While we read a lot these days of reckless driving there is one prevalent form of recklesness which is responsible for a very heavy toll of human life, of which we read and hear little. We refer to the recklesness of pedestrians-a condition which is growing so general that every motorist lives in constant dread of what the day may bring forth. How many times have you had to turn sharply to the right side or the wrong side in order to avert stricking some careless individual who shuffles out into the path of traffic without looking where he is going -sometimes looking back and talking to some one on the sidewalk? How many times do we jam the brakes and pray while the car comes to a stop a bare inch from somebody who walks aimlessly or jauntily out from parked cars his eyes fixed on some silk stocking or else star-gazing -with mind as far from danger as his gaze? There is no question but we have one hundred percent too much reckless driving, but it is just as true that we need to cry aloud against the carelessness of hundreds of pedestrians who jeopardize their own lives and those of others by their heedless rambling across our streets and highways. Most of us are both motorists and pedestrians, therefore we may take both lessons to heart and profit thereby. The warning heeded will mean longer life and fewer accidents for us all.

A most deplorable accident hap-A most deplorable accident hap-pened late Saturday afternoon when the car driven by Miss D'-Laurel Beville hit W. G. Raby of near Wichita Falls and injured him so that he died en route to Wichita Falls in an ambulance. Mr. A. M. Beville and Miss D'Lau-rel were returning from San An-Mr. A. M. Beville and Miss D'Lau-rel were returning from San An-tonio, where Mr. Beville had gone to meet his daughter and had progressed that distance when the accident happened. From witness-es of the accident, it would seem that the man had stepped from a truck' and was watching the in bound traffic to Wichita Falls for an attempt to cross the road in bound traffic to Wichita Falls for an attempt to cross the road to his home, which lay not less than 150 yards on the Northern side of the site of the accident. The traffic on the opposite side of the road was not being watched and the man stepped from behind the truck directly in front of the Beville car. He was hit by the left fender and caromed on to the windshield which was shat-tered, cutting Miss Beville about the face and arms. The car was the face and arms. The car was thrown off the road by the impact and stopped in the ditch as soon as

Mr. and Miss Beville then drove into Wichita Falls, where they appeared in an examination before appeared in an examination before the coroner's inquest. Witnesses to the tragedy testified and the Bevilles were cleared of all res-ponsibility concerning the victim. Mr. Raby was not killed instantly but died before he could be placed under medical care. The tragedy occurred about half way from Wichita Falls to Iowa Park.

A driver was secured for the car just after they left Estelline, and brought them in to Memphis, where they were met by Harwood Beville, who brought them on home. Miss Beville is in a state of shock from the accident and.
