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### WINTER SESSION DISTRICT COURT MEETS HERE JANUARY 10TH WITH HEAVY DOCKET

DISTRICT JUDGE HENRY S. BISHOP WILL CONVENE COURT HERE ON JANUARY 10TH. MANY IMPORTANT CRIMINAL CASES WILL BE TRIED. SEVERAL LARGE CIVIL SUITS WILL ALSO COME UP FOR A HEARING. BUSY SESSION PROMISED.

The winter session of the District court to convene here on the above date promises to be of more than usual interest. This is probably the heaviest docket for several years, due in part to cases being brought here on a change of venue.

Among the more important cases docketed for this term is the Gilbert case on a change of venue from Potter county wherein the defendant is charged with murder. The case of the state versus Wallace Walling will also be heard at this term. The defendant in this case is charged with assault and attempt to murder. The case of T. J. Cochran and S. M. Jamison is also docketed for this term. Both men are charged with swindling in an oil stock scheme. The case of the state versus Mrs. Nora Stanton is also on this docket. The defendant is charged with obtaining goods from the Little store under false pretense and waived a preliminary and is said to have refused bond. She has been in jail since being arrested at Amarillo some weeks ago. Several forgery cases will come up for a hearing. Several will have to answer to charges of disposing of mortgaged property. The term will cover a period of three weeks.

Some of the best legal talent in West Texas will be present for this term. It is understood that some of the accused will be represented by attorneys from central Texas.

A negro aroused the suspicions of the officers and he was removed from the train at Memphis. Sheriff Rutherford went down after him Saturday but he and other officers were convinced that the negro was the wrong man. No arrests have been made in the case up to the time of going to press.

### CONGRESSMAN JONES WANTS UNIFORM TARIFF

EXTRACT FROM SPEECH OF CONGRESSMAN MARVIN JONES IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, DECEMBER 14, 1920. SPECIAL TO THE NEWS

A desperate situation confronts the producers of this country—not fanciful, but real. Wheat, corn and cotton, as well as live stock are selling below the cost of production. Relief must be given, or the farms and ranches of this country will be deserted. In this problem every man, woman and child in America is vitally interested. Everything in this country ultimately depends upon the prosperity of the producer.

In the first place the net earnings of the Federal Reserve System, already accumulated should be authorized as loans to the farmer and stockman. The organized banking machinery of this country too long has been limited to the commercial interests, whereas back of industry, necessarily is the producer. If the producer fails, the business man must finally go to the wall. Nearly \$100,000,000 could be furnished at once under this plan.

The Treasury Department should be instructed to immediately reissue the War Finance Corporation, and through it to extend credits to the producers.

An absolute embargo should be placed upon the importation of wheat, cattle, cotton and wool, so that the millions of bushels of wheat and other products could be kept out of this country until a living price for farm products is restored.

Again, inasmuch as we are to have a tariff to help pay the war debt, it should be placed upon raw materials as well as the finished product. The doctrine of free raw materials and a protected manufactured product is a pernicious one. Requiring the producer to buy in a protected market and sell in a free one means bankruptcy for the farmer and ranch

### LOCAL GROCERS FORCED TO CASH BASIS JAN. 1

Grocers of many other towns were adopting the cash basis method of doing business earlier in the fall. Reports from all over the Panhandle indicates that local merchants were about the last to reach the decision that they must sell for cash or go out on a cash basis, they are now forced to do so and will sell for cash only after the first of the year.

Selling groceries for cash has its advantages as well as its disadvantages. The new system means some reduction in prices. It means that those who pay will not have to pay the bills of the other fellow as well as their own. In the long run, it would be far better for the whole country if every merchant sold for cash only, and that day is not far distant.

The first Holiday noise arrived with the dismissal of the public schools Friday after several of the grammar grade teachers had given the "kiddies" an opportunity to exchange gifts. The public schools will take two weeks for holidays that the teachers may attend the institute at Wellington.

THEN next morning how he'd hurry down to see the things he had. Things old Santa Claus had brought him, just to make a wee boy glad!

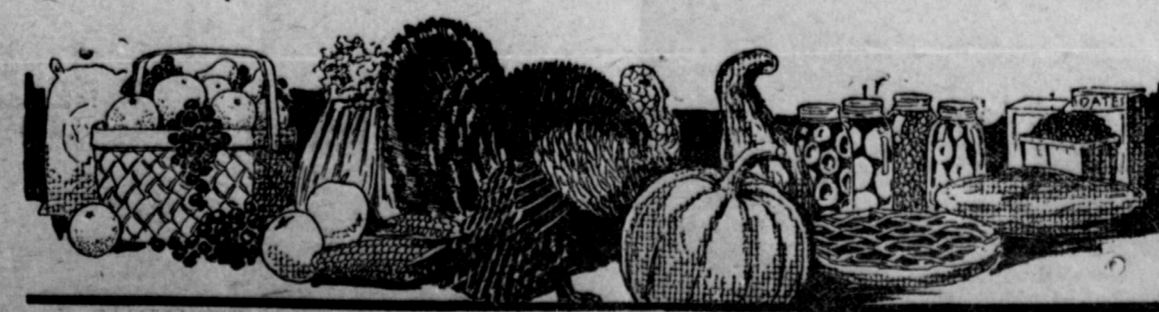

Have we paused to seriously consider the reason for celebrating the Christmas season? This is a question that should be given our sober thought as we approach that gladdest of all seasons. The fact that nineteen hundred and twenty years ago a Jewish babe was born in the town of Bethlehem of Judea, is too far removed from this present age to be worthy of note, were it not for the infinity that attended His birth. When Christ came into the world He came with a mighty purpose, so far above the ken of the purely human mind that until this day the human mind cannot comprehend the significance. That He is the Son of God is revealed when we get in close touch with the Divine Spirit. It was so in that day when Jesus said to Peter, "flesh and blood hath not revealed this," and it will be so until the end of time. But it is nevertheless true that our mental understanding often leads us into right paths and into intercourse with God's Spirit. From the first Christmas until this blessed season in 1920 has transpired events that cannot but con-

vince the dullest that the Man of Galilee was more than the ordinary man, and "spoke as never Man spake." The Golden Rule is so far above the ordinary human inclination that it can have had no lower author than God. The Christian religion that has sustained thousands in times of peril, that has glorified men and women even in death is too high, too holy, too noble, to be other than Divine. The only religion that promotes charities can be only that of a God of Mercy. Well may we celebrate the glad anniversary of the birth of Christ. It was the gladdest event of all the ages, to us and every person, yesterday, today and forever. "Peace on earth, good will to men." Let us be merry, let us be joyful, let us give good gifts, let us give ourselves—a brighter and better world will certainly result.

Possibly the greatest joke that has got into print in recent days came last week when a few secretaries of chambers of commerce of Vernon and nearby towns met in solemn concourse and voted that they favored a merging of all the regional chambers of commerce in Texas into the Texas Chamber of Commerce. The thin veil that shrouds the main purpose of this move was shorn of most of its secrecy when the action of the meeting in question was given such large prominence in the Dallas papers. Most people who are at all familiar with the work of the so-called "Texas" Chamber of Commerce know that it is very little more than a "foreign" department of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce. It has small financial resources, it is reputed to be somewhat in debt, and is actuated so largely by jealousy of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, that it is passing strange that men who live and draw salaries from West Texas towns should be so easily blinded by propaganda so palpably without reason or justice. The West Texas Chamber of Commerce is the second largest and strongest commercial organization in the world. It came into being when West Texas needed help. It has given reason for its existence ever since its inception, and well may it be the ob-

ject of envy to other organizations not so founded and without such evident fruits. The News is happy that the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce very promptly and very emphatically put its veto upon such a nefarious plot as would wreck the usefulness of our most potent commercial asset, and surrendering into the hands of the grasping fund-chasers of the "Texas" Chamber of Commerce with offices at the head of navigation on the Trinity. Nix on it, boys, let us give more power to the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. Let us rally to the support of the Panhandle-Plains Chamber of Commerce. In so doing we shall strengthen the work of our local body and stand true to the best interests of West Texas and the Panhandle.

If the combined resources of the banks in Donley County will not suffice to handle the credits necessary to distribute the pure-bred hogs among the farmers and farmer-boys of this county, The News suggests that there may be a number of private citizens who would be glad to back the transaction on one or more head. The price of one pure-bred pig will be from fifty to seventy-five dollars. This sum not only represents the true worth of the animal, but the extension of such a loan means a great step for progress in better breeding in our county, which of all counties in Texas is most blessed in natural resources as a hog country. When a boy is backed for one or more of these pedigreed pigs it creates an ambition in his breast to raise a better individual boar or sow, and when you stir ambition in the breast of a boy, you work tremendously for better citizenship and financial independence. Some of our banks are glad to help in the good work. A number of citizens are deeply interested and it is now believed that no pure-bred hog will of necessity be sold out of the county. For five years no registered swine should be allowed to go out from us. We need every one in the founding of pure-bred herds for Donley County.

There is something queer about this "hard times" squall. Clarendon banks have nearly two million dollars on deposit. The cattlemen have been in straightened circumstances for some time—the money isn't theirs. The merchants are all hard run for cash—the money can't be theirs. The farmers once had lots of money but after running themselves for this crop and then not getting anything for the crop—it doesn't stand to reason that it is theirs. Use a little of your idle time and figure out just whose money makes up these noble deposits. "Button, button, whose got the button."

The days you are busy, you are happy. When you idle about the streets and listen to hard luck stories, you just naturally get blue. Since this is true it stands to reason that most of this depressed feeling is caused by talk. Work is a panacea for the greater per cent of human ills. Let's try it out and feel better.

#### PROFITABLE DAIRY HERD FROM SMALL BEGINNING

To illustrate how a good herd of cattle may be developed from a small beginning, the United States Department of Agriculture makes public the following letter from a farmer near Nokesville, Va. This letter is typical of many contributed by practical farmers aiding in the "Better Sires—Better Stock" campaign.

"I am a farmer and dairyman. I milk 15 cows and raise about 2 calves a year so as to be able to cull my herd 2 cows a year and replace with young cows.

"I started with common grades of all kinds, but they were good ones. Then I began using my neighbor's pure bred bull, and kept the best heifers. But this was slow progress, so I bought six grade Holstein heifers and also a pure bred bull. Then I added two pure bred cows.

"I now find a ready sale for stock. I wish to sell, even for my grades. When one uses a good bull and good cows, well cared for, he does not have any scrub calves."

The letter points out clearly how it is possible for one to develop gradually into a breeder of pure bred and high-grade live stock.

#### BAKED EGGS WITH CHEESE MAKE GOOD SUPPER DISH

The combination of eggs and cheese makes dish suitable for supper, dinner, or lunch. The following recipe is recommended by the experimental kitchen of the United States Department of Agriculture:

4 eggs, 1 cup, or 4 ounces, grated cheese, 1 cup of fine, soft stale bread crumbs, 1-4 teaspoon salt, a few grains of Cayenne pepper.

Break the eggs into a buttered baking dish or into ramekins and cook in a hot oven until they begin to turn white around the edge. Cover with the mixture of crumbs, cheese, and seasonings. Brown in a very hot oven. In preparing this dish it is essential that the oven be very hot or the egg will be too much cooked by the time the cheese is brown. To avoid this, some cooks cover the eggs with white sauce before adding crumbs.

The food value of the dish is very close to that of a pound of beef of average composition. For those who are particularly fond of cheese, the amount of cheese in this recipe may be very much increased, thus making a much more nourishing dish; or the amount may be reduced so as to give hardly more than a suggestion of the flavor of cheese.

#### INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT THE BIRTH OF CHRIST

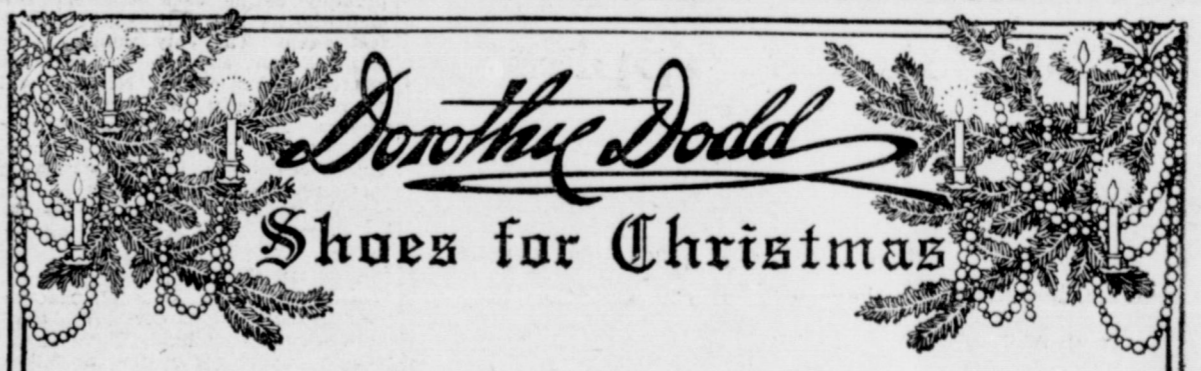
The following, gleaned from an old exchange, embodies the facts that led to celebrating the birthday of Christ on December twenty-fifth when it should be December 5th, according to the clipping below:

"Many are misled about the day, and thus do not know that its selection was due to the worship of the heathen goddess Diana. Her festival fell on December 20 and lasted four days. The next day, the 25th, was observed by the exchange of presents of all kinds. In the reign of the Emperor Commodus in the second century, so says Pelsphorus, who lived in his reign, this heathen feast day was adopted into the Christian Church. This fact you will find in all true histories of that time."

"The true date of the birth of Christ is confirmed by Luke, who in his gospel records the antecedent events to the great event, the birth of our Savior, and the dates of known facts which he used fixes the dates of those various events. From this you see that the angel Gabriel appeared to Zacharias on October 6, and the same angel appeared to Mary, the mother of Christ, to announce the birth of her divine son on March 5. John the Baptist was born on June 5 and Jesus Christ six months thereafter, on December 5. The shepherds saw the holy babe on December 8 and the wise men came to see Jesus on February 4. One month later, to save him from the murderous Herod, Joseph, with the virgin mother, Mary, and the infant, Christ, fled to Egypt, where he abode eight years."

"From those facts the conclusion is irresistible that the true birthday anniversary of Christ is twenty days before the date commonly observed, December 25, which is the date of the present-giving feast of a heathen goddess."

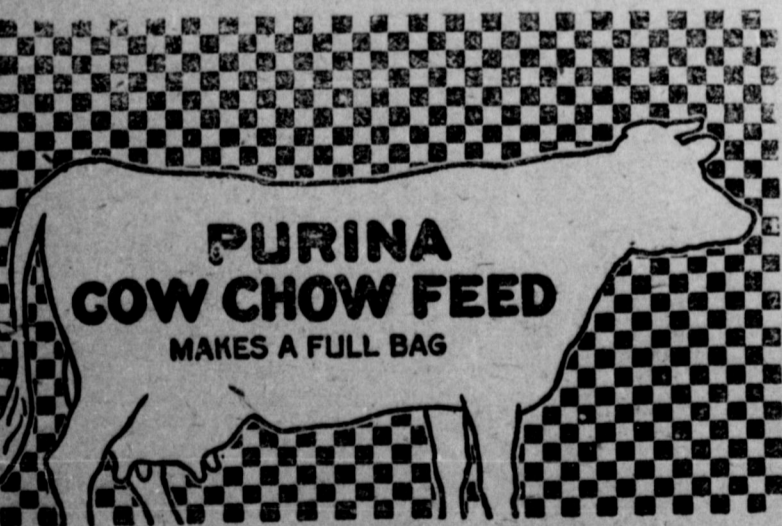

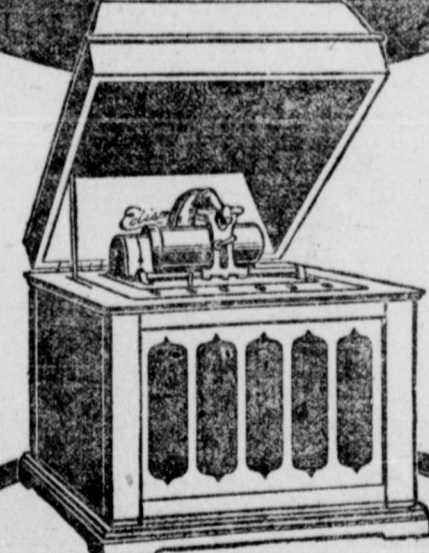

### MERCANTILE FAILURES ARE NON-ADVERTISERS

"Dunn and Bradstreet mercantile agencies show a 25 per cent increase in failures for last week, over the same week in 1919. It also shows that 84 per cent of the failures for last week were firms that were non-advertisers. These two sets of statistics bring out just one thing—that storekeepers are failing and that business men are going along just the same. The difference between a store keeper and a merchant is the difference between success and failure, between being able to manage your business—as against letting your business manage you. Last year a lot of storekeepers got the idea they were merchants. They did not know how they did it—perhaps they were the most surprised of all of us. It was easy to sell at a profit. They could buy anything then at any price, and it was cheap the next day. If the merchant did not sell one day, his goods were worth more the next. But today—the storekeepers and the merchants are being separated like the chaff and the wheat at the harvest. It takes a real business man, a real merchant, to handle the business that last year just handled itself. Eighty four per cent—all but 16 per cent—of the 211 failures in the United States last week were non-advertisers. It is not more proof of the now time worn phrase, that advertising is the greatest single element that enters into the making of modern business success?"—San Angelo Standard.
