The Broncho-Cyclone Game As Seen by a Senior

In a driving snowstorm with a bitter wind blowing a gale, amidst cheers and fervent pleadings from the sideline, the faithful and loyal Broncho team fought valiantly against the Memphis Cyclones.

All the clean fighting, brave spirits, and courageous plunging on the part of the Clarendon boys failed to keep the opposing team from scoring. The Bronchos were penalized time after time for faults common to the Cyclones; yet the Memphis squad was rarely set back.

Out weighed, on foreign soil, and many discomforts — these played a part in the outcome of the game as far as the Bronchos were concerned. Foul rumors circulated freely concerning various officials; and the stealthy roughness, brutal intents, and unclean play on the part of the opposing team aroused much feeling on the sidelines and made the clean sportsmanship of the Broncho team the more noticeable.

During the half, the Clarendon Pep Squad marched out on the field, giving yells for Memphis and for the Bronchos. The splendid support of the Pep Squad helped the boys from Home fight harder.

Typical of the Memphis "wit" was the crude, childish stunt, attempted by the Memphis girls. A stretcher being unavailable, two bridge tables bearing a sheet-covered figure with "Clarendon" spelled in scarlet letters on the sides were brought out by the Memphis girls who, dressed as nurses, tried to keep in step. Behind the dummy followed a procession of mourners imitating friends of the Broncho team.

We are ashamed of the fact that one of the Memphis players who formerly attended school here and who won a football sweater from dear old C. H. S. two years ago, but who is now attending the Memphis school, allowed his Maroon and White sweater, emblem of the Broncho Football Team, emblem of Clarendon, emblem of all that is pure and clean—that boy allowed that sweater to be shamed by being worn in that despicable procession.

Out on the field before the eyes of the Clarendon fans, the Memphis pep squad flaunted the colors of the visiting team. It was like waving a red flag before an angry bull. Before the prescribed operation could take place, the Clarendon fans had swarmed out on the field and removed all traces of the Broncho symbols, leaving two bridge tables, one dummy, and others—"flabbergasted" on the field.

The second half of the game was a repetition of the second quarter. There was no scoring on either side. At last, due to certain well-founded reasons, the game was forfeited to the Memphis team. The Bronchos returned home quite battered it is true, but they left the field with the knowledge that they played a clean game.

The family home had been maintained near Hedley most of the time, tho the family resided in Clarendon a short time some three years ago.

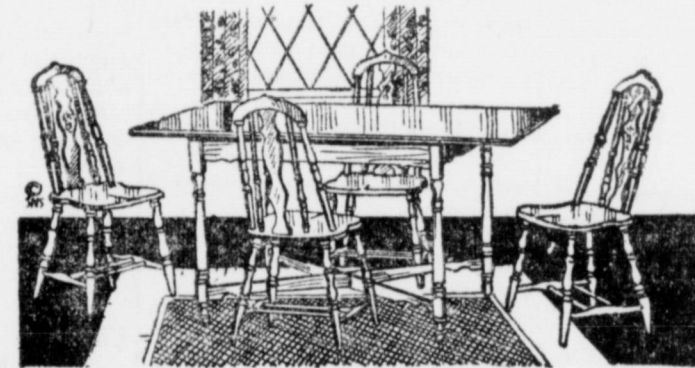
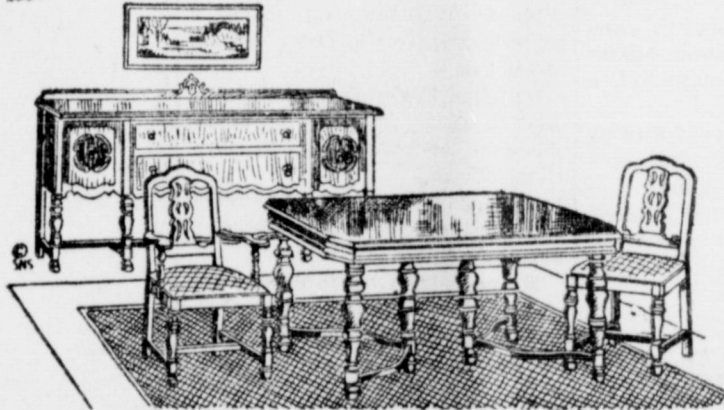

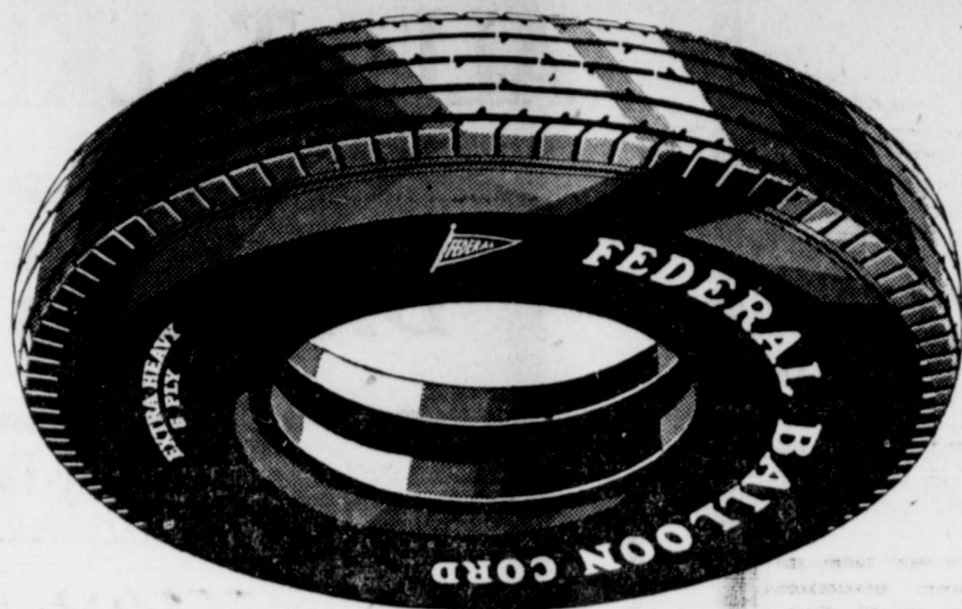
