subjects.

Judge Davidson of Childress and former District Judge Marvin H. Brown of Fort Worth, spoke in behalf of Governor Hobby. After them, the various candidates for district offices

Judge Davidson opened the speak-ing, being introduced by Dr. B. L. Funkins, made a splendid appeal upon the issues in the governor's race, in behalf of Governor Hobby.

Judge Brown was then introduced and in his very characteristic way dived into the issues of the campaign for governor, using sarcasm, satire, wit and humor, argument and ora-tory, and in all delivering one of the finest addresses heard here in many a day. Judge Brown took up the race of the two candidates for governor, Hobby and Ferguson, and told some personal political history, events in which he personally took part when a member of the Legislature, and riddled the arguments of Ferguson and his supporters. Taking up the charges on which Mr. Ferguson was impeached from the Governor's chair. Judge Brown drew many interesting illustrations from a practical view-



should not use more than a total of 11/2 pounds of wheat flour or prepared wheat, in

any form, per person per week, including the wheat flour in Victory bread, and including the wheat flour or prepared wheat in crackers, pastry, macaroni, breakfast and other

Victory bread is bread manufactured by bakers under the rules of the United States Food Administration. In estimating flour consumption 1% pounds of Victory bread may be considered equal to 1 pound of wheat flour.

In buying wheat flour an equal weight of other cereals as sub-

is the 50-50 rule. In buying mixed flours, the substitutes in them may be counted, so that a smaller proportion of substitutes may be bought with these flours than with white flour. In buying graham and whole wheat flours (containing not less than 95 per cent of the entire wheat) 6/10 pounds of substitutes shall be purchased with every pound of such flours.

Wheat flour substitutes are hominy, corn grits, corn meal, corn flour, edible corn starch, barley flour, rolled oats, oatmeal, rice, rice flour, buckwheat flour, potato flour, sweet potato flour, soya bean flour, and feterita flour and meals.

Householders in towns and cities may not buy more than one-eighth of a barrel of flour or two pounds of sugar at any one time. Householders in the country may not buy more than one-fourth of a barrel of flour or five pounds of sugar at any one time. In no event shall any purchaser have more than 30 days' supply of either on hand.

Householders should not use more than % pounds of sugar per person

In addition to the above, however, sugar may be used for home canning and will be available to the householder for that purpose upon his signing a certificate that such sugar is desired and will be used only for that purpose. No wheat flour, or prepared wheat in any form, should be used for any purould be used for other purposes.

PECIAL TAX For MAINTENANCE OF PUBLIC SCHOOLS AND FURNISHING FREE TEXT BOOKS.

House Joint Resolution No. 27.

Proposing an amendment to Art. 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by changing Sec. 3, providing for a thirty-five cent tax levy for the maintenance of the public schools of Texas, and providing free text books in public schools of the State of Texas, making an appropriation ther-

Be it resolved by the Legislature of

the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution, be so changed to read as follows (creating a new

Sec. 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes and a poll tax of one (\$1.00) dollar on every male inhabitant of this State, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount not to exceed thirty-five an amount not to exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred (\$100) dollar valuation, as, with the available school fund arising from all other sources, will be sufficient to maintain and suport the public chools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and it shall be the duty of the State Board of Education to set aside a sufficient amount out of the said tax to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State; provided, however, that should the limit of taxation herein named be insufficient, the deficit may be met be insufficient, the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State, and the Legisla-ture may also provide for the forma-tion of school districts by general or special law without the local notice required in other cases of special legislation; and all such school districts, whether created by general or special law, may embrace parts of two or more counties. And the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts, and for the management and control of the public school or schools of said district, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties. And the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts hertofore formed or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and the erection and equipment of school buildings therein; provided, that a majority of the qualified prop-erty tax-paying voters of the district, voting at an election to be held for that purpose, shall vote such tax, not to exceed in any one year fifty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of the property subject to taxa-tion in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent

school districts.
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1918, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amend-ment shall write or have printed on we printed on . TAKING OF TESTIMONY IN CRIMINAL CASES

House Joint Resolution No. 2.

To amend Section 10, Article 1, of the Constituttion of the State

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
Section 1. That Section (10) or Article (1) of the Constitution of the

State of Texas be so amended that the same will read and hereafter be as follows:

Sec. (10.) In all criminal prosecutions the accused shall have a speedy day night at Clarendon as the guests public trial by an impartial jury. He shall have the right to demand the nature and cause of the accusation against him, and to have a copy thereof. There is a scope of country along the Mexican border in New Mexico, about 20 miles long, that has been subjected to repeated raids from Mexican cow thieves across the Rio Grande the past six months. The ern Stockmen's Association has had sense with nonsense and accept tion, and local cowmen have main-tained about 10 guards along the bor-der in New Mexico. There have been 244 head of cattle driven from Ameri-244 head of cattle driven from American ranches across the border that we know of and only 95 head have been recovered, and that at considerable expense in rewards, etc.

On the night of June 20th a bunch of Mexicans came across the border and raided the ranch of F. N. Hall, an El Paso cattleman. The ranch is about 10 miles from the border. The thieves carried off 40 head that is known. By offering reward 18 head were returned, crossing the line about where they were taken over but the balance are still missing. It seems these fellows are not only in the game to reap benefit direct, but hold them on a ransom basis. 



ICE SHORTABLE IN ROUSTUR **CUTS DOWN SUPPLY TO NON-ESSENTIALS**



Excessively hot weather and not a lack of supplies has made it necessary to con-serve 100 tons of ice in Hous. ton a day. Just how to meet the local situation and at the same time not cause the small consumer to

suffer was a problem for the food administration and the ice dealers of Houston to decide. The result of a conference on Monday afternoon at the office of Administrator Peden was the decision to cut the non-essential users of ice to 75 per cent of their normal consumption, including all users of ice above 200

pounds. Soda fountains, soft drink stands, ice cream manufacturers and similar industries will feel the order rather sharply-many of them already in the throes of adjusting their business to the limited ration of sugar allotted them. It is expected that they will care for their reduced allotments of ice by eliminating the broken ice exposed to the air in troughs and on counters. The practice of shaving ice by restaurants, soda fountains and other such users the administration announces should be eliminated.

The public is requested to avoid delaying the ice man. Owing to a scarcity of help he is probably serving a larger route than ever before. Co-operation on the part of the householder will enable him to cover a great er territory, thereby minimizing meltage and at the same time release labor for other essential

purposes.
"There is no need for hysterics," says Administrator Peden. "There is no danger of an actual famine in ice, but there is a serious need for the elimination of all waste and extravagance. If the public will co-operate by avoiding unnecessary waste in the use of ice there will be plenty to supply everybody."

The situation is a local and not a State one-all ice problems be-Houston instance may, however, be construed as a precedent for the State, and no doubt if the conditions were identical the application of the remedy would be identical.

FERGUSON ADMITS

SENATE'S RIGHT

Dallas, Texas, July 1 .- Former Governor Ferguson has admitted the 7,920.00 Senate's right to impeach him, despite his declarations that he had resigned when the judgement was rendered. In his recent speech at Arlington, he said: "While I was pleading for my TOTAL _____\$170,310.72 own official life," referring to his address before the Senate on the morning of Sept. 22, 1917.

That afternoon, following the closing prosecuting speech by M. M. Crane, the Court of Impeachment vot. ed to sustain the first charge preferred by the House of Representatives, relative to use of \$5,600 of the State's money to pay his private indebtedness.

"Admitting throughout his speech that the Court had the right to impeach him, Mr. Ferguson pleaded for a verdict of not guilty," says Senator Whitfield Carhart, as cashier of said McNealus. "Obviously it was absurd a court which had 'no jurisdiction.' the best of our knowledge and belief. His plea was tantamount to admission of both the power and right of the Court to remove him from office and bar him from holding office in the future.


