



The authorities at the institu tion were of the opinion that the find might possibly be similar to a skeleton unearthed some time ago in Arkansas, which reptile was found to have been a water animal. Professor Moorman plans to make further investigations and excavations as soon as possible, in attempt to find any possible trace of the animal's limbs, which if discovered will show whether the creature was a land animal water animal.

Identification' will become difficult in the event the bones of the limbs are discovered. Profes sor Moorman expects to receiv some definite information from the Smithsonian Institution regarding the animal by Oct. 1 .-Dallas News.
