



Doctor Kaupp states that those chicks which run out-of-doors pick up other things which are required for good health and development, but usually this is not sufficient as the tests with

the cod liver oil show. As a result of all the tests, Doctor Kaupp believes that the expense of using 1 per cent of this oll is well worth while. It holds up the health and gives stronger constitutional vigor.
