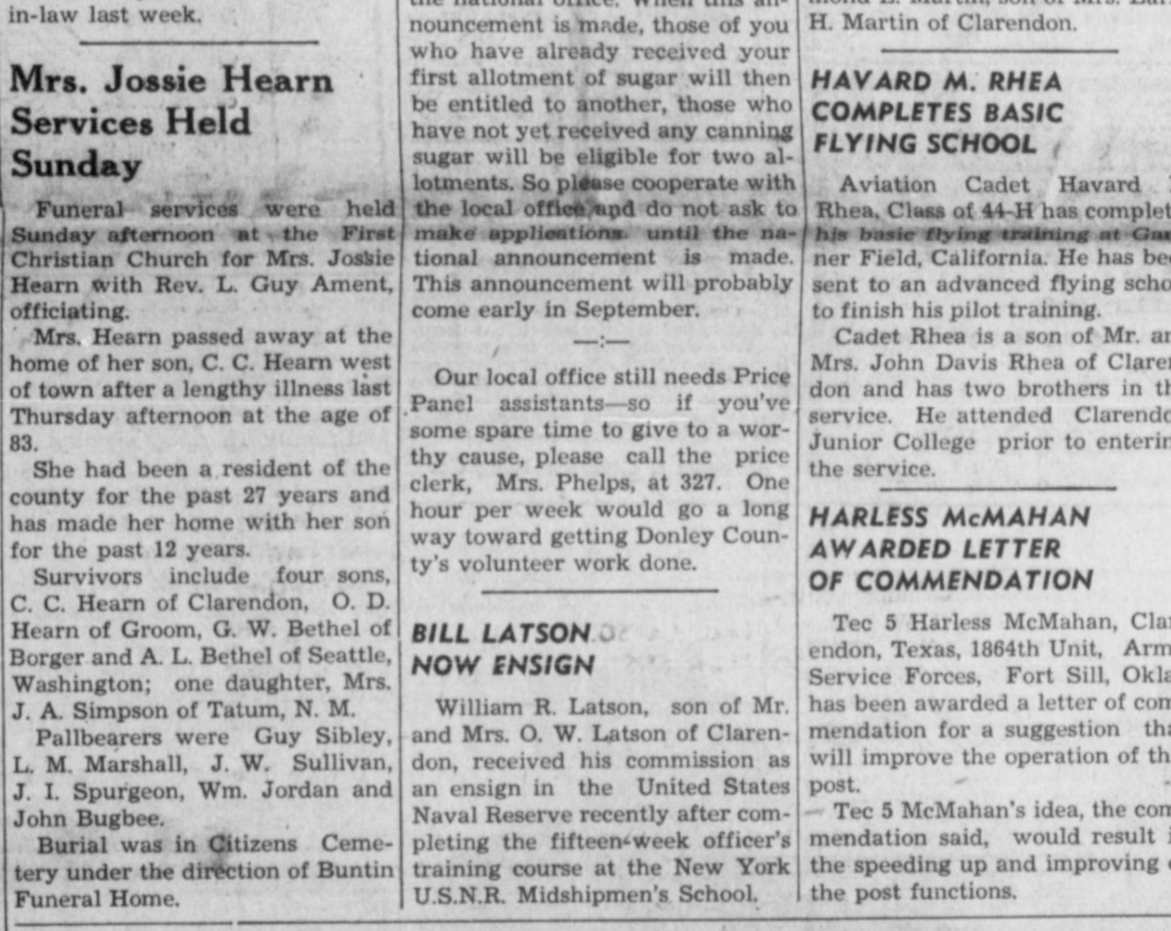

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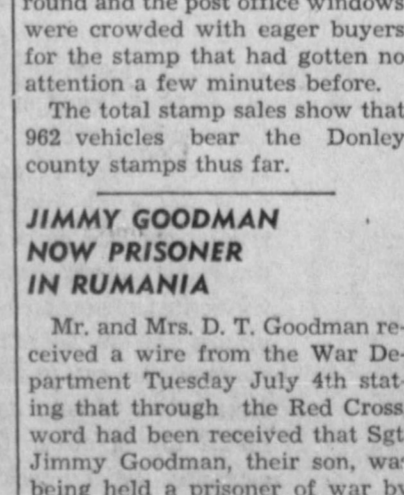
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Ration Reminder

MEATS, FATS—Red stamps A8 through W8, good indefinitely; X8, Y8, Z8, become good July 2nd. PROCESSED FOODS—Blue stamps A8 through V8, good indefinitely; W8, X8, Y8, Z8, and A5, become good July 1st. SUGAR—Sugar stamps 30, 31 and 32 each good for five pounds indefinitely. Sugar stamp 40, good for five pounds of canned sugar through February, next year. GASOLINE—A-12 coupons, good through September 21. SHOES—Airplane stamps 1 and 2, good indefinitely.

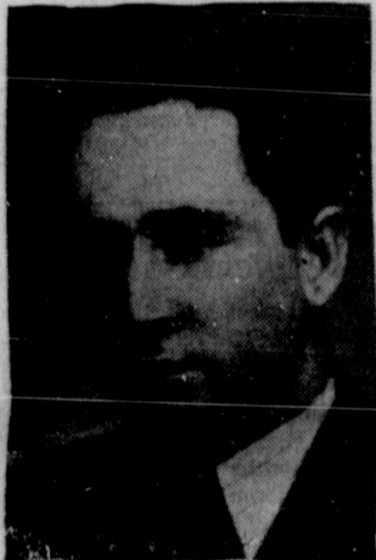
We had a visit with the Arthur Seatons Saturday. Their son, Faris writes he is well and is in England.

Our people are still reading—from 150 to 175 books checked out each Saturday afternoon and from 50 to 75 on each of the other days.

A few new books have come in: "The Wounded Get Back" by Albert Q. Maisel—a thrilling report of the miracles of medicine in treating our wounded men;

"Mother"—an anthology containing tributes from world famous authors; "You Wouldn't Know Me from Adam," by Colonel Stoopnagle—a nonsense book to counteract the horrors of war; "Wrath of the Eagles" by Frederick Heydenau—a story of the guerilla warfare carried on by the Chetniks in the mountains of Yugoslavia—as seen by an American submarine officer who had brought guns and ammunition to these people in their desperate fight for freedom; "The Whole Heart" by Helen Howe—an A.L.A. selection—the story of an author and a radio commentator; "Substitute Nurse" by Adelaide Humphries; "Grand Crossing" by Alexander Saxton—described as an earnest, intelligent story of a young man trying to find the best way of life; "Dr. Whitney's Secretary" by Dorothy P. Walker—another one of the popular doctor and nurse stories.

It is with books as with other things now—you may get what you order and you may not. Even reprints are not always available. War stories are dominating more and more as the war dominates our thinking more and more. Yet many other books, some more serious and some in lighter vein, are being presented the reading public.

Virginia Chase's humorous story of a Maine doctor and his family, "The Maine House," will be issued in Braille for blind readers by the Library of Congress.

Lloyd C. Douglass' "The Robe" and Sholem Asch's "The Apostle" continue to be best sellers, which shows that not only light stories are popular. And "Undercover" is still being quoted as a best seller in non-fiction. We have lately placed it on our shelves.

"The People of India" by Kumor Goshal contends that the Indian National Congress is a truly representative body and that its leaders are ready for decisive united action.

A consumer durable goods survey, including such items as furniture, hand tools, refrigerators, vacuum cleaners, washing machines, and cook stoves, is underway throughout the District, the Office of Price Administration reports.

"Because there have been fewer of these items for sale, the demand for them has increased many fold, and in counties where there have been any of these items for sale there have been complaints on prices," District officials stated.

Common Housefly A Health Hazard

Millions of flies help to cause the illness and death of thousands of children and adults each year in the United States. Hundreds of these casualties may be in the State of Texas this year if residents fail in their responsibility for developing the best possible sanitation measures in the area where they reside.

Typhoid fever, summer complaint, and other intestinal diseases can be traced to the common housefly as the carrier of infection.

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, speaking in this connection recently said, "Be sure that your windows and doors are tightly screened so that stray flies from a careless neighbor will not endanger your family. Be sure that flies are kept away from food, drink, and utensils used in the preparation of food. Make sure, if you live in rural districts, that outside privy vaults are tightly covered so as not to permit the entrance of flies. Infections from this source can be picked up and spread to human beings through contact with food, drink, and utensils. Keep all garbage covered until collected or buried. Eliminate all breeding places for flies and you will be helping your community in its work of controlling communicable diseases and preventing unnecessary illness."

Mineral Oil Destroys Food Essentials

Increased war-time use of mineral oil in salad dressings, salted nuts, potato chips and doughnuts may have serious nutritional consequences.

This concern is expressed by Hazel Phipps of the A&M College Extension Service who cites nutrition research at state experiment stations which have shown that mineral oil robs the body of at least two of the fat-soluble vitamins necessary to health and also of two important minerals, calcium and phosphorus.

The American Medical Association also has issued a recent warning against indiscriminate use of mineral oil, Miss Phipps says. The AMA statement says prolonged use of mineral oil can interfere seriously with the absorption of Vitamins A, D and K by the body.

The specialist in food preparation explains that because doctors sometimes recommend mineral oil for special diets, apparently many people prescribe it for themselves.

Mineral oil has come into wider use in food preparation during the war because it has not been rationed along with other fats and oils and because it has been plentiful and relatively cheap. Nor does it become rancid. It has practically no taste, so it cannot be detected in salad dressings.

Air Corps Open To Young Men

Enlistment in the Air Corps Enlisted Reserve is again open to qualified young Americans now 17 years of age—who want to win their wings on the "greatest team in the world"—an AAF air combat crew.

Young men of 17 who want to fly with the AAF may apply at any AAF Examining Board for enlistment in the Air Corps Enlisted Reserve. Upon passing the preliminary qualifying physical and mental tests; they will become members of the U. S. Army Air Forces on inactive duty. This means that they will not be called for training until they have reached their 18th birthday. If at work, they may remain on the job until they are 18. If in high school, they may elect to complete the semester they entered prior to their 18th birthday. If they are high school graduates, not over 17 years and 9 months of age, they may elect to take advantage of the Army Specialized Training Reserve Program, which provides free college training for men approaching military age.

When called, they will first be given basic training. During this period, they will take aptitude tests to determine whether they will be classified for training as gunner, pilot, bombardier, or navigator.

New Use For Gelatin

A box of gelatin may have a place with your home laundry aids, as well as in your kitchen cupboard.

Gelatin is a good remedy for rayon dresses that become limp and wrinkle easily after washing. Mrs. Dora R. Barnes, clothing specialist for the A&M College Extension Service, says the process is simple: Just dip the dress in a gelatin and water solution.

Starching is not successful with most rayon fabrics. Mrs. Barnes explains, but plain, granulated gelatin, softened and when dissolved in water, likely will give the needed "body" or filling. The amount of gelatin used will depend on the stiffness desired, but usually two tablespoons should be enough. You might use less for sheer rayon, Mrs. Barnes says.

Here are her directions: "First, soak the gelatin a few minutes in a little cold water, then dissolve with boiling water. Pour the solution in a bowl large enough to hold the dress and add enough cold water to be comfortable for your hands. After the dress is washed and rinsed, dip it in the gelatin solution and squeeze it gently. Then roll the dress in a thick bath towel until it is dry enough to iron. Finally, remember that ironing rayon requires low heat."

Mrs. Barnes says she also has tried gum arabic with similar success, and that borax is good for stiffening lace collars. Instructions for their use, however, differ from the instructions for using gelatin.

Harley Longan Writes Letter of Naval Life

EDITORS NOTE—In the following letter Harley Longan tells of a few things the navy man sees and experiences while on and off duty. Harley is a son of Mrs. Edith Longan of the Midway community.

U. S. S. San Diego
Crew's Letter:
Dear Folks,

Because of security reasons which are absolutely essential in war time, censorship regulations are very strict, and so in my letters home I have not been able to tell you much about anything we have done, or where we have been. Now the ship is starting to publish these Crew Letters with the idea of telling you as much as possible of some of the interesting happenings of our ship.

Shortly after leaving the States we stopped for a short time at that supposed island of Paradise, which under war time conditions falls far short. We didn't see the beautiful south sea dancers nor were we greeted by a large group of people who gives each person a lae as we always saw in the movies. Some of us had the privilege of staying in the Hotel Royal Hawaiian for one night, and on other days sightseeing tours were arranged for us.

Golly, the hotel, was great! Understand that in peace time it cost as much as twenty-five dollars a day to stay there. It only cost us twenty-five cents, just enough to pay for laundering of the sheets and pillow cases. It seems the Navy has rented the whole place just so we enlisted men might spend a night ashore and away from the ship; pretty swell, right?

After a short time there, we proceeded on out to the combat zone. It is not true that we go looking or are fighting everyday, so part of the time we spend in a port, at one of the Pacific Islands. While in port we do the regular routine work which varies from painting to further study and practice on our wartime jobs so that we will know more about our part of a fighting ship when the time of need comes.

There is time for recreation and we have at hand a few things to do. Our ship's newspaper had a contest for the largest fish to be caught; one of the sailors caught a 12 lb. 3 oz. fish to win. There must have been from forty to fifty fishing lines over the side all the time. Each day a large number of the crew went ashore for afternoon. There was not a great deal to do but it was good to get off the ship and get our feet on land.

Another thing, I put my feet on soil that at one time belonged to the Japs which was a thrill. We have movies aboard at night and every so often have what is called

a Happy Hour, which is a talent show including our swell band. In the last few days, we have been out looking for some Jap ships to do away with, but unfortunately we did not contact anything. Our airplanes found a small little fellow and left it sinking, but each day was just as any other day.

So far everything is OK and I am well. Perhaps soon we can have another Crew's Letter to send you.

R. L. Templeton Campaigning For Representative

R. L. Templeton took his campaign for representative to the north end of the district this week after speaking at Abra Tuesday. If elected I will carry out the duties of my office as my conscience and my desire to obey the will of the people tell me. I have no radical ideas. I will not be influenced by pressure groups nor will I allow prejudice or partiality to influence me against my better judgment.

My primary interests are for the farmer, cattleman and ordinary businessman because these are the ones I know and understand best. I propose to do my best to be of service to every legitimate business organization in my district, be it large or small; I want to help the new as well as the old industries in Texas.

As for old age pensions, my grandmother gets a pension and through her I have been able to see how much that little income means to all lonely old people like her. The independence and security she gets from that pension, although it has been cut while my opponent was in office, is the only bright spot in her lonely life. I am not one to make glowing promises that I might not be able to fulfill; but I will say that you can depend on me to support old age pensions.

Prison Labor Limited

Only 45,000 prisoners of war will be available to Texas farmers for agricultural work in the months ahead, the Eighth Service Command has advised the Texas A&M College Extension Service.

At the present time there are only one-third as many prisoners in the Command area as a year ago. Extension representatives have been told. Earlier, one-half of all the war prisoners in the United States were located in this area Command embracing 5 states, but many have been moved out to help meet critical labor needs in other areas.

A recent agreement between the commanding officer of the Eighth Service Command and Acting Extension Director J. D. Prewit will permit movement of the prisoners to branch camps for employment in harvesting crops wherever the Extension Service consider the greatest needs exist. The commanding general also is considering the establishing of mobile camp units for use in emergencies. These units might include 150 to 250 men.

Recent regulations will prevent the use of prisoners for agricultural work such as brush clearing, cleaning ditches, and building fences, according to C. Hohn, Extension state farm labor supervisor. Their work must be limited to food production.

The provision that the government cannot bear the expense of furnishing war prisoners for agricultural work, still stands, Mr. Hohn explains, and farmers will

be expected to pay their wages, cost of subsistence and transportation. Ordinarily there is more expense attached to establishing branch camps for emergency work than in obtaining prisoners from the base camps in the state.
