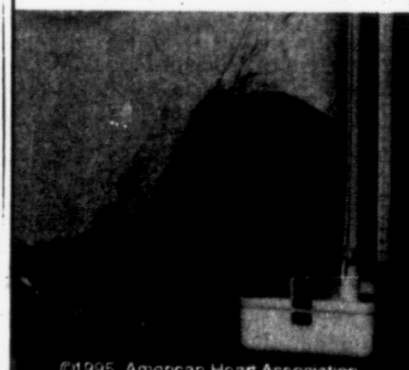

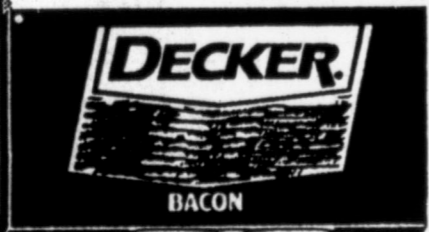
