

### Was a Member of The Ellis Wrecking Company And Principal Mechanic Of Exceptional Skill

While removing the plug from a gas tank with a blow torch Sunday afternoon at the Ellis Wrecking Company, Oscar Ellis, aged 24, was blown out of the garage some Christmas Week fifteen feet by an explosion that rocked the building.

He was on fire and ran toward his father, F. M. Ellis crying, "save me! save me! don't let me die." The father removed his coat sweater as he ran toward his son immediately wrapping the victim's face an head smothering the flames but not until his body was burned in a number of places extending from his feet to his head.

The father hurried the son to the hospital for medical aid and though he walked into the hospital, he had evidently inhaled flames and died about two o'clock Monday morning.

F. M. Ellis, father of the victim, was severely burned in attempting to save the life of his son. The right hand being burned so badly that the flesh came loose from the bones. Though suffering intense pain, he will recover the use of his hand in time.

John Morris, who was standing talking to Oscar Ellis just as he got ready to loosen the soldered plug with the torch remarked, 'you are flirting with the undertaker Oscar" and turned to walk away just as the explosion occured. Morris received severe burns also.

Panhandle but Thursday when the Key Key Bankers, one from every County of the Panhandle met in session with them a resolution was adopted to form county councils in each county composed of the Key Banker, the county agent, the Home Demonstration Agent, the Chamber of Commerce Secretary, a member of the Commissioners

Court and one representative from each of the clubs in the county which are under the supervision of the Home Demonstration Agent and County Farm Agent.

The object was to get the Bankers to understand the Farm Probems better and to get the coopration of every body in the county to put over the soundest Agricultural program possible. For instance when a farm woman has agreed with the Home Demonstration Agent that the best thing she can do is to grow the food for the family at home and keep it in her pantry shelves to furnish adequate diet for the family the year round, she sometimes wants to get a little seed money advanced to start this garden. If the Bankers and the Agricultural workers and specialists understand each other the farm woman will have her garden, but if there is misunderstanding she probably will not because she fears to ask the banker to cooperate and he fears that the money will be sunk in seed which will never bear fruit enough to repay his loan. ### **Paul Revere Busy Man**

Aside from galloping through the night and into history, Paul Revere, the patriotic horseman of the Revolution, engaged in a number of avocations, including the sale of anti-prohibition liquor.

In correspondence made public today by E. H. A. Revere, great grandson of the revolutionary hero, bills of lading are included showing that Paul Revere sold a consignment of rum at 60 cents a gallon and a case of gin at a proportionate bargain figure.

Other documents, hitherto unre vealed sowed that Revere was America's original jack-of-all tardes, being at various times a dentist, a copper roller, a goldsmith, an engraver of the nation's currency, and a powder manufacturer.

In addition, he probably was the new republic's first great industrialist whose iron was in every commercial fire. The copper business which he founded in Boston is perpetuated today in a corporation headed by his great grand-

The letters revealed that Revere supplied copper to Robert Fulton for the famous "Claremont," first steamboat.

Revere also was a manufacturer of picture frames and ran a hardware store on Essex Street ni Boston.

Revere was justly proud of his ability as a dentist and sent the following reminder to past and future clients:

"Artificial teeth

He would now inform them and all others, who are so unfortunate as to lose their teeth by accident or other ways, that he still continues the business of a dentist, and flatters himself that






