"In a one-house legislature, the faithful servant would find his recworthy legislator to cover up his record. "A bill to become law in a twohouse legislature must pass both branches in exactly the same form. Where there is a disagreement between the two houses, it is referred to a conference committee. This committee is more powerful in all matters referred to it than either

"Its meetings are held in secret: there is no such thing as a roll-call vote: and there is no record of its proceedings. A bill, once referred to a conference committee, cannot by a majority of the conferees representing each house.

"Thus, it is within the power of the committee, in secret and without a record vote, and without any public record whatever, to absolutely prevent legislation, and to kill or to modify, at its pleasure, any proposed legislation within its jurisdiction

"If a report is agreed to, it is then reported to the house and to the senate, and the bill thus reported cannot be amended. It must either be accepted as a whole or rejected in its entirety. Thus, members of the senate and the house are compelled, without an opportunity to offer amendments, to good they must accept the bad. If they think the bad predominates, they must likewise reject the good.
