Clarendon is one of the important points on the Denver road between Fort Worth and Amarillo. It turns over to the road many thousands of dollars annually. By refusing to pay its cost of paving, which would amount to but a few hundred dollars at the outside, the road will lose the good will of Clarendon citizens. It will not lose their patronage, however, because Clarendon has no alternative; there is no other

And that is the secret of such a policy as the Denver is charged with attempting to carry out in Clarendon. If it had competition in Clarendon it wouldn't go into district court to avoid paving a street that crosses its property. Railroads in Amarillo always have been more than fair in co-operating on street improvement programs. The Santa Fe, for example, spent \$60,000, which was more than half the cost of the project, on the viaduct on East Tenth street. Private property, other than homesteads, is assessed paving costs, when owners fail to sign the petitions, and the paving is paid for with penalty attached. Clarendon should have such a provision in its charter that would apply to railroads which wilfully refuse to do their part. In fact, the Clarendon News is of the opinion a way will be found to force the Denver to come through. 




