The demand is active because consumers can use much more beef than they are getting. A steady run of cattle to market through the summer makes processing easier for the packers, who also are affected by the labor shortage.

More than six million of the estimated 82-million beef cattle population of the nation are on Texas farms and ranches. To meet the slaughter quotas for civilian lend-lease and military needs more than 32-million head of cattle and calves must be marketed in 1944. Texas' portion of this total is in the neighborhood of two million animals, including about two hundred thousand feed lot calves. The major part of the slaughter animals are of the grass fat type.

If Texas producers are not disposed to market all of their grass finished animals at this time, Smith suggests culling and selling other types. Every herd has some off-type heifers, dry cows and when they are between six and 12 older breeding cows which can be rounded up and marketed this summer.

Fowl pox, which causes concurs in a heavy fall run to market. and can occur in fowl from chick age to advanced years. 



U. S. S. San Diego Crew's Letter: Dear Folks

Because of security reason which are absolutely essential in war time, censorship regulations are very strict, and so in my letters home I have not been able to tell you much about anything we have done, or where we have been. It seems the Navy has rented the whole place just so we enlisted men might spend a night ashore and away from the ship; pretty swell, right?

After a short time there, we proceeded on out to the combat zone. It is not true that we go looking or are fighting everyday, so part of the time we spend in a port, at one of the Pacific Islands. While in port we do the regular routine work which varies from painting to further study and practice on our wartime jobs so that we will know more about our part of a fighting ship when the time of need comes.

There is time for recreation and we have at hand a few things to do. Our ship's newspaper had a contest for the largest fish to be caught; one of the sailors caught a 12 lb. 3 oz. fish to win. There must have been from forty to fifty fishing lines over the side all the

# R. L. Templeton **Campaigning For** Representative
